

AMPOL CUP SEMI-FINALS

TOWNSVILLE UNITED 4 (Young 18th; Geoghegan 86th; Spiegelhauer 97th; Goeghegan 115th) d MT. GRAVATT 2 (Bland 43rd; E. Thompson 68th) Halftime 1-1; Referee Col Amos, rating 9. THIS was a tremendous Cup encounter with goals galore, plenty of action and more than enough to keep the big Sports Reserve crowd happy, especially with their local heroes winning, to avenge the 1-0 loss to the Mounts which knocked them out of this competition some 13 months ago. TKU applied some early pressure and an uncharacteristic bad pass by Paul Yeuell in the 18th minute created the initial opening for Chris Young, who scored from eight metres with the keeper Mark Davis stranded. The Mt. Gravatt equaliser also resulted from a defense lapse, just before halftime, when Hugh Montgomery failed to clear a corner and an intelligent chip from Mal Bland beat Phil Figgins all ends up. Midway through the second session, Mt. Gravatt looked the more composed of the two sides and the penalty which resulted from a foul on Gary Bohan looked to have settled the issue. In the last 10 minutes, the home side mounted an all out assault but it looked as if they might not be capable of pulling off the task.

That was until the 86th minute, when Young, instead of passing to men he had in support, charged through the defence and rapped his shot against the crossbar. from where Mick Goeghegan followed through to finish the job and force extra time. There is no doubt the vocal support at the Reserve lifted TKU for the extra time period and after only seven minutes of the additional session, midfielder Mark Spiegelhauer came up with the goal of the match from 15 metres out, when his great shot broke the deadlock. Mt. Gravatt were magnificent in defeat and kept plugging away for the equaliser, but the issue was finally settled by Geoghegan's goal. Eric Thompson had patrolled the Irishman all night in an effort to cut down his aerial skills, but for once he slipped away from his marker to head in Townsville's fourth goal. Geoghegan deservedly won the Lappins Menswear man of the match award but he had several outstanding teammates in this victory. Mt. Gravatt, who ended with yellow cards for Bohan, John Ferguson and Leon Wilson, were best served by Bland, Eric Thompson and Steve Clark.

In a fairly dour uninspiring match at Perry Park, last year's Cup Finalists met again, this time in a semi-final, but the end result was identical to that of 1979.

Ipswich got into their stride fairly quickly with Ian Lawrie testing Thistle's keeper John Ferguson with a blasting 25 metre shot in only the second minute. Thereafter Ipswich could do nothing right as their buildup was excellent, but the final thrust was non-existent. Lawrie and Peter Binnie were both guilty of poor finishing thereby making a mockery of the bulk of their teams' midfield work. After 13 minutes, Steve Dolan went through the middle of the park with the ball leaving a wake of green shirts behind him, pushed the ball left to Wilson Maelaua who drove home, keeper Donnelly could only parry the shot and Alan Marley put it away.

Steve Dolan, who had one of his best matches in a long while, again was prominent when he pushed a ball to Marley dead in front of the Ipswich goal, Marley bicycle kicked goalwards and Donnelly did well to palm away for a corner. On the half hour Ritchie Wilson broke through the Thistle defence and was practically there when he lost momentum and slowed down on the edge of the box, the tattered Thistle defenders recovered and cleared the danger.

Danny Hill saw one of his headers miss the upright by a mere metre and then Greg Donnelly pulled the next one right off his head after Mickey Tripp had supplied the cross.

Just prior to the break Thistle had their best chance to go two up when amidst a terrible scratchy defensive mix up they had four separate shots at goal either blocked or go wide. So half time brought 1-0 to Grange Thistle.

After the interval Thistle's central defender, Mark Aponas, was guilty of a missed clearance and this allowed Ian Lawrie through to an open goal. Inexplicably he shot too casually and Ferguson's spreading body blocked his shot.

Eleven minutes in and Derek Barron was just centimetres short of a lobbed ball to the Ipswich left striking position where Jeff Dann blasted goalwards. Ferguson could only knock it out onto Peter Binnie's head and from there it went home. 1-1. This did, in fact, liven the match up as Ricky Mangan then shaved the Ipswich cross bar from 25 metres and Randall McKeand's good first time volley only just missed Thistle's crossbar.

Both teams were guilty of giving away

possession, it appeared to be a contest as to how many bad passes could be strung together by either side.

On the half hour Ian Lawrie atoned for his earlier misses by putting away a not too easy shot after again receiving the ball from Jeff Dann through a square defence. Greg Donnelly kept Ipswich in the Final by pulling off two good saves in the dying minutes, one from the very laces of Alan Marley and one from a mis-hit but goal bound shot, also from Alan Marley after John Paterson had provided the lead-up.

In the final minute of the game Ipswich sent on young Neville O'Sullivan to have a taste of Cup football and with his very first touch of the ball he very nearly scored — the problem was it was at the wrong end. Fortunately, Greg Donnelly

again came to the rescue.

PREPARATION of the Queensland team this year included a weekend training camp at Tallebudgera. The squad of 18 players and three officials kept to a rather hectic schedule.

On Saturday, after a rigorous session in the morning, the girls played the Gold Coast U15 representative boys team. This was a very evenly contested match with the score level nil all at half time.

After the break, the boys found form, scoring three goals. Sharon Wass managed to pull one goal back with the final score being 3-1.

Sunday came far too quickly for many members of the squad and began with a beach job at 6 a.m. Later in the morning the squad played the Gold Coast Women's representative team. This match could be described as a confidence booster with the final score 13:0 against the Coast including seven goals by Sue Monteath and three from Sharon Wass.

MERTON MANIA

AFTER the last two performances, this Merton Mania could be described by the head shrinkers as a "Manic Depressive". Little has been seen which could elate even the most avid Merton follower. This week's trip to the Sunnyside cowpaddock must surely prove better than the last two weeks, musn't it!

I applaud the Sunnyside Club for their efforts to develop their own facilities. They are at least trying, unlike many other clubs, some of whom hold positions in State League. However, at this stage of development the playing surface leaves a lot to be desired. The area has a good coverage of grass but is very uneven and thereby generating some unbelievable bounces and wobbles. The approaches to the ground also leave a lot to be desired, God knows what it would be like in the wet. However, they have made a start, I don't envy the financial outlay they are facing to adequately develop the area, but they are not "dragon" their feet and when done will soar like eagles. I won't mention the State League sides who are "dragon" their feet and won't soar like eagles.

Despite the uneven surface of the pitch the First Division game provided some passages of attractive football from both sides. Merton played the game in patches of about ten minutes duration. During these spells they played simple balls to feet and kept Sunnyside out of the game. Unfortunately the success of these tactics went unheeded by the Merton boys who became ambitious and in some instances lazy. Whenever they played the simple stuff they looked a premiership side but to gain that honour they will have to sustain this type of play for longer than ten minutes at a time.

The type of bounce generated by this pitch was illustrated in the first few minutes when a ball was rolled about six metres along the ground to find "Sonny" Meikle unmarked in the middle of goal and about two metres off the line. As he made his shot the ball popped up from the ground to strike him in the face. The goal would not have counted anyway as play was stopped for an infringement, but had the situation been different, this wobble could have cost the game. This shouldn't happen in First Division football.

Without being biased, Merton should have won this game. They created more chances and were in general the better side. But, chances don't win games unless converted, so let's start knocking a few in. "Chub" Donsky, promoted from fifth division after the Trident game, obviously missed his application of "Brand D" as he was unable to produce the screamers evident in that game. Perhaps he was tired from all the walking he has to do these days. We got a point from this one and showed some slight improvement on the previous two games. I may not have to consult my "shrink" after all.

FIFTH DIVISION. This was a vital game in fifth division so far as table positions were concerned. The sides were level on points with Merton taking second position on goal averages. A win to either side would see them in the clear in second position. The fifths this week included two youngsters from the Colts, John 'Coca Cola' Cariola, and Stein Grodum. Those Merton old timers seeing Cariola for the first time could be forgiven for mistaking him for another little dynamo, the late Johnny Anthony. The physical appearance and style of play of the two is remarkable.

Merton took charge of this game territorially from the outset but like the first division found goals hard to come by. Many chances were created by intelligent play before an opportunist effort by John Cariola saw the ball finally netted by Shane Box. I must admit I thought Shane was offside, but, the linesman disagreed with me and the goal was allowed.

The single goal did not allow Merton to relax and desoite many missed chances during the remainder of the game they were subjected to a lot of pressure by Sunnyside. The fact that they were under pressure robbed "The Incredible Hulk" of his first senior appearance. Kev Grimley couldn't afford to blood the kid, but don't worry Murph, your turn will come. Final score one nil to Merton. Congratulations.

Cup Playoffs in U.S.

NEW YORK, N.Y. - During the ordinary CONCACAF Congress at the United Nations, the 19 teams participating in the August 1-17, 8th CONCACAF Youth Championship were assigned venues for the preliminary round qualification matches.

The CONCACAF tournament, which will qualify two teams for the 1981 World Youth Championship in Australia as the representatives from CONCACAF, the 23 nation regional governing body of FIFA (the World governing body) whose jurisdiction includes the North and Central American and Caribbean Soccer associations, is being hosted by the United States Soccer Federation at four regional venues.

Preliminary round matches will be played at all four sites August 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9, with the top two teams from each venue advancing to the quarter finals, scheduled for August 12 and 15. The four venues for the tournament are Princeton, N.J.

(East), St. Louis (Midwest), Dallas (South), and Los Angeles (West).

The United States has been seeded in the East, joined by El Salvador, Barbados, the Netherlands Antilles and Antigua. In the Midwest, Honduras, Bermuda, Grenada, and Surinam will go head-to-head. The South venue will consist of Canada, Puerto Rico, Guatemala, Jamaica and Trinidad & Tobago. And in the West, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Panama, Cuba and Costa Rica will play one

With 19 national youth teams participating, the tournament will be the largest in the 19-year history of CONCACAF and the most important soccer competition ever hosted by the United States. The Coca-Cola Company, the leading commercial supporter of soccer around the world and local bottlers of Coca-Cola are the exclusive sponsors of the event

for teams comprised of players 19 years of age and younger (born after August 1,

All the teams in the East venue will play at the Princeton University field and be lodged on the campus of Princeton. Southern Illinois University, located in the St. Louis vicinity in nearby Edwardsville, Ill., will house the teams in the Midwest. All games there will be staged at SIU's Cougar Field.

In the South, the teams will compete at Dallas' Franklin Field, a 10,000-seat facility that at one time served as the home field for the North American Soccer League's Dallas Tornado. The South teams will stay at Dallas Baptist College. The teams in the West venue will do battle in the 90,000-seat Los Angeles Coliseum and reside on the campus of UCLA, which will also be the site of the Olympic Village for the 1984 Games.

Mexico, because it was the CONCACAF champion in the previous tournament 1978 in Honduras, was seeded, while 1978 runner-up Canada was seeded in the South. Honduras was seeded by virtue of the fact it qualified for the 1977 World Youth Tournament in Tunisia. The United States was seeded because it is the host nation. Both the winner and the runnerup will

advance to the 16-nation World Youth Championship in Australia next summer and play for the Coca-Cola Cup.

ROSSI IS IN A FIX

ROME - Paolo Rossi, the Italian centreforward under suspension for his part in the betting and bribes scandal, cannot make up his mind about South Africa.

Rossi recently had his ban cut, on appeal, from 3 years to 2 for accepting money to help "fix" a match for his club, Perugia. But that did not please him because he had hoped his suspension would

have been reduced even more.
"I can't decide what to do next," Rossi said. "On the one hand I feel like quitting football altogether. But I know I owe the game too much." Rossi and his fellow culprits Bruno Giordano and Lionell Amanfredonia, of Lazio, Rome, have turned to South Africa because this is the country with organised football outside FIFA where they could play.



SO CLOSE - SO FAR

MELBOURNE — South Melbourne escaped defeat by five seconds, snatching a lucky 3-3 draw after slack defensive play had twice cost them the lead in their Philips Soccer clash against Brisbane City at Middle Park.

14th August, 1980

Defeat would almost certainly have put South Melbourne out of the top four. South Melbourne had territorial advantage throughout the game but failed to escape the clutches of Brisbane City's tightmarking defenders David Ratcliffe, Kevin Caldwell and Steve Perry.

Duncan Cummings, the one South Melbourne forward who beat his opponent, Billie Wilkinson consistently, was foiled by bad luck in shooting for goal and by some fine saves by Kim Wishart. South Melbourne took the lead in the 24th minute with the most courageous goal of the season.

Billie Rodgers scored the goal with a spectacular diving header and knocked himself out as he landed heavily on his face and upper body.

The match was held up for six minutes as Rodgers, his face covered with blood, was carried off on a stretcher and rushed to hospital in a private car. It appeared that Rogers had a broken nose and other facial injuries.

Without Rogers' strength and defensive ability in midfield, South Melbourne lost some of its effectiveness. Brisbane City equalised 12 minutes after half time. Joe Palinkas sent over a corner from the right, Evan's clearing header fell to the feet of unmarked Willie Conner and he rammed the ball high into the net.

South Melbourne reacted immediately with a dangerous header by Cummings but, with Wishart beaten, player-coach George Potter was there to clear off the lines. Kelso squandered a chance to put Brisbane City ahead when he shot too high after a mistake by Arthur Xanthopoulos had enabled him to break clear into the penalty area.

After that lucky let-off South Melbourne surged forward. Evans slipped the ball wide to Vince Bannon and the fullback shot the home team back into the lead from an angle.

But the lead lasted only two minutes. Palinkas played another corner and the defence, challenged by Kelso and Ratcliffe could only repel the ball short to Conner who lashed it low past South Melbourne's shaky goal keeper Peter Laumets.

Bobby Hamilton and Frank Pimblett were getting more of the midfield play now and it was Hamilton who started the move that put Brisbane City ahead 3-2.

Hamilton stormed out of his defence with the ball, played it to Conner and ran on, hoping for a return pass, but Xanthopoulos stopped him with a tackle that injured Hamilton, but also left Xanthopoulos sprawled on the ground unable to prevent Conner from relaying the ball to Kelso, who ran into the penalty area and scored.

Kevin Low replaced Hamilton immediately after the goal.

South Melbourne looked doomed but with five seconds to go referee Evan Venios awarded a free kick about five metres outside the penalty area. George Campbell squeezed the shot through the defensive wall and Wishart could only block it.


