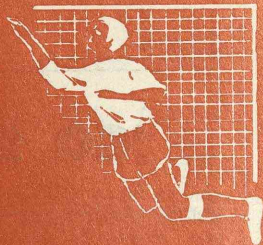

Waves, always well in command, gave themselves a slim outside chance of making the semi-finals with this forceful 4-1 victory at home. Brian Kibbey had a masterly match in the middle to dominate that department and supplied the pass which split the defence to set up the first goal for Gary Bromfield from close range.

Bromfield returned the favour for John Wood a minute from halftime when he gave a pass which enabled Wood to easily beat Steve Cunningham. Frenchville turned on a big effort in a bid to get back into the picture and it looked like coming to fruition when State under-16 rep. Brett Druery scored from a free kick situation, after noticing his State teammate Ross Barbera had slipped.

It was the first goal conceded by the Bundaberg youngster in 250 minutes of State League football. But Waves weathered the storm and came back to 3-1 with a solid drive from Graham Young in the 80th minute. Ron Smith drew the keeper to slot home no. 4, four minutes from the end, and Waves were left to ponder, that they had taken all chances on offer, could well have matched or bettered Thistle's seven goal onslaught in the same round.

Eagles' main chance in the first session came in the 28th minute when Gordon was set up by Archie Fraser, but shot

just wide. The goal came in the 56th minute when Greg Donnelly called for the ball but was beaten in the race for possession by Gordon, who deflected it home.

Ipswich mounted repeated attacks in search of the equaliser but never seriously threatened Eagles, who are making a habit of coming up with unexpected victories.

Poor service from the midfield left strikers Trovalusci and Watson with very few opportunities, and Mareeba's defence was prepared to rely on the long ball in an effort to score on the break. Strong work in the middle by St. George's Ricky Bow, Tom Gray and Billy Fagan kept up a constant supply for Mark Kelsey and Steve Konstaninou. It took Mareeba until the 42nd minute to create their first chance, with Kelly saving and Watson failing at his second attempt. Prior to that, Hardaker was forced into fine saves from Konstaninou and Fairbrother headers and shots from Gray and Bow. St. George's goal came in the 57th minute, a Kelsey penalty after Konstaninou was brought down.

With ten minutes left Mareeba started to find huge gaps and when a Watson pass was completely misread by Tony Edwards, Trovalusci was on hand to nab the equaliser. Then in the last few minutes, Trovalusci had a chance to win the game but Kelly raced outside the area to clean the striker up as he tried to round the keeper instead of shooting. In a long overdue win for Thistle, they defeated Townsville 7-0 after leading 4-0 at halftime. This was the scoreline from a team that had promised so much for so long but delivered so little.

The opening goal nearly came from an own goal when Dale Whalley nodded a harmless bicycle kick from Alan Marley right out of his keeper's hands. Fortunately Figgins recovered and palmed it away.

Marley opened the scoring after 17 minutes after receiving a good ground pass from captain, Iain Fagan.

Townsville's Ian Boyce had a header goalbound but Ferguson plucked it off his head.

On the half hour, Maelaua went in for his first goal after a terrible defensive mix-up. Seven minutes later Dolan sent Sokeni away with Maelaua backing up and applying the finishing touch.

Two minutes before the break Marley went in for his second goal after Mickey Tripp had floated in a 30 metre free kick which Maelaua nodded on.

After the break Townsville played with a bit more purpose. Spiegelhauer dropped one into the box which Tom Walton endeavoured to apply the finishing touch to, but missed the upright by a metre.

Maelaua was in for Thistle's first hat trick of the afternoon after some pathetic defensive work by the TKU backline.

Walton was Townsville's only aggressive forward and he again nearly scored his team's first goal but Ferguson was equal to his efforts.

In the last five minutes of the game, the hapless TKU defence was utterly shot to ribbons as Sokeni and Marley went in for two more goals, but they and Maelaua could have had a handful each. Indeed, once they almost tossed a coin to see who would apply the finishing touch.

This was a game that Townsville and Tim White will remember for a long time, their football was there but they lacked drive and aggression. This was the one thing that Thistle did have in abundance, their strike force clicked all the way, their defence, with Huisty Lazenby fit and well, was completely in control.

For Townsville, Johnson and Tuttle were average in defence, the midfield, unfortunately for them, didn't exist and, up front, Walton played a lone role. Townsville's leading scorer, Chris Young, was nowhere to be seen. One thing is certain, it would be impossible for TKU to have two consecutive matches of this disastrous proportion.

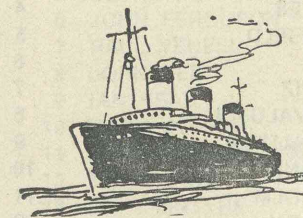

## WARREN TO APPLY

SYDNEY — Former Australian Soccer Captain John Warren is a leading contender for the newly created division of director of soccer coaching at the Australian Institute of sport.

The institute is to commence operation in Canberra next January, and will provide facilities for eight major international sports.

In Sydney, Warren said: "I don't yet know whether the position is fulltime or part-time, but I have strong ties in Canberra and would relish the challenge to conduct the course."

Warren's qualifications are undeniable. He holds the MBE, played 44 full internationals for Australia all around the globe, and represented in the 1974 World Cup finals in West Germany.

His coaching qualifications, a FIFA certificate, was won following four months intensive work in 1972 under international coach Dettmar Cramer. It is the highest available in Asia and Oceania.

Warren coached St. George to NSW grand final honours in 1974 and 1975, and played many top matches with both St. George and Canterbury in a long playing career.

As coach, he carried Canberra City through its stormy early period in 1977 and 1978, the opening years of the Philips League.

In addition, Warren had three months at English club Stockport County, while completing an English Club management course.

He studied economics at University for four years, but is yet to complete a thesis to obtain his degree.

"Time doesn't permit," he said. In addition, Warren has visited the United States three times to study promotional trends in the code.

It is believed that the Home Affairs Department recently advertised in England for suitable applicants.

## COCA-COLA CUP 1981 NEWS

The other quarter-finalists came from the playoffs in Princeton, New Jersey, where the Netherlands Antilles defeated Barbados 3-2 and the United States downed Antigua 3-1. The top American player was Tom Kain.

Crooks scored the second and manager Keith Birkenshaw enthused: "Crooks took that goal really well. He was quick but

Archibald looked even quicker. The pair have a tremendous understanding."

Kevin Keegan's long-awaited and much-heralded return to the first division was something of an anti-climax.

The Southampton fans gave him a tremendous ovation before the two goal victory over Manchester City, but Keegan had a quiet afternoon.

But the England captain's mere presence gave disorganised City the jitters and Mike Channon took full advantage, scoring both goals in the first half.

Said Channon: "If teams concentrate on trying to stop Kevin it will take the pressure of me and Charlie George."

Arsenal new boy Kenny Sansom had a hand in the Frank Stapleton goal that beat West Brom at the Hawthornes, while Brighton's recently signed striker Gordon Smith scored one of the two that dismissed Wolves at the Goldstone Ground.

It proved a happy return to the top flight for newly promoted Birmingham and Sunderland. Neighbours Coventry were beaten 3-1 at Birmingham and had their misery extended by the sending off of Ray Gooding.

Sunderland beat Everton 3-1 at Roker Park, but the third promoted side Leicester went down to a late John Wark goal against Ipswich.

Second division favourites Derby made a disastrous start losing 3-0 at Cambridge, while West Ham went down 2-1 at home to Luton and lost Paul Goddard through injury.

## BLACK DAY FOR LIONS

SYDNEY — Blacktown City temporarily eased their Philips Soccer League relegation worries with a comfortable 4-1 victory over Brisbane Lions at Toongabbie Stadium.

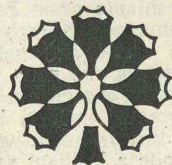

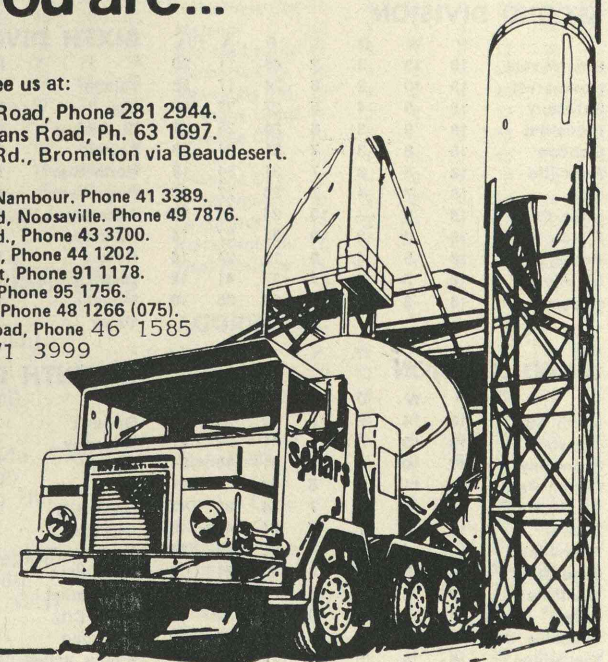
