MERTON FINALE

GRAND Final day will see the last appearance of a Merton team not only for the season, but, forever. Future teams will play under the banner of Eastern Suburbs Soccer Club, and will, as do all major sporting bodies in this area, use as its emblem, a TIGER.

The name change will come about as result of a Special General Meeting held at Heath Park on the 22nd September at which an overwhelming majority of members present voted in favour of the name change.

The rationale behind the change is to gain REGIONAL IDENTITY. Since the headquarters of the club are geographically located with "Tiger Territory" the Eastern Suburbs that part of the title was a natural. As the club will soon become a corporate body it was necessary to have a title acceptable to the Corporate Affairs Commission and as a Club from that other code erroneously uses the name Eastern Suburbs Football Club we could not use that title. Hence the birth of Eastern Suburbs Soccer Club.

Those charged with the administration of the club are not so naive as to believe that change will provide an instant panacea to all problems. Fortunately, most of the problems that have plagued us in the recent past are now behind us, and the club is poised and ready to launch us back to our rightful place amongst the leaders, after several years in the wilderness. However, as with all sporting clubs, particularly those in our code, finance and the acquisition thereof, is a constant worry. As the club has never been associated with any particular group i.e. Ethnic on which we can call for support and/or funding, and it is obvious that we will never be able to survive on gate receipts regardless of the playing level we attain, we feel that it is imperative that we attract finance from sources outside the code. Sponsorship is the area which most readily comes to mind.

It is the contention of our committee that sponsorship can be more readily

attracted by an organisation which identifies with an area, than by a club whose identity is now somewhat obscure. After all, all the name Merton suggests is a street at Woolloongabba which begins at a Pub and ends at the Gaol (do I detect a temperance moral in that). There are many commercial and industrial organisations who will more readily accept a sporting body bearing the name of the area in which they operate than a body whose identity is somewhat obscure. This obscurity is not isolated to those outside the code, there are many within the code who don't know where Merton East come from, nor, the location of their ground. I kid you not.

With proper promotion and liaison within the area i.e. schools and local residents more people will have the opportunity to get to know the Club and accept it as THE Soccer club in the Eastern Suburbs. Result, hopefully, more Juniors and supporters.

There are many other areas in which the name change will have side benefits. These are too numerous to categorise, but, are sufficient to show that the change of name, is not just for the sake of change but a progressive move designed to benefit the Club and its members.

To those stalwarts of the Code who do remember Merton Rovers and more recently Merton East at their best, and worst, we say thank you, and sincerely hope that you retain those memories, fond or otherwise. To those who have been associated with the name in a playing, official or membership capacity, do not despair. The name will be retained in the Merton East Old Boys Association in which we invite you to participate.

So now I say Vale Merton, you have served your members, the Code and the community well. You have provided years of enjoyment to many people and though now leaving the playing arena, you can never be erased from the record books, or from the minds of those on whose lives you have had enormous influence.

It is not without sadness that the author says, Bob Hope style, THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES.

Lex has fitted in well as full back in recent weeks and has given great service to the Club over a period of years. Says Lex "The future Eastern Suburbs Soccer Club will prove an even bigger success than did Merton East. I want to see us go out on a winning note." Lex will be No. 1 Panther in our team of tigers.

LUIS GUERRERO — 17 Full back, an apprentice Boilermaker. "Little Luis" was born in Spain but has played all of his football with this Club. As a Junior he played all his football in goal and gained regular representative honours in the role. Has adapted well on the field and has a big future in the game. Part of the youth policy of this club.

JEFF DOLAN — 20, an Electrician, born in England but now almost accepted as human, the youngest member of the renowned Dolan Family. Jeff played his early football with Souths United but came to our club when still a Junior. RIDGE BOWLS OUT

THE first half of this game was a rather boring affair with both teams getting bogged down in the middle of the park and neither keeper had much to do apart from the occasional back pass. It was Mitchie who nearly scored first in the 38th minute after a goal mouth scramble in which the Ridge defence was at sixes and sevens, but fortunately put the ball away for a corner. Soon after keeper Rob Farrow made a good save from shot from Phil Cruse, with 44 minutes up the Ridge took the lead when Randal Jackson went on one of his overlapping runs, brushing aside 2 or 3 tackles. He lost the ball on the last tackle, a Mitchie defender passed a poor ball back to his keeper and Jacko still running through, gratefully accepted his present and slotted the ball home.

The second half was a big improvement on the first with both teams looking for goals, Mitchie went close in the 9th minute when Richard Shortman hit a good low shot which was saved by keeper Farrow. Two minutes later Mitchie levelled the score when Greg McDonald hit the ball from just outside the area, keeper Farrow appeared to have the shot covered but it took a deflection off a Ridge defender and flew into the top of the net. The Ridge looked like taking the lead in the 24th minute when Captain Cruick, split the Mitchie defence with a good pass to Ferrett Kean, who raced into the Mitchie area only to see his low shot skim past the far post. For the first time in the game the Ridge was getting on top of Mitchie, a shot by Randal Jackson which was really travelling was taken well by the Mitchie keeper, shortly after he was on the spot to make a good save from a "Ferrett" shot. Bobby Davis had a good chance with only a few minutes remaining when he was left on his own. But he miss cued his shot and the score remained 1-1 at full time.

In the first 15 minutes of extra time it was the Ridge who appeared the more likely to score. Nick Griffin had a great chance after 5 minutes, after being put away by Stevie Holmes, he only had the keeper to beat and chose to shoot and his effort was very well taken by the keeper. Just after, Alan Hunter was unlucky not to score when his goal bound header from a corner was cleared off the line with the keeper well beaten.

From the next break Mitchie went 2-1 up when Ross Denny crossed a good ball from the left which was put in the back of the Ridge net by a flying header from Peter McDonald. This was a goal worthy

of winning any match. In the second period of extra time, Mitchie who were finishing the stronger, nearly increased their lead with shots from Phil Cruse and Garth Jones just missing the Ridge uprights. Best for the Ridge were Peter McKenzie in the midfield who must have covered every inch of Perry Park and Rob Farrow who had a great game in goal.

Talking of keepers, the Mitchie keeper had a good game for his team, especially in the second half. Before I finish I would like to thank the editor of GO SOCCER, for the time and effort he has put in to compiling the magazine throughout the season. I was sorry he was not given the support he deserved by other clubs failing to send in reports. Like the gentleman I met from Mitchie last week who thought the mouth was mightier than the pen.

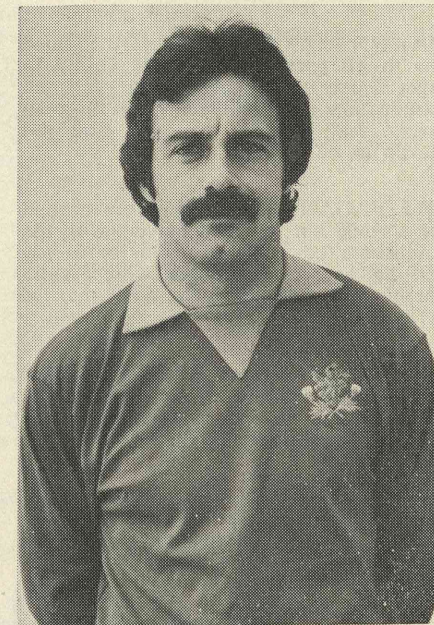

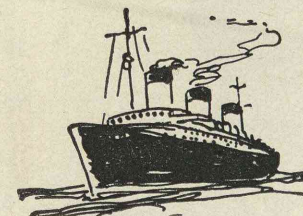
