

TRIDENT VALLEY TOPICS

LAST weekend the club again had mixed success. TOWNSVILLE UNITED 4 (Clarke 76th, 85th; Whiteside 9th; McGuiness 15th) d Wynnum 0. Halftime 2-0. Referee — Des Miles, rating 8.

Pure Magic, was how Allan Clarke was described as he almost totally dominated this match, which in retrospect, virtually gave Wynnum no chance at all. Another description was Clarke 4 d. Wynnum 0. The game was only nine minutes old when the former England striker laid on a pass which enabled Cliff Whiteside to skirt the defence and score. Some six minutes later, he again pulled the defence and slipped a pass across the goalmouth, where Bobby McGuiness finally scored with his second attempt. Wynnum were never really in the hunt as Clarke caused them too many problems yet in the first 15 minutes of the second half they came back a little, particularly through Nigel Rehbock, who struck one good shot and then had another disallowed for offside. Some Townsville supporters said later they could see nothing wrong with the goal.



U.S. Youth Team for Brisbane

NEW YORK (April 3) — Looking at the draw for this October's FIFA World Youth Championships, the US National Youth Team has a stiff challenge.

The US has been paired with Uruguay, Poland and Qatar. While little is known of Qatar, US National Team coach Walt Chyzowych and US National Youth Team coach Bob Gasnler are well aware of Uruguay's and Poland's abilities.

"What I think they did was put two biggies in each group" Chyzowych said. "But we feel very optimistic. Bob has been talking about the Uruguay match in Brazil (a 2-0 loss in January's Paulo Machado de Carvalho Cup in Brazil)."

In his technical report on the Brazillian tourney, Gasnler reported: "This encounter was a predictable effort on our part. Too much respect for the opponent allowed them to dominate the first quarter hour. Their early goal was part of a trend. We played respectively in the back and defensively in general, but were unable to sustain much offensive on a trecherous field with much of the contest played in a rainstorm."

Where the US team had only six days of preparation in Tampa before departing for Brazil, the Americans still have six months to get ready for Australia and the quest for the Coca-Cola Cup.

Participating in the 41st annual Bellinzona, Switzerland International Youth Tournament, April 17-20 is another step in getting the US squad ready.

Some new faces have been chosen for the US team in Bellinzona, with only seven members of last summer's CON-CACAF team on the roster. Part of the reason being the difference in eligibility. For the CONCACAF tourney and the World Championships, plavers must be born after August 1, 1961. For Bellinzona, plavers must be born after January 1, 1962

"Plus, in some instances we don't have a choice because kids have to get out of school," Chyzowych said. "We're more concerned with exposure now, than results. We hope to have them together for almost the whole summer.

the whole summer.

"In June we'll be in Mexico for a tournament where of eight teams that'll be there, seven have qualified for the World tournament. In July we'll have the Olympic Festival in Syracuse, where we'll have a National Youth Team playing against the regional teams, although the National Team won't be competing for medals,"

noted Chyzowych.

"Then we'll be hosting a tournament probably in August in Colorado Springs, with Mexico, Canada and Bermuda. In September we'll train in Holland, then go to Australia," Chyzowych added.

The extensive schedule indicates the

The extensive schedule indicates the United States Soccer Federation (USSF), and everyone involved with American soccer, is taking the World Youth Championships very seriously, especially in light of the poor showing in the '82 World Cup qualifiers.

The Bellinzona tourney will be a good indicator, particularly since the US won the event in 1978 and placed second in 79. The US has been matched with AC Bellinzona. FC Nuremberg (West Germany) and SSC Napoli (Italy) in the round-robin play. FC Nuremberg is the defending champ. Also competing in the other bracket are Leeds United (England), AS Monaco, AC Fiorentina (Italy) and the Swiss National youth selection.

"We'll be looking to Tom Kain, David Lischner, Amr Aly and Peter Jianette as the prime people on the attack," Chyzowych said. "Plus Chris Hundelt is strong coming out of the back."

Kain, Lischner and Darryl Gee are veterans of the US team, all having a lot of international experience, including last summer's CONCACAF team. Aly is debuting with the US contingent during the Ballinzona tourney, while Jianette played with the US during the Cannes International Youth Tournament in France last spring.

Aly's from New York and completed his first season at Columbia University. Jianette's a Long Islander and attended Hicksville H.S. He signed with the MISL New York Arrows and will debut for them in the Fall.

"I've watched Amr for three years and he's a technically high player and shows strength," Chyzowych said. "Dieter's (Columbia coach Dieter Ficken) done a nice job with him. He's a sophisticated player, whose strength may be his leadership and ability to dictate rhythm."

ship and ability to dictate rhythm."

The US group will leave New York April 9 for Milan, Italy where they'll train at the Coverciano Training Centre outside Florence. They'll also face Rondinella and AC Fiorentina in friendlies while

in Italy.

April 16 they'll venture to Switzerland for the Bellinzona tourney, returning to the States on April 21.


