HUGE BOOST

Two all-beef patties, special sauce, lettuce, cheese, pickles and \$750,000 that's the financial sponsorship for junior soccer announced by McDonald's family restaurants last week.

Sir Arthur George, President of the Australian Soccer Federation, unveiled the McDonald's Socceroo Super Skills Award Scheme - the official ASF Junior Coaching Scheme, to be adopted by all coaches in clubs and schools throughout Australia.

McDonald's Socceroo Super Skills is an award scheme designed to take youngsters under the age of 13 through all the required techniques and skills to develop their playing ability, to set accepted standards. Six separate awards' tests have been devised, incorporating the all important skills of touch, heading, passing, controlling, dribbling, kicking and shooting.

Youngster will be coached in these skills at clubs and schools before being tested by two coaches for their award. These awards are designed for the 7 to 13 age group and are colour graded — Blue, Red, Black, Green and Gold, increasing in difficulty at each level, gradually building aptitudes and standards.

To undergo the Gold Award, two other grades must have already been successfully completed. For those children under the age of seven, a special Mini Award has been created as a preliminary test for youngsters before attempting the main awards. Once a child has passed his award test, he or she pays \$2.50 and receives. cloth and enamel badges, together with a certificate acknowledging the achievement.



The McDonald's sponsorship includes a direct payment of \$500,000 to the Australian Soccer Federation over three years. with a further \$250,000 committed to instore promotional activities and the provision of \$2.50 food vouchers to each child who successfully completes an award grade.

\$750,000 Coaching Scheme

Sir Arthur commenting on the Mc Donald's sponsorship said, "The Socceroo Super Skills Scheme represents a major breakthrough in our development as a code. The scheme will draw more youngsters to the game, as it will provide them with a thorough grounding in the necessary skills to help them become better players. Socceroo Super Skills represents the cornerstone of the Australian Youth Soccer Development Scheme and we are particularly grateful to McDonald's for the establishment of such a worthwhile programme".



The eight state coaching directors who report directly to Eric Worthington, the National Director of Coaching, will be responsible for the introduction of Super Skills into the school and club network in Australia.

"Too often in the past, 22 young players have spent the entire match chasing a ball from one end of the field to the other," said Mr. Worthington. "McDonald's Socceroo Super Skills will bring the degrees of skill and ball control to the young people's game which will help them adapt to the demands of competitive soccer".

Mr. Peter Ritchie, Chairman and Managing Director of McDonald's, commenting on his Company's support for Super Skills said, "We have watched the growth of soccer in recent years, particularly at junior level and are impressed by the number of youngsters and their parents who are being attracted to the code.



McDonald's intend to undergo a massive promotional support effort with posters, traymats and in-store activities to assist the launch of the scheme to schools and clubs in the localities surrounding their 123 restaurants throughout Australia.

To mark the beginning of the 1982 soccer season Socceroo Super Skills has commenced with a mass mailing to clubs and schools, which contains full details of the Scheme, together with support literature and an invitation to participate in the nationwide programme.

AND FUJI TOO!

Fuji film has also launched a national promotion of junior soccer in Australia involving Fujis major sponsorship of the World Cup in Spain from June 3-11.

For every box of Fuji film sold, the Australian Soccer Federation is eligible to receive 10 cents. As well as this cash bonus, individual soccer clubs and associations can win World Cup hats and T-shirts, sporting bags and watches.

Entries will then be put into a barrel and one club will win an all-expenses paid trip for two to Spain for the World Cup. The promotion relies heavily on individual soccer players, clubs and associations.

Each box of Fuji film has an Espana '82 soccer symbol on one end. About 1000 pharmacies and photo shops throughout the country are taking part in the promotion and are acting as "drop-off" points for the box tops.

The competition closes on May 31, 1982, and winners of the trip will be announced one week later.



Peru's World

Cup 'gem'

Julio Cesar Uribe, the "Black Diamond" of Peruvian football, wants to do more than sparkle at the World Cup finals. He intends to outshine the rest.

An international soccer magazine recently judged the 24-year-old forward the third best player in the world, after Argentina's Diego Maradona and Zico of Brazil. Flattered he may be, but Uribe is not planning to rest on his laurels.

"The World Cup will show who is the best and there's no reason why it shouldn't be me. Maradona, Zico, Rumenigge - all these players have great reputations. But they've got to prove their class in Spain, where it counts.'

Uribe has the smooth, good looks of a film actor and the physique of a boxer. A player of perfect poise and dizzy acceleration, Uribe can wrong-foot defenders in one slick movement. As a boy, he appeared on television juggling a ball more than 1,000 times with his feet and performing 2,000 consecutive headers.

"My job is to score goals and my aim is to create constant danger," he said.

A natural dribbler, he is at his best collecting the ball in midfield and running at the defence. Pushed up front, with his back to the opposing goal, he lacks space to display his talents and becomes vulnerable to bruising challengers. But he does not shirk a tackle. He learned his craft with boys twice his age and size as a youngster in a shanty town on the outskirts of Lima.

"I've never been afraid of getting kicked," he said.

His main failing, according to critics, is his inclination to try to beat one man too many or to go it alone when a colleague is unmarked. Uribe accepts the criticism but says his individualism has been curbed by playing with established stars in the Peruvian national side.

Uribe has spent all his career with Sporting Cristal but looks certain to move abroad after the World Cup. Despite his one million dollar price tag, his club has been approached by several foreign sides. Uribe said his first choice would be Leeds United, struggling in the depths of the English First Division.

Uribe sees the World Cup finals as a springboard to fame.

"The World Cup will put me in the showcase of football, it's the golden opportunity of my life. Peru could cause a sensation in Spain, we have the skill, style and determination to surprise the world," Uribe said. the second s

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
IT'S MEXICO

Mexico, scene of the 1968 Olympic Games and 1970 World Cup, is set for another sporting spectacular.

It's been chosen by FIFA, the world's governing body of soccer to host the fourth FIFA/Coca-Cola Cup—The world youth championship — from June 4 to 19 next year.

The coming International Youth Championships of Europe, South America, Africa, Asia and CONCACAF (North, Central America and the Caribbean) are the qualifying battlegrounds for Mexico. Australia begins its campaign in Port Moresby in December against New Zealand and New Guinea.

The FIFA/Coca-Cola Cup, first won by the Soviet Union in Tunisia in 1977, has since witnessed the sight of the great Diego Maradona captaining Argentina to victory in Japan in 1979 and the astonishing giant-killers from the little oil state of Qatar reaching the final in Australia last year. Qatar played their first round games at Lang Park in Brisbane.

Sydney club, Leichhardt has taken everyone by surprise with an incredible start to the season that has seen them take 13 points from eight games. Much of that credit is due to the astute coaching of Willie Wallace but to win you must score goals, and one of the players scoring the goals for the Strikers is young Australian-born and bred Marshall Soper. Go Soccer today takes a closer look at the man who at the moment is THE Leichhardt Striker.

GS: Marshall, can you tell us a bit of your background and how you got to the Leichhardt Philips League team?

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MS: I was born in Newcastle 21 years ago and began playing soccer at about age seven. I started with my local club Raymond Terrace but I had a couple of years with other clubs like Western and Kurri. I played my senior football with Stewart's and Lloyd's in the northern New South Wales League but last year after I scored 21 goals in 18 games I was transferred to Leichhardt for \$5,000.

GS: How did you find the change to Philips League?

MS: It was obviously a lot faster and required more dedication and it took me a few games to adjust but I finished last season with eight goals from as many games I think and I had a feeling everything would come right this year.

GS: Have you always been a striker?

MS: Yes, for as long as I can remember I have played in the forward line. I have

GS: Have you any representative honors?

MS: I played once in the under 16 northern New South Wales team but I didn't try for many other teams.

GS: Do you do any special training and what do you think of the Leichhardt team?

MS: I am a semi-professional player and don't have another job so that gives me plenty of spare time to train. I try to kick a ball at every chance I get and in training I do as much shooting as I can. Leichhardt is a great team to play in because we have the best forward line in Australia. There is so much competition for places the pressure is incredible which brings out the best in everyone.

GS: What is Willie Wallace like as a coach?

MS: He is one of the best in Australia and commands the respect of the players because he picks every team on form and no one gets into the side because of who they are.

GS: Have you done any special preparation for this weekend's game and what do you know about Brisbane City?

MS: I don't think about the opposition in the way that I could let it worry me but before a game I try to sum up their defenders, and decide which would be the best way to beat them. From memory last year Bobby Hamilton impressed me as a good player and big Barry Kelso is always dangerous in the air.

GS: What does the future hold for Marshall Soper?

MS: My two year contract with Leichhardt finishes this year and I think it might be good to move around a bit at this stage of my career. I guess I could say at the end of the year I would be open to offers. My overall aim though is to play for Australia.

IT'S TOUGH FOR CITY -

Brisbane City could not have struck Leichhardt at a worse time — there is nothing more dangerous than a top team smarting from its first defeat.

Leichhardt's unbeaten run of seven games came to an end last weekend when they were downed by the exciting Sydney Olympic and now the Strikers, who two weeks ago looked runaway leaders, are only two points in front.

Coach Willie Wallace will no doubt be desperate not to let his side fall into a slump and will want to register a win to boost their confidence which had grown with each earlier victory.

And it will take a mammoth effort from The Gladiators to stop Leichhardt doing just that.

Brisbane City were crushed away from home again last week, this time by three goals to West Adelaide and their form this season has been far from that of last year. But amazingly, the Gladiators are still unbeaten at home. The last time they played at Spencer Park they caused the shock of the round when they stopped Sydney City and ran out 2-1 winners.

While it was a morale boosting win for the Gladiators, anyone who saw the game would realise it was not a footballing victory for City and the side is still playing well below its best.

Many solutions can be put forward: injuries, the loss of key players, new players taking time to settle and the failure of some new signings. But at the moment City look like a ship without a rudder — a team of individuals who can't seem to decide on the same direction to follow.

Players are ignoring the easy ball and as a result possession is more times than not lost in the attacking third which then quickly puts the pressure back on the defence which this year, due to injuries, has been a makeshift outfit.

At this stage of the season City should go back to the basics and concentrate on their strengths. They have always been a workmanlike side and coach Nereo Saftich must demand more heart and running from his players. They should give the ball to Barry Kelso and let him run — sooner or later he is going to score. And in defence, if the strikers are too fast, the back four should not push as far forward nor commit themselves early as they did repeatedly in the South Melbourne match.

City can't afford another average performance this week because Leichhardt are the team which will punish them severely.

ST WEEK IN ADELAIDE

ADELAIDE: West Adelaide crushed Brisbane City 3-0 to record their second win of the season at Hindmarsh Stadium.

Wests were held goalless in a scrappy first half but cut loose after the restart and could easily have won by more.

West Adelaide had hardly finished their celebration when Tim Brown rose to hit home a cross from David Doorne.


West Adelaide continued to push forward and notched a third goal when Adrian Santrac was on the goal line to scramble a cross from Graham Honeyman over the goal line.
