A LETTER TO THE **EDITOR**

Dear Sir,

The editorial comment on the State League Wrangle (Go Soccer 31/3/82) was accurate and historically correct within the information to which he, and the general public, had been made privy. The article was, however, significant more for what it didn't disclose rather than for what it did disclose.

The article begins with the most misleading, and damaging to the clubs involved, suggestion that this dispute, went on for the last three months, i.e. 'to the beginning of March this year'. This would indicate that the clubs left it to the last minute to bring their grievances under the notice of the Q.S.F. In fact, the first mention, to my knowledge, made of a necessary re-structuring of the financial arrangements for State League '82, was made at a meeting of the club delegates and Management Committee in November or December, 1980. This meeting was, in fact, held prior to Wynnum or Eastern Suburbs having been officially accepted into the League. Nev Whittle, the then President of Ipswich United, told that meeting that his Club would continue in the League for 1981, but, that unless country clubs were made to shoulder more of the cost burden, his club would not be involved in 1982.

That is when Federation should have started to do something, but, as we have heard for the last four years, they "were negotiating with a potential sponsor and things looked very promising." Delegates were assured that the sponsorship monies would be used to alleviate the costs, particularly for the local clubs. Again, as is usual, nothing happened, no sponsor and no attempt by Federation to find other



solutions. The comments of Mr. Whittle were endorsed by other delegates.

Step Two

In May, 1981, after six months of inaction by the Federation, Ipswich United, again the instigators, request a meeting with other Brisbane and near Brisbane State League Clubs to discuss the financial aspects of the League. The meeting was attended by Gold Coast Utd. (unfortunately it came too late for them), Wynnum, Mt. Gravatt, Eastern Suburbs and Ipswich United. The delegates from Ipswich came cap in hand beseeching the other clubs to support their suggestions for financial changes, in their words, "to keep State League soccer alive in Ipswich in 1982.'

Again it was suggested that the League adopt the concept of "user pays", in other words, each club was to meet its own travel and accommodation costs, and, if the country clubs still maintained they couldn't afford it, then they should withdraw from the League.

It was requested that the Federation convene a meeting of all State League clubs as soon as possible. A meeting was convened early in June and the suggestion put to it was greeted, by Federation and country clubs alike, as being "Queen Street oriented". The Townsville delegate expressed his disappointment that Brisbane clubs believed that they had been "subsidising" country clubs. How he could believe otherwise is beyond me. Again, no constructive alternatives were suggested either by Federation or country representatives, and the matter was again apparently shoved into the too hard basket. Another opportunity for the Federation to act gone begging.



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And so on to September

Having been aware for at least nine months that all was not well one would have expected the Federation to have done some homework and come up with some proposals when the clubs again met in September, but, surprise, again nothing coming from the top. Lots of the same type of discussion, still no decisions, and the meeting concludes with clubs asking the Federation to look at ways to cut costs for the League. They considered this necessary since the Federation had not taken any initiative during the preceding nine months.

Come November

Federation come up with a number of proposals, all designed to keep the League intact with all country clubs. Discussion grinds to a halt until Ross Melville of Eastern Suburbs has the temerity to suggest that the first step which should be taken to cut the costs is the exclusion of Mareeba, this alone would cut the cost by some \$52,000. Meeting concludes, still no decisions. Federation later meet with Mareeba and advise their exclusion from the League.

Next Step

The Brisbane press advise everyone of the Federation's proposal for State League '82. Unfortunately, the clubs involved learn of these proposals through the press initially, and, not as should have been the case, before the proposals are made public. They learn some days later that they are expected to confirm their acceptance of the proposals before 30 November, in other words, in less than seven days. The Federation is becoming desperate for time, after twelve months of procrastination on their part, they expect the clubs to convene meetings etc. on short notice, during the off-season, and make hasty decisions on matters involving not a few, but, thousands of dollars. After a November 30 meeting between four clubs i.e. Ipswich United, Grange Thistle, Mt. Gravatt and Eastern Suburbs it is decided that thes clubs cannot confirm their acceptance of the proposals and they seek further discussion with Federation. It will be noticed that the name Ipswich United has been predominant throughout. A letter is composed at the

meeting which is hand delivered and answered on December 1.

The rest is bitter history. After the eleventh hour sell out by Ipswich, the original instigators of this whole confrontation, the three remaining "rebel" clubs meet with the Federation. They are accused of attempting to "blackmail" the Federation and the President indicates that he will accept their non-confirmation of the proposals as a withdrawal from the League.

In the intervening weeks Twin Towns announce their withdrawal from State League, Valley Trident and Olympic indicate second thoughts about a competition not involving the top three clubs of 1981, and Mr. Brusasco has a meeting, sorry, "has lunch with" representatives of Lions and Brisbane City. Despite denials that the meeting, sorry "lunch", was to discuss the inclusion of those clubs in State League, it is soon announced that those clubs are prepared to join a State League where affiliation fees are adjusted in respect to the amount of travel. (A different way of saying the country clubs pay their own way).

Prior to the council meeting at which this earth shattering disclosure was made Nambour Reds, a team previously rejected, Twin Towns, who had also withdrawn, Valley Trident and Olympic, are invited to meet with the Management Committee.

It soon becomes apparent that they "were made offers they couldn't refuse' and an "unconstitutionally composed" State League is born based on financial arrangements which the 'rebel' clubs had requested as early as November 1980, AND HAD BEEN DENIED. They were also denied the opportunity to discuss this proposal, except, from the floor of the Council Meeting, when they were there and then required to state whether they would be willing to play in a State League under those conditions. Again, another grossly unfair demand on representatives not briefed by their clubs on such a proposal.

Now it is obvious that the statement attributed by Go Soccer to Alan Vessey "It was a sad state of affairs. The timing of the announcement put the QSF in a position where it couldn't plan the 1982 season which had an effect on every club not only the State League. As a result the image of Queensland soccer suffered

badly." should have been aimed at the Federation rather than the clubs. It was the Federation who bumbled along for twelve months to reach a financial arrangement that was suggested originally in 1980. The clubs were unable to decide because the Federation had given them nothing on which to make a decision until November 1981. How could they then alter the timing of their decision.

In hindsight, the clubs may have been better to have announced their withdrawal in the press in September. You can be sure the Federation would have then done its utmost to retain the clubs, something it obviously wasn't willing to do at any other time.

Several questions could be asked for which answers would never be forthcoming. Firstly — Did the Federation see the opportunity to introduce via the back door something which had been rejected by clubs at two Annual General Meetings, that is, the inclusion of Lions and Brisbane City in State League?

Secondly — Why did the instigators of "the revolution" Ipswich Utd. suddenly change direction?

Thirdly — How could the country clubs suddenly afford to pay their own way, and why would the Federation promulgate such an arrangement, when neither was able to do so, 12 or 6 months previously?

Finally — Announcements have now been made that the State League will be regionalised in 1983. Will the "rebel" clubs be treated fairly, or will suggestions of vindictiveness, made by Bob McVie at the council meeting of January 26, be vindicated?

We will see in time to come, but how much time, the track record of the Federation in this dispute tends to indicate that they may be able to drag this out until the end of the century to coincide with the gaining of a sponsor for the State League, and that's something they were on the verge of doing in 1978.

ADDENDUM

Perhaps the most disturbing feature of this whole dispute, and the most disappointing to the clubs remaining resolute, is that the prime movers in the dispute, Ipswich United, after changing their stance at the eleventh hour, then voted in favour of the imposition of the \$2000 fine on the "rebel" clubs. I would hate to see what they could do to clubs who hadn't supported them in their alleged hour of need.

New deal on Ampol Cup

In a joint statement last week, Ald. Ian Brusasco, President of the Queensland Soccer Federation and Alby Furness, Marketing Manager Ampol Petroleum (Qld.) Pty. Ltd. announced a 20 percent increase in money available for the 1982 Ampol Cup.

A total of \$12,000 is available for prizemoney and promotion with the winner set to receive \$4,000 plus the Ampol Cup. This knockout competition that first

commenced in 1959, has spread to the present format that will involve 49 teams from areas as far west as Mount Isa, north to Cairns and south to Stanthorpe and Twin Towns.

Defending holders Grange Thistle, as a result of their move to First Division, will have to qualify in early rounds involving the 27 First and Second Division teams. It is the first time a team as Cup holders has been in a position where it is required to qualify for a place in the final 16 teams.







ATHENS — Greek soccer fans clashed with police last week smashing shop windows and damaging cars in a protest against the disqualification of the top team, Panathinaikos, from the Greek Cup.

There was a strong police presence in the sidestreets around Panathinaikos Stadium where the League leaders played a 1-1 draw against Ofi in the League championship.

After the match about 1.000 demonstrators marched to the centre of Athens where they clashed with police who stopped them from delivering a protest to the offices of the General Secretariat of Sports.

The fans were protesting against a decision by an arbitration council to disqualify Panathinaikos from the semifinals of the Cup for using an unqualified Argentine player, Juan Rocha Poumblis, in an earlier game.

Their place has been taken by Greek champions Olympiakos who had protested against the presence of Poumblis on the team. The Argentine is Panathinaikos'

third foreign signing and Greek clubs are allowed only two.

Panathinaikos, who will appeal to the supreme administrative court, have threatened to pull out of the Greek championship in protest.

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FRANZ CALLS IT A

West German soccer idol Franz ("Emperor") Beckenbauer, who is about to renounce his crown, is to go into wealthy exile in Switzerland with his blonde consort.

Beckenbauer, 36, Libero with HSV Hamburg, told his club he was giving up the game after 17 years as a professional because of the many injuries he has suffered in recent months. Now he is expected to don Hamburg's strip for the last time on June 1 in a farewell benefit game against the national XI.

After that he will pack his bags and move to Switzerland with Diane Sandmann, the 29 year-old former photographer for whom he left his wife and three sons four years ago. Beckenbauer, said to have made 10 million from football, owns an apartment and a tennis centre in Sarnen, near Lucerne.

The "Emperor" said in Hamburg: "I shall finally catch up on all the things I didn't have time, or was not allowed, to do as a professional player. Like ski-ing and mountain-climbing."

Beckenbauer, who has a record 103 international caps, has played to victories in West German, European and World Championship and Cup matches with an elegance that earned him his royal title. But his form since he returned to Germany in October, 1980 after three years with Cosmos New York has been patchy. Injuries have also taken their toll of him. He has had problems with his groin, achilles heel, thigh muscle and breast bone. The last injury, when he was badly winded during Hamburg's 3-2 winning game against the Swiss Neuchatel club, was the final straw for him.

As for the future, Beckenbauer will help raise funds for his foundation to help the physically and mentally handicapped, and he won't be short of cash as he also has long-term sponsorship contracts with the Adidas sports goods firm, Lancia Autos, a cosmetics firm and the BP oil concern.

There are also rumors that he may later return to West German soccer as a club manager, although no club has been named. Beckenbauer will say only: "Management is a possibility."

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MARK KOUSSAS:

The arrival of controversial and flamboyant coach Tommy Docherty at Sydney Olympic last year was the turning point in the career of young Socceroo Mark Koussas.

"If it wasn't for Tommy Docherty I wouldn't be where I am today," the young Koussas proudly admits.

"He is a great coach. He believed in me and made me believe in myself. He was a real players man and put confidence in the Olympic team."

Prior to Docherty coming to Australia Koussas was only a "fringe" player in the Olympic side. He had played only one PSL match, the last of the 1979 season when Olympic clashed with St. George. Olympic lost 0-1, ironically the goal was scored by Koussas' teammate now, Peter Katholos, and were relegated to the New South Wales State League.

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With Jim Adam at the helm, Koussas found his role constantly as a substitute and rarely made a first team appearance. But in 1981, with Docherty in control, the youngster began getting matches in the first team.

"I wasn't scoring goals but my game kept improving and Tommy just kept me in the team," Koussas said.

The rest is history . . . the 19-year-old went on to score 10 goals for Olympic last year and earn his way into the Young Socceroo side which performed so well in the World Youth Championships. Koussas finished the tournament with the Adidas Golden Boot for the championship highest scorer.

And even success with the national team came sudden for Koussas.

He had played in the NSW under 19 team in the national championships and was selected in a squad of 45 players by then the national coach Rudi Gutendorf.

"I didn't appear to be in line for the final squad despite going to a training camp in Townsville with Gutendorf. But I got to know Les Scheinflug and he too believed in me," Koussas said.

"But even when Les took over I wasn't in the team and it was only a week before the start of the championships that I got my chance. Les had always preached a policy that only fit players would be selećted and Ian Hunter had been injured for some time so I was picked".

Koussas has happy and sad memories of those world championships. He says his most memorable one is when the Young Socceroos beat Argentina on the opening night — a result which virtually sealed a second round position.



"It was fantastic to win a game like that in front of Australian fans," he said. His saddest memory is the penalty he missed in the 74th minute of the quarterfinal against the eventual champions. West Germany. A goal would have levelled the scores.

"I was very disappointed for everyone else in the team because they had all worked hard. But you can't let a penalty miss affect you and I even put the ball in the net after the miss but the goal was disallowed." Koussas said.

Koussas had taken the Youth team's penalties prior to the championship and had not missed. Amazingly while on a tour of China after the championships he took another and missed again, this time hitting the crossbar.

"That still didn't worry me and I am eager to take them for Olympic but they won't let me," he said.



Of his opposition this weekend, Koussas is quite well briefed on Lions.

"Calvin Daunt is a friend of mine and I know he can play well and Craig Low is always a danger with his speed," Koussas said.

"Jim Hermiston and Col Bennett were the hardest defender to play against last season and it will be interesting to see how the defence is without Hermiston".

"Lions are a hard shell to crack at their own ground but we are confident because a championship is now within our capabilities."
