# A CHANCE TO

Young Brisbane soccer players are to be offered a chance to train and be coached in some of the best sports facilities in Europe.

A youth soccer tour to West Germany is now being organised and it is envisaged to take up to 30 boys, preferably aged between 13 and 18 years to Europe during the September school holidays.

The boys will be guided throughout the tour by a well-known Brisbane soccer personality who will ensure they get the best treatment possible. It will be the chance of a lifetime for the young budding soccer stars and could well be the platform which will launch them to not only to Philips League stardom but perhaps even trials with some of the top European clubs.


The tour will be booked into one of the leading Sports Schools in West Germany and could well train under some of the world's most respected soccer coaches. It is also highly likely that while the soccer tour is at the Sports School, other teams from the German Bundesliga and even from around the world, will also be using the facilities.

The planned itinerary for the tour also includes matches against similar aged teams from the Sports School and local areas. The benefit of the schools is recognised worldwide and proof of their success was demonstrated in Australia last season during the world youth soccer championships.

The winners of the Coca-Cola Cup, West Germany, spent a period of concentrated training in a West German Sports School before coming to Australia and the benefit of that preparation showed when they crushed Qatar 4-0 in the final.

The United States team, which played its first round matches at Lang Park in Brisbane and proved to be a strong and physical outfit, also trained at a German Sports School as part of their world youth preparations.

With that in mind, think of the head start for the 1983 season those who go on the soccer tour will have over everyone else.

And the big advantage of this tour is that it is not totally restricted to the youngsters and the itinerary is such that coaches are also welcomed as are any parents who might wish to turn the whole thing into family holiday. An example of the itinerary has been mapped out by representatives of Trans World Travel, who with the approval of the Queensland Junior Soccer Council, are organising the tour.

On Day One the tour will depart Brisbane, flying TAA to Sydney then board a Lufthansa jet to Frankfurt via Kuala Lumpur and Karachi. The tour will arrive at Frankfurt on Day Two and after transfer to a Hotel the remainder of the day will be free time.

On the morning of Day Three the tour will be transferred to the Sports School where the boys will be accommodated in comfortable rooms usually with four boys to each room.

The next four days the boys will work a specially-planned program under the supervision of highly qualified coaches. Every aspect of their game will be assessed with weaker points being drilled and strengths honed to perfection. During the four days teams will be formed and matches will be played, not only among themselves, but also against teams of similar ages and ability from other tours at the Sports School.

On Day Eight the tour will transfer to the Homestay Centre where the boys will be billeted with local German families for the next four days. During this time there will be a reception held by the local Mayor, soccer matches against local teams, visits to local schools and sports centres with informal meetings with German students, local sightseeing and a farewell party.

On Day 13 the tour will be treated to what no doubt will be one of the high-lights of the trip — a six-day tour of sightseeing in the Rhine River area. The sites of planned new training centres and Homestay centres will be inspected and it is also likely one or two matches will be played during the tour.

On Day 19 the tour will depart Frankfurt, again flying Lufthansa and stopping at Karachi and Kuala Lumpur again before arriving in Sydney and then transferring back to Brisbane on Day 20 on a TAA flight.

In line with typical German perfection the Sports Schools are well appointed and their operators leave no details to chance. Although the tour organisers have not finally settled on which Sports School to use as there are so many and all of a high standard. A typical example and one which could very well be used is the Sports School-Sports Hotel at Grunberg, only a short drive from Frankfurt. The

school has 103 beds in one or two-bedded rooms and a further 107 beds in the training rooms.


Many of the rooms have their own toilet, bathroom, balcony and direct dialling telephone. The facilities at Grunberg are second to none. In addition to convention and discussion rooms, there are lecture rooms and conference rooms and the amazing sports hall, an indoor stadium which is ideally suited for games of small-sided indoor soccer.

Other facilities include spacious outdoor sports grounds, tennis courts, indoor swimming pool, saunas, running tracks, forest tracks and a fully automatic bowling alley.

The Grunberg Sports School is owned by the West German football association and is in and financed by the state of Hessen. It works to the motto — "whoever arrives as a stranger, departs are a friend." The school offers a wide range of internationl cuisine and a large selection of drinks, all served with well-known first class German service.

Any parent who is interested in giving his son the chance of making it in the big time, and at the same time letting him see another part of the world, will want to send him on this tour.

Similarly it is a chance for club members to band together and send the cream of their youngsters. Perhaps the best and fairest of a particular team or even the



# THE VALLEYS' ECHO ...

Anzac Day saw a revival of Valley Trident's fortunes after the lapses of the previous weekend and our State League team recorded their first fixture win.

The club, and some of its loyal supporters, visited Twin Towns on the Gold Coast and were rewarded when John Kennedy volleyed the ball through a crowded penalty area to give us a late winner.

Earlier Valleys had translated their dominance into a goal from Dennis Lockhart, which capped a fine, agressive display from the midfielder. When Twin Towns equalised, due to a strangely hesitant Valleys defence, the Blues lost their rythm and Twin Towns came much more into the game and even threatened to snatch a winner themselves.

In general the Valleys team played more settled football than last week with added bite in midfield due to the inclusion of Lockhart and Gerry Lindsay while Richard Shortman seized his opportunity to play a strong game at fullback. Changes remain probable however before the team starts to satisfy perfectionist coach Mauro Saftich.

The return to form though was not confined to our State League side and the Valleys flag was flown high by the Senior Colts team which remained undefeated in the tough 'A' competition when they drew 1-1 with Mount Gravatt.

The seventh division side travelled to

One satisfying aspect of the game for Valleys coach Dave Heywood was the solid defensive partnership established between Roberto Monteverde and Renato Iovenetti.

Although we had last week off because of Ampol Cup matches the State League team by no means rested.

The side has been training hard for our next Perry Park game, against Nambour Reds this Sunday at 3 p.m. The team was a little despondent when it let down the many fans who turned up when Across the Waves ran out 2-0 winners in the first fixture and are determined to make amends this week.

But Nambour should be by no means under-rated. For a start they have local talent like Neal Daines and Kim Cox combined with experienced State League campaigners like goalkeeper John Bennett defender Pat Leathan and midfielder Alistair Pagan, whom coach George Pagan took with him when he made the move from Grange Thistle.

Nambour drew 1-1 with Capricornia in their first fixture then pulled off an even more amazing result when they held the powerful Ipswich United to the same score in the second round.

But Valleys coach Mauro Saftich has drilled into his side the importance of not underestimating the opposition and the Blues this weekend are confident of giving their fans plenty of entertainment.

We look forward to seeing everyone who was there last time and even more people at Perry Park this weekend to cheer the mighty Valleys to another victory.

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# A NEED FOR CHANGE

A letter to GO SOCCER from independent contributor — OFFSIDER

About twenty years ago a small group of clubs wanting a better deal for soccer than was being provided by the governing body broke away to form the Queensland Soccer Federation.

In the initial year the Federation attracted only a small number of clubs, and, although it was confidently expected that they would be joined by other clubs who at that time had remained with the Association, I don't think anyone was able to foresee the growth of the body, particularly in the Brisbane competition.

As I recall some of the reasons given for the breakaway included:

1. That the code's development was being stifled by lack of a professional outlook on the part of the governing body.

2. The major clubs of that era did not have sufficient say in decisions affecting only those clubs because of inferior voting strength as compared with that of the lower divisions Club delegates, who, it was said were easily manipulated by the governing body.

In the initial stages of Federation, the Association continued to function, and, in doing so catered for those clubs of amateur and/or special type status. Those years provided the best organised and most prosperous years the code has yet seen in this State. However, since the death of the Association there has been somewhat of a return to the previous status quo. There is a need for change.

Those with foresight saw this possibility and took steps to avoid the code again being controlled in its decision making by those amateur or social type clubs. The the effect that — The voting strength of



clubs in the then top two divisions i.e. original constitution included a clause to Division 1 and 2, could not be exceeded by that of the clubs in the lower divisions, hence the two votes allowed to those clubs as against the one vote of the lower clubs. Unfortunately, somewhere along the line, and apparently without being noticed, this clause did not appear in later copies of the constitution.

No one I have spoken to can recall the constitution having been amended, in the proper manner, to have this clause excluded. And so with the seemingly uncontrolled growth of the Brisbane competition the lower division clubs with their combined superior voting strength can, and do, rule the roost by taking part in decisions which, in fact, are none of their business. There is a need for change.



It seems the only qualifications necessary to join the Federation are the ability of a group of people to form a team, afford a set of strip and a ball, have an area of ground on which to kick that ball, and pay an affiliation fee. They then become a club and have a voice in the affairs of clubs whose investment in the code amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars. This is not good enough. There is a need for change.

There is a talk of a restructuring of State League. I contend that there should also be a restructuring of the Brisbane competition.

Competitions in country areas are organised and controlled by local associations, each of which is affiliated with the Q.S.F. The sole function of these bodies is the organisatioin and controlling of the code within their own little areas. The clubs under their control have no say in the affairs of, say the State League. Why then should those clubs in the Brisbane competition? None of these bodies is responsible for the control of a competition anywhere near the size of the Brisbane competition and vet they have nothing else to do. Why then should the management committee of the Q.S.F. be responsible for the organisation and control of the massive Brisbane competition in addition to their other functions? They are expected to do all these things and still function efficiently. In all fairness to them they cannot. Therefore, there is a need for change.



Having in mind those halycon years of the infancy of the Federation the changes I would suggest are these:

1. A return to the situation which existed in those years with the Federation being responsible for the organisation of only the State League and Divisions 1 and 2 of the Brisbane competition. The remainder of the Brisbane competition to be split and administrated by Brisbane North and South Associations which would be similar in composition to country bodies.

2. These associations to be autonomous operating independently, but under the rules and supervision of the Q.S.F.

3. Strictly amateur status within these associations.

4. Clubs in the competitions controlled by the Federation be required to field, and be restricted to, Divisional and Reserve teams and Colts. All teams of the clubs to play at the same venue on the same day.

5. These clubs be required to foster junior football in a realistic manner and not a token manner as has been the case in

some clubs in the past.

6. Promotion and relegation in the normal manner with the same conditions as Philips League with clubs finishing at the bottom of the lower division having to complete with aspiring clubs from the associations for re-election.

Election to those divisions being determined by conditions which could include standard of facilities, recent playing performances, stability of club administration, financial considerations, and suchlike.

The benefits I see arising from such changes are:

- 1. A lessening of the work load of the Queensland Soccer Federation management committee, thereby leading to more efficient administration and organisation.
- 2. The seperation of Federation and Association Councils would allow decisions at each to be more in line with the needs of the clubs within the separate organisations.
- 3. The strictly amateur status within these ranks would allow clubs to concentrate their finances towards development of

facilities etc., thereby increasing their potential for future higher gradings.

4. The restricting of the number of teams within the higher division clubs would have a threefold benefit. (a) To those clubs, less teams to outfit, insure, and to generally provide finance for. (b) Those fringe dweller players not quite good enough to make a regular place in a higher division would have to go elsewhere to play and thus the lower divisions would benefit by gaining their services. (c) This would mean a more equitable distribution of players amongst the clubs rather than large concentration in some clubs as is the case at present.

5. The playing of all of a clubs senior fixtures at the one venue on the same day would concentrate the clubs support rather than fragmenting it to various locations, often at the same time. This can only lead to larger gates, and closer knit clubs. It is often frustrating for younger players to be playing in situations where the senior coaches do not have the opportunity to see them play and thus cannot really gauge their

ability.

6. The potential for better administration at all levels combined with the simplicity of organisation of competitions, at both levels, and the organisation of teams within clubs could do nothing but revitalise our rapidly stagnating code, and this is something that we would all dearly love to see.

I know that some of these suggestions, or perhaps all, are not going to be popular in many areas. Those who can see no further than their own personal or little club worlds won't like them, but, I can assure you that unless something is done, and soon, then the possibility of a rerun of the events of the early 60's is a very real threat.

THERE IS A NEED FOR CHANGE and if those charged with the administration of our code do not recognise this and do something about it, then, perhaps, that is where the first change is needed.
