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CARSON EYES

Ipswich United State League team coach Matt Carson has revealed he would still like to coach the Brisbane City Philips League team.

Carson told Go Soccer this week he would relish the challenge to steer Brisbane City out of the relegation zone. But he stressed he was very happy at Ipswich and had no intention of leaving the club in the lurch if the City PSL job was offered.

"But obviously there is a big difference between Philips League and State League level and just like a player, a coach wants to be at the top level," Carson said.

Ironically, Carson applied for the Brisbane City job at the beginning of this season but as he described it, his application was "lost" and as he heard nothing from the Philips League club he applied and was accepted by Ipswich United, as a replacement for Graham Kathage.

Although Carson's methods and playing style his teams adapt have been criticised by some people at various times of his career, the fact remains that his record is a good one.

He had success at Merton East before



moving to Southside Eagles where he took them from Second Division obscurity to the First Division "grand slam" in 1978.

He went to Lions in June 1979 when the club was third bottom with only eight points from 11 games. They had scored 14 goals and conceded 16. After 11 games this season Brisbane City had only seven points and had scored only 10 goals and conceded an amazing 27.

But in the year Carson took over Lions they finished the season in ninth position in the 14 team competition with 22 points from 26 games, three clear of second bottom team Olympic and five ahead of last-placed South Melbourne.

Carson resigned from the Lions position in May 1981, although the side was in no danger of being relegated. Carson gave the reason for his decision as Lions wanted him to go fulltime and he considered this a waste of time when the players were only part-time.

But in the events that followed in the next fortnight it was obvious Carson had been under some pressure to step aside to make way for current Lions PSL coach Joe Gilroy.



But many officials at Lions are still grateful for the job Carson did as he took them from a state of despair to a stable middle-of-the-table team.

And Carson believes the same type of thing can be done with Brisbane City — and with the present squad.

There are 14 or 15 players in the Brisbane City squad and many of them are very good. That's all you need," Carson said.

But any talk of Carson being appointed coach at Brisbane City is only hypothetical while Nereo Saftich has the position. And although as Go Soccer went to press the expected rumours of a sacking were circulating freely, City officials denied any such moves were imminent.

"In these difficult times we must show unity. Nereo Saftich must be given a chance," Brisbane City president Mr. Gino Merlo was recently quoted as saying.

It was inevitable the calls to sack Saftich once again, would be made when City faltered this season after a fine performance last year when they finished in third place — the best ever by a Brisbane team.

But things have not really run right for Saftich, who in the past was renouned for his motivational abilities.

Four players from last year's team left the club, striker Paul Wilkinson, mid-

fielder Larry Gaffney, goalkeeper Martin Coe and defender David Ratcliffe, the player many say should have been kept at all cost as it was around him the City team pivoted.

To compound Saftich's problems there has been an amazing run of injuries and unfortunately, Steve Glockner and David Vincenzino apart, there is no stunning young talent to call upon.



City have had team stalwarts like Billy Winkinson, Steve Perry, Barry Kelso, Willie Conner and now Jimmy Dunne out with injury. In fact in their last home match City played only five players who appeared regularly in the side last season.

When Brisbane City were beaten by Canberra in the last home appearance, the first time since August last year that they lost a PSL fixture on Spencer Park, people were talking on the terraces about a new City coach.

Some were even bold enough to suggest the club should make an offer to controversial British and former Sydney Olympic coach Tommy Docherty who was to arrive in Australia this week.

But realistically with the staggering loans repayments on the new grandstand hanging over the City committee's head it would be extremely surprising to see the club match the \$50,000 bid made by PSL "millionaires" South Melbourne. Sydney City, backed by the poker machine stocked Hakoah club are also interested in Docherty and it is hard to see City coming in with a competitive offer.

But of course if Docherty was employed by South Melbourne, it would almost certainly mean the sack for current coach John Margaritis. He no doubt would be looking for another club.

But a choach's life is a precarious one and if the Gladiators decide to retain Saftich it would only need a few wins strung together and all would be pushed into the past and forgotten.

ROSSI SCORES

Italian football idol Paolo Rossi, making his comeback after a two year ban for his alleged part in the bribes and betting scandal, scored one goal and made another when Juventus thrashed Udinese 5-1.

Rossi, who always claimed his innocence in the scandal, scored a spectacular goal in the 48th minute, diving to head in a Liam Brady free-kick and put Juventus 3-1 up.

He was taken off in the 70th minute to avoid the risk of injury but Juventus carried on to score another two, through Cabrini, again, and Virdis. GO SOCCER

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PAGAN LEADS

Nambour Reds State League coach George Pagan will be the tour leader for an exciting junior soccer trip to a West German Sports School later this year.

The plans for the tour to Germany were announced in Go Soccer last week and now the selection of the experienced Pagan as a tour leader puts the finishing touch on what could be the opportunity of a lifetime for some Queensland youngsters.

Pagan will ensure the youngsters get the best possible treatment from the time they leave Brisbane airport to until they return. Pagan is widely experienced in handling young soccer players as for many years he has been a coach with the Queensland Junior Soccer Council taking young representative teams to all parts of the state.

And his coaching results on the field are just as reputable. Pagan is a former Queensland and Brisbane Lions coach but achieved more notability as the manager/coach of former State League club Grange Thistle.

Pagan took the club from the Brisbane second division to State League premiers and champions in 1979. Thistle, with Pagan at the helm, were again champions in 1980 and runners-up for the premiership flag and last year were again one of the leading teams.

During that time Pagan's expertise with juniors was proven by the many talented youngsters he nurtured into the top level of football. Players like Ross and Ken

Now Pagan has taken on a new challenge on the Sunshine Coast and already Nambour Reds have produced some shock results in the State League competition. Pagan talks enthusiastically about the

facilities in the German Sports Schools. "They are among the best in the world

and any youngster who goes on this tour must benefit. And the good thing about it is that his soccer will not only improve but he will also be seeing another part of the world," Pagan said.

"It is only a small investment for what could be a lifetime benefit."

The tour, designed for boys aged between 13 and 18 years, is planned to be held during the September school holidays. They will be away for up to 20 days and during that time will stay in one of the many well-appointed Sports Schools in West Germany. While at the school they could well train under some of the world's most respected coaches and kick

around alongside some of the many top players from West Germany and Europe who use the facilities. And the big advantage of the tour is that it is not totally restricted to the youngsters and the itinerary is such that coaches are welcomed, as are any parents who might wish to turn the whole thing into a family holiday. And that could be very worthwhile as the second week of the stay in Germany includes a tour of the fabulous Rhine River valley.

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The cost of the tour is expected to be about \$1850 which is a small price to pay for some of the best soccer coaching in the world combined with some of the best sightseeing. It's a great opportunity for clubs to start fund-raising now and perhaps send their most exciting youngsters. Separate teams could well hold bingo nights, car washes, raffles and drives to raise the fare to send their own best and fairest player. With several people working together it would only take three or four fund-raising efforts to raise a fare and it would be something the whole team could work for.

Imagine the excitement of an end of season party where a winner of the trip to Germany would be announced.

It's a great opportunity that should not be let to pass so act quickly and book on George Pagan's Junior Soccer Tour.


WHAT TO DO NOW

They might be a bit slower than the State League boys but just as enthusiastic — that's the Valley's Commercial League team.


The side boasts "stars" like Mauro Saftich, John Mengotti, Dave Heywood and

THE WHITE ELEPHANT?

In recent years the Federation has obviously relaxed the standards required before grounds and facilities are approved for State League and First Division fixtures.

As a result those clubs who, in the past, have been forced to play their home fixtures at Perry Park are now using home grounds. This has provided a headache for the Federation who are confronted with the problem of regular usage of Perry Park.

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To the annoyance of Brisbane-based State League clubs (another imposition not suffered by the country clubs) and First Division clubs they have, over the past couple of seasons, been required to play some of their home fixtures at Perry Park. This has resulted in a loss of revenue which would have been coming to the clubs had these fixtures been played at home grounds. Since the expenses of these clubs are higher than lower division clubs, they are the ones who can least afford such losses. This, however, appears to have been of little concern to the Federation in their quest to provide constant usage of THE WHITE ELEPHANT.

Here are two suggestions which could help alleviate the problems and annoyances.

- 1. Return the venue, and maybe its occupants, to the Australian Rules community in an effort to halt their obvious progress within the state.
- 2. Use the venue for Divisional weekends such as are held at Junior level and in Women's soccer.

I will not elaborate on the first suggestion since it speaks of itself

The second suggestion, which could exclude State League and First Division due to their contributions of the past couple of years, would involve only one home game per year being "donated" by clubs in Divisions 2 to 7. This if necessary could be extended to include Colts A and B. Three games each Saturday and Sunday would mean full usage of the ground. This would account for 16 weekends of the season, which, when added to the Easter weekend, Ampol Cup fixtures, and Finals, would account for the normal season.


The idea has merit in three areas;

1. It eliminates the problem of the Federation in trying to find sufficient usage for the ground. 2. The State League and First Division clubs would get some respite from erosion of some of their income.

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3. Teams and players who would not normally have the opportunity to play at headquarters would be given such an opportunity.

I consider the idea to be worthy of consideration, and one never knows, it could be one way of returning a bit of colour to THE WHITE ELEPHANT.

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McKendry Happy with Warriors

The most pleasing thing about this season for Heidelberg coach Len McKendry has been the way oppositions have packed their defences.

Although we are not as yet a serious championship contender we have recaptured the fear that many teams had of us more tham 18 months ago when we led the PSL and were scoring more goals than any other", McKendry said.

This season we have noticed that teams are once again beginning to worry about us and we are being confronted with seven and eight men in defence. And what makes me equally as happy is that we are still getting results."

And it has been only through sheer hard work and application that has brought Heidelberg back to the top — a lesson struggling Brisbane City may well take note of this year.

At one stage last season Heidelberg were in fact third bottom on the table and only one point from last place. But the team under McKendry worked hard at its game, playing a simple but consistent game, and eventually the Warriors worked their way to finish the 1981 season in ninth place and only 12 points from the lead, which was an amazing performance considering the start they gave many teams.

And now this year the club has continued the rebuilding policy and the moving to a new ground a month ago heralded a new era for the club.

"Like Brisbane City and Lions when they played at Perry Park, much of our gate takings were lost to the rental of Olympic Park." MsKendry said.

"But now at our home ground we get the gate and food and drink sales."

But the cost of moving to a new ground has meant strict belt tightening policy at Heidelberg, very similar to what has been



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forced on Brisbane City this season because of last year's extensive capital works. The policy at Heidelberg has been enforced by new president Sam Goulopoulos, who appears to have reunited the club and although he has been ruthless in his cut backs he has maintained relative harmony in the club. The cutbacks inevitably meant a prunning of the playing staff and a cleaning out of the deadwood.

"We faced a debt of \$130,000 which forced us to sell three players and were restricted to buying only one," McKendry said. That player is talented defender Don MacLeod who the club got from former European Cup winners Nottingham Forest. MacLeod claim to Heidelberg last year but McKendry sensibly did not rush him straight into the team but has slowly blended him in.

"We have a good balanced squad now that I think can take the club places," the coach said.

"If you take out George McMillman and Jimmy Rooney, who are the experience that compensates for youth, then the average age of our side is only 24 years."

McKendry said that he was delighted with the current position of Heidelberg on the PSL ladder as he was not expecting results this soon from the side.

"With all the troubles we have faced over the past 12 months I really expected us to be much lower. But it is now quite feasible that we could make the final four although I am reluctant to make too many promises of what lies ahead as I have learnt a lesson from our neighbours South Melbourne," McKendry said.

Now that McKendry has guided his club away from the relegation fears of last season and reestablished Heidelberg in the PSL, any advice he could give Brisbane City should be listened to soundly.

"I don't like telling other clubs or coaches what to do as people who do that generally come unstuck at their own club. But the best advice I could give Brisbane City is not to panic," McKendry said.

"It only takes two wins strung together and the whole picture changes. Another win a few games after that and before you know it relegation is a long forgotten word. The team should play as if they want to win and not as if they are scared to lose." Of this weekend's match McKendry said his biggest worry was the standard of refereeing as stories of bad decisions in Brisbane and Adelaide matches were now commonplace among Sydney and Melbourne coaches.



"We went to Adelaide two weeks ago and we were literally kicked off the park. We were beaten and deserved to be, but my players didn't deserve some of the treatment they got. For the players sake I hope any rough play is stamped out early," McKendry said.

We opened this game with a good goal from the kick-off but in the next 35 minu-


tes missed five chances. It took us until the 37th minute mark to get our next. Two minutes into the second half we
