A NEED FOR CHANGE

A letter to GO SOCCER from independent contributor — OFFSIDER

About twenty years ago a small group of clubs wanting a better deal for soccer than was being provided by the governing body broke away to form the Queensland Soccer Federation.

In the initial year the Federation attracted only a small number of clubs, and, although it was confidently expected that they would be joined by other clubs who at that time had remained with the Association, I don't think anyone was able to foresee the growth of the body, particularly in the Brisbane competition.

As I recall some of the reasons given for the breakaway included:

1. That the code's development was being stifled by lack of a professional outlook on the part of the governing body.
2. The major clubs of that era did not have sufficient say in decisions affecting only those clubs because of inferior voting strength as compared with that of the lower divisions Club delegates, who, it was said were easily manipulated by the governing body.

No one I have spoken to can recall the constitution having been amended, in the proper manner, to have this clause excluded. And so with the seemingly uncontrolled growth of the Brisbane competition the lower division clubs with their combined superior voting strength can, and do, rule the roost by taking part in decisions which, in fact, are none of their business. There is a need for change.

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE STORY

Every club within the Queensland Soccer Federation will be interviewed separately as part of restructuring for 1983 according to the QSF president, Ald. Ian Brusasco.

Ald. Brusasco, replying to criticism of the QSF management committee by independent correspondent OFFSIDER in recent editions of Go Soccer, said a questionnaire had been prepared and would be sent out to all clubs seeking information and to find out what the clubs expected from restructuring.

"Restructuring of the federation definitely will go ahead this year. We wanted to start it last season but were held back because of our involvement in the world youth championships," Ald. Brusasco said.

"For the progress of the code it must be done this year. Everything will be finalised at the annual general meeting or possibly even a special general meeting."

Ald. Brusasco dismissed a lot of the criticism written by OFFSIDER as incorrect and not a true reflection of the situation.

"For a start the lower divisions cannot out-vote everyone else but even if they could, in my 20 years with the federation I have never once seen them 'gang up' on any issue," Ald. Brusasco said.

"What a lot of people should realise is that the clubs are terribly responsible as has been highlighted in the way they have acted on numerous issues in the past. They act for the benefit of the code."

Ald. Brusasco said he was fully aware of the background of the federation as mentioned by OFFSIDER as he was part of the movement which broke away from the old Association.

"I led that revolution which overthrew the then reigning body," he said.

"The growth of the Federation has not

happened too fast or the size has not become too big for us to handle (as suggested by OFFSIDER), but there is only a need for it to be defined a lot better.

"We already have one idea of restructuring and have graphs and diagrams prepared to display it, but everything is still in the planning stages. We aim to restructure the whole lot, including the Trust and the use of Perry Park.

"Personally I think there are too many clubs in the semi-professional side of soccer. We should sort out which ones really fall into this class and separate them from those who are really amateurs. But our overall aim must always be to help ALL those who want to play soccer not just those clubs in the top bracket.

"Ideally this can be done with the QSF management committee directing things with the help of a series of committees. We intend this year to bring additional help into the Perry Park office and let the secretary concentrate on the important things of the federation.

"But for everything to work and work well we need workers. We need administrators who are willing to give a part of their time to the Federation instead of their clubs.

"It is easy for people like OFFSIDER to stay in the background and write anonymous letters because they don't want to get involved. In fact for the past two years no-one on the management committee has been challenged for his position.

"If OFFSIDER or the clubs want a change, then they are the federation, and only the federation can make the changes."

Dear Sir,

I read with interest the submission from OFFSIDER in the May 5 issue of Go Soccer.

In my position as Secretary of the Queensland Soccer Federation I cannot at this point of time make comment on the article other than to say it is pleasing to see someone prepared to carry out some in-depth research of this code's aims and objectives.

The purpose of this letter is to put forward some facts that should be published in relation to OFFSIDER'S comments.

The first refers to the entry of new clubs into the Federation; this is in fact in the hands of the Council of Clubs who ratify the divisional placing recommendation of the Management Committee.

In regard to voting strength there are 27 clubs in divisions 1 & 2 plus Brisbane City and Lions all of whom have two votes each while the number of clubs (not teams) in division 3 and lower, number 31 each with one vote. It is therefore impossible for lower division clubs to out-vote the full members.

Finally to assist I have enclosed a photocopy of the section of our Constitution relating to Full and Associate membership of the Queensland Soccer Federation which you may care to publish.

CONSTITUTION — SECTION 3

AFFILIATION AND MEMBERSHIP

4. All Clubs and Organisations affiliated with the Federation shall be classified either as Full Members or Associate Members.

5. Any soccer club or any other soccer organisation desirous of joining the Federation shall lodge an application in writing with the Secretary not later than November 30th in any year, accompanied by an entrance fee of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) in respect to the State League competition or Fifty dollars (\$50.00) for any other division, together with the particulars as required by the Federation on its formal application form provided however that:—

(a) Any such application shall be first considered by the Management Committee who shall recommend to the Council of the Federation which may in its absolute discretion

refuse such application or admit such club or organisation as a Full or Associate member upon such terms, conditions or stipulations as it may think fit.

(b) On acceptance of membership all clubs shall pay an entrance fee for teams provided in Clause 116. All other organisations shall pay a fee according to membership status which shall be as follows:— Full Membership \$200.00; Associate Membership \$50.00. The fees must be paid by November 30th in each year.

(c) Any soccer club or other soccer body becoming affiliated in pursuance of this Clause shall be furnished with a copy of this Constitution and the Rules and Regulations thereunder and shall be bound thereby.

6. (a) Full Members shall be clubs participating in the State League competition plus clubs participating in divisions 1 and 2 together with clubs participating in the Philips Soccer League or any other National League competition conducted by the Soccer Federation, providing the club or clubs also participate with teams in the Queensland Soccer Federation and are therefore not covered under Clause 7 (3), plus governing bodies of associated soccer organisations are admitted by the Federation Council.

(b) Clubs affiliated to the Federation who participate in the Philips Soccer League or any other National League competition conducted by the Australia Soccer Federation, shall be prohibited from playing a team in the State League competition. Likewise any club participating in the State League competition shall be prohibited from playing a team in the First Division competition.

7. Associate Members shall be: (1) All other clubs lower than Division 2 including South East Queensland League provided however that a club competing in that League is not also defined in Section 3 Clause 6 (a); (2) Governing Bodies of Associated Soccer Organisations as admitted by the Federation Council; (3) Clubs participating in the Philips Soccer League or any other National League competition, conducted by the Australian Soccer Federation, but not participating in the State League or any other Division in the Federation competition.

What others think ...

Dear Sir,

I read with interest Eric Sinclair's letter in Go Soccer of 21st April and I feel I must answer a few points he makes in that letter.

The last meeting I attended on the State League fiasco was September 1981, as I had then stepped down as President of Ipswich United. I personally am appalled, as all soccer supporters should be, that the three Brisbane clubs were fined \$2000 and if there were any action as a result of the withdrawal of the clubs it should have been at least a censure of the Management Committee of the QSF for their failure to act in a more positive manner to the problems confronting the majority of clubs in the State League competition.

In mid-1980 I approached a Brisbane club in an attempt to arrange a meeting of all Brisbane State League clubs to gauge their opinions of State League. Just after that approach it was mentioned at a Management Committee meeting that Ipswich United was trying to organise an illegal meeting. Ipswich United then met with the Management Committee and among other things suggested the possible splitting of the state into two zones — northern and southern. Also that due to the financial strains of the then format of the State League, we felt that Brisbane clubs could "go to the wall" — a prediction, unfortunately as we found later, not to be reserved for Brisbane clubs.

At no time did Ipswich come to a meeting "cap in hand". It was my opinion, as President of Ipswich United 1980/81 that the committee saw a problem in State League and endeavoured to generate discussion on that problem as well as putting forward what they saw as a viable alternative; that being a two district solution and built into the costing of the competition would be the retaining of promotions officer or firm to promote the competition in an endeavour to inject interest. At no time did any club in any meeting show an interest in even discussing our proposition to see if a viable alternative could be put to the Management Committee.

For me personally it was this negative reaction to our proposal which finally prompted me not to seek re-election for office in the Ipswich United Committee. I could see without combined action from the metropolitan clubs that the State League format would continue in 1982 and I was not prepared to work for

something I did not believe in. I was not opposed to the principal of State League as a means of extending soccer in the state but I believe I was realistic enough to accept that because of the geographical size of Queensland, the spiralling cost of travel and the dropping of attendances at the games, the financial pressure of such a competition would be enormous. Also, if you take into account in the south-east of the state, in excess of \$300,000 was spent by clubs on the State League in three years 79-81; and take into consideration the standard of soccer overall in the competition, low spectator attendance at games, poor media coverage by newspapers and television; then you the reader can draw your own conclusion as to the value of the dollars spent.

The purpose of this letter is to clarify my position in relation to State League as I feel certain portions of Eric's letter questioned my credibility and I hope that this reply will justify my actions concerning State League without creating any further discussion.

Dear Sir,

May I jolt OFFSIDER's memory in regards to his article in Go Soccer. In 1970 the then coaches federation put forward a motion to the Annual General Meeting of the QSF that the first and second divisions be professional and that all other divisions revert to amateur status. The professional clubs being full members of the QSF would have two votes, the others one.

Amateur clubs seeking admission to the professional ranks would have to show that they were financially sound, had a suitable playing area, adequate canteen and toilet facilities and were fostering juniors.

The coaching federation could see what direction the system was leading to, hence that particular motion. In fact the original motion went even further in the reorganisation of the QSF. Teams would play in what would have been known as district leagues, for example Western District League, Southern District League and so on. The coaching federation were

advised to go for the main part of the motion, and leave the rest for later, otherwise if one part failed the lot would fail.

As OFFSIDER knows this motion got through and was put into operation the following year. It was obvious that there were people who were against the motion, which did not exclude the then management committee.

The system was given just one season to operate. Under the system Pine Rivers found that after they had won their division (Division Three) they could not advance to Division Two as they did not fulfill some of the requirements. It was that club which put forward a motion, with the blessings from people in high places, to revert back to the status quo.

If my memory serves me well, I can remember OFFSIDER saying that it had put the clock back 10 years. Back in 1970/71 if the clubs had listened to the advice given to them from people like Jack Nunn, Matt Carson, Fred Robins and others, the code would not be in the position it finds itself today.

The problem is just not a case of re-organising teams, it goes much deeper than that and it will take time to put it right. If the clubs see the merits which OFFSIDER put forward, so much the better, but don't repeat the 1970/71 scandal just because it suits your club.

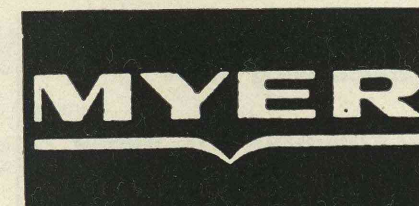

8. Applications for re-affiliations as a Full or Associate Member of the Queensland Soccer Federation must be by prescribed notice in writing sent to the registered office of the Federation no later than November 30th in each year.

Clubs affiliated to the Federation and participating in the Philips Soccer League or any other National League competition conducted by the Australian Soccer Federation, shall have the right to re-nominate and be re-admitted to the State League or First Division competition should they be either relegated from or the National competition ceases to function.

9. Full members shall be entitled to two (2) votes each at any Council Meeting, Annual General Meeting or Special General Meeting. Associate members shall be entitled to one (1) vote at all such meetings.

9A. "The divisions shall be State League, First Division, Second Division, Colts Divisions, South East Queensland League,

First Division Reserve, Second Division Reserve with all other Divisions being numbered consecutively from Third Division. Clubs fielding teams in First or Second Division must also field teams in the respective Reserve Division."

10. With the exception of the State League competition which shall consist of ten (10) teams, all other Divisions shall be made up of not more than twelve (12) teams, with as many divisions as deemed necessary, from time to time, by the Federation.

10A. Full Membership shall be determined by application and re-election.

11. The teams finishing first and second in Division three may apply in writing to the Management Committee no later than fourteen (14) days prior to the Annual General Meeting, for Full Membership to Second Division providing they show themselves more capable than the two bottom teams of Second Division, e.g. ground improvements, facilities and team strength.

THE VALLEYS' ECHO ...

Valleys determination to show what they are really capable of was realised against Nambour in the last home match when they shattered the Reds 4-1.

From start to finish Valleys dominated play and Nambour were lucky to escape with a mere three goal deficit.

Rueful Nambour coach George Pagan admitted the Valleys had outplayed his teams.

"We gave them the opportunity to play good soccer . . . and they certainly took it," Pagan said.

Only defensive stalwart Pat Leathan and ever-dangerous striker Jeff Heydon escaped censure in the general malaise. It was big Pat who shocked Valleys into action by hanging above the defensive wall to head in a freekick. Valleys retaliated immediately, however, and Len Pollock fired the equaliser after good approach work by Dave Watson.

The score remained 1-1 until halftime but then it became one-way traffic with Nambour apparently mesmerised by the pace and skill of a confident Valley's team.

Dave "Doog" Melia celebrated the birth of a son by slotting in two impeccable penalties and Tommy Pike showed brilliant control and coolness in a crowded penalty areas as he set up Dennis Lockhart to hammer the ball into the goal from close range.

Valleys victory was well deserved and very satisfying for coach Mauro Safticr. In a game which all players excelled, Gerry Lindsay and Denis Lockhart deserve extra commendation for their tireless midfield contributions.

Earlier the SEQ side had set the pace against Nambour by annihilating the Reds 8-0. Fired by the non-stop action of Joey Bella and the refined skills of Ron Kidd, Valleys made amends for previous disappointments. Mark Cruese scored a hat-trick while Blackney, Bella, Rathmell, Ciobo and Kennedy also got their names on the scoresheet.

The senior colts showed great character in maintaining their unbeaten record when they turned a 0-1 deficit into 2-1 victory against leading side Acacia Ridge. While the whole side under Ross Bella has been performing with considerable skill and

determination, Tony Iovenetti deserves mention for his consistently resourceful performances.

The fourth division team gave some satisfaction to long-suffering coach Donnie McDonald by beating Slacks Creek 4-1 and the seventh division side, after a much improved display, lost by only a single goal late in the game.

Altogether a satisfying weekend for the Blues.

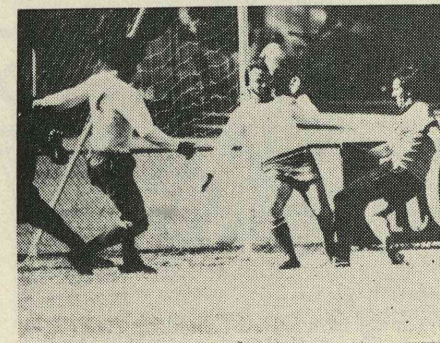
