A NEW PLAN OR

Last week in Canberra a new blueprint for the future of Australia's national soccer competition was unveiled.

The blueprint was released at the Philips League council of clubs and provided it receives the support of the Australian Soccer Federation, will be the master plan for at least the next five years.

Basically the plan calls for a nonrelegation period of three or four years for the current 16 national competition teams in which time regional second divisions will be established.

These second divisions will consist of teams striving to gain a place in the national competition. Eventually, if things go according to the "New Plan", relegation and promotion will operate between the top league and the second divisions, which the planners hope will take in areas from Townsville to Perth.

Unlike several other 'master plans' before it, this one attracted only minimal publicity and initially little criticism, basically because it had the support of the 16 teams in the national competition.

It is a plan formulated for the clubs by the clubs.

The "New Plan" is largely the work of Canberra Arrows official David Dillon, who was commissioned some time ago to come up with a solution to the relegation problem which at some time had haunted nearly all the teams in the current Philips League.



And it appears Mr. Dillon has done his job well. He has come up with a plan which obviously benefits the 16 national competition clubs who say it is financially disastrous for them to have to go back into a state league competition if relegated.

They have guaranteed themselves security by opting for no relegation for the next few years while they are asking other clubs to take a chance and join the new sub-national second divisions.

If the second division idea works, and one wonders if any serious costings have been done as to talk of a team travelling from Townsville to Sydney is a costly operation, then the national teams will benefit as they will have their answer to relegation.

But if the idea fails and the second divisions prove too costly and teams fall onto the financial scrapheap, then the national clubs will not have lost either. They will still be in the national competition and their only inconvenience will be having to come up with a new idea.



For this reason one can see serious opposition to the "New Plan" from state bodies at the next ASF meeting in August. Already QSF president Ald. Ian Brusasco has been quoted as saying he will not support any plan which could lead to the destruction of the Queensland set-up. And this almost certainly would happen if the state's leading local teams, like Townsville, Ipswich and Valleys withdrew from the State League.

Similarly top NSW State League clubs like Croatia and Melita no doubt while relishing an opportunity to get into the national competition would be somewhat reluctant to abandon their competitive league now to play against Queensland country teams. The NSW and Victoria clubs no doubt would be more in favour of forming a second division of their own and no doubt eventually phasing out Queensland and South Australian teams from the national competition.

Queensland's delegate to the PSL management committee, John Morcus, president of Brisbane Lions, said there was overwhelming support among the clubs for the "New Plan"

for the "New Plan."

"But I don't see it eventuating for many years yet," he said.

Mr. Morcus said the clubs firmly insisted that the national league be continued despite no adequate sponsorship looming on the horizon.

ASF president Sir Arthur George is believed to be hoping to renegotiate the deal while in Europe for the World Cup next month but he is reported to have said he is not optimistic.

The clubs voted that if there was no sponsor next season, they would cover the costs. This will mean an increase of more

than 100 percent in affiliation fees. PSL clubs this year paid \$20,000. Next year it is expected to be at least \$45,000.

"All clubs indicated they would stay in the competition under those conditions but if they withdraw then their places will be taken by other national competition aspirants," Mr. Morcus said.

The clubs were also assured they would

The clubs were also assured they would get a voting position on the ASF, which should be finalised at the August meeting and also talked at length about the new visa players proposals. The clubs feel the proposal, which calls for an eventual reduction of visa players from four down to

one over the next four years, is too restrictive.

It was also decided that the idea of summer soccer would be shelved and the national competition season will start in March next year.

Indications are now that the ASF August meeting will be one of the most interesting for some time. It is pleasing to see the clubs trying to solve the problems of next season this early in the year but one wonders in the light of ASF Marketing's expense Americanisation plan blunder little more than 12 months ago, how far this "New Plan" will go.

"He would be an excellent acquisition for any club and I am sure there are a few around Australia who are a little jealous of Lions," Thomson said.


"I think the arrival of Sunderland could coincide with a resurgence in form for Lions as the players in the team will raise their games. They will want to impress him

POINTS TO PONDER

Seems strange though that in the main the offenders are those clubs who not so long ago were complaining about things not being done by the constitution.

Just because you're on top of your division and look like getting promoted at the end of the season, don't start making firm plans for next year. The word on restructuring is that the higher divisions will be those clubs that have adequate financial and capital assets and are seen to be promoting junior soccer in their area. It could mean rapid promotion for some clubs and conversely, although they won't like it, a big drop for some others.

Two of the state's more prominent clubs did not win a lot of friends with the way they released two major stories over the past month. The problems appear to have been solved and apologies made, but one club may not get a lot of time in the future from a well-known sports editor while a prominent media man may not he told too much more in confidence again.

Are things at one big Brisbane club as rosy as what directors make out. The word is that there have been stern discussions between players and the coach over a number of things including travel arrangements and money in relation to a forthcoming promotion while in the second team some of the "young stars" enticed to the club are not entirely happy and have considered other pastures.

Seems the girls in the Perry Park office, who prompted the return of this column, can't take a trick. Each time they sneak out to the local shop for food they are caught by one of the kitchen staff. PROMOTION AND PUBLICITY

A letter to GO SOCCER from independent contributor — OFFSIDER

As soccer supporters the above two words should be almost foreign to you since neither are commonly associated with our code. Coverage of the code given in all avenues of the media is at best only a token gesture, and, in the main, is almost exclusively directed towards the Philips League and its Brisbane participants.

Admittedly the national competition is of interest to many of us, but, those of us, who are in the vast majority I might add, not associated with, and, with litle interest in, any of the teams competing in it, are surely entitled to read, see, or hear some news or publicity surrounding local competitions, via what is after all local media.

Clubs taking part in purely local competitions in Brisbane must surely be the most neglected in the nation so far as the media is concerned. Rarely, if ever, do we see the result of a purely local game in any TV sports news, never do we hear them on the radio, and without our magnifying glasses we would have difficulty seeing them in the press. As for publicity about local games — forget it — the media have.

Clubs from Brisbane participating in State League get some brief and occasional mentions in the Brisbane Press, whereas country teams in the League and those playing in country competitions get their coverage in local rags, on radio and TV, but, in Brisbane, where the local rags are distributed statewide, and the TV is hooked into national and statewide networks, we get nothing, except in cases of sensationalism.

The most publicity given to soccer in recent times has all been bad. Firstly during the world youth championships the network carrying the broadcasts of the games could only find suitable timeslots for some games in the early hours of the morning, while showing ugly crowd incidents at every opportunity in prime viewing time, while locally, the State League dispute and the resultant furore got more coverage in the local press than you would expect from an FA Cup Final. Surely this type of publicity isn't all the media think we're good for! It seems so, though.

Unfortunately, we soccer supporters are a complacent lot because we cop it sweet. Between us we make up a pretty fair slice of the newspaper buyers and TV viewers, but, do we ever see a letter to the editor condemning the lack of space devoted to us, or, do we ever ring the managers of the radio stations or TV

channels about the sparcity of time we get? Like hell we do, we cop it sweet.

This complacency must be catching, it seems it has also affected over governing body. Never do we hear a squeak from them, or perhaps I should say rarely. I do recall seeing a photostat copy of a letter written by our President to the newspapers on the subject about two years ago. I don't recall a photostat copy of the reply if such was ever received, having been circulated to the clubs. It would seem our governing body is also treated with disdain.

So, says you, what can we do about it?

Well, here are my suggestions:

- 1. Contributions of suitable size by the clubs to a pool to be drawn on each week to promote by advertisement, games in purely local competitions. As regular advertisers we may be able to bring some pressure to bear on media management.
- 2. Perhaps club officials could prepare petitions by their members threatening boycott of those not doing the right thing. Drops in circulation and ratings is something media management do not enjoy.
- 3. Bring pressure to bear on our governing body to wake them up in the area of promotion. Get them moving, this time in the right direction.
- 4. Support your clubs in strength, after all, pressure is a numbers game, the larger the number making the noise, the louder the noise. The louder the noise the more it's heard. Until we are heard we can't expect response.
- 5. Push for a return of ethnic identity to to clubs. We meekly surrendered to the edict to quash this, while the southern states stuck to their guns and retained it in local competitions. They have a readily marketable product with a market ready to buy it. Without something to sell we have nothing to promote.

Whatever we do, let's do it soon before we get discarded like yesterday's newspaper.

THE VALLEYS' ECHO ...

The Valley Tridents State League side came back from Ebbw Vale recently with a hard-earned point from a 1-1 draw with Ipswich United.

In a turbulent encounter, Valleys found the heart and will to match the rugged determination of Matt Carson's side. Any team going to Ipswich relying solely on skills will come away pointless this year unless they have the necessary steel to compliment their ability. In accepting Ipswich's challenge, Valleys played their finest soccer of the season.

The match was composed of two contrasting halves featuring more than a touch of irony. In the first half Valleys dominated play only to find themselves a goal in arrears at the interval while in the second half, Ipswich controlled events only to allow their opponents to equalise in the last 10 minutes.

From the start it was obvious that no prisoners were to be taken. Ipswich play a very ruthless game. They play it tight and fast, out to win every ball at all costs and to their credit they never complain when their opponents adopt the same tactics. Deiter Klose, referee on the day, amused some and infuriated others with his curious inconsistencies, and from the start was obviously going to allow this type of game to proceed. So Valleys were compelled to reply in kind or go under. It resulted in a very exciting match.

Ipswich went ahead when an early penalty, awarded for "hands", was hammered past goalkeeper Martin Coe by Kevin Caldwell. Valleys players furious at the decision took the game right to Ipswich and should have scored on at least three occasions.

The team was playing purposefully, frequently brilliant soccer and coach Mauro Saftich, delighted with the rhythm established by his team, was confident that it was only a matter of time before goals were scored.

Valleys fullbacks Lovell and Shepherd tackled and hurried like terriers while Dave Melia patrolled majestically at the back. Richard Shortman put the clamps on the potential threat of Mark Brusasco by winning virtually everything in the air.

Midfielders Gerry Lindsay, Tom Pike and Dennis Lockhart combined skilfully at relentless pace to subdue their counterparts and set up chances for their forwards. Some of their sallies and first time passes were sheer magic as they pressured the Ipswich defence who had enough trouble handling the deft touches of Dave Watson, the determined flank running of Frank Mengotti and the stylish aggression of Len Pollock. The home side held out however and halftime arrived with the Valleys players somewhat disappointed to be unrewarded for their efforts.

The second half was an altogether different story. Then it was the surging Ipswich team creating and making chances and Martin Coe worked overtime to keep the scoreline down. Then with the end of the game in sight, Valleys forced themselves into a revival. Substitute John Kennedy almost saved the game with a fierce ground shot and a defence-splitting run down the right. But it was left to "handball" culprit Frank Mengotti to salvage his pride and that of the club by scoring. He rose to a corner and headed the ball fiercely against an Ipswich defender on the goal line. When the ball rebounded, Frank smashed it jubilantly into the net.

Unfortunately the SEQL side, although abound with skill, lacked the grit of the senior side and were steamrolled 4-0. Only an overworked keeper and stopper Mickey Hayes, making a welcome return from injury, were entitled to hold up their heads with any sort of pride at the end of the game.

The lack of a referee at North Star prevented a top-of-the-table clash between the home side and the Valleys Senior Colts.

Finally, I am disappointed to hear Valleys will be losing Dave Watson, who has obtained a teaching position in the Solomon Islands. Dave had just begun to hit his straps after coming to Valleys this year and he will be a hard man to replace. But everyone at Valleys wishes him well in his new position.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

First I would like to commend Go Soccer magazine for being so well set out and informative this year. The editorials and comments have been informative in that they have tried to get behind the scenes for the truth, that in itself is refreshing. More power to your arms!

Secondly I wish to say how perceptive I think Offsider has been in recent weeks. I wouldn't presume to begin advising how to restructure the leagues. I've seen that many changes since the old association days, the mind boggles. The clubs themselves must bear a fair share of the responsibility for this. Whether there was a governing clause favoring the clubs in the top two divisions in the original constitution or not, the steady erosion of amateur status and the proliferation of clubs in practically every new suburb has led to a cut throat situation in the search for quick success.

I'll wager there are quite a few clubs around that regret the passing of amateurism, both financially and in the number of players that have been enticed away from them. To them I say more power to your fund-raisers' arms!

Thirdly, and the one I have found more exasperating than in the previous season, is that the fixtures I refer to, I obtained from Go Soccer as the year book isn't available at the time of writing. The dates and venues for the first division and reserve teams have to be studied to be believed. Some clubs have Saturday matches at home week after week while others will be strangers to their own park by the time the second round comes along. The arrangements will affect the club conversely in the second round.

From that I have heard of some of the mid-week venues, I can only assume that Cooke's Tours are coming in with a sponsorship somewhere along the line. The reserves aren't even playing at the same venue or on the same day as the first team! What little consideration has been given to coaches and suporters!

If clubs are not going to be given a better deal than this, there are going to be a few more clubs going broke by the end of the year. Clubs can't exist without support and unless arrangements are made to make home games reasonably and regularly accessible to the locals, the support will dwindle.

In closing, I think clubs should take a look at Offsider's comments about the "White Elephant". Are we engaged in an egotistical exercise in struggling to maintain a showpiece for the benefit of our standing in comparison with the other football codes? The clubs that wish to play regularly at Perry Park should be encouraged to do so. The others, who are probably attempting to improve their own facilities, should not be expected to, the expense in money and support is just too much.
