NEWMARKET HAS ALL THE IDEAS

In the shadow of Brisbane City's magnificent million dollar grandstand is a club which if it maintains its current rate of progress could well surpass its Philips League neighbours.

The club is Newmarket, which since its foundation in 1949 has always been respected in local competition but it has only been in the past two years that it has been discovered as a sleeping giant.

And plans are now under way to tap that potential and direct it towards the future security and progress of the club. Later this month Newmarket president Bob White will head off to the West coast of America where he hopes to finalise one of the most ambitious plans ever undertaken by a lower division club in Australia.


It is Bob's and Newmarket's desire to set up an exchange player system where some of the top young players in United States' competitions will play in Brisbane while some of Newmarket's brightest prospects will be sent to America.

The idea has been greeted enthusiastically by United States Soccer Federation president Gene Edwards and secretary general Kurt Lann who have been in constant telephone contact with Bob White over recent weeks to finalise his trip itinerary. And Queensland Soccer Federation officials this week confirmed their support for the Newmarket proposal and QSF secretary Mr. Alan Vessey said that other than the usual visa problems he could envisage no difficulties in an exchange player system operating. If all goes to plan, Newmarket are confident of setting the exchange system operating by next season. "I intend visiting at least four clubs in America and I will be putting to them the exchange system and hopefully working out some kind of sister club arrangement," Bob White said this week.

"The Australian and American seasons overlap so any players who come to Australia will be in peak condition and no-one will be here just for a holiday. And I have no doubts that when our players return from the States they will be much better for their experience."

The talent of American players should not be underestimated. The US Youth team qualified for the world youth championships in Australia last year and played their first round matches at Lang Park. Although they finished bottom of the group, players of the likes of Tom Cain, John Stollmeyer, Tom Gardiner and Jay Ainslie proved they could hold their own in top company. And the talent of the Newmarket side similarly should not be taken too lightly this year, as many second division and second division reserves sides have found.

The club this season made the ambitious move of bringing back Ian Steele as player coach and they have been rewarded with *Continued Page 5*

results on the field. After eight games the first and second teams are on top of their respective tables with the second division side yet to be defeated, scoring 25 goals and conceding only five in the process. The club's Colts B side is also sitting on top of its league.

"Steelie" has not been the only reason for the promotion-chasing form of Newmarket this season and credit must be given to players like midfielder Kerry Felsch, sweeper Jim Reiken and strikers Rob Peterson and Peter Richards, and in fact, every other member of both teams. If the exchange program is finalised, Newmarket officials are very open as to who will be the first to go to America. They say it won't be limited to just first team players and even talented youngsters like Duane Quinn and Greg Irwin could be sent as investments for the future.

In the true style of the new go-ahead Newmarket committee, which in under three years has converted a \$3,000 debit into a very favourable bank balance, the American exchange program is not the only thing the club has on its plate this season. The committee fully expects the first stage of the club's new \$100,000 club house to be completed by mid July with the official opening planned for late August or early September. Local Alderman Joe St. Ledger has committed himself to officially open the clubhouse.

The clubhouse, which is designed to be extended further down the sideline at a later date will have a huge entertainment area with a bar, a kitchen and an office. The extensions, planned for three to four years time, will include among other things, large well-equipped dressing rooms.

Such is the revival of support at Newmarket, that not only have they attracted good sponsorship from businesses like Brisbane Insurance Services and Cromwell Motors, but supporters have gathered together to form an eight girl cheer squad. The squad has been organised by Cathy Mancuso and will perform at every home game from now on. They have asked Bob White to also get some information on American cheer squads while in the States and they hope to incorporate some of the American ideas into their routine.

All indicators are pointing towards not

only a good year for Newmarket but a great future and with many clubs battling these days it is pleasing to see one standing on firm ground. With the foundations which appear to have been laid over the past two years there seems to be only one way the club can go — and that's up!

Dear Sir.

Re the Cobweb Corner pictures published on May 26. I am fairly certain that the players in the top photograph were Graham McMillan (nearest the goal-

Keeper) and Gordon 'Bunny' Nunn (No.7). I was the "Courier-Mail" soccer writer for a lengthy period about that time, and if my memory serves me correctly both Graham and 'Bunny' represented Australia.

Nunn, who played with St. Helens and Bundamba, was a prolific goalscorer in local competitions and McMillan, a member of the Y.M.C.A. team, was a first class winger. McMillan went to England, I think, and trialled with a top English club for a season.

The players in the bottom picture are more difficult to recognise. No. 9, whose face is contorted with the effort he is putting into his shot, could be Col. Kitching, a member of a well-known Bun-damba soccer family. (Note — others identified the No. 9 as Bobby Lawrie, also of Ipswich - Ed.).

I would hazard a guess that No. 10 in the background was Mal. Wild of Easts, whose cannonball left foot shots were feared by most goalkeepers.

It seems to me that the creation of the PSL and State Leagues has severely curtailed international team's visits to Australia. In those days I covered games be-tween Queensland and Australia and such international teams as English professionals and amateurs, China, Yugoslavia, Palestine, Czechoslavakia, India, South Africa and others. Most of the Indian players, incidentally, played in bare feet! I can recall two incidents from some

of these matches. In a "Test" in Brisbane the goalkeeper of one European team was so upset by the referee's decision to award a penalty that he walked out of his goal and gave the Australians a "free" shot.

A member of another European side, sent off by the referee in another game, pulled out the flag on the half way line and hurled it like a javelin at the referee, but fortunately his aim was poor.

The structure of the divisions in the QSF competition requires reorganisation. Higher competition would result of the best 12 teams in Brisbane played in one division, the next best 12 teams (and not necessarily clubs) played in the next division and so on.

Apart from the State League which is the highest standard division? It is most probably First division but are all First division clubs better than South-east Queensland League sides? Are Salisbury and Mitchelton (bottom of the First division on May 23) better than St. Helen's and Rochedale (at top of the SEQL at the same date.) There is no promotion and relegation between first division and SEQ League.


There are good teams who should be playing against each other which are playing against lower standard teams. I will assume all first division teams are better than SEQ League teams. What then is the next best division after first division? Is it SEQ League or second division or perhaps first division reserve? In short, good teams are spread all over the shop and the standard of competition in any given division is correspondingly reduced.

Clubs with depth shoud be encouraged. Thus Lions and Brisbane City should be able to field teams in the SEO and State League if they are good enough. Likewise Mount Gravatt and say a club like North Star should be allowed to field teams in SEQ League and say second division.

Promotion and relegation would mean teams would find their own level within a couple of years if any grading mistakes were made originally. Meaningless lopsided reserve competitions would disappear,


