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

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## DONNELLY SPEAKS OUT

Last week is one Ipswich United goalkeeper Greg Donnelly will not forget too quickly. It was one in which he was sent from the field for the first time, labelled the bad boy of Ipswich soccer in the media, lost his place in the team — then exonerated for the incident which caused all the problems.

But despite the incidents of last week, and some showed Donnelly and his wife Christine who their friends really were, the young keeper is just glad its all over and he has emerged officially with his reputation untarnished.

And it is a fine reputation to be proud of — 16 years without a caution — and it is understandable why Donnelly and Ipswich officials like Terry Broen fought so doggedly to win the appeal.

The whole incident began last Saturday week in Townsville when the home side took on Ipswich United in the State League match of the round. And Donnelly this week told Go Soccer his version of the events which led to referee Gary Brownlie giving him the red card.

"It was about 15 minutes into the game when a ball was knocked across from the wing," Donnelly said.

"It was on the near post and the ball carried to the far post where Alan Marszalek was marking Bob McGuinness. There was a challenge for the ball and Alan headed it over for a corner. They say there was some shirt-pulling but I never saw it and when the whistle was blown I thought it was a freekick for us.

"The referee then said I had pulled Mc Guinness' jersey but that was impossible as I was two or three yards away. I accepted the decision though and I was in fact pulling other guys away from the referee as I knew protesting was no good.

"McGuinness took the penalty and I dived the wrong way. I got up and I said 'What a f..... joke'. I was not talking to anyone and just said it to myself firstly because I had dived completely the wrong way and secondly about the whole chain of events.

"I said it that quietly even the other players on the edge of the box did not hear it and were surprised when I was shown the red card. Someone in our team said the referee actually went for the yellow card but fumbled and pulled out the red one accidentally but I don't know how true that was.

"I was depressed, shattered and destroyed. I knew it cost us two points as we were playing well enough to win. I had let the team down yet I knew I was innocent. (Ipswich lost 1-2).

"When I got back to Brisbane the press, particularly in Ipswich blew it right out of proportion. Some people came up and

made smart remarks and that particularly upset Christine.

"But the players in the team and some of the club officials backed me 100 percent and that was a great feeling.

"I was upset though that the coach dropped me before the appeal. It seemed as if he considered I was guilty. But I realise he is the boss and he decided to commit himself early and name Ross in goals for the next game. Matt is in charge and I respected his decision.

"When the appeal came up I was very nervous. I probably showed when I was talking but I knew all along I was innocent. It was such a relief when they called me back in and said that it was unbelievable a player could go so long without ever being cautioned and they were prepared to keep it intact by accepting my appeal.

"It was like a weight off my shoulders," Donnelly said.

But the Ipswich keeper did not get off a warning that he should watch his language on the field in future, particularly if he was involved with juniors, as he has been at Ebbw Vale.

And that is something Donnelly intends working on in addition to getting his first team place back.

"That was close enough to the real thing for me and I don't intend going through it again," Donnelly said cheerfully this week. And for Ipswich's and soccer's sake, that can only be good news.

## Another Guest Likely

Brisbane Lions officials this week confirmed that it was "extremely likely" that the club would bring another guest player to Australia next season.

And one official revealed to Go Soccer that preliminary negotiations had already been made with one player and he indicated he was very keen to take up the club's offer next season.

But indications are that Lions may not necessarily sign that player, a former team-mate of this year's guest, Alan Sunderland and were closely watching the World Cup now in Spain and could approach at least one English-speaking player who figured prominently in his team's performance.

Lions have several talent scouts in Great Britain who keep in regular contact with the club and can be instructed at less than a day's notice to make an approach to a player.

"There were several big names like Kenny Dalglish and Osvaldo Ardilles who were set to come to Australia to southern clubs but the World Cup thwarted their plans. There is no reason why players like them would not want to come next year," one Lions official said.

"We intend to make early approaches to ensure we get in before any other Australian club does."

Lions' current guest Alan Sunderland makes his final appearance for the club against Heidelberg at Richlands on Sunday. Although Sunderland has probably not captured the imagination of many Brisbane people in the way Bob Latchford did last year — and that was probably only because of the interest Latchford's muscle injury created — Lions maintain the venture has been just as successful.

His coaching clinics, which were held at Richlands this week, were an outstanding success and all but booked out.

The attendance at the derby two weeks ago was a club record and although many cynics are saying the crowd was attributed to Lions' 25th anniversary celebrations and a derby crowd normally is just as big, they fail to realise how well Sunderland was promoted in the week prior and there were many people in the crowd who are not normally at a derby.

Sunderland's success on the field probably has only been limited but it certainly hasn't been his fault. When he has got the ball Sunderland has shown some brilliant skills — Jim Hermiston surely won't forget how he was skinned in the first half of the derby — but Lions midfield has not been at its best and at times the English star has been starved of the ball.

It should also be remembered, if comparing Sunderland to Latchford, that the latter arrived at a time when Lions were on a high — a new coach and a guest player for the first time ever. Latchford's benefit though showed after he left with several players, particularly the youngsters oozing with confidence.

That too could well happen when Sunderland returns with players like Danny Wright and if it does then Lions' decision to bring guest players to Australia will be proved to be a right one.

## WITH THE JUNIORS

The Mazda Queensland under 15 junior soccer championships at Richlands next week could be the stepping stone to a successful senior career for many youngsters.

The championships, which begin this Saturday and continue until Saturday, July 10, almost certainly will be watched by "talent scouts" from various senior teams. And it seems inevitable some players will be invited to join senior sides on the strength of their showing at the championships.

And there certainly will be some talent on display. Nine zones will compete for the prestigious Mazda championship. They are Far North Queensland, Central Queensland, North West, Wide Bay, South West, Brisbane North, Brisbane South and South-east Queensland.

Each zone has a squad of 15 players but their abilities and stamina will be tested over the tough week-long titles.

After the championships a team will be selected to represent the state in the National under 15 championships at Frankston, Victoria from August 29 to September 4. The team will be coached by Nambour Reds State League coach George Pagan and managed by Ken Hesson from Mount Isa.

Games will begin at Lions Stadium, Pine Road, Richlands at 9 a.m. each day although this Sunday will kick off at 10 a.m. to tie in with the Philips League match between Lions and Heidelberg Utd. at 3 p.m.

**A solution appears to have been reached in the controversial Brisbane Southern Districts Junior Soccer Association's coaching policy proposals.**

At one stage some clubs feared they may face fines of up to \$50 because coaches of their junior teams did not attend courses held earlier this year.

But at a club delegate's monthly meeting on Tuesday, June 22 a motion by Beenleigh Soccer Club was accepted. The motion wisely takes any time element out of the proposals and urges clubs to send their coaches to the courses as soon as possible.

The motion read: That the coach of the top team in each age group from under 9 to Junior Colts and if applicable Open Age division be required to attend a coaching course not exceeding 16 hours duration conducted by the Association's Director of Coaching, one approved by the executive of the BSDJSA. This require-

ment also applies where a club has only one team in each age group, irrespective of what the divisional grading of that team. All club coaches who do not come within the above requirements should be actively encouraged to also attend a coaching course. Where an approved course is conducted by someone other than by the Association's Director of Coaching, a full report by the person conducting the course will be forwarded to the Association at the conclusion of the course.

The Junior Ampol Cup, the state under 14 championships will also be held from this weekend at the Townsville Junior Soccer Association complex. Championships manager will be Barry Curry and the QJSC representative Andy Boscacci. The state under 14 team will be picked for the nationals at Para Hills, South Australia where they will be under the control of experienced coach Jim Dolan.

## WORLD CUP SNIPPETS

Because now we've seen so many world class stars such as Michel Platini of France — who Italian club giants Juventus have signed for two million dollars — and Italy's Francesco Graziani and apart from a few nice touches they haven't shown anything that we couldn't see from a good John Kosmina, Joe Watson or Dez Marton in the Philips League, no matter how ridiculous it sounds.

**THE VALLEYS' ECHO ...**

In two weeks Valleys will play their second round Ampol Cup game and indications are the Blues could be set for a good run in this prestigious and rich knockout competition.

After beating the Bundaberg Federation team 3-1 two weeks ago, Valleys now play the winner of the first round match between Olympic and Acacia Ridge. The Greek-backed Olympic would have to be favourites to beat the Ridge, our old first division rivals, but in Ampol Cup, like every other knockout competition around the world, you never know.

We demonstrated against Bundaberg that at times we can turn on the type of football needed in knockout competitions and the double — the State League premiership and Ampol Cup — is well within our sights provided we play football all the time and not in patches.


This was the case against Bundaberg and we made hard work of what should have been a relatively easy win. We started in the blitzkrieg manner which had shocked Townsville two weeks earlier and mesmerised the opposition with forceful midfield play. We forced the home team into a defensive error which allowed Len Pollock to demonstrate his incisive finishing.

Valleys continued to dominate. There were plenty of shots and the Bundaberg keeper was kept busy. He made some particularly remarkable efforts to thwart a back to form Phil Cruse but eventually a second goal by Gerry Lindsay, following a one-two with Pollock, was an inevitability.

But two goals up, the worrying Valley Trident flaw once more became evident. Many players suddenly felt free to do their own thing and reveal to the crowd their hitherto repressed range of soccer skills. With the discipline faltering, Bundaberg came within an ace of pulling a goal back and only a determined solo effort by Martin Coe prevented Charlie Dench from scoring.

With the score 2-0 at halftime coach Saffich forcefully reminded the team of their responsibilities and Ian Rathmell was sent on as sweeper to join Shortman, Micky Hayes and John Lavelle in the backline.

As expected Bundaberg threw caution to the winds and came strongly at Valleys but after 15 minutes or so the Brisbane team gradually reasserted its authority. Valleys could have scored on several occasions but when they finally put one away it was through their own goal with Mickey Hayes the culprit.

This goal however spurred Valleys on — it was the sort of pressure they relish as they proceeded to dominate all aspects of the game and Phil Cruse celebrated his return to the team by knocking in the third goal from close range. John Kennedy then replaced a tiring Pollock and he proceeded to tear the home defence to shreds. Although there were no more goals the game finished as it had begun, with Valleys on top. The midfield were once again awarded the Kudos with Shortman just shading them for the man-of-the-match and Mickey Hayes making a very commendable return to the first team.

The Fourth Division team went down disappointingly to Taringa by 4-1. Through most of the game Valleys dominated territorially but they simply couldn't capitalise on their dominance. Peter (Racky) Agelholm fired in Valleys' goal but making the most of their breaks, Taringa finished comfortable winners.

The seventh division team, with several new faces in evidence, raced to a two-goal lead at halftime through goals by Silvester and Bippin who showed they might be learning a thing or two from the Brazilians. Valleys ran out of steam in the second half however and allowed Taringa to equalise with two late goals.



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



# HAVING A MOAN . . .

A letter to the Editor from Acacia Ridge's MIKE COLLINS

**So far this season the format set down by the Queensland Soccer Federation for the First Division and First Division Reserves fixtures can be described as nothing short of disgusting. Why the clubs have put up with such shoddy treatment defies all reasoning.**

First we find that each club has to forfeit four home games, which are played on a neutral ground, Perry Park, which in the case of our club means we stand to lose at least \$5000 — and we do not charge an entrance fee. So off to Perry Park we go, some 20 kilometres, for a 6.30 p.m. kick-off on a cold winter's night. Half or more of the players have come straight from work so what chance have you got of getting spectators there at that time? In one instance we played Darra at 6.30 and the 8.30 match was between Annerley and Coalstars. I wonder what time they got home? The referee's fees for the night were \$120 and to make these up each club had to add a further \$7 out of their own pocket to the gate, while upstairs the QSF was rubbing its hands with the bar takings. They could not even bother to use the public address system.

The best one so far though was when the First Division played Salisbury at Perry Park on Wednesday night, on Thurs-

day the Reserves played each other at Mitchie at 6.30 p.m. some 30 km away while Mitchie and Pine Rivers played at 8.30 p.m. which is as silly as a wooden balloon.

Most of the First Division clubs would have played as many as four fixtures in eight days, including Ampol Cup games, when these could have been played during weeks which were vacant from fixtures. The weekend of June 19 is a classic blunder. The QSF handbook states this weekend was set aside for the final 16 teams in the Ampol Cup. But no, what do the QSF do, cancel the games to play three State League fixtures that were postponed early in the year. The State League play 18 fixtures during the season whereas the First Division play 28 plus three Ampol Cup games if they reach the final 16, which is almost twice as many, yet they have to make way for State League fixtures. I also notice that none of the State League clubs have to play any fixtures at Perry Park.

I feel there must be some animosity by some QSF members regarding the First Division, maybe from what happened during the off-season with the three State League clubs that are now in the First Division. If the State League in 1981 was run anything like the First Division is this year, one can hardly blame the clubs concerned for the action because at the moment these 15 clubs are being bled dry.

One last moan on this matter. Whoever was responsible for drawing up the fixtures for the First Division needs a dose of Epsom salts to clear his brain. We have Darra United who after playing their first three fixtures, play the next 10 games away from home. In the case of my club, we have just finished playing the last five Saturdays at home so that in our last 12 games, two are at home and 10 away.

Recently in Go Soccer I read the letter to the Editor by Lindsay Stewart of Mount Gravatt about supporters from a certain club spitting on players after a game. The same thing happened last year to players from my club, but in front of the referee as they were leaving the field, after we had beaten them in an Ampol Cup match at Perry Park. Perhaps it is time the QSF management committee took action.
