

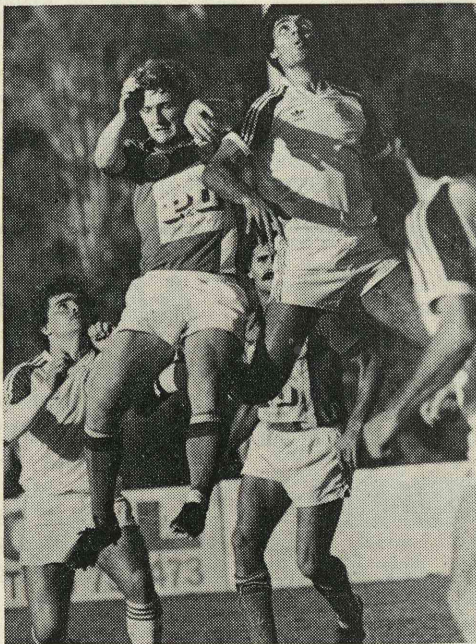

IN DEFENCE OF SALISBURY

Dear Sir,

I am writing to express my disgust over the unsporting and inaccurate comments made in this magazine by the so-called experts of Darra and Acacia Ridge about Salisbury in recent weeks. What makes it worse is that in Darra's case he doesn't even have the guts to give his real name.

Now I know Salisbury have not had the best of seasons but I can tell you it has not been due to the lack of effort by either the players or the club committee who have been struggling to keep the club going despite almost impossible odds. As one leading referee said, there is very little between the top clubs and the bottom ones. Sure we have deserved to lose some games but there has been just as many that with a little luck we could have won. Just ask Mount Gravatt how Salisbury can play when given a little luck. As for the Acacia Ridge game, if it had been decided on clearcut chances, Salisbury would have won handsomely.

With regards to Darra, I would start thinking about the state of their own club before criticising others. Any English First Division club would be insulted to have to use Darra's change rooms and to call their field a cow paddock would be to the detriment of any self-respecting cow. Now Darra might have had three first team players out, Salisbury had seven including captain and vice-captain so a result of 3-0 isn't a bad result for half a first team and half a second team. Since several reserves were also unavailable it was simply impossible to field a reserve side and Darra had been notified of this.

In conclusion I must say I can understand how the top clubs don't like playing the bottom side and not getting everything their own way, but to be unsporting about it is a disgrace. The second round is underway and with it might come a chance of luck for Salisbury, so beware other clubs, especially those who feel that because they pay their players they are better than the rest. We who play simply for the fun of it might be down but we are not out.

"Some of the football produced by these teams was superb. At times it was hard to believe these boys were so young," Mr. Dye said.

"From the enthusiasm and level of skill shown by the youngsters in all age groups I am sure the future of Queensland soccer is in safe hands."

NEWS FROM VALLEY TRIDENT UNITED SOCCER CLUB

At the start of the season there were in excess of 50 State League hopefuls at the Valley Trident club. It was a slow process but out of that group a first team squad of 15 players has been refined.

A new approach and basic team design has replaced the one which was so successful in the First Division last year. Where last year's team relied heavily on the speed and thrust of strikers Peter Carey and John Kennedy, this season's side is a more controlled, inter-dependent unit.

As in Italian coach Enzo Bearzot's World Cup winning side, the Valley Trident team tries to utilise the strengths of each player, even to the extent of subordinating individual talents for the sake of the overall team performance.

Effort and the team pattern has been all-important even to the extent of leaving talented players out and the results have been forthcoming. The Blues are now handily placed in the table for the run home behind the two pacesetters, and have only lost two games in the first half of the programme.

The SEQL side has also settled down well after the necessary changing and chopping of the early season. They have a useful blend of youth and experience, have developed a good team spirit and more significantly, have taken five points from their last three games.

The Senior Colts are a well-balanced side who have excelled themselves in the tough "A" division by finishing the first half of the season on top, undefeated.

In their recent game against Mount Gravatt they illustrated their dominance of the division when they won 3-0. After a rather scrappy first half, the Blues played some thrustful, attacking football to emerge worthy winners. Angelo Vico and Zino Spitaleri were the men in form, capturing the goals and the Kudos. Zino looked particularly inspired as he dribbled through a hesitant defence to score the first goal and showed great control under pressure to slot home the second. Extra Friday night training certainly seems to be paying off in his case.

A gratifying aspect of the colts' success is their willingness to benefit from the advice of State League players "Doog" Melia and Joey Bella in particular. Altogether it fosters a very positive club spirit.

The Fourth and Seventh Division teams may not be the most successful in the club, although Donny McDonald's boys scored a great victory over top-of-the-table Woodridge recently, but they certainly make a great contribution to the overall club atmosphere.

At the junior level, the Valley Trident teams, while not exactly setting the world alight, have proved themselves to be opponents to be reckoned with every time they play. This is the area in which we hope to see considerable expansion next year when hopefully the all-round successes of the club, on and off the field, will attract more youngsters to our teams. Last but not least, tribute must be paid to our king of the backroom boys — our cheerful strapper and masseur, ex-Bushrat Gary Healing, who by name and nature has kept the boys on the park. Well done Gary.

At this stage of the season, chief coach Saftich can feel justifiably proud of the achievements of the club at all levels.

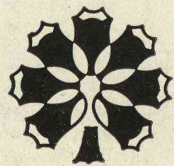

Ipswich United State League team coach Matt Carson has laid it on the line to his players as they strive to ensure the club does not miss playing in the finals series for the second consecutive season.

Carson, who took over the coaching reins at Ipswich this year, told Go Soccer this week he would drop anyone who did not give full effort in any game before the end of the season.

"We must consolidate a top four position and that means effort from everyone. If someone is not doing their job then they will be dropped and I will find someone who will," Carson said.

"We are past the stage of the season where anyone can afford to take it easy. We must work to get into the semis. It is obvious the competition has developed into one where there are five teams fighting for four positions. Someone has to miss out and if the players do what they are capable of then it won't be Ipswich this year."

Carson would not be drawn into selecting which team would miss out of the four from Lions, Townsville, Across the Waves, Valley Trident and his own side, but gave the impression he considered the top three teams at the end of the year

would be Townsville, Lions and Ipswich, perhaps even in that order.

But Ipswich's fate is certain to be decided over the next month. Assuming all the other top sides beat the lower placed teams, which is now proving to be a harder task each week, then the only way Ipswich will stay in the four is to beat the other top sides.

In their next five fixtures Ipswich play Capricornia, Valleys, Olympic, Townsville and Lions. Carson has settled for a target of no less than 10 points but realistically if the side can emerge with seven it will probably guarantee a passage to the finals.

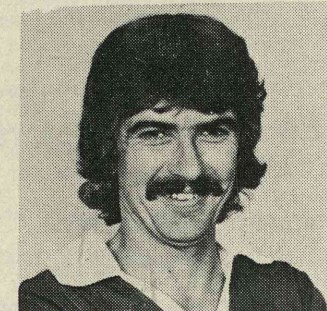
Ipswich have played some of the best soccer in the competition this year, just ask Olympic about their first round clash with United and it would be a shame for a club with such talent not to be involved in the finals again. But if everyone adopts the whole-hearted attitude of Carson, Ipswich could well be one of the sides at Perry Park in mid-September.

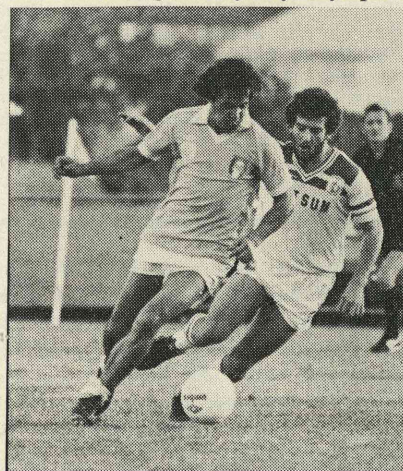
SENIOR COLTS B
