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

THIRD TIME LUCKY FOR IPSWICH

Ipswich United have been so close yet so far in winning the Ampol Cup over the past two years.

This year Ipswich have again reached the semi-finals and ironically again play Across the Waves. But good fortune, and the Queensland Soccer Federation management committee smiled on Ipswich and granted them a home match, much to the delight of club officials and players alike.

This is Ipswich's big chance to be third time lucky.

Accross the Waves are no easy side as Ipswich have already discovered this season. But coach Matt Carson has drilled total commitment into the Ipswich side and in front of their home supporters, and a predicted crowd which could approach 1000, they could well edge their way into the Cup final.

They have reached the final stages of the competition after battling through the tough early rounds but on each occasions have faltered at one of the last hurdles. Two years ago it was against Townsville. Ipswich were forced to travel to North Queensland to play Townsville on the home territory and after a gutsy performance forced a replay.

But in the second clash at Ebbw Vale, when everything should have gone Ipswich's way, they were unluckily pipped for the trophy.

Last year the Coalminers again fought through the early rounds but to their dismay they found they had to play yet another important tie away from home — a semi-final against Across the Waves in Bundaberg. Again Ipswich finished on the losing end.

It's going to be one of the greatest matches in Ipswich this season and potentially one of the best in the city's long soccer history.

A home win another crack at the Cup will be the icing on the cake!

COL HAD THE ADVICE TO SOLVE THE PROBLEM

The whole Queensland referees controversy which blew up last week could well have been avoided if Brisbane City officials had heeded the advice of Col Amos more than a month ago.

Amos had suggested to the City officials that some kind of hessian cover be put over the players and referees race to prevent spitting and the throwing of small objects at match officials when they left the field.

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"I suggested it to them after I had been spat on. I didn't make an official complaint because I thought it would be better to make the suggestion to them," Amos said.

But despite having yards of hessian put along the creek side boundary of Spencer Park to stop people looking in without paying, the race stayed uncovered and helped contribute towards the ugly scenes after the City-Olympic match.

But to their credit the City directors did all in their power to avert any further ugly scenes by dispersing the crowd and getting the match officials out of the ground as quickly as possible, after a heated end to the game when Amos ruled a shot at goal, which would have given City a win, did not cross the line.

But all the good work went to waste when a thoughtless comment was made to the media. A City director, obviously upset by the incidents, said twice to the scribes — "if I had a gun I would put it to his head".

It was this remark which triggered the

ban by the referees federation on Brisbane City teams.

The controversy received plenty of coverage in the local media. But was it the type of coverage we needed?

A meeting was held last Tuesday night at Perry Park between all parties concerned with the incident. Hopefully that will be the last we hear of it and it is remembered players, spectators and officials alike — the referees decision is final.

A LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir.

The recent publicity surrounding the controversial decision by Col Amos in the Gladiators 1-1 draw with Sydney Olympic, can only be damaging for the game. However the stand taken by the Queensland Referees Federation has the full support of the general public. And rightly so

Referees are always open for criticism, however the treatment handed out to Col was disgusting. He is one of Queensland's most experienced referees having controlled PSL games since 1980. He has handled five Philips League games this year along with the Philips Cup clash between Brisbane Lions and Sydney City. But the after-match display of certain sections of the Spencer Park crowd was degrading to everyone involved and does

nothing for the image of the game.

There has been similar incidents in the past but no action was ever taken. However it will now be necessary if the crowd cannot control their emotions. The fickle Brisbane City supporters would be better off supporting their team rather than jeering them and then seeking excuses.

Before this behaviour becomes common place perhaps it is time the PSL or the Australian Soccer Federation flexed its muscles now. By making the Gladiators forfeit the use of their home field for one match they would demonstrate that this type of behaviour will not be tolerated. Incidents like those at Spencer Park do not occur in other codes played in Australia. Soccer is being riddiculed as a result of this minority of "bad eggs," at Spencer Park.

THISTLE'S TURN TO 'SHOUT'

Go Soccer this week received a most comprehensive letter from Grange Thistle member and supporter Mrs. Carolyn Ribone folowing verbal slights against Thistle players and supporters, whom other clubs claim had refrained from socialising after some away matches this year. In her letter Mrs. Ribone raised some interesting points and suggestions on Brisbane Soccer. Below is a condensed version of the first half of the letter which discusses the Grange Thistle situation in particular. Next week Go Soccer will publish the second part of the letter which asks the question — "What happened to the fun in soccer?"

Will some reader enlighten me as to when it became a crime to be a soccer player who did not drink to any degree during the playing season?

I have been a staunch follower of Grange Thistle for some 13 years, and I have seen the club have good times (many) and bad times (just as many). However, I do not think I have been quite as disgusted as I have been this year by the unwarranted bad publicity the club's players have been given by some so called club reporters in Go Soccer.

It has usually been the practice of the Board of Directors at Grange Thistle not to be drawn into mud slinging, hence no comment has been made in the "Thistle Patch", but both supporters and players alike are justifiably fed up with always being the butt of the "let's smear 'em" bylines. To those on the "Grange Thistle No Drinkies" band wagon — aren't your

priorities just a little warped?
Correct me if I am wrong, but I've always thought that the basis of any spectator sport was that the PARTICIPANTS ENTERTAIN by their skills and ability, while the SPECTATORS go along to SUPPORT by watching the match in progress and by making use of the host club's facilities. In other words, "Sports" (for the want of a better word), you shouldn't be looking for "familiar" faces in your bar — instead, look for the more unfamiliar faces, from prior to your reserve grade through to after the main match, and you will probably be astonished just how much Grange Thistle followers have supported your club

We have read so much about Grange Thistle players, none which has been terribly complimentary, in past issues, that I think it is time that a little bugle blowing is done on their behalf.

At one stage it was not even certain whether we could field both a First Division Reserve side and a Third Division. It was decided to play our second team of youngsters in Third Division, in order to given them experience and a goal to work for. Those players put their heads down and did all that the Club asked them to do. Even with all the injuries that they have had (and these are many), these lads have, to date, never been lower on the table than second.

So that about our First Division Re-

serves? That team lost 9-1 in their first match, much to the joy of Annerley — but I am damn sure that they were not aware that 80% of those players played either junior football or commercial league in 1981. So they've lost more matches than the've won and they're down the bottom end of the table — but you can bet your bottom dollar that those lads have the respect of Grange Thistle supporters, because they get in there and TRY, and they don't WINGE about lousy fields and having to come up again most club's second string teams.

And don't forget about our First Division team. There are a number of reasons why they are not "sociable"

(a) Many of the players have seen up to three years in State League, playing many night and away games. This year, the players' families (and you would be surprised just how many of our First team have have young children under the age of five) are able to go along and support. It's great to see them all come along to games, whether it's at Grange Thistle or at Wynnum — but who would blame them for wanting to take those young families home as soon as possible after the game ended?

(b) As I said, I've seen the "good" times and the "bad" times — and things could not have been worse when they took the tumble back into Second Division, the first time ever. At that time, Grange Thistle players would probably have been, as a team, the best drinkers in the whole of Queensland. George Pagan stepped in, did a lot of weeding, and then set down a few rules and regulations. First to go was the drink, and that policy has been adhered to in the years since then — sure, there still may be some players who would like to turn one on, but they leave that to out of season times now. It was a hard lesson learned — but it certainly has reaped its rewards

You can be assured that, although we do not have a huge ethnic following, and our suporters are paltry compared to some other clubs, when we come to your clubs we really do support you.

THINGS ARE HAPPENING IN THE ROCKHAMPTON AREA

Capricornia have been one of the unluckiest sides in the State League this season and their position belies the teeam's ability. But the advances that have been made in the central Queensland city over the past three years have been part of a total program co-ordinated by regional director of coaching John Ward. This week John provides a short round-up of the Rockhampton scene:

State League offers youngsters a chance to be involved in a squad of up 20 players receiving a high standard of coaching and playing games at a level above local competition, which in Rockhampton, is very much played on a social basis.

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The State League fixtures are the "shop window" to show the rest of Queensland the potential that lies in country areas. It only needs to be given a chance to develop and any player with any dedication who works hard at his game can succeed.

In Rockhampton players who have come through to represent the state are Craig McLatchley, Brett Druery and Adrian Smith, with McLatchley going on to the Australian Institute of Sport and playing with the Australian Youth squad.

State League in Rockhampton attracts a large crowd on a Saturday evening and the fixtures have regular press coverage both before and after games. There is a three minute radio coverage each Saturday morning and results are broadcastetd also. We have T.V. coverage on some of the home games and frequently match previews are given on the local "Sports Action Show". With outlets like these to pursue it is a wonder that no major sponsors have yet been found, but it is not for the want of trying!

With State League now established and dedicated players being given the opportunity to progress in their chosen sport we now have to achieve a situation in local soccer for all players to reach the top.

With the introduction of small sided games for young players — Under 7's (six aside), Under 8's and 9's (eight aside) on small fields and played on a social basis (no competition) — we are now finding, after two years, that there are no star players developing, but, all players are developing on a par. Naturally some develop better than others, but, overall more are developing their basic skills.

These players play for fun, but the "competitive parent" will want to take his or her son up to win games and when

they go into Under 10's it is a transition period for these young players as offside is now introduced and competition points also.

Representative soccer starts at Under 11's for the Central Queensland champion-ships. At Under 12's if a team finishes first or second in the C.Q. championships it qualifies for the Gino Paris Carnival and from there onto the Under 13's C.Q. zone 3 team.

If some players do not make the C.Q. Squad they tend to drop out of soccer. This is the start of the "dangerous" years when all sports lose players to other distractions, but, in soccer in Brisbane, the players have various clubs at State League level plus two Philips League clubs to aim for. I feel that if the Gino Paris Carnival was put back to the Under 15 age group it may help to keep players in the game as a lot of importance is placed on that competition in the country areas, north of Gladstone.

However one or the other of the blasts had the effect on the Trident boys and they stormed to a devastating victory, completely dominating the struggling Reds in every facet of the game.

Len Pollock, twice, Frank Mengotti and Gerry Lindsay were the destroyers and Valleys finished the game looking the very competent outfit they undoubtably are.
