WHERE ARE ALL THE PEOPLE?

When was the last time you had to stand in a long queue outside a ground to get in and see a soccer game in Queensland? The world youth championships? The Manchester United tour? A Brisbane First Division final between Azzurri and Hellenic?

What ever match it was it certainly wasn't a State League or Philips League game over the past few years.

It seems the crowds at local matches have been constantly on the decline and although nearly everybody has a reason, no-one seems to have a universal solution.

Local club officials have tried various means of bringing the crowds back but none have seemed to work.

Guest players have attracted crowds initially but eventually the novelty wore off, Saturday night games proved far from acceptable and pre-match and halftime entertainment did little more than amuse those who were coming to the game anyway

The crowd at Lions' last home PSL game reached an all-time low, with the people on the terraces almost countable. And although in recent weeks Brisbane City have dragged in a few more, there are more empty spaces than filled seats in their magnificent grandstand.

Admittedly the results of the Brisbane teams have not been crowd-boosting this season but the fact remains that there is a huge majority of Queensland soccer followers who probably have never been to a PSL or State League game.

Why?

Is there too much soccer? Is there a general animosity against the clubs in the higher competitions which makes soccer followers not want to go along and support a local side?

Go Soccer is keen to hear from people as to why they won't go to a local PSL match or why they think others won't attend. Any interesting ideas will be passed on to local club and QSF officials and perhaps things can be changed to help bring the crowds back.

AND IT'S NOT JUST HERE . .

LONDON — English Football League attendances fell by almost two million last season (1981/82). The home gates of all 92 soccer clubs totallinfi 20,006,961 compared with 21,907,569 in 1980-81.

The biggest slump was in the First Division where crowds fell by 972,099 on the previous season, yet, it was not all gloom at the top.

Swansea City pushed their average Vetch Field (home ground), crowd up by 38 percent to total 382,745, and Notts County's return to the top bracket saw their home crowds rise by 21 percent to a total 244,178.

The Fourth Division showed an overall increase in attendances from 1,701,379 to 1,998,790.

Among the First Division clubs with falls in total home crowds were Arsenal (down 150,000), Liverpool (50,000), West Bromwich Albion (90,000) and Wolverhampton Wanderers (130,000).

FOUR IN FINAL YOUTH SQUAD

Queensland has four players in the final squad selected by Les Scheinflug to prepare for the world youth championship qualifying matches in Port Moresby in December.

They are original squad members Danny Wright, Steve Jackson and Frank Farina and Mount Gravatt midfielder Russell Stewart, who was a late inclusion.

Deleted from the squad was Bundaberg midfielder Andrew Chapman whose serious leg injury probably contributed more than anything to him not holding the place he deservedly won on his brilliant performances at the national under 19 championships.

Farina was not named in a squad of 18 last week to attend the next Youth training camp in Sydney from August 30 to September 3 but it was because he was excused with three other players to allow

him to tour with the Australian Institute of Sport side to New Zealand.

Scheinflug has growing fears that his youth players face a difficult period in mid-September when many will not be involved in any finals for play-offs and could lose their edge before the tour to Mexico for the Havelange tournament in November and the December qualifying matches.

Scheinflug is hoping a tour to Asia or somewhere in the Pacific can be arranged during the "blank" period.

BODEN IS INTERESTED IN A QUEENSLAND MOVE

Sydney City Socceroo Ken Boden has revealed that he is interested in playing in Brisbane next season.

In a recent interview with Go Soccer, Boden said although he had not received any offers from either of Brisbane's two Philips League clubs, he fancied the idea of moving to Queensland.

"Each time I have come to Brisbane I have liked it and I have always got on well with the players up there," Boden said.

"I know Brisbane City goalkeeper Tony Pezzano from Sydney City and Lions' Alan Niven from Australian team camps. I don't think I would have any trouble fitting in to the set-up at either City or Lions.—

"If an offer was made I would consider a move to Queensland," he said.

But Boden added that he understood several other clubs, particularly from Adelaide and another Sydney side were keen to sign him.

"It's not that I desperately want to leave Sydney city it is just that I want to play first team football. Here there are so many good players that it is just so hard to force your way back into the side."

Boden missed much of this season with a serious foot injury and only returned to the Slickers side about a month ago. His first full game was the Philips Cup second round match against Lions at Perry Park.

But since then he has found himself in and out of the Sydney City PSL side.

But even if another club weighs in with an offer, and to secure Boden a club would have to be talking in five-figure language, it is uncertain whether Slickers would release him.

Club president, Mr. Andrew Lederer, has

been quoted as saying Sydney City would not let Boden go at any price.

But the former English and Newcastle KB United star is one of 17 Sydney City players who are due to have their contracts renewed at the end of the season. And accordingly to club secretary Mike Urekelo the Slickers are set for a big cleanout.

There is talk that the Slickers want Lions fullback Alan Niven, so perhaps some kind of player swap with Boden could be on the cards.

Whether anything materialises or not remains to be seen. But one thing is certain, Boden would be a personality figure which has unfortunately been sadly lacking in Oueensland soccer for some time.

TAKE THE APATHY OUT OF JUNIOR SOCCER

An open letter from B.N.D.J.S.A. Secretary Carolyn Ribone.

Last weekend saw the end of fixture competition for teams registered with the Brisbane North and Districts Junior Soccer competition. The semi-finals, preliminary finals and grand finals follow over three weekends, and then, that sees the end of soccer for affiliated junior clubs for 1982.

1983 is the Centenary of soccer in Queensland. However, while it is admirable to look back on what has been, it is a necessity for one to look forward to the future as well. Our junior players are Queensland's future. It is important that we all realize this, and begin to give the area of junior soccer the importance that it requires.

By this, I mean the following -

(a) Take some time to secure as many qualified coaches as possible for your potential junior teams for next year in the off-season. Do this by advertisement certainly. However, more importantly, look into the depth of your club, and, where you feel you have potential coaches, arrange for them to attend a coaching course in the off-season. What is more, don't ask the intending coaches to foot the complete bill; make them aware you want their services for the following year by arranging to pay either the whole or a large percentage of the bill.

And remember, without encouragement young lads who might like to take on coaching a junior team will not come forward. Once again here is our future you must have coaches and they can only come from within. Handled the correct way they will return the faith you put in

For those clubs affiliated with Brisbane North, our Director of Junior Coaching, Mr. Tony Buesnel, is willing to take such course, as is the Queensland Soccer Coaches Federation. They are there, waiting to be of use to the code; it is up to you to contact them, make arrangements for such a coures, then set to and organise it.

(b) Once the soccer season finishes, that will be the last it sees of 30 to 40 percent of its junior players. Therefore, in the off-season, find out WHY?

(c) At the beginning of 1983, make a really concentrated effort to SELL SOC-CER—letter drops in your area, canvassing schools, displays in shopping centres in your area, write ups and advertisements in your local papers. With the number of

junior clubs that are around now, to keep up your membership, you have to get out into the area and go to the potential players, not wait for them to come to you.

(d) And most important of all — ENSURE THAT YOUR CLUB HAS A STABLE, FORWARD THINKING JU-NIOR COMMITTEE. Make sure that this committee is elected or appointed, as the case may be, PRIOR to the end of 1982.

I can remember not too many years ago when you used to get large numbers to Annual General Meetings, and there were always several nominations for positions: now, more often than not you scrape in with just enough for the quorum, and, once you accept a position one year, the only way you can get off is by not turning up at the A.G.M. the following year! This simply is not fair on your club and on soccer. A club that gets its act into gear with regard to the people who are going to administer for it is one which will go ahead — provided that that committee is prepared to work together for the good of its players and soccer in general, instead of indulging in petty side issues.

As secretary of Brisbane North, I am making this an "open" letter to all clubs, not only those affiliated with Brisbane

Our method of celebrating the Centenary of soccer in Queensland should be by showing that we are building on the future for the next 100 years. Therefore, please, forget about (not completely) your grounds and your clubhouse and so on for just one year — instead, give a really concentrated effort towards building up the numbers of your junior teams, towards providing them with qualified coaches so that they have "a chance in life" with regard to their soccer career, and towards making all clubs in Brisbane North active and productive.

In other words, our motto for 1983 should be to "TAKE THE APATHY OUT OF JUNIOR SOCCER". To do so, you must start working on this NOW, not on January 1st, hence the reason for my writing this at the end of 1982 season, and not at the beginning of 1983 season.

I wish you all the best for your Soccer Centenary — you are the future of soccer in Queensland, along with our junior players, even if, within 20 years, the game is played with a zip zap ball, computerized boots and electronic goals and side-lines!

Last week representatives from the media were invited to attend simultaneous press conferences in Sydney and Melbourne to, as the invitation said, "discuss the future of the Australian national soccer competition". There was much speculation that a big sponsorship announcement was to be made and the woes that had troubled the national competition this season would be over.

But, as they say in newspapers, the press conference turned out to be a "furphy" a nothing. All the press was told was that no sponsor had yet been secured but the League was looking - something everyone has known since the start of the season. But the PSL did announce that they had sought the help of marketing company Consolidated Royce. Below is the statement as released to the media last week.

The Australian national soccer competition has launched an agressive campaign to secure a new sponsor.

18th August, 1982

Chairman of the Philips Soccer League, Mr. Sam Papasavas, confirmed that Philips Industries were to cease their sponsorship after a six year association. Mr. Papasavas expressed the thanks of all Australian soccer players and administrators to Philips Industies for their outstanding contribution to soccer.

"We fully understand the company's decision to change its marketing directions and to plan different promotional priorities. We wish them every success for the future." he said.

Mr. Papasavas confirmed that the national soccer competition would continue in its present format but that urgent steps were being taken to secure a new major sponsor.

Together, the League and its newly appointed consultants have drawn up a detailed prospectus document outlining the commercial advantages and special privileges available to prospective sponsors.



The League is promising 34 continuous weeks of multi-media exposure to cover 2.5 million soccer followers across the nation and a host of related benefits. Media coverage alone has been calculated to provide sponsor exposure valued in excess of \$1 million annually.

In a bold new move, the League has decided to advertise publicly for a sponsor. Mr. Sam Papasavas said that the League was looking for two key attributes in the new sponsor — money and promotability.

"We are in the process of drawing up a dynamic marketing program for the League for the next few years, and we are anxious to find the right sort of sponsor who can be promoted with and grow with us," he said.

The League is looking for sponsor funding of at least \$375,000 a year for the next three to five years.

The League's total 1983 budget is just over \$800,000 which means a new sponsor would be asked to contribute roughly half



Mr. Papasavas said he believed the sponsorship offered by the League represented the best value promotional prospect available in the Australian sporting calendar.

"With the agressive marketing program we are preparing for the League, our new sponsor will be guaranteed unparallelled and ever-increasing corporate and product promotion in all major eastern Australian markets." he said.

Among the League's forward plans presently under consideration are: Increased League size, establishment of a second division, regional competition with promotion and relegation provisions, extension of the Under 19 Youth League to a national competition, and increased TV coverage through a major national network.

"We are very aware that sports sponsorship has to be a commercially viable proposition, especially in the present economic climate." Mr. Papasavas said. "The League's package and future directions have been carefully geared to provide real value for money for our new sponsor. We are committed to achieving a mutually successful business relationship."

NEWS FROM VALLEY TRIDENT SOCCER CLUB

The break from an intensive soccer programme last Sunday week seemed to do the Volley Trident State League team a power of good.

Watching them train last week they reminded me of the comment applied to ex-Leeds United star Norman Hunter — Norman bites yer legs.

18th August, 1982

A weekend without a game due to Ampol Cup and all the early season sharpness appeared to have returned. At the time of writing there were five games to go and however well the other contenders play, there's no doubt that the boys in blue will be well in contention at the finish.

Mickey Hayes is still unfortunately on the sidelines but all the other players suffering with lesser injuries seem to have shaken them off. Even Ian Rathmell's badly gashed toe has healed up remarkably. Our only other worry now is that someone could get severely bruised by the vigorous tackling during the training sessions.

Some sides start falling away at this stage of the season due to injuries, but thanks to the depth of talent at Valley Trident this does not look like happening to Mauro Saftich's team. While Martin Coe is undisputed "numero uno" between the sticks, Saftich has some interesting options at the back when he has to select from John Shepherd, Richard Shortman, Dave Melia, John Lavelle and Ian Rathmell.

Midfielders Dennis Lockhart, Gerry Lindsay and Tommy Pike have been very consistent, frequently brilliantly so, but they have had to be as Joey Bella and Ian Gentles have been pressing them with some outstanding displays for the reserves. Up front the combination of Frank Mengotti, Lennie Pollock and Phil Cruse has left no room for the mercurial talents of John Kennedy. But having a player such as John standing by for the run into the premiership and finals must surely bring out the best in the other three and give added confidence to coach Saftich.

Of all the teams the SEQL side could best have done without a break. After a run of seven games without loss they face two successive weekends without a match and must start working on building up that concentration and discipline which has been a feature of their game recently.

One of the games included in their recent run of successes was a 5-1 Qantas win over Brighton. Instead of the usual formation, due to ineligibility of State League players, a hybrid team of SEQL and Senior Colts took the field. It took them the first half to get used to each other but their second half performance impressed considerably as the scoreline indicated. Incidentally Ian Gentles, playing in the unaccustomed role of striker, scored four out of the five goals.

The Senior Colts received a depressing jolt to their premiership hopes when they lost 0-1 to Lions. This was their first defeat of the season and comes at a singularly inappropriate time with only three games left to play. All is not yet lost fellows though as your nearest rivals have a much tougher run-in to the tape than you.

The Fourth Division and Seventh Division sides both lost their matches on the weekend August 7 and 8. The Fourth Division went down rather dismally to Virginia 5-1 but the Seventh Division side lost by only a single goal.

Congratulations are due to Jan Winn for editing and producing the Valley Trident Newsletter. An excellent effort well appreciated by the news-hungry folk at the club. Among the many interesting forthcoming events at the Valley Trident Club, Jan asks us to make particular note of the two great Cabaret Nights due to be held on Friday August 20 and Friday September 24.
