COMMERCIAL BREAK

This Sunday promises to be a day of DIVISION ONE fine football in the Commercial League. That's the date for the semi-finals of the Commercial Knockout Cup.

At Lanham Park, First Division leaders Waterloo 1 take on Bardon Old Boys. Going on league results this season, the Baysiders look to have the inside running on this game. However, Bardon, beaten finalists last season, are renowned for keeping their best football for the Cup competition.

The other semi-final will take place at Wakerly Park, Runcorn. Waterloo II, currently third placed in First Division, take on Ajax, the powerful leaders of the Friday night competition. The Ajax forward line is spearheaded by Ian Davis, who has scored in all but four matches this season. Whatever the outcome, this should be an excellent game of football.

Four clubs are fighting out the Third Division crown. Any one of North Star, Westside Eagles, Lota and Eventide Old Boys (don't let the name fool you!), given the right run of luck, could take the title.

The Fourth Division title is already in the hands of Frigmobile, who've yet to drop a point this season. All that's left now is for the following two teams, Slacks Creek and Vultures (an apt name for the Tax Office team), to battle for the runners-up trophy.

The Friday night competition has become another two-horse race with Ajax and Easts having opened up 11 and 10 points leads over their nearest rivals. These two teams will clash on the final Friday night of the competition. The only definite result of that meeting that I can predict is 90 minutes of excellent soccer.

LET'S GIVE THEM A

In recent editions of Go Soccer local referees have come in for criticism from all quarters. In this letter to the editor Moggill's Bob Tollenaere offers the other side of the story.

Dear Sir.

25th August, 1982

There is a very obvious shortage of referees in both senior and junior football.

On looking in from the outside, I surely find this difficult to understand. As a player moves towards the end of his playing career, is it not reasonable that a natural transgression would be into the refereeing area? Firstly it would provide him with a continuing active element in the game he loves, and secondly it would enable him to maintain a high level of fitness.

Why then does this natural transgression not occur to the extent that one would expect?

Many of us 'knowledgeable' men in soccer have had occasion to referee a junior match. Seldom at the conclusion of that game can we claim to have satisfied all parties — players, coaches or spectators. Sometimes, in fact often, these players, coaches and spectators can be damned unreasonable, abusive and unfair during and even after the game. It is situations like this that can 'turn off' the potential new referee.

Back this up with a few very bad scenes (and associated bad press) such as that which occurred recently at the Brisbane City PSL game and I ask you who would want to be a soccer referee?

I would comment briefly on John Reid's recent article. In my opinion, he made some very valid points and some not as valid. I have this season witnessed some refereeing displays which could only be regarded as poor; yet in spite of this, "the man is in charge and has to be respected, without him there is no game."

I have two points to offer:

(i) I expect all referees are truly doing their best - and who can ask for more than that. I feel sure that they too hope to enjoy their game. How in the world can that be when they are regularly being unfairly (maybe sometimes fairly) criticised? It is interesting to note that there are many who support Col Amos' controversial decision at Spencer Park — just as an example.

(ii) Just as a player is "entitled" to the occasional bad game surely an otherwise capable referee is "entitled" to the odd bad game. I would further suggest that unless referee numbers increase in the senior ranks. the main sufferers will not be the PSL, State League or First Division sides but the lower division competitions.

I could be accused of being "naive" in suggesting that soccer people at all levels players, coaches, spectators and particularly administrators display a much greater level of tolerance towards referees, for the good of the game.

THE SOLOMON ISLANDS — A GREAT PLACE TO TOUR

Is your club considering an end of season trip? Former Valley Trident, Mareeba and Grange Thistle player Dave Watson is presently in the Solomon Islands and has written to the Queensland Soccer Federation looking for interested touring teams.

One State League club is presently examining the possibility of touring the Solomon Islands but as Dave's letter points out, any teams would be welcome. Below is Dave's letter:

Dear Sir,

25th August, 1982

I have been asked by the Solomon Islands Football Association to arrange some tours by Australian soccer teams.

I have previously arranged tours of the Solomon by Grange Thistle and Mareeba United when I played for these two clubs in the State League. Both these tours were very successful. However, since then the Solomons has developed an excellent sports stadium with floodlights.

This will mean the SIFA can offer a percentage of the gates as an incentive for teams to tour. For previous tours the crowds were in excess of 4000 per game with spectators paying \$1 admission.

The SIFA have indicated they would go 50-50 on gate money provided touring teams met airfares to the Solomons and accommodation while they were there.

A very reasonable package tour consisting of fares and accommodation can be arranged through Air Pacific in Brisbane. This package includes staying at the top international beachfront hotel in Honiara and Brisbane - Honiara - Brisbane airfares. Any touring team will find there will be several functions to attend while meals that need to be purchased are reasonably priced.

The teams that tour here would probably have to play the Solomon Islands national team, the national Youth team and a top club side. Incidently when Thistle toured in 1979 they lost two games out of three while in 1980 Mareeba drew two, lost one and won one game.

Therefore we are looking at Philips or State League level teams. However, teams of lesser ability and even social or veterans teams could contact me, though terms

offered wouldn't be so good.

The Solomons is a very unusual, unspoilt group of Pacific Islands. Virtually the last discovered tropical paradise in the world. The government is anti-tourist however, everyone here is a soccer fanatic. Soccer is the national game and people here want to see good overseas teams. Our season here is June to November. Ideally a good time to tour is September, October, November or early December. Even so tours can be made anytime.

Their striker Bill Gillespie was particularly outstanding with intelligent running and dominance in the air. Valley Trident midfielder Denis Lockhart was assigned to mark the tricky Ken Swan but the former Thistle youngster ended the day ahead.

The first half was goalless but in the second half John Shepherd, playing in midfield, drifted unmarked down the right to receive a glorious ball from John Lavelle and scored. Lavelle then went off with a muscle injury and Shepherd, who had been going well in the middle of the park went back into the defence.

Capricornia came back strongly and Martin Coe made two good saves before Brad Smith equalised with a near post header off a corner. From then on Capricornia looked very smart and it was only great positional sense from Coe and good work from Dave Melia which saved a point for the Blues.

The Valley Trident Senior Colts have finished their fixture program for the year after drawing 1-1 with Thistle in their last game. Despite only losing one game through the season they unfortunately didn't secure the title which looked theirs.

But Ross Bella's boys are eagerly looking forward to the finals where they are confident they will make amends.

With the Colts not playing we were able to call on some of them to fill places left in the SEQL side by injuries to Joey Bella. Phil Cruse, and the promotion to the First team last week of John Kennedy and Ian Gentles.

Shane Rideout, Tony Iovenetti, Gino Spitaleri and Carl Miscemacci were called on to help the team regain its rhythm against Olympic. It had been two weeks since the SEQL had played their last game which made it a tough match for everyone concerned not only the Colts.

A LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir.

25th August, 1982

In recent weeks Col Amos has been in the limelight through the Brisbane City incident. Brisbane City is desperately fighting relegation so their attitude towards Mr. Amos may have been adverse.

But the recent game I witnessed between Sunnyside United and Eastern Suburbs left me supporting their claims. It appears the disallowing of a goal because it was said not to have crossed the line is rapidly becoming part of Mr. Amos' act.

I thought the goal was chested down by a defender inside the net and kicked

out.

But this letter is not merely to dispute this one particular incident but also to bring to the attention of the spectators of soccer and all people concerned about the welfare of the game, the inconsistency of this man's refereeing and the damage he is doing to the game.

The following are incidents which occurred during the game for which either the dreaded yellow or red cards were

issued.

The first of the ridiculous incidents occured when a striker shot for goals. Mr. Amos has apparently found a new way of shooting for goals because the player was booked for a dangerous swing of the legs. There was not another player involved in this incident but Mr. Amos was obviously offended by the players style.

The second was a sending off when a player attempted to punch another player. This is the correct punishment, especially when the other player is on the ground and insists that the punch connected. But Mr. Amos did not see fit to penalise the opposing team when a player came running and throwing punches in retaliation. Not even a yellow card for the other player. Really, you must be consistent, Mr.

The third incident occured during a dangerous tackle from an opposing player which would have warranted a caution by any other referee. When questioned by the Sunnyside player, without using obscene language I might add, as to why no action had been taken, Mr. Amos proceeded to produce the yellow card for the Sunnyside player. Can't complain I guess, Sunnyside still got the free kick.

There were three other bookings for Sunnyside during the game but even the worst referee can't be wrong all the time.

Finally the only comment I can make is —better refereeing produces better soccer.

THE EYE ON IPSWICH

Sunday, September 5 could well go down as one of the most memorable days in the history of Ipswich soccer. That is the day when Ipswich United and Townsville Kern United clash in the final of the 1982 Ampol Cup.

The whole of Ipswich has been buzzing in anticipation ever since the Oueensland Soccer Federation management committee allocated the venue of the Cup final to

And United officials are confident their side can add to what will be a great afternoon by winning the coveted Cup which has narrowly eluded them in recent years.

Ipswich United coach Matt Carson, largely responsible for the revival this year, is as keen as anyone about the home Cup final and won't hear of any talk other than that of an Ipswich win.

"Things are happening at Ipswich, the whole town is behind us," Carson said this week.

"There is a great feeling at the club, not only among the players but also among the officials and supporters. People are smiling again.


The supporters are coming back too. They're coming out of the woodwork from everywhere. We will have a huge crowd on Cup final day and that will certainly boost the boys.'

But Carson's optimism is not limited to the Cup final. He has set his team a target of no less than winning every match from now to the end of the season.

"Winning the Cup is our immediate target but taking the treble — the Cup, the premiership and the grand final — is our aim," Carson said.

And with enthusiasm like that — they could well do it.

If Inswich United are awarded a penalty during the Ampol Cup final there will be no hasty decisions as to who will be given the responsibility of taking the important kick.

One man will immediately walk up to the spot and if his past record is any indication, he is quite likely to score.

That player is defender Kevin Caldwell, who is having a fine season in his return to Ipswich.

Kevin has taken all Ipswich United's penalties this season and so far has a 100 percent record. The former Coalstars and Brisbane City PSL player has been taking penalties for as long as he can remember and treats them just like a normal outfield freekick.

He just steps up and blasts the ball into the net.

"It's just a matter of knowing within yourself that you're only 12 yards out and it's easy to put the ball in the goal from there. A lot of players psych themselves into missing. If you hit the ball properly and the keeper doesn't move then it takes a freak save to prevent a goal," Kevin said.

It's as easy as that!





Before the goal Brisbane had had the better of exchanges but their old failing of not being able to convert chances into goals again let them down.


In the first half Joe Cairney hit a shot
