

Like a tireless campaigner, Queensland soccer this weekend pulls on its boots for yet another season — its 100th in fact — but this time there is something different Queensland soccer is alive and kicking.



CENTENARY

. The code has reached a significant landmark but unlike previous years when it raced into the season with limited preparation and the same match plan, the head has finally caught the legs. As Queensland soccer begins the 1983 season it is more like a cagey veteran and finally thinking about the game around it.

Late last year through the restructuring committee Queensland soccer began to take a long hard look at itself. It found an ageing athlete sadly out of condition. It had spread out in areas in where it should have been trim while other parts had become slow and worn out from continual use.

But like an unrelenting coach the restructuring committee - Ald. Ian Brusasco, Cliff McClurg, Allan White and Stan Jackson — assessed the situation and began to get the athlete back into shape. In the early days it hurt a few parts, and the programme is far from over, but one thing is for certain — "the athlete" is much better prepared to tackle the season than any in the past 20 years.

But what does it really mean for everyone concerned? Go Soccer this week put several questions to QSF president and restructuring committee chairman Ald.

Brusasco.

Why was restructuring necessary?

Every section of soccer had been growing and expanding without really looking at itself. I think to go forward, every now and again you have to go back and look what you have done. We weren't doing this and that is what restructuring is about. It should have been done five to ten years ago. What we have had in recent seasons is a situation where clubs were trying to reach goals in the fastest way possible. The race to beat another club to a specific target became more important than reaching the target itself.



How will it benefit the clubs?

Once they got caught up in the socalled race I think there were a lot of clubs forced to compete to pay players when they really didn't want to. With only two semi professional divisions there won't be such a broad cross section of clubs which will have to find the money to keep their players. But don't get the amateur divisions wrong. They will not be sub-standard competitions. They will be divisions in which good football will be played but clubs will not

have the obligations of paying players. They will now be able to use their money for coaching and improving

How will restructuring benefit the players?

Carrying on from the previous question it is quite obvious. If clubs have more money to spend on coaches and facilities then things can only improve for the players. Once the amateur and semiprofessional divisions are set up there will be a moratorium. Players will have time either to switch to a semi-professional club or stay amateur. But I believe most Australian players play for fun rather than the money anyway.

What were you looking for when you interviewed the clubs?

To be honest we expected more of the clubs than they expected of themselves. In the end we had to lower our expectations a bit. Of course we had standards we wanted our top clubs to achieve and a list of criteria will be set down which they must meet by the start of next year. There is already a list for the Premier clubs this season. We were also looking for clubs wanting to combine - and by that I don't mean amalgamation. Amalgamation seldom works as soccer clubs are generally formed for a reason, either



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culturally or ethnically. It is not possible to amalgamate on regional grounds because the basic division will still be there. What we were looking for were clubs that could work together in the same areas and since the interviews some clubs have already begun to do this. In effect we were looking for clubs which wanted to reach the targets I talked about earlier but were concerned about the way they got there.



We discovered that there are a lot of very good administrators involved with clubs that we had never seen before. Skilled people who we had seldom seen at council meetings. It was with these people that I saw the future of soccer. We must start grooming people for every position within the federation, even including the next president. Under restructuring I want as many people as



possible to share the load. People working in areas in which they are specialised. Through the interviews we found some of the people we were after already there. It also was pleasing that in the end most clubs agreed to the committee's recommendations. They agreed restructuring was vital and necessary and, in fact, many clubs wanted guidance.

What has disappointed you most about restructuring?

The thing that hurt the most was stopping the State League but I firmly believe we made the decision before it was made for us — and in the long run that will be important. But the Ampol Cup will now fill the space left by the





State League and eventually its structure will be such that our country affiliates will be involved with the Brisbane teams. It was disappointing that some clubs weren't more ambitious. They had the potential but not the desire. And unfortunately some clubs could not realise that restructuring was for their benefit and they thought it was some kind of management committee scheme.

In retrospect, did the restructuring committee go about things the right way, or if the chance arose again, would you do anything differently?

I am pleased with what we have done so far but the task did prove bigger than what we expected. I would have liked things to have happened a lot quicker but at the same time I would have liked to have had more time to examine the alternatives. But there is no going back now. We have made the break and I am sure the right decisions. The divisions have been set up and now we will begin the restructuring of the administration. We have the potential. Soccer is the major sport in nearly every other major and developing country. The rest of the world is not so wrong, it is Australia that is out of step. We have the most marketable product of all of footballs in Australia and I am confident sooner or later there will be a catalyst that will bring our potential to the fore. Restructuring will ensure we are not only ready, but may even help bring it

EDITORIAL

The current success of young Queenslanders in the Australian Youth team augurs well for the future of soccer in the state.

Frank Farina, Russell Stewart and Danny Wright fully deserve the accolades they have received over the past three months. And other young Queenslanders like Stephen Glockner and Rich Bassingwaigthe are pushing for late inclusion in the squad for Mexico.

But for soccer to advance in this state we must keep the talented youngsters here in Queensland, not only to boost the code, but to provide a successful example for which other youngsters can aim

But already this season we have seen two brilliant North Queenslanders in Farina and under 16 starlet Manis Lomond go to a southern club, National League side Canberra Arrows.

Admittedly Queensland's two NSL clubs chased Farina doggedly and the circumstances did not suit for him to play with a Brisbane side. But Lomond slipped away right under the nose of almost every Queensland club.

And there are others the same age and younger, equally as talented, just waiting for an opportunity.

The two NSL clubs are now beginning to realise the importance of grooming youth but is should go further than just Brisbane City and Lions.

Now following the re-structuring of the Queensland Soccer Federation, the other 10 Premier League clubs must start promoting themselves as the best clubs in Queensland.

Any young player with potential must be lured to a Premier League club. If the youngsters are allowed to drift interstate, or worse even out of the game, and do not start appearing in the Premier League, then the competition will lapse into one where the same old stalwarts turn out season after season.

And if that occurs, Queensland soccer would have taken a disastrous five-year step backwards for the Premier League would be nothing more than the old Brisbane First Division — but with a new name.

Club officials are clutching at straws calling for 'sin-bins' and changes to the rules to avoid send-offs in pre-season competitions.

Players know the rules and should abide by them.

But to be fair to all concerned, perhaps it is time for the whole red and yellow card system to be re-appraised. Maybe a system of reports where the offence is examined after the game could be used for minor offences, like swearing.

It might avoid some rash, heat of the moment decisions.

Points to ponder

It was a very red-faced Allan Kibbler during the opening NSL fixture between Sydney City and Lions. Lions keeper Nigel Lownds was injured and Kibbler whistled on the trainer, who by this time had already run around to behind the goal in anticipation.

Kibbler became quite perturbed as he looked towards the Lions bench but could see no movement. Quite a bit of arm waving and whistle blowing transpired before the very embarressed referee realized that the trainer in fact was only a metre behind him and already treating Lownds.

One rumour currently doing the rounds tells of an all-in brawl during training at one Premier League club. If the story is

true it would be a sad state of affairs for a club with such a proud history and a team which offered so much when it came back into top competition only a few years ago.

Australian captain John Kosmina did not win too many fans with his loud on-field language up at Richlands recently. And he wasn't too selective with words in the dressing room later when asked by one media representative what he thought of Lions youngster, Allan Hunter — his marker that day.

"Bloody hopeless", the Socceroo replied. Despite being only 18, Hunter gave one of the best all-round performances of the match — and maybe that was a little hard for Kosmina to accept.

BARRY VERSUS BILLY

One of the most talked about pre-season player transfers was the switching of Clubs by Barry Kelso and Billy Williamson — Kelso went to Lions while Williamson crossed the river to City.

At this stage both players are only on loan with their respective new clubs until June, when the situation will be re-assessed — particularly in the light of Williamson's visa which expires midyear.

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But it is generally accepted that if the Scotsman gains permanent residency, as he wishes, a proper transfer will go ahead.

But which club will be benefitting most from the deal? Go Soccer used the recent NSL Cup clash and the XXXX final between City and Lions to put the Formscope on Kelso and Williamson.

And the Formscope preduced some surprising figures.

On paper it appears Kelso, the big lanky forward, has been harder-working and more effective than midfielder-striker Williamson. And that is even more surprising considering Kelso's team Lions was on the end of a sound beating in both matches.

But the big man's overall workrate, dominance in the air and a successful pass ratio of nearly 4 out of evey five was far superior to Williamson's figures.

But in front of goal, Williamson shot with much more purpose and accuracy, although Kelso emerged with one more goal from the two games.

Williamson's reluctance to tackle and weakness in the air were highlighted vividly while Kelso tended to give away far too much possession, many times through lack of control.

Breaking down the figures even furthr it was evident neither player was fully

fit and drifted out of the game — Kelso usually in the second half and Williamson when City were struggling.

In conclusion, on the two matches surveyed, Kelso would have to be rated as the better buy although Lions appear to be wasting their advantage by not capitalising on the big man's skills—particularly his dominance in the air.

City at this stage appear to be carrying Williamson for sections of the match and relying on him to periodically come back into the game and with his silky skills initiate a potentially dangerous situation.

KOP THIS! IT'S AN EXAMPLE

As an ardent life-long Everton fan it must be hard for Acacia Ridge coach Bob Butchard to admit he uses the mighty Liverpool team as an example for his side to follow.

"I suppose if it means success for Acacia Ridge then it is a sacrifice I have to make. But don't tell any of my friends back on the Mersey side," Bob jokes.

But on a more serious note, the entertaining style Bob has encouraged since taking over at Acacia Ridge midway through last season has made the Premier League side one of the most attractive to watch in Brisbane.

"You can't help but admire Liverpool and in our own way we try a lot of things that they do. While everyone likes to win we have a responsibility to the

supporters and playing good football should be our priority," he said.

Bob Butchard was born in Liverpool 43 years ago and played in the city as an amateur. He came to Australia in 1965 and had his first association with Acacia Ridge in 1969. After two seasons with The Ridge he moved on to help set up a Church League in Inala. He has also been involved with Inala Rangers, Lions, Inala City and Salisbury.

Bob's aim for The Ridge this season is to not only get them into the top four but advance their style further.

"I would like us to play a bit more shorter than what we have been. Sharp, short passes is what I am after," he said.

Bob who has had his senior coaching badge since 1978 said he was hoping for a big year from all his players but cited Nev Cruickshank, Bob Farrow, Gerry Kay and the Gerritsen brothers Mick and Peter as ones to watch.

Bob admits The Ridge has a point to prove after missing out on the First Division semi-finals last season on a registration mix-up. And he believes the whole incident brought the club's two top teams even closer together.

"It could have been shattering but the players adopted a let's go and show them attitude. It was pleasing to see and certainly was one of the reasons why I came back this year.

"The other is that now I am back at The Ridge — I'm home to stay," Bob said.

NO CAPTAIN CRUICKSHANK HERE!

"Acacia Ridge is the type of team that doesn't really need a captain" — that's the opinion of the club's on-field leader, Nev Cruickshank.

"We play together as a team with no real stars. We don't really need someone out there to order the others around. We know what each other's job is and whether or not we are doing it."

"I suppose they pick me as captain to win the toss," Nev said.

The lanky midfielder or striker has been with The Ridge for six years, the past four as captain. He previously played for 12 years at St. Helens and two years with Dinmore Bushrats.

He is eagerly looking forward to the first season of the Premier League and is confident of his side's chances.

"I thought we had achieved everything we could about two years ago. Everything since has been a real bonus," Nev said.

And a bonus it has been. Last year the side was one of the top outfits in the First Division and had that great run in the Ampol cup before losing on penalties to eventual winners Townsville.

Nev rates that loss as even a bigger blow than when the team had most of its premiersip points deducted last sea-

The great Bob Paisley has announced that this is his last season in charge of that mighty Liverpool machine.

While many sections of the media believe that current Swansea manager and former Liverpool player John Toshack will get what must be football's most coveted job, I believe the position will go to Ronnie Moran. Ronnie has served his time as coach and has been one of the backroom boys instrumental in Liverpool's domination in recent years.

FC Barcelona, now managed by the great Luis Cesar Menotti are said to have their sights on Jim Patikas, star of Sydney Olympic and the Australian Youth team. According to the report, Dalglish demanded an understanding from the photographer that it wouldn't be used for commercial purposes — and that the negatives would be returned to him.

The report also said Dalglish asked for a fee for an interview after being presented with an award as last year's Shoot magazine Player of the Year.


Ipswich United and Valley Trident fought out an exciting 3-3 draw in the opening match of group D - a group which was to become the closest fought of the competition.
