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INSURANCE: IS THE HEADACHE WORTH IT?

Queensland soccer's compulsory insurance scheme, aimed to ease the social and economic stress after the event, has turned into a four-figure financial headache for many clubs even before the season has started.

The \$1,000 per team premium, a 100 percent increase in many cases, came as a bitter pill for the clubs to swallow and many, particularly those in the lower divisions, are still reeling from the effects

It was a slug most club officials were not expecting and now they will be battling the whole season to keep their heads above water.

But do the costs justify the benefits? Obviously the answer to that question is a personal one as that is the nature of insurance. Some are willing to run the risk and gambe against it "not happening to me". Some are lucky, others are not.

But what were the reasons behind the premium hike and how does Queensland soccer compare with other states

It doesn't take many enquiries to learn that in fact the Queensland Soccer Federation is one of the few sporting organisations in Queensand that has a compulsory comprehensive insurance scheme and the only eastern seaboard soccer federation that constitutionally binds the clubs to participation.

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Death or disablement cover generally is compulsory among those organisations that impliment some kind of insurance scheme. But the loss of wage and medical expenses cover, compulsory in the QSF, are in most cases only optional.

A spokeswoman for the Victorian Soccer Federation said it was the VSF's policy to leave insurance up to the clubs

"Player insurance is not compulsory but recommended. With respect to contract players it is the VSF's attitude that the clubs employ the players so insurance is the employer's responsibility," the spokeswoman said.

But she added many contract players had compulsory insurance clauses in their contracts.

In relation to lower division amatuer players, the spokeswoman said it was her understanding that insurance was up to the individual or his club.

But she conceded — "most lower division players are not insured."

Mr. Aulden Brown, secretary of the NSW Soccer Federation, said the only compulsory insurance in that state was a government-run scheme.

For \$2 per player per year sportsmen are given a limited death or disabler cover. An optional medical and los wage cover is offered but taken up by only a few clubs.

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Clubs with professional players in NSW must insure them to the level of the state's workers' compensation.

Australian Soccer Federation secretary, Mr. Brian Emery, said the ASF recommended comprehensive insurance cover and thought highly of Queensland's attitude.

"It is ASF policy to insure all national teams. All National League players must be insured comprehensively in addition to being in a medical fund. But as far as lower division players are concerned that is a matter solely for the state federations to work out." Mr. Emery said.

So basically the QSF is out on its own, but the cover given generally has been quite adequate.

For example last year clubs had to insure teams for a minimum of \$500. They were given three areas of insurance—death and disablement, loss of warm and medical.

Premiums varied from \$100 to \$600 m some cases for each area but most clubs got away with reaching the minimum by taking only two of the three catagories—generally death and disablement and one of the other two.

The most complaints last year came from players who thought they were covered medically but found their club had gone for the other two.

To overcome that problem the QSF late last year sought quotes on a package encompassing all three areas. The quotes varied substantially. To go with the same company last year, under a relatively similar policy would have meant premium hikes of up to 150 percent.

Under the policy now adopted, clubs have obtained for their outlay of \$1000

team an increased death and disablement payment, double the time period for loss of wage but a reduction

in the percentage of medical costs reimbursement.

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According to QSF secretary Alan Vessey obtaining quotes is not difficult and each year the QSF office receives at least half a dozen proposals from various companies.

"You can always get a cheaper premium but insurance has to be examined very carefully and you usually find with the cheaper schemes the cover is far less than what Queensland players have

been accustomed to." Vessey said.

Actually Queensland soccer's compulsory insurance goes back to the annual

general meeting of 1977.

"The idea behind compulsory insurance is that it relieves the clubs of moral and subsequent financial obligations in the event of a player being injured and having to meet medical costs and possibly losing wages or employment," Vessey said.

Prior to 1977 there had been at one rage a special QSF insurance fund;

instigated and managed by the federation but not only was it nearly bled dry but it may have been contrary to the Insurance Act.

The idea of a uniform policy was put to the clubs but it was stressed that to obtain the best premium, maximum participation was needed, so the scheme became compulsory.

It has continued ever since and only time will tell whether this new policy adopted will satisfy most claims.

But as some clubs struggle to find their premium payments, and many found it difficult to meet the February 28 50 percent deadline, they should realise what the alternatives and risks would be without a compulsory scheme.

There are a lot of men, women and children actively involved in soccer in Queensland each winter weekend and statistically sonner or later one of those people will be involved in a serious insurance-related incident.

It's always easy to be wise after the event so maybe those headaches some clubs have now in meeting their premiums are small compared with what they might have if there was no insurance.

EDITORIAL

Queensland referees seem to be applying a double standard when it comes to dealing with interstate players and those with the two local National League clubs.

And an incident last week proved to only strengthen that belief

Brisbane Lions defender John Sime was sent from the field in the XXXX pre-season tournament final for allegedly swearing. The verbal attack was not heard by the referee and the player was sent from the field on the advice of a linesman.

Fair enough, swearing is against the rules. Players who break the rules should be dealt with.

But why then did the officials concerned recommend a harsher suspension than the mandatory one match? (As it turned out Sime was suspended for two matches on a technical point rather than on the recommendation).

But it seems very inconsistent when only three days earlier the same two officials chose to ignore totally the very loud abusive language of one very prominent Sydney player. One one occasion the player concerned stood on the penalty spot and yelled abuse to the linesman.

Everyone in the stadium heard the language but there was not a suggestion of a yellow card, let alone a recommendation for a harsher suspension.

What is the difference? Are Brisbane referees scared to send off southern players for fear of losing their position on the national panel?

Or is there some local, but unpublicised direction, which prompts ther submit recommendations on local soffs?

Losing a player is not easy for any team and proved particularly disastrous for Lions. It is not good for Queensland soccer as a whole to have a team on the bottom of the national competition and we should not be making it harder for them to get out of trouble.

Abuse of officials should not be tolerated and players should realise they face being sent-off. But the practise of recommending more than one week for the offence must be reviewed.

We are playing football, not netball. Its about time we got on with the game — on both sides of the whistle.



One southern National League must be expecting the worst. The Greekbacked club has a contingency plan already formulated for them to quickly pull out of the national competition in June or July if their crowds do not improve. But a recent high scoring home result may have kept the plan under wraps for just a little longer.

Strange and sudden goings on behing the scenes of one Premier League club have led to the rise of all sorts of rumours. Perhaps it is about time the club made an official statement rather than letting the rumours persist.

Victorian officials must have been pleased with the performance of their team in the recent centenary clash against Queensland — the players were paid \$20 each extra for winning 2-0.

That still falls short of what the QSF lost on the game but indications are there will be another next year. 1984 is the centenary of Victorian Soccer an would not surprise if Queensland was invited to play in Melbourne.

If the match goes ahead it will be interesting to see when someone else, other than Queensland, organises an interstate game, if any matches are put on in competition. If there are, and its very unikely, you can bet your season ticket it won't be an international.

The five-goal defeat Lions players suffered at the hands of Canberra recently turned into a double disaster for some of the Brisbane players. They returned to the dressing rooms after the match to find money gone from some of their clothing hung around the walls. Surely at NSL level club officials maintain a reasonable amount of security.

BOHAN: - UNLUCKY OR UNLIKED?

Brisbane City midfielder Bevan Bohan must be beginning to question the wisdom of his move to the club from Mount Gravatt early last year.

Despite his tireless efforts on the park, Bohan still does not command the respect of the City supporters and his slightest of mistakes still attract "go back to Mount Gravatt" calls.

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Then last week he was given the ultimate in rebuttals when state coach Bruce Stowell, in a pro-Brisbane City swing, selected the entire Gladiators National League squad — with the exception of Bohan.

Is it because he is an inferior player his team-mates or is it because his low profile get-on-with-the-game approach keeps him out of the limelight?

The answer has to be the latter because Bohan is a good player and anyone who does not recognise that is not watching him closely enough on the field. Without a doubt he is one of the hardest working midfielders in Queensland. His style is unorthodox but effective.

And the statistics prove it. In Brisbane City's recent home National League match against Adelaide City, Bohan had by far the highest workrate of any midfielder on the park. Yet it was his captain Frank Pimblett who was given the accolades after the match.

Sure, Pimblett made some nice passes, great crossfield switches and was cheered on by the City fans. They even once totally ignored when Pimblett kicked the ball straight out of play.

But on the other hand Bohan at best only earned a slight handclapping from a few for his touches of skill and was booed when he lost the ball. Obviously hose spectators, and possibly Stowell, d not see the 16 successful passes Bohan made through the game. And perhaps they missed the 14 good challenges.

Maybe they didn't notice that through the whole game he was dispossessed only once but beat a man five times, won the ball cleanly in the air four times and despite playing much deeper than say Williamson, still managed to get in two shots.

Bohan will not be drawn into any comment on his treatment by the City fans and says "I don't notice what they say, I just get on with the game and try to do everything I can."

But he surely must be a little disappointed because effort-wise he has given his all.

ROBINS: IT'S COMMITMENT

Former Queensland and Mount Gravatt coach Fred Robins admires Bevan Bohan's ability despite originally thinking he was not good enough to make the top grade.

"When I first saw him play at Merton East I didn't rate him highly and it wasn't until he was in my team and I watched him train that I realised what an asset he can be," Robins said.

"He is one of total commitment. There are no half measures. He hates to be beaten and if he is, he has the workrate and determination to get the ball back."

But Robins added he was "surprised but not surprised" that Bohan missed on the state squad.

"I suppose it was either Bohan or Hamilton. That's the way it was for the last state squad, Bevan was in originally when it was thought Bobby had gone back to Scotland. But when he returned and Bevan was still on holidays, Bobby came back in," he said.

CAN GLOCKNER MAKE IT?

The Australian Youth team is currently enjoying some of the most favourable publicity ever given to a national soccer side and three Queenslanders are sharing some of that limelight.

Frank Farina, Russell Stewart and Danny Wright have been in the Youth Squad which has swept all before them to qualify for the finals of the world youth championship in Mexico in June.

But as the youngsters go into their final preparations, calls have come from all parts of the country for late inclusions in the squad. In some cases these calls could be quite justified as it is now nearly six months since national coach Les Schienflug settled on his squad.

Australia is such a big country that it is quite possible some talented young-sters slipped through the net which was dragged across in search of good young talent.

One of those players is Brisbane City youngster Stephen Glockner, who twice through circumstances beyond his control, missed playing in front of Schienflug. Now he is making a last minute desperate attempt to get the form on the board in the National League and be among the final 18 who will go to Mexico.

But what are Glockner's chances? Is he Youth team material?

Go Soccer recently put the Formscope on Glockner and Lions' Youth teeam member Danny Wright. The Formscope was used not to discredit Wright in any way, for he is in the team, but to establish a yardstick by which Glockner's chances could be measured.

As it turned out when the Formscope was put on the pair — in the NSL Cup first round match — Wright played in the midfield rather than up front like Glockner. In examining the statistics it also must be remembered Wright was in a losing team while Glockner was given the service of a dominant midfield.

But some very pleasing statistics did emerge for the hopeful Brisbane City youngster. He made exactly double the

Realistically there is only one place open in the Youth team forward line—and that is Rodney Brown's position. Farina and David Low are certainties for the other two. Brown provides the height and aggression in the team's forward line—something Glockner no doubt from the Formscope could equally contribute.....

But time is running out. The next Youth team camp is in a week then the final squad will be named in Ma. Glockner must start scoring goals now and draw Schienflug's attention.

But whether he makes it or not the Formscope statistics below definitely indicate he is a player with potential.



A video company has offered \$13.4 million for the exclusive rights to screen English matches over the next two seasons.

The money has been put up by Telejector, a video entertainment company, who are prepared to pay almost twice as much as the TV organisations.

Telejector's plan is to show recordings of matches on big screens in pubs, clubs, hospitals and schools.

The huge financial bait is sure to tempt league chairmen, who last month rejected TV's latest offer of \$4.4 million a year for one live match a week.

Recordings of matches would be distributed to customers and shown two or three days after the matches had been played.

Chelsea have offered Swansea City \$150,000 for English international centre-forward Bob Latchford. But it is understood the talented striker, who had a successful spell with Brisbane Lions two years ago, is keen to return to Australia and establish a travel agency. No doubt Lions officials will recall the inspired performance of their team under Latchford's influence.
