The New 'Controlled' Brazil

Carlos Alberto Parreira, the new coach of Brazil's national soccer team, has promised a "gradual renovation" but no major changes for the 1986 World Cup.

Parreira also indicated he will maintain the attacking style of play introduced by ex-coach Tele Santana — even though it was widely blamed for Brazil's elimination from the 1982 World Cup in Spain.

"I don't believe in radical changes. My work begins with the (team's) base already formed," Parreira said after he was named to a one-year term as coach.

He added: "Santana left us many good things, which we will use."

Parreira, 40, took command of the national team with the memory of Brazil's 3-2 World Cup loss to Italy still fresh in fans' minds. The stunning upset eliminated Brazil, and Italy went on to win the championship.

Many blamed the loss on Santana's offensive philosophy, which stressed improvisation and attack over defence. The consensus was that Brazil's so-called "art soccer" proved their downfall.

Parreira wants to change that image. His ideal team, he says, will combine "art soccer" with hard work and aggressiveness.

"My players will have complete freedom to create," the coach said. "But there's no room for specialists. The player who shows he's not willing to run all the time, to defend and support and attack with the same dedication, will not stay on the team."

Parreira said he would stress physical conditioning and better tactical organisation on the field "to be able to take on the Europeans."

"The Brazilian player must learn to participate more in the play, to follow tactics, without worrying about showing off when he gets the ball," he said.

Parreira declined to say if he already had chosen players for the team. But he cited Zico as a model of his ideal player.

"Zico right now is an example of participation-soccer I want. He's playing with tenacity, dedication and great style. Whether he will be at the 1986 World Cup only time will tell. But right now he's in great form."

Looking ahead, the Coach said West Germany would be Brazil's toughest adversary.

"They have the best style of play in Europe: firm on defence and quick on the counterattacks," he said.

On reigning world champion Italy, Parreira commented: "They are tough on defence and don't let the other team play freely."

The English, he said: "Have little skill but good speed and strength."

But he added, "none of them should worry us. We have more ability, and with a little more participation on defence and the attack, no one will beat us."

NICKNAMES BOOST SOCCEROOS MORALE

Fingerbone, Porkchop, Hands off and Hamburglar don't sound like the names of world beating soccer players but when you are on tour with the Australian 19th Team you know they are key players in the Young Socceroos side.

Nicknames are a fact of life in Australian sporting teams and the young Socceroos are not exception. Almost every player has a nickname and those that didn't prior to this trip for the World Youth Championships have been given one. The stories behind the nicknames are wide and varied, and some even risqué, but by using them the players have built a morale and team spirit that could not be better. Fingerbone is the name given to Queensland Institute of Sport player Frank Farina. Farina earned the name from his passport photo which makes him look a little bit darker skinned than what he really is. The name well and truly stuck after the qualifying rounds in Papua New Guinea when Farina, a former Port Moresby resident, said he knew some of the natives.

Sydney Olympic midfielder Jim Patikas earned the name hands off from a newspaper headline, the headline, which sat on top of a photo of Patikas in a Sydney newspaper, was quoting Sydney coach Eddie Thomson when Olympic players were trying to lure Patikas to their club.

The Hamburglar is young Socceroos Captain Tom McCulloch. He was given the name only recently following his appearances in television advertisements for McDonalds.

Although nearly all the young Socceroos are Australian born their ethnic backgrounds provide the nickname-makers with plenty of ammunition.

Woolongong stopper Ray Vleistra is known as Dutch, Sydney Olympic defender Tony Dakos as Dago, Chris Hummel as sour (from sauerkraut) and Newcastle's Ralph Meirs as Snitzel, also because of his German background.

Brisbane Lions' Russell Stewart is known as Ocker while his team-mate Danny Wright is Digger. Digger was

actually coined by A.I.S. Coach Jim Shoulder when Wright was at the Institute in Canberra and resulted because of his constant use of Australian slang.

Anatomy often plays a part in what nicknames players get and Brisbane City's Stephen Glockner is now being called Lanky while Canberra keeper Tony Franken is known as Block, because of the shape of his head.

Porkchop is the name given to Melbourne's Fabio Incantalupo, and no-one really seems to know why, while Rod Brown of Marconi is known as Charlie's brother. Brown's club-mate Joe Rizzotto is called cruncher because of the way he tackles and Institute of Sport full-back Roy Jones has been labelled Clarence (the lion in Daktari) because of his lazy eye. Jones, a big strapping lad, is also known as Milton — from the gentle giant cartoon character, Milton the monster.

Melita Eagles midfielder Paul Daly is called Fred Astaire because of his marathon with a girl on a free night off once.

The two most interesting names are those given to Newcastle's David Lowe and Marconi's Renes Licata. Lowe is called Shaggers while Licata has been dubbed babysitter, for reasons which just can't be revealed.

The tour Officials also have been given names by the boys. Physio Charlie Jurisic is called Beachball, and if you saw him you would know why, gear steward Roger Musgrove is Goffer and assistant coach Raul Blanco is Hawkeye because he never misses anything.

As for coach Les Scheinflug, he is sometimes called Colonel Klink because of his German background but more times than not is called something completely different by the players.

KESSON'S FORESIGHT IS GOOD NEWS FOR LIONS

Long after Brisbane Lions Premier League team coach Iain Kesson has quit soccer, the club will still be benefitting from his foresight.

Kesson, with former Lions director Jim Binnie, were largely responsible for setting up the Lions Youth policy which is recognised as the most productive and effective of its kind in the state, if not Australia.

The idea behind the youth policy was to give the youngsters top coaching.

"You can't teach a 26-year-old National League player anymore about how to control a ball or make a pass. With the youngsters you have something to work with," Kesson said.

The system of bringing youngsters up through the grades has produced countless young stars at National and Premier League level, both at Lions and now at other clubs.

Players like Danny Wright, John Ogden, Steve Jackson, Andy Ogden, Craig Low and Graham Wilson were all former Lions Juniors.



Lions are now benefitting from the wave of youngsters who have come through the youth scheme one way or another, players who made up the bulk of the highly successful 1982 Queensland Youth team. And there are other waves beginning to gain momentum.

Players like Rich Bassingthwaighe, Frank Byrne and Bradley Kearton are now holding down Premier League places. And behind them are talented Colts players like David Nasato, Mark Goodman and Shane Plazibate.

And according to Kesson they will just keep coming.

"The machinery is there now to keep producing these youngsters," he said.

Kesson, who was born in Glasgow, came to Australia 16 years ago after playing as a striker with various amateur sides including Queens Park. He played briefly with Hellinic (St. George Souths) then after a spell out of the game played

with Mitchelton then became player-coach and took the side to victory in the second Division grand final. He then coached at Southside Eagles for five years, was at Brisbane City for a season, Ipswich United for 18 months and now entering his fourth season at Lions.



And the Scotsman, who is very proud of the Youth scheme and his players, rejects recent criticism about the Lions Premier League team this season.

"The National League team is the most important thing. If that is successful then it slows down the line," Kesson said.

"I could have the best Premier League team in the state if I wanted to keep players at Lions. But as a coach grooming players for NSL level I have to take gambles. I have to decide whether a player is going to make it or not.

It is no good keeping someone at the club if he is not going to make the NSL squad. They are not bad players, in fact some are very good. But they are better off somewhere else earning a bit of money rather than plugging away here. By staying they would only deny someone else a chance of making it."

"Of course the gamble might not pay off and there could be the occasion when we have to really pay to get a player back. But in the long run it will prove cheaper than paying to have two top teams at Lions. There is no club in Queensland that can afford to have two top teams," Kesson said.

Because the Brisbane Lions team is constantly changing due to selections in the club's National League side, the team not have a regular captain. But watch for a story in a coming edition on talented fullback Steve Jackson.

BILL'S BACK AT REDLANDS

Hearty coach Bill Bryant has done a full circle now that he has teamed up again with Second Division club Redlands.

The jolly Bryant played with the Bay-siders when he first came to Australia from England in 1967. He played for two seasons with Redlands as a central defender before an ankle injury ended his career.

Surprisingly one of his old team-mates, midfielder Allan Morris is still in the team. Morris, 41, a former Merton and Bardon player first signed on at Redlands in 1964 and is still one of the club's most consistent performers.

Bryant, 45, a former Southend School-boys player has combined Morris with several other experienced players and a crop of talented youngsters to give Redlands a promising team that is pushing for promotion at the end of this season.

Among the other experienced players are former Wynnum identities Dave Large, Peter Edwards and Greg Rafter. The youngsters include state under 18 representative Shane Cooper, a fine left fullback.

Other youngsters coming through the club's ranks from the junior teams include Peter Gammie, Paul Hull, Peter Despot and Steven Morley.

They are being groomed by Bryant and the Redlands Reserve team coach Alan Jones, also a former Redlands player and the Brisbane Under 13 shadow squad coach.

Redlands were bitterly disappointed that

they missed promotion to the First Division last season after looking certainties at one stage. And this year they started off well with several fine pre-season performances but lost some early points because of complacency.

But the experienced Bryant, now in his second year with the club is confident he can steer the side to success.

Bryant's coaching background is vast. For many seasons he was assistant to former Queensland and State League coach Fred Robins. The pair spent a season at St. Helens, two years at St. George before Bryant went on his own way to spend seven years at Wynnum before coming to Redlands.

He was a Queensland staff coach for five years and assisted with the preparation of several Queensland teams.

Bryant knows what it is like at the top and he is determined to get Redlands there.

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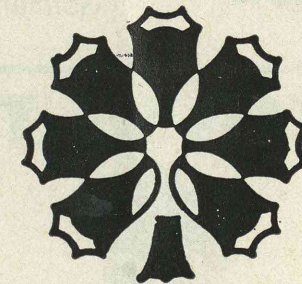
