CONTROVERSY IS OLD NEWS

Controversy has raged this year over the make-up of the England team which will play Australia in three Tests next week — including a match at Lang Park next Wednesday night — but for many soccer veterans the arguments are not new.

Each time a team from the United Kingdom — whether it be a side of professionals, amateurs or just a club tour — comes to Australia, Australians have demanded to know why a full strength squad had not been sent.

Criticism like that which has been thrown about prior to this England tour was typical of that banded around just before the arrival of the Football Association touring party in 1971. And it is interesting to read the comments of former Australian Soccer Federation Secretary Brian Le Fevre in an editorial in the national "Soccer scene" magazine.

He said: "It is very disappointing to the Australian Soccer Federation to read in so many publications, so much criticism of the FA's selection of players. Granted, no present member of the England international team has been included in the party, but many have had considerable experience of international football at Under 23 level. The English team will provide first class entertainment, giving 100 percent effort. Before the tour is over, many of the critics may well and truly rue their words."

And as it turned out, they did, and it seems certain the critics of this England squad will be made to do the same.

With the prospect of seeing some of the worlds finest players a large crowd is expected at Lang Park on Wednesday, June 15. England manager Bobby Robson has selected a squad of household names while the Socceroos are determined to prove that they are now a force in world soccer.

A good performance against one of the worlds best teams would be a major inspiration to the game in this country. So lets all get out to Lang Park and give the Socceroos our fullsupport.

And each tour has produced its stars. On that first tour in 1925 it was the centre forward H. Batten who scored 49 goals as England romped around Australia to be undefeated in 25 matches. Other players on that tour included Tom Whittaker, Stan Seymour, Charles Spencer and Jimmy Davison.

Australia had its first win over England when it downed the Amateurs 5-4 in Sydney in 1937. It lost the next game at Brisbane 4-0 but won the third at Newcastle. But England finished the tour with seven victories in 10 matches.

The England team actually played one of its matches at the North Ipswich reserve and beat the local side 3-0. That was much more respectable than the 11-0 drubbing the Poms handed out to Queensland the following weekend.

When the England Professionals came back in 1950 they handed out to Australia a world record international defeat — a 17-0 thrashing in the mud at Sydney. England finished the tour undefeated in 20 matches.

But Australian soccer has come a long way since then and this tour could be one of the best yet as far as entertainment is concerned. Next Wednesday night at Lang Park could well be the football highlight of the year.

FARINA TO PLAY FOR LIONS?

From Geoff Stead on tour with the Young Socceroos.

Australia's young socceroo winger Frank Farina wants to leave the Institute of Sport in Canberra and National League club Brisbane Lions is high on his list of possible clubs he might join.

Farina will not make a decision until after he returns from the World Youth Championships in Mexico but it seems he will either go to Brisbane or Sydney. And that's of course if he doesn't get an offer here to play overseas.

The former Cairns player has always wanted to play soccer in England and said this week if the opportunity arose

he would have to seriously consider any offer. But Farina admits there is only a slim chance of that happening and he is more concerned with giving a good showing for the young soccerooos to enhance his appeal to Australian clubs.

Farina has been at the Canberra Institute for little more than a year.

Although Queensland has long known the talents of the North Queenslander, it wasn't until head AIS coach Jimmy Shoulder spotted the youngster at a training camp at Mount Gravatt that he was offered a scholarship.

Farina has learned a lot since he moved south but now he considers it is time to move on.

"The Institute's job is to bring in raw talent and then polish it," Farina said.

"But I think the institute has done just about all it can for me. To improve my football I must start playing reg-

ularly in the National competition".

Before he came to Mexico, Farina was playing with National League club Canberra Arrows. And although he won't say it, one gets the impression he was not very happy there. In fact it was a tackle at training which put Farina out for a month prior to this tournament and had him battling to the last minute to win back his place on the right wing.

The fact that the AIS is not playing in the top competition in Australia is Farina's and the Institute's biggest worry.

"You prove nothing by scoring four or five goals every week against weaker opposition. The AIS team must play teams better than it for the players to improve," Farina said.

For more than six months now Shoulder has been working doggedly to get the AIS into Australia's top competition but things are happening too slowly for the fast-moving Farina.

The fact that there are a number of his Australian team-mates earning well over \$250 per game for their clubs has not worried Farina in the past but he realises when he returns to Australia he will have to make the break or risk missing out all together.

HOW TO BE A MILLIONAIRE

Ever wondered how the Soccer Pools started?

Well, 60 years ago, three bored office telegraphists thought up the idea of making a fortune from other people's dreams.

They chipped in, \$84 each, had 4,000 football coupons printed then stood in the cold distributing them outside Manchester United's ground.



Only 25 completed coupons were returned. The total staked was about \$8 with the first dividend about \$3.50.

Encouraged by that small profit, they tried again at Hull with 10,000 coupons.

But this time only one coupon was returned. By the end of the 1923 season the lads were \$1,000 out of pocket. Two of the disheartened trio pulled out but the third, John Moores, stuck with it, enlisted his brother Cecil, borrowed more money and launched an advertising campaign to help sell the Pools.

One year later Littlewoods Pools were raking in \$3,300 a week.

By 1928, the total pool for one week was topping \$16,900 and what is now a permanent feature of our way of life was well on the way to being established.

Today, more than 15 million people in Britain fill in coupons every week. Last year, the company which started so shakily, had a turnover of \$562 million.

Since Littlewoods started, \$1,690 million has been paid out to winners, \$169 million last season alone.

MATT HAS DONE IT ALL

It would be hard to find a more colourful past in Queensland soccer than that of Ipswich United coach Matt Carson.

The softy-spoken, unassuming Carson has coached at almost every level and there are few local honours he has not won in a career which has spanned five clubs.

The former Albion Rovers and Cheltenham player came to Australia in 1964 and after two seasons with Latrobe, moved on to Heath Park and stayed there for seven years as a player and coach. He saw the club, now called Easts, undergo three name changes.

Carson became very active in coaching in the late 1960's and in 1966 he helped establish the Queensland Soccer Coaches Association. For eight years he was director of coaching and chief of coaching for two more seasons — stepping down when Dennis Ford was appointed by the Queensland Soccer Federation.

The Coatbridge-born Carson, a bread vendor, is also a former state coach, Australian Soccer Federation staff coach and former national selector.

After his spell at Merton, Carson first really hit the headlines when he took the previously unfashionable Southside Eagles to the top of the State

League and made household names of players like Ron Millman, Tony Brennan, Ken Gordon, Alan Marzalek and John Bennett.

Carson was with Eagles for nearly four years before he accepted the opportunity to steer Lions away from National League relegation — a task which he did admirably and subsequently was voted Queensland Coach of the year.

Now Carson has a new challenge of stamping Ipswich as the No. 1 Premier League side. He has started to build a side he thinks can win the competition and rejects criticism about him taking players from his previous clubs.

Former Eagles players Bennett, Gordon and Millman are all in the Ipswich team this season and Marzalek was last year.

"I look for players who can do a job. A club wants results quickly and I think it is a waste of time to look for talent when I know where it is. I know what players like Ron and Kenny can do and I am sure they will do it this season for Ipswich," Carson said.

WAYNE IS LOOKING AHEAD

Ipswich United captain Wayne Warren is confident about the future of Ipswich soccer and he is probably more qualified than most to make that assessment.

Warren, 25, a physical education teacher at St. Edmunds, is the coach of the Brisbane West region high school team that recently won the Queensland schools championship at Spencer Park.

According to the big Ipswich defender, that team contained some brilliant youngsters who should begin breaking into local top sides within the next few seasons.

But Warren, who has been playing first team football since he came into the St. Helen's team 10 year ago, has firm beliefs on the development of Junior players.

"I think a lot of talented youngsters coming through are getting too much. By the time they are 14-years-old they have been interstate three times with representative teams and have a cupboard full of pennants. Some of them are expecting a reward all the time

then and they don't develop a true dedication," Warren said.

And for an example of dedication a youngster needn't look any further than Warren.

The big sweeper or stopper has been one of Ipswich's most consistent players for more than a decade. He is particularly strong in the air but at times does special training to improve his jumping ability.

And his dedication is proven by the fact that since he began playing as an under 8 he has never left the Ebbw Vale clubs. This is his fourth season as captain after previously leading the side from 1978 to 80.

Although Warren has taken up coaching, and has his preliminary certificate already, he hopes to have another five years of playing before he considers hanging up his boots.

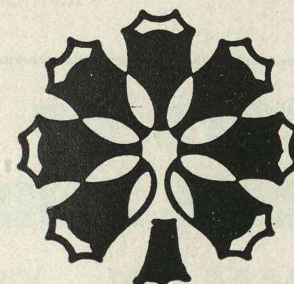
To ensure that these titles will be conducted to the same high standard is synonymous with National Championships held in Queensland, organisation is well under way with a very able committee being formed.
