HERMISTON POLISHES CITY'S TWO RAW GEMS

This season will undoubtedly go down as the year in which for the first time ever, Brisbane City began building for the future rather than attempting to buy success.

In previous seasons Brisbane City has been in there with the rest bidding for overseas players and interstate "stars" as they tried to use the cheque book to buy a high placing.

But a combination of difficult financial times and a new approach by new coach Jim Hermiston has seen the Gladiators put their faith in youth and already they are being rewarded.

Hermiston has predicted young strikers Angelo Falco and Stephen Glockner have the potential to become the Kevin Keegan and John Toshack combination of Australian soccer.

That's a bold statement to make but if attitude counts for anything the two young Brisbane products have a head start.

Angelo Falco, 17, began playing soccer with Brisbane City in 1972. He progressed through the clubs junior ranks, gaining selection in state and zone under age teams. Falco eventually won his way into the Brisbane City Premier League side at the beginning of last season but was forced to miss a year because of a knee injury.

"When I came back this year I was only looking at trying to win my place back in the Premier League side. I never dreamed I would be playing National League by the middle of the year," Falco said.

The youngster made his NSL debut in the derby against Lions in May when he came on as a late substitute. But it was while Glockner was away in Mexico with the Young Socceroos that he was able to make his mark.

"I was very nervous the first time but Jim told me to listen to the other players. They helped me a lot but it really has been since Steve came back into the side that I have started to enjoy it. He gives me a lot of good balls," Falco said.

No longer being the youngest in the team has to a certain degree taken a lot of pressure off the 19-year-old Glockner who has been at City for several seasons after spells with Annerley and Souths.

"Since I have returned from Mexico the older players seem to be treating me with more respect. They look on me as

one of the experienced players in the side, so I try to help Angelo as much as I can too," Glockner said.

"But over the past few weeks it seems like we have been helping each other. Angelo feeds me and I feed him. It has been working really well but we are both working hard to make it even better."

Both of the youngsters have high praise for each other and their on and off field relationships could not be better.

"Angelo can outrun any defender in Australia. He is so determined I think he would run into a brick wall if it meant winning. Every good striker needs a foil and I think at the moment we are doing that for each other," Glockner said.



Although being able to jump extremely high for a small man, Falco says he relies on Steve to set him up a lot. A typical example was in City's last home game against Leichhardt when Glockner wore a kick in the face to get a ball through to Falco.

"Steve is really good at winning the ball and holding it until the right time before pushing me through. He's not that slow either and in a race between us I think there would only be about a few inches in it," Falco said.

Both players are also very appreciative of the support they have been receiving from the sometimes fickle Brisbane City supporters.

Of late, though, Glockner has drifted into the background a little as the crowd has chanted out Falco's name. But both are dedicated team men and don't look for their own glory.

"The crowd obviously likes Angelo a bit more because he is Italian, but they are also very good to me. They give me a lot of support," Glockner said.

Falco is proud of his Italian background. He can speak the language and had an enjoyable visit to Italy several years ago. And while he too receives a boost from the supporters he sees their chanting more as an incentive to other players at Brisbane City.

"The crowd really boosts me and has helped me settle in, but I hope the attention I am getting is an incentive for other Premier League players to try and make it into the top side. It would

be great if eventually all the team was made up of players who have come through the Brisbane City ranks," Falco said.

With some of the youngsters now at the club that may well not be too far off, but Hermiston makes no secret of the fact it's a hard road to the top.

But in Falco and Glockner he has two youngsters who are willing to do the work, yet keeping level-headed about what it is giving them in return.

"Sure we would like to be a duo like Toshack and Keegan but we have a lot to learn before we even get close. But it's not a bad challenge to have," the two agreed.

EDITORIAL

This season indeed has been a good year for young players in Queensland soccer.

Our lead story on Brisbane City youngsters Angelo Falco and Stephen Glockner gives heartening indications that these young players bursting onto the scene are not prima donnas, but talented youths who are making every post a winner.

But Glockner and Falco are not the only ones. Also over at City is John Kowtan, Glenn Ahearn — who tragically missed his NSL opportunity through a broken leg and Luciano Fabrizio — who still may come to the club.

And up at Lions the entire backline is almost made up of former Queensland Youth team players. Peter McClurg is sound at leftback while Alan Hunter and Russell Stewart are holding up the middle.

At Premier League level we have seen the likes of Cameron Bell and Mark Hairsine, (Mount Gravatt), Keith Marsh, Glen Archer and Garth Moloney (This-tle) Billy Dann (Ipswich) and so the list goes on.

These youngster have immense futures in the game and with them lies the standing of Queensland soccer in Australia over the next decade.

It is this point that our local administrators should keep uppermost when they make decisions at the end of this month which could change the whole outlook of Australian soccer. The situation presently is too confused to even predict how it will turn out, but Queens-

land Soccer Federation and National League voters should consider the youth before casting their decisions.

Queensland cannot be left in an Australian soccer backwater and expect our present crop of talented stars to stay and others to come through the ranks.

We must have regular contact with the other states whether its through a National League or some other regular interstate competition.

It can clearly be seen from rugby league that two or three interstate games is definitely not enough to keep young players from going south. If the National League is to be scrapped then Queensland must push for a viable alternative that won't leave us in the cold.

Under the present voting structure it could be difficult to achieve, but surely the other distant states have the same feelings. Queensland must take the initiative and lobby other states to ensure the southern "giants" don't push anything through.

It would be a shame if we had to introduce a state contract program as occurs in another code to keep our representative youngsters here. But if Queensland soccer becomes isolated then it probably will be the only way we will benefit from the players we have produced.

this concerned eye of some southern officials. But last week's paragraph about a possible amalgamation certainly had a few buzzing. Everyone wants to know who, while one phone call to Go Soccer revealed the three clubs may not be Robinson Crusoe. It wasn't a city hotel but most who attended the George Best dinner at the Lion's Den last weekend had too good a time to worry anyway.

The amicable Best and his equally chirpy manager Bill McMurdo helped contribute to an interesting and at times amusing question and answer session through the dinner.

And what made the occasion even more successful, as far as Lions were concerned, was that Best offered to do the dinner free as a token of his appreciation for the hospitality shown during his four-week stay in Brisbane.

Best normally charges upwards of \$500 for guest speaking appearances.

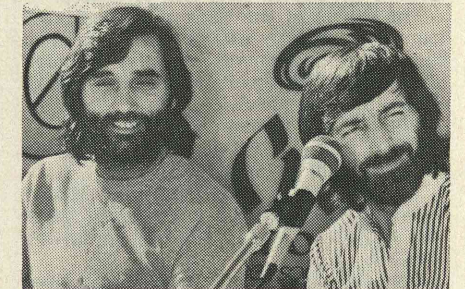
The former Irish International was worried in answering questions which ranged from his impressions of Australian soccer to his love life and alcoholism.

Best said he believed the result against England was a fine achievement for the Socceroos and one which all Australians should be proud of.

"England is still one of the great soccer nations in the world, although personally I don't support their present tactics, and to get the three results that Australia did was a tremendous achievement," Best said.

Best said Australian soccer had come on in "leaps and bounds" since his last visit in 1967 and said that during his coaching clinic at Lions a fortnight ago he had seen youngsters "as good as any their age in the world".

Best rated Tottenham midfielder Glen Hoddle as his current favourite player but said Alfredo De Stefano was his favourite of all time. He listed former Manchester United manager Sir Matt Busby as the greatest manager he had played under while on Tommy Docherty he said openly "I don't like the man, we just don't get along. And I don't think he is a very good manager either."

Best spoke several times about his son Calum, 2, and said while he would never push him into football he seemed to be showing tendencies towards the game and regularly kicked a ball around his backyard in London.

EVERYONE WAS WARNED...

The Queensland Soccer Federation management committee is making no excuses — players were warned.

And last week a Redcliffe First Division serves player was cited to appear before the management committee after being detected playing in the Commercial League.

The management committee emphatically stressed at the start of the season that all players registered with the Federation were not permitted to play Commercial football.

The reason behind the move is that the Commercial League is not affiliated with the Queensland Soccer Federation, this means it is not bound to recognise QSF suspensions.

The management committee was concerned that some clubs were keeping their suspended players match fit by playing them in Commercial teams. Therefore the

suspended players were not being punished by missing their football.

But ironically it is understood that the player who has been caught was "docked in" by the Commercial League. The League contacted the QSF to advise of their suspension on the player and to ensure that he did not try to play in the QSF competition.

A check revealed his registration with the Peninsula club.

As we went to press it was uncertain what penalty the management committee would impose but it was likely the committee would show it meant business.

With rumours that the practice is still widespread, perhaps this incident will serve as a warning to others.

OUR GIRLS SET TO ANNOUNCE THEIR PLAYER OF THE YEAR

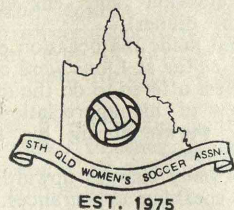
Women's soccer in Queensland is certainly on the move and this year the South Queensland Women's Soccer Association will take a further step forward when it announces its first ever Player of the Year.

The announcement will be made at a special Player of the Year awards night to be staged at Fairview Lounge later this month. And the award has taken on even more importance following the donation of a trophy by Queensland Soccer Federation president, Ald. Ian Brusasco.

The Player of the Year will be selected from the monthly award winners named this season. Those winners have included players like Leanne Priestley from Easts, Stephanie MacMahon from Virginia, Michelle Sawyers from Coalstars, Teresa Cronin from Virginia and Christine Roberts from Leichhardt Eagles.

The girls come from First and Second Division teams and have won their monthly awards on votes posted by opposition coaches.

The last few years have emphasised the growth of women's soccer in Queensland. Last year, when Brisbane hosted the nationals, the state won the Australian championship for the first time ever.



The state side, under the astute coaching of Fred Robins, continues to improve and in February six Queenslanders were chosen in the Australian side which had a successful tour of Hawaii.

Queensland officials are now gearing for the national titles in Perth in August and are eager to retain the Australian crown.

No doubt a successful awards night and a national championship would be a rewarding end to a hard-working season - and Queensland's women soccer players are right on target to achieve that goal.

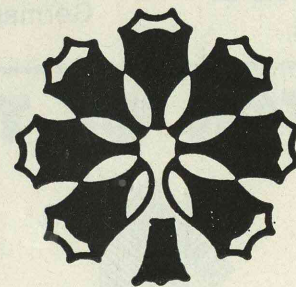
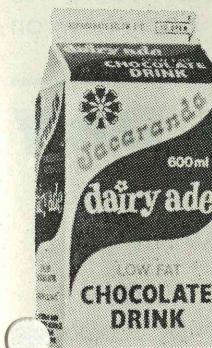
