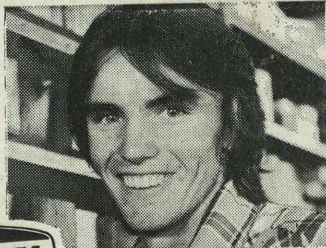

TIME IS RIGHT FOR A NEW QUEENSLAND CUP

Support is growing in Queensland soccer for an all-in cup competition along similar lines as England's highly successful and world famous Football Association (FA) Cup.

Similar calls have been made in the past, but now with the Queensland Soccer Federation undergoing its greatest upheaval ever, the re-structuring of the federation at all levels, it is the ideal time to instigate the new Cup competition.

And the Ampol Cup, which goes into the semi-finals this weekend, and the lower division's Qantas Cup, now also in progress, are the perfect vehicles through which to implement the idea.

The Ampol Cup has long been the premier Cup competition in the state and a "money-spinner" for the federation. But in recent years the Format has lost some of its appeal, particularly in the way the draw has been conducted.

It is no coincidence that Olympic and Ipswich, the two biggest crowd pullers in the state, are in opposite halves of the draw and "seeded" to win their way into the final, on September 13 or 14.



In fact, under the present format, the Ampol Cup is nothing more than an opportunity for the leading clubs to pick up some money and the federation to make a profit. A look back over the finalists in recent years highlights this fact.

When was the last time a "minnow" made it to the final?

To get to the semi-finals, Mount Gravatt, Olympic, Thistle and Ipswich have had to play only two games. For Wynnum to just get into the first round it had to fight off the challenges of 23 other First and Second Division clubs which were made to pay-up and play despite the fact that only one team would get through.

Apart from the leading four or five First Division clubs, none of the other teams were really interested this year.

Similarly, the Qantas Cup has become "something that has to be organised before the season is over". Quite a few clubs didn't even bother to enter this year.

But if both competitions could be united, say as a Queensland Cup, it may re-capture the interest of all clubs and,

most importantly, the spectators.

A Queensland Cup could provide a vital link between the semi-professional premier and Intermediate League next season & the amateurs. And the country could still be incorporated to maintain the statewide appeal which is one of the few attractions of the present Ampol Cup.

After restructuring, a Queensland Cup could be staged in the following manner.

All teams from Amateur Division Two down, participate in a knockout qualifying tournament. This could probably involve up to 60 teams and could be started up to three weeks before the commencement of fixtures.

If necessary, teams could play twice a week, on the weekends and mid-week which would provide valuable pre-season competition and avoid the necessity for clubs to arrange friendly trial games.

Eight qualifiers from the tournament, which should be completed within the first fortnight of the season, would go into the First Round of the Queensland Cup. The losers of the qualifying tournament would play-off later in the season for the actual Qantas Cup.

The 12 teams from the Amateur Division One also gain a First Round berth. Another four teams would go into the draw from regions throughout Queensland. These would also be decided in pre-season play-offs.

The Queensland Soccer Federation has 15 affiliate federations and associations, including the Queensland Churches, which could be divided into four zones — North Queensland, Central Queensland, Darling Downs and the South-West and South Queensland, including the two coasts Maryborough and a Church representative team. They would play round-robins similar to this year's Ampol Cup.

That would provide a total of 24 first round teams. These would go into an out-of-the-hat draw to produce 12 games to be played on the Easter weekend. (The church team, if it qualified, may have to play on Easter Monday). Ideally the first team drawn would be the home team, but in this round ONLY, the QSF could have the right to decide the venue to increase gate returns. Matches would go into extra-time or penalties to decide winners on the weekend.

BUT AN OLD CUP TRADITION MAY NOT BE LOST YET

One of Queensland's oldest Cup competitions is set for a revival in September.

Plans have been underway for more than a month to stage the Kruger Cup after a lapse of nearly 10 years. The Cup, the symbol of inter-city supremacy between Brisbane and Ipswich, looks set to be staged on September 11, after an earlier date this month was ruled out because of the clash with the National League derby between City and Lions.

Queensland director of coaching Bruce Stowell has been named as the Brisbane coach while longtime Ipswich soccer identity Gary Wilkins is to select the Ipswich side.

The staging of the Cup, and a venue is yet to be set although Ebbw Vale would have to be a short-priced favourite, almost certainly will mean a switching of Premier League fixtures to the preceding Saturday.

The Kruger Cup was sponsored in its heyday by prominent racehorse breeders and owners and Ipswich businessmen, Perc and Ted Kruger.

Apparently the Cup was instigated by the Kruger's father well before the

Second World War. There were nine boys in the Kruger family and their father wanted to establish a competition that would promote soccer in the Ipswich and Brisbane area.

The competition lapsed during the war but ran from 1946 until 1961 when it again was not contested for until Brisbane retained it in 1966. The Brisbane team then went on to win three more times in the following years before Ipswich took the Cup back in 1969. That gave Ipswich an 11-10 lead in the series.

But the 70's saw a decline in interest in the competition particularly in Brisbane, and March 1976 the QSF decided it had no alternative but to scrap the Cup.

The move brought heated protest from Ipswich soccer followers and players, who saw selection in a Kruger Cup side as the first step to getting a Maroon jersey.

With several interstate matches planned for next season, this year's Kruger Cup clash could well again take on that significance.

The 12 successful teams would go into Round Two where they would be involved in another random draw with the 10 premier League and 10 intermediate League sides — 32 teams in all.

Those 32 would then play their way down to 16, then eight, then four to the two finalists who would play off at soccer headquarters, Perry Park. Each draw up to the semi-finals would be out-of-the-hat, preferably done on a television sports show rather than in the "secrecy" of Perry Park.

The rounds leading up to the finals could be played on weekends especially set aside and on mid-week dates. The final should be the climax of the Queensland season.

Of course the biggest drawback of a Queensland Cup is the cost. If the North Queensland zone winner got to the final, airfares would be astronomical. But Go Soccer estimates the QSF, at worst, could be up for a bill of \$25,000. But sponsor-

ship and the present Ampol sponsorship is nearly half of our estimate, gate receipts and nomination fees would help offset a percentage of the overheads. The sale of television rights to the final and if it is promoted properly it could have appeal to the Queensland stations, could also contribute towards the costs.

The QSF at first may have to run the competition at a loss until it gains prestige and increased sponsorship. Perhaps in the initial years the prizemoney could be limited until the competition begins to stand on its feet.

A fund-raising scheme, such as suggested by Acacia Ridge at a recent Council meeting, might also be implemented to contribute towards the costs.

But the sheer involvement of so many teams and affiliates gives the QSF a wide base over which to spread the costs. If 60 clubs and 15 affiliates were levied an average of \$200, the QSF would have a working fund of \$15,000 before sponsorships.

EDITORIAL

A return to ethnic names in Australian soccer can only harm the game and will be of no benefit in the long run.

It has only been in the past three or four years that we have started to make headway in throwing off the tag that soccer is a game for "a bunch of wogs".

The Young Socceroos, mostly Australian born, have been instrumental in helping the campaign. To revert back to the ethnic names would take Australian soccer back 20 years.

The ethnic names were a legacy of Australia's high immigration rate of the 50's and 60's. They provided that generation with a contact with their homeland.

But that generation is now a minority in Australian soccer.

The present game is dominated by Australian-born players and an ever growing number of Australian-born administrators — some, despite their ethnic names, can not even speak the language of their forefathers.

The break has been made, and in general, ethnic names have been scrapped. And anyone who thinks a return would attract bigger crowds could not be further wrong.

It will only alienate the few who have come into the game in recent years.

It may bring back a small majority of ethnics, but for how long? One season, maybe two? But what happens in five or six years time?

Falling crowds are a worldwide sporting problem. It is not one created in

Australia because we abandoned ethnic names. The way some administrators go on, one would think there are thousands of Australians of ethnic background just sitting at home on a Sunday with nothing to do but wait until their former team changes its name back.

The fact is, those that would come to watch a team because of its ethnic background are already there. The ones that aren't coming are the thousands of soccer playing Australians that are more conditioned to going to the beach or to a barbeque on a Sunday afternoon.

It is towards these people that we should be concentrating our efforts.

And it is about time the Australian Soccer Federation once and for all made a firm stand.

The Queensland Soccer Federation led the way in outlawing ethnic names — and it has worked.

But in the southern states we still have Croatia, Juventus, Ajax, Azzurri Hellas and so the list goes on. Victoria is the worst offender and the ASF should come down strongly on the state which has demonstrated on more than one occasion in recent years that seems to think it can do what it likes irrespective of national policy.

It can't be denied Australian soccer needs the ethnic groups but what it needs more than all those groups combined, is the support of Australians.

Former Liverpool, Coventry and Nottingham Forest player Larry Lloyd has been appointed manager of Notts County.

Italian League champions Roma intends fielding two Brazilians this season. The club has signed Roberto Falcao and also intends playing Tominho Cerezo although his signing has been vetoed by the Italian federation which claims it was completed after the June 13 overseas transfers deadline.

Speculation that former Scotland striker Joe Jordan would return to Britain has ended following his transfer from AC Milan to Verona. Jordan, 31 who has been with the Italian club for the past 18 months, was forced to move on after AC Milan signed England star Luther Blissett and Belgian captain Eric Gerets. Chelsea and Crystal Palace were interested in the former Leeds goal-grabber.

REMEMBER PAUL BURNS . . . ?

Remember Paul Burns, that tough tackling, neat passing young midfielder that burst into the Lions National League team last season only to disappear just as quickly this year?

He hasn't quit football as some thought, but is recovering from two serious knee operations and is setting himself for a comeback next season.

Burns, 21, needed ligaments in his knee totally reconstructed and had his leg in plaster for nearly six weeks. His leg strength suffered as a result and it has been a slow comeback for the youngster who promised so much.

His exercise has been limited to some slow jogging and golf and after the pain of the past six months, he is in no hurry to rush back.

"I had so much trouble with it last season I want to get it right before I start playing again. But I definitely want to get back on the field," Burns said this week.

Burns had been troubled by his knee for nearly three seasons before it finally "went". He had played in Lions' tough Phillips Cup match against Sydney City and had aggravated the injury then, but it was during training for the next NSL match against Preston that the knee collapsed.

Burns has watched Lions a number of times this season and has seen them at their best and at the worst. He saw the derby win over Brisbane City in May then watched them crash 0-4 to West Adelaide a month ago.

"I hardly know anyone in the team now. There has been so many changes," Burns said.

Although Burns was too modest to admit it, he would have been a valuable addition to Simon Kistemaker's squad this season. In fact he could well have dropped back to sweeper to fill that role which has been vacant for much of the year.

A season off can be disastrous for a top-line footballer but with strength building exercises and a sensible approach Burns could well be back in the Lions side next season.

With that in mind, perhaps it is time for the club to renew its contact with the talented youngster — before someone else does!

A CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP TO BOOST PREMIER LEAGUE?

Premier League club Mount Gravatt has called for a Queensland soccer club championship to be introduced after the suggestion was raised at a club meeting.

Hawk's secretary, Mr Barry Nevin, first published the idea, which is common in other football codes, in the club's newsletter.

The favourable response he received promoted taking the matter further. He has circulated a letter on the proposal to soccer officials and the media and the idea was discussed at last week's management committee meeting.

In his letter Mr Nevin says:

"At present, there is an Ampol Cup and a Qantas Cup competition held within the fixtures, which are keenly contested by all clubs, no doubt, because there is prizemoney involved. With the QSF promoting the Premier League as Queensland soccer's "showcase" in 1983 and more so from 1984 onwards, the promotion of a club championship would create added interest and appeal to the clubs.



A more particular appeal and achievement would be generated if a sponsor could be obtained to donate prizemoney for the top three of four clubs in such a competition. With increased interest being shown this year by the newspapers, perhaps they may be willing and able, either individually or collectively, to sponsor such a competition.

A points system would be applied to calculate club points and we would suggest:— Premier League points x 3, Premier Reserve points x 2 and Premier Colts points x 1 and the three totalled

We feel such a competition would help generate interest in the Premier League as a whole and in particular would be an endeavour to generate more interest in the Premier Colts and Premier Reserve games as these teams (in the main) are the Premier League players of the future

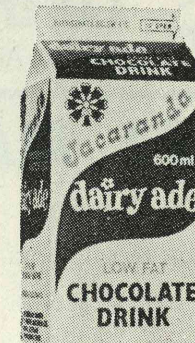
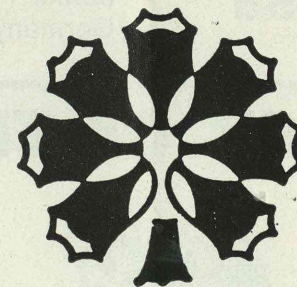
