ADELAIDE SIDE MAY GET QLD'S UNWANTED NSL SPOT

Another team from Adelaide may now come into the National League following the decision by Queensland's leading Premier League clubs not to apply for entry into the 1984 regional NSL.

National League officials had hoped at least one further Queensland team would join Brisbane City and Lions next year but now will have to seek additional teams from the south.

And NSL general manager Mr. Steve Kamasz said last week the League understood two Adelaide clubs, in addition to present NSL sides City and West, wanted to be included.

"We have already received one letter of intent and understand another is on the way," Mr. Kamasz said.

Leading Premier League clubs Olympic and Ipswich were among a handful of Queensland clubs considered capable of making an acceptable NSL application.

But despite some extensive lobbying by some local officials, and a secret meeting at Richlands two weeks ago, officials from both clubs decided to consolidate their clubs' positions in the new Premier League.

Both clubs claimed they were not ready to enter the national competition, financially and administratively.

Olympic president, Mr. John Polichronis

said it could be up to two years before the Greek-backed club applied for the NSL. For Ipswich it could be even longer.

And although the clubs' decisions mean the NSL will have to find teams from other areas, interstate, Queensland's Premier League clubs certainly have not blown their chance.

"The format is such that an extra Queensland team could come into the competition any year in the future," NSL commercial director Mr. Peter Sheean said.

"In fact I didn't think Olympic were ready to come in yet anyway and there is no point applying unless a club can meet the commitment. Unfortunately there are one or two clubs which look like applying because they don't want to miss out."

But Mr. Kamasz points out that application is no guarantee of inclusion in next year's competition.

"There will be an ASF screening committee just as there has been in the past. Only those clubs which reach the required standards will be admitted," he said.

MERRIMAC TO STAY-PUT!

President of champion Gold Coast club Merrimac, Mr. John Poletto, has denied the club was planning to apply for the new Brisbane Premier League next season.

Rumours have circulated Brisbane and the Gold Coast in recent weeks that the rich Italian-backed club was planning to breakaway from the coast competition it has dominated in recent years.

But Mr. Poletto said this week Merrimac was content to consolidate its position on the Gold Coast and develop its facilities.

"We are in no hurry. We are only a young club and are happy playing in the Gold Coast competition. We definitely will not be applying to play in Brisbane next season," he said.

Merrimac are one the richest clubs in Queensland in terms of assets. Their

club is situated on a piece of Gold Coast land valued several years ago at more than \$6 million.

In fact, some have even said if the club sold off a portion it could easily afford to go into the National League.

If Merrimac made such a decision it would get the wholehearted support of the Gold Coast Federation, president Peter Williamson said.

"But we would oppose any move for Merrimac to play in Brisbane," he said.

Mr. Poletto said the club had considered selling off some of its land, but the money would not be used for the soccer team.

"We want to build a clubhouse," he said.



DERBY IS A FUTURE SAMPLE

This weekend's derby clash between Brisbane City and Lions will be a sample of the big matches to come under the new National League format expected to be announced on Sunday.

That's the prediction of Australian Soccer Federation and National League commercial director Mr. Peter Sheean, who was in Brisbane this week for talks with the Queensland Soccer Federation management committee.

"Brisbane is going to come out of this a lot better than many people think. You're going to get more than you perceive," Mr. Sheean said.

Mr. Sheean said big match atmospheres, like those created by a derby become commonplace in Brisbane under the new format.

"If a team like Sydney Croatia plays in Brisbane, 1000 Croatians will come out of the woodwork. It will be one of the biggest crowds ever up there."

"And there will be other games like that," he said.

That surely must be good news for City and Lions, particularly Lions which has struggled to draw crowds in recent weeks.

Despite City's high position on the table, Lions humiliated the Gladiators and ran out 4-0 winners, Stewart scoring one of the goals.

It was a result Hermiston found hard to swallow. And Kistemaker surely was not expecting such a convincing scoreline or a drenching, but the result was his finest moment so far in Australia.

It is one he eagerly wants to repeat but one Hermiston desperately wants to reverse.

The players won't need any psyching as their reputations too are on the line.

And that makes for Sunday being a classic, no-holds-barred local derby a match not to be missed.



EDITORIAL

Premier League clubs Olympic and Ipswich united made the correct decisions last week when they chose not to apply for inclusion in next year's regionalised National League.

Outside of Brisbane City and Lions, there is no club in Queensland capable of making a successful step into the national competition.

And neither Olympic nor Ipswich or any other club should be embarrassed to admit it. The fact that the two clubs realised they were not adequately prepared shows they are aware of what is required and now know the targets for which to aim.

And they should be in no desperate hurry to get there. Next year's Premier League will be a good competition — a competition in which sound club development should prosper.

Clubs in the competition will have to work hard to make it work but the workload is within their present capabilities.

To enter the National League next year under-prepared would be the worst mistake any club could make.

If the National League is the pinnacle of Australian soccer, as its officials want it promoted, then it should be around for many years yet. Olympic and Ipswich and others will get their chance in future years.

At the moment it will be better to watch from the shore and prepare than join the swim and drown.

Points to ponder

The Queensland Soccer Federation scored a major victory over its Australian Rules counterparts last weekend — section of the annual Queensland Australian Football League Golf day at the MacLeod course. And reports indicate Bruce was desparately unlucky not to win the tournament outright. The pair earned a shield and a trophy each for their efforts. The shield will be placed alongside the Federation's other "major" trophies.

The behaviour of one player when sent off in a Premier League Reserves game recently left a lot to be desired. The player, a former well-known State League Midfielder, left little to the imagination when he half dropped his shorts to the referee when shown the red card. What made the matter worse was that the player was also the team coach, and should have known better.

Does the QSF management committee believe there is life after death? Or like a cat, does a soccer player have more than one life? It depended which way you read a recent management committee minute. Did a player get life then six weeks or did he get life and six weeks? Like the minute entry, it's hard to work out.

The "cheating" story last week in a local newspaper produced an unprecedented response and the writer's telephone ran hot the next morning. For once there was a controversial talking point about local soccer. Perhaps if a few more officials ventured a bit further than just saying they were "quietly confident", the code might grab a few more big headlines.

The word is Croatia will come into National League without changing its name — merely tagging Liverpool on the front. And Melbourne Juventus will also come in under that name. The tip is also Croatia will be in the same group as the two Brisbane teams, which no doubt will be good news for Sunnyside supporters and will help boost City and Lions' Gates.

While researching our story about the possibility of soccer being played at Seagulls Leagues club (page 5), we were told that the club plans to shift its present grandstand to the other side of the field and build a new one on the present site. And all this comes only months after the club opened its multi-million dollar entertainment complex. And clubs here in Queensland battle on with chook raffles!

GOLD COAST — AN NSL PROSPECT?

The Gold Coast could provide Queensland's next National League team.

In fact, had the format for next year's NSL been finalised earlier this year, a Gold Coast team could well have submitted an application for the 1984 regionalised National League.

Gold Coast and District Soccer Federation president, Mr. Peter Williamson said this week the matter had been discussed at a federation meeting earlier in the year. But the idea had lapsed when coast officials became confused as to the future of the National League.

But Mr. Williamson said once a firm plan was outlined, as was expected at this weekend's meeting, he would not be surprised if the suggestion was raised again.

Like any other club in Queensland making the step up to National League, a lot of factors have to be taken into consideration before the Coast could make a suitable application. But unlike many Brisbane clubs a Gold Coast application would have considerably more going for it.

Apart from the obvious aspect that the Gold Coast is a region in itself where a team would have exclusive drawing power, a venue is readily available for a team to play tomorrow.

Preliminary negotiations were made with

the Seagulls Leagues Club, at Tweed Heads, when the idea of a Gold Coast NSL side was first mooted.

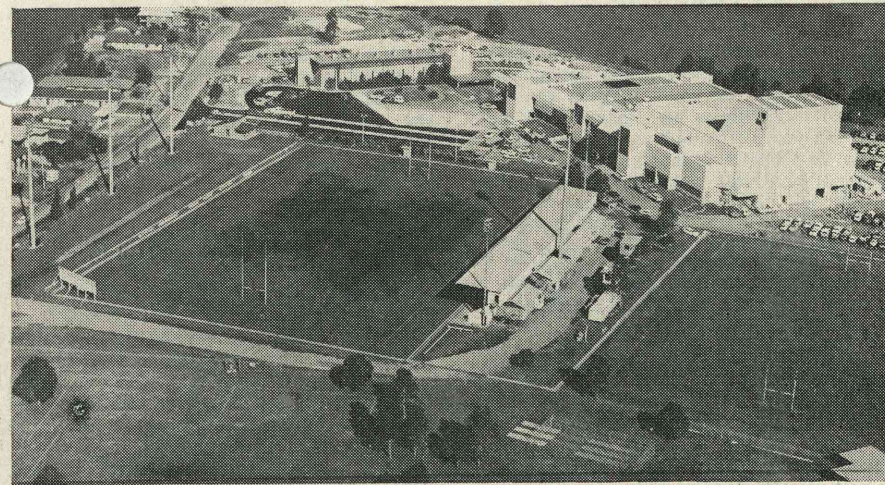
Coast soccer officials were stunned at the response from their rugby league counterparts.

It is understood Seagulls' original offer was that an NSL side could play at their complex for a rent of only \$100. It was almost too good to be true.

Mr. Williamson said this week while a Gold Coast team might play initially at Seagulls a more central coast home-ground would be envisaged. And with more than 180 acres of a new residential development expected to be devoted to sporting facilities, the Gold Coast Federation may acquire a new headquarters.

"Having a Gold Coast team in the national competition has been in the back of our minds all the time. We had discussed it this year but it was felt it wasn't the right time and of course funding was a problem," Mr. Williamson said.

"But once we got things going, in the right economic climate, I think there would be a lot of money on the coast forthcoming for a team in a national competition."

Having listened to and read so much over the past few weeks regarding the proposals for the new Premier and Intermediate Leagues next season, it's no wonder people are confused.

We have heard about the criteria for qualification to these divisions and all the promises from the QSF that these teams will be given three years to fulfill the criteria.

At the beginning of this season the Premier League clubs were given a similar promise by the QSF. Evidently that has been thrown out of the window.

So what guarantee do the clubs have that they will not be in the same position this time next year?

Since 1972 the QSF Brisbane divisions have been changed no less than five times, with clubs winning promotion and getting relegated and Relegation clubs being promoted.

We read in papers and magazines of promises from clubs that if they are given a certain status they would do this and that to their facilities. Four years later we are still all waiting for these ambitious fairytales, which would do the "Brothers Grimm" justice.

The Junior Factor must play a big part in the selection of clubs as it gives the club its depth.

Looking at this point, five of the present Premier teams would find themselves in big trouble. It's a problem some will never cure going by previous attempts to do so.

On a regional basis is is much harder as mentioned in Go Soccer a couple of weeks ago. With the case of Newmarket, Grange, and Brisbane City, being close to each other. one must look at the fact that all these clubs have performed well over the years through senior and junior levels and their supporters are like the leopard who will not change his spots.

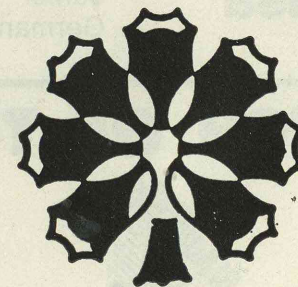
