## SOUTHERN CLUBS EYE QUEENSLAND TALENT

A Melbourne National League club wants to sign Brisbane Lions' Young Socceroo striker Danny Wright and the club is prepared to spend big to get him.

But any deal looks like falling through as 19-year-old Wright wants to stay in Brisbane.

"I have spent too long mucking around. It is time I settled down and finished my trade, got something behind me other than football." he said.

The Melbourne club does not want to be named, at this stage, but it is known the offer has come from one of the four new Melbourne NSL sides.

The initial approach was made to Wright through two intermediaries, one acting on behalf of the club. The other is a Queensland-based soccer identity who has wide contacts among the two Brisbane NSL clubs.

He told GO SOCCER this week that Wright had been recommended to the southern club by a former Queensland coach, now based in Melbourne.

"The club is desperate to gain a striker, but not one who would only serve them for a season or two. They wanted something more long-term and were prepared to pay for Wright," the Brisbane agent said.

"The club figured that even if they had to pay a transfer similar to what Frank Farina went to Canberra for (\$8,800), it would be a good investment in the long term.

"With transfer fees so high in Sydney and Melbourne at the moment, southern clubs are beginning to look elsewhere. Right now Queensland is seen as a bargain basement where good

players can be snapped up for thousands

"Even though this club has missed out on Wright, and I am not sure they have given up yet, there definitely will be other offers. NSL players can be bought in Brisbane for the same price Sydney and Melbourne clubs have to pay for State League transfers."

Wright was very flattered to learn of the southern clubs interest, but was quick to reject the offer.

"At this stage I will be staying in Brisbane for at least two years until I finish my apprenticeship," said Wright, who is an apprentice electrician.

"I figure I have time on my side because in two years I will still be only 21. Heck, if a 21-year-old striker is still not appealling to a Melbourne club then I would not want to go there anyway.

"Tell the club to contact Lions at the end of next season." Wright said.

Brisbane City's Stephen Glockner is a potential target for southern National League clubs.

News has quickly spread south that Glockner, who also was a member of last year's Young Socceroo squad which went to Mexico, is no longed a regular selection in the City NSL team.

Glockner's biggest fans appear to be in Sydney and one coach who has expressed interest is Marconi's and former national coach Les Scheinflug.

"He is a good player, nice touches. I wouldn't mind having him in my squad," Scheinflug told Go Soccer recently.

But the former Young Socceroos coach, who made Glockner a late inclusion in his squad but never played him

in Mexico, said it was unlikely any formal approach would be made at this

Glockner has not expressed publicly any desire to leave Spencer Park, nor has Joe Gilroy, said he wants to sell the youngster.

But it is widely known that Glockner has for a long time wanted to team up again with his former state Youth team striking partner, Danny Wright.

That though seems likely to remain a dream as it would appear neither City nor Lions have the cash or possibly even the inclination — to buy the other half of the "set".

## CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

Go Soccer

A club championship — offering prizes worth thousands of dollars - is set to become one of the highlights of the restructured Queensland soccer competition which is about to kick-off. .....

The championship is a concept used widely in other codes and urges clubs to spread their interests across several teams rather than "putting their eggs in one basket" and concentrate solely on having one good side.

The benefits are obvious.

If a club develops its Reserve and Colts teams, it can expect to produce its own players, rather than having to enter the costly transfer market.

Initially the club championship will apply only to the 10 new Premier League clubs.

## PRE-SEASON IS DISAPPOINTING

Football-wise, this year's pre-season build-up has been one of the poorest for years.

The standard of soccer has been inconsistent and generally bad.

While experimentation and lack of team balance are all part of preseason football, it is obvious many clubs are well behind in their levels of preparation than they were at the same time last season.

The most obvious reason for this is the uncertainty created by the restructuring wrangle. Many clubs were uncertain about their future right up to the new year - hence firm plans in relation to coaching and playing staff could not be finalised.

Even now, with the Premier League set to start within weeks, at least two teams in the top competition are knocking on doors looking for available players.

Fitness, or moreso the lack of it, has been another alarming factor of the pre-season.

It is frightening to see how far some so-called semi-professional players let themselves go during the off-season. Many look overweight and slow - even at National League level.

One pleasing exeception was Rochedale, which under Col Bennett was by far the fittest side of the early matches at Thistle's Coca-Cola Bottlers tournament at Lanham Park.

Brisbane City and the home side totally dominated the tournament, which poorly supported by the other clubs. But then the format should never have been allowed to overlap with other competitions.

The situation arose last Sunday where Brisbane City's NSL team played at Spencer Park at 3 p.m., then by rights should have played at Lanham Park at 6 p.m., as it was the NSL team which won its way to the final.

Naturally, the City Reserves took the park which made a farce of the qualifying rounds.

The biggest disappointment of the XXXX tournament has been the lack of crowds. Seemingly the other clubs feel there is no reason to 'scout' on their rivals and apart from the opening night only meagre groups of supporters from the clubs involved on the night have attended...

Taringa's big showing against Lions, Ipswich's bold effort against City and some high scoring games have been the highlights of the XXXX.

Thankfully, by the time the finals start next week, some of our better sides will be closer to top form.

## OUR SOCCEROO HOPES GET A LUCKY BREAK

The appointment of Frank Arok as the national coach has given a new significance to the interstate clash at Perry Park next month — particularly for the Queenslanders.

Arok, who was appointed to replace Les Scheinflug, will coach N.S.W. in the annual clash against Queensland at soccer headquarters on April 29.

And that means any Socceroo hopefuls in the Queensland team will have the perfect opportunity to impress Arok, and gain a berth in the Australian side for the mid-season international series.

In fact, it could be one of the few opportunities the Queenslanders will get to play in front of Arok. Unlike Scheinflug who, last year was not tied to a club and could attend his selection of NSL games, each weekend between now and the international series Arok will be travelling around Australia with his club side, St. George.

That means, generally he will only see those players his team plays against. Brisbane City are drawn to meet St. George in an NSL fixture in Sydney on April 22 but Lions don't clash with the champions until July 8 — after the international series.

And the best way to do that is to beat New South Wales — and beat them convincingly.

City keeper Kim Wishart, will be one player determined to give a bold showing on April 29. Wishart won his way into Arok's Australian squad for last year's Ttests against England after he performed brilliantly in the interstate clash, which Queensland won 3-0.

Arok watched the game and remembered Wishart's performance when it came to announcing his Socceroos.

But the Queenslanders face a tough battle to gain selection. Already Arok has stated that he expects the majority of his national side to come from NSW.

A Blues' win at Perry Park will only further reinforce that thinking.

The job is certainly ahead of Bruce Stowell and his boys, but from all indications they are set to rise to the challenge. State team training, every Tuesday night, has been a gruelling affair. It has even included fitness work, which stunned one or two players.

With 19 players in the "interim" squad, Stowell can afford to be choosy. Anyone who does not come up to scratch will be dropped — he has made that quite clear.

N.S.W. are gunning for revenge, Queensland needs to win to prove last year was no fluke. Everything augurs for the greatest game of soccer at Perry Park in years.



## STAN IS A LIFE - MAN

Well-known Queensland juniors president, Mr. Stan Dye, has been rewarded for his tireless work by being made a life member of the Queensland Junior Soccer Council.

Stan was awarded the life membership at a surprise presentation at the annual meeting of the QJSC late last year. He also holds life membership of the Redcliffe City Soccer Club and the Brisbane Northern Districts Junior Soccer Association.

In December last year, Stan was tour leader of the Australian junior team which competed in the Oceania tournament in New Zealand.

Stan came to Australia from Britain in 1950 and after playing here for several years became involved in the administrative side of soccer in 1962. In 1963 he formed a junior club in Redcliffe and was president and later secretary of the club until 1969.

In 1970 he was elected onto the management committee of the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association, and served until 1976. During that time for five years he was the representative team

organiser and was appointed secretary for two seasons. He was also team manager and tour leader for the under 15 team to Auckland in 1975.

Stan was a key member of the steering committee which re-organised junior soccer in 1976 and was instrumental in the establishment of the Queensland Junior Soccer Council.

He was secretary of the QJSC from 1978-79 and president from 1980 to 83. He has been Queensland representative on the National Junior Soccer Council since 1980 and now is president of the body.

Stan is predicting big things ahead for the juniors and with FIFA talking about a world under 16 championship in the not too distant future, he believes Australia will soon prove to the world that our youngsters are as talented as any others.

Everyone in Brisbane is talking about the Brisbane Bullets—our National League basketball team that is sweeping all before them and sitting high on the table.

But how many people know how the NBL works? How many in the sellout crowds they have been getting at Auchenflower know that the competition is split into two "conferences"?

And how many know that the Bullets are in the Eastern Conference, yet still play an Adelaide team? Or that a Tasmanian team is in the western Conference with the Perth sides?

Who knows? Who cares?

And that is precisely the point the two National Soccer League clubs here in Queensland should be driving home.

Who cares who we are grouped with, or in what order we play our opponents. The vital, oh so vital, thing for City and Lions to do is to win or at least enter-

tain at all costs in the first year of the new format.

The average supporter doesn't look any further than next week's game, he doesn't need to. All he wants to know is who his team is playing that weekend and whether a win will get his side any closer to the honours.

Let's forget about all the ballyhoo and promote each game on a week to week basis and put all our efforts into winning more games in Brisbane, or playing excitingly enough to make the spectators come back.

With success, comes interest. And with interest comes knowledge. Those who want to know how the new format works will find out themselves. Most people just want good football.

A big rap over the knuckles to whoever's decision it was to announce the state squad BEFORE the derby. Even if the squad had been picked a week before it made good sense, and good PR, to make it look like the derby had been taken into consideration. For my money, the best forward in Brisbane at the moment is Acacia Ridge's Michael Gerritsen. Put alongside an experienced player, like say Bob Mountford, the youngster could be a real sensation. How Lions ever let him go is beyond me.

It's the way a lot of other rep. teams here and overseas do it and perhaps worth a try next time.

Still, as a Queenslander I am behind Stowell. He is undoubtedly the best man in the Staate at the moment to get a result against the Blues.

If it hasn't already, the bubble is about to burst at Lions. And when it does it's going to be with a loud bang.

## IT'S A LONG ROAD TO MEXICO FOR THE CUP

The Socceroos, under new national coach Frank Arok, this season begin their long quest to gain a place in the World Cup finals — after failing to qualify for the past two tournaments.

The finals are to be held in Mexico in 1986 from May 31 to June 29. More than 120 countries have entered the competition, and with the exception of Mexico (the hosts) and Italy (the holders), must qualify in matches around the world over the next two years.

Australia is drawn in the Oceania group with New Zealand, Taiwan and Israel. The four teams will play each other twice in a league system in Ausrtalia and New Zealand.

The winner of the group enters a two-match play-off against the runnerup of the European supplementary group for a place in the finals.

The dates for the first qualifying matches have not yet been announced, but at least one game could be played in Brisbane.

## THE DRAW

EUROPE: (13 teams qualify to join Italy, the title holders, as Europe's 14 representatives in finals):

Group One: Poland, Belgium, Greece, Albania (Winner Qualifies).

Group Two: West Germany, Czechoslovakia, Sweden, Portugal, Malta (Winner and Runner-up qualify).

**Group Three:** England, Northern Ireland, Romania, Turkey, Finland (Winner and Runner-up qualify).

Group Four: France, Yugoslavia, East Germany, Bulgaria, Luxembourg (Winner and Runner-up qualify).

Group Five: Austria, Hungary, Netherlands, Cyprus (Winner qualifies).

Group Six: Soviet Union, Denmark, Ireland, Switzerland, Norway (Winner and Runner-up qualify).

. Group Seven: Spain, Scotland, Wales, Iceland (Winner qualifies).

Teams in each European group will play each other twice in a home-and-away league system of matches to be staged between next May 1 and November 15, 1985.

Runners-up in groups one, five and seven will play off for a place in the finals. The runner-up in this play-off will meet the winner of the Oceania Qualifying tournament in a play-off for the remaining place in the finals.

SOUTH AMERICA: (Four teams qualify for finals):

London bookmakers are in no doubt as to the ultimate destination of the World Cup in 1986 and have installed Brazil as 7-2 favourites.

Other prices include: 5-1 Argentina; 6-1 West Germany; 7-1 Italy; 8-1 Uruguay; 12-1 Belgium; 14-1 Netherlands & France; 16-1 Soviet Union & England.

Group One: Argentina, Peru, Colombia, Venezuela.

Group Two: Uruguay, Chile, Ecuador. Group Three: Brazil, Paraguay, Bolivia.

Winners of each group qualify. Runnersup in each group together with the third-placed team in group one play off for the fourth qualifying place.

ASIA: Two teams will qualify from 27 countries placed in four groups, with each group having two sub-groups. Sub-group winners will play-off to be group winners and the four group winners will clash to decide the two finalists.

NORTH AND CENTRAL AMERICA AND CARIBBEAN: One team must qualify from 17 countries to join Mexico as the area's two representatives. Matches will be played, home and away in three groups, then the three group winners will meet home and away to decide the team to join Mexico.

. AFRICA: Two teams will qualify from 29 countries which will play straight knockout games in three groups. The draw is worked that 16 teams will remain after the first round of matches, and will continue the knockout series to produce two finalists.

The captain of the Belgian national side, Eric Gerets, has sparked another football scandal in Brussells by telling an inquiry that Standard Liege won the Belgian league title two years ago by bribing their opponents. Gerets, who captained Standard Liege at the time, said he was asked by the president of his club to offer (about) \$7000 to Waterschei to throw a final round fixture which Standard Liege needed to win to secure the title. Under Belgian law bribing is not criminal and Gerets has not been charged, but his club AC Milan has suspended him until the matter is cleared.

Football Association officials are awaiting confirmation that England has been discarded as candidates for staging the 1990 World Cup.

Italy and the Soviet Union are vying to hold the tournament and FIFA has said a decision would be made on May 19. Greece looks to have lost the chance because it cannot meet ground requirements.

cuffs — only once during the period.

England manager Bobby Robson described the new design as "chic".

"It gives a new prominence to the badge and mixes simplicity with originality. It's a new shirt for a new breed of player," he said.

The manager of the U.S. Olympic team, Manfred Schellscheidt has been sacked "for economic reasons". He is to be replaced by Alkis Panagoulas, who previously had been in charge of the U.S. National team. The new manager will have a two year contract worth \$100,000.

Under Schellscheidt, the American team played a total of 34 games in preparation for the Olympics, but results were disappointing as they won nine, lost 11 and drew 14.

A suggestion that Liverpool and Everton fans be allowed to mix during the Milk Cup (League Cup) final at Wembley has been rejected.

A Spanish newspaper has called English FA secretary Ted Crocker as the "first English vandal." The paper criticises Croker for "blaming the problems in Paris and elsewhere on provocation by the Continentals of the poor English supporters." The paper also reports that two Manchester United supporters are still in jail in Spain after riots in Valencia last year.

## **HOW THE NSL WORKS**

Are you having trouble understanding how the new format for the National League competition works? Then you're not on your own.

But the format is not that complex, just different from what we are used to.

It was necessary for the NSL's administration to alter the league for a number of reasons. It was decided to split the competition into two "conferences" (divisions if you like) for the following reasons:

To maximise club income and spectator interest through more local derbies.

To reduce the spiralling costs of air travel.

To retain the national identity of the competition.

Basically, there are two 12-team conferences. The Brisbane teams are in the National Conference. The conferences were not decided on geographically, but in a way to be economically sound and please the majority of clubs.

In understanding the fixture program, the idea of regular home and away matches must be dismissed. This is not practical in an Australia national league.

The two Brisbane teams play all other teams in their conference once — with the exception of the two Adelaide sides, which we do not meet in the normal fixture program because of the air costs involved.

The Brisbane teams also play all teams in the other conference once. Finally, Lions and City play each other four times, to give a total of 22 matches.

As a supplement to the season there will be three intra-conference challenges staggered throughout the season. That is, the top team in a conference plays the second team into its conference, 3 v 4 and so on.

Three inter-conference challenges will also be played periodically. In these matches the top team in one conference

will play the top team in the other, 2 v 2 and so on.

Points won in a challenge match are added to a team's tally in its own conference table.

The format is unique, and the program for the Brisbane teams is different from that for the Sydney sides, those in Melbourne or even Newcastle and Canberra.

But for the National League to survive a special program had to be invented.

While the idea is novel, the basic principles are not. At the end of the season, the teams which win the most matches will still be at the top of the table.

Each conference this year will play a top five finals series. The two teams which win the conference play-offs will clash in the Australian final.

Easy, isn't it?

## A NEW CUP

The 1984 NSL Cup will be played during the one month break scheduled for May-June, set aside for international matches.

The format will be similar to the World Cup where the 24 NSL clubs will be divided into six groups of four teams. Each group will play a round robin. The six group winners and the best two runners-up will go into the next round which will become a straight knockout.

The Brisbane sides, Lions and City are in Group Four with Marconi and Sydney Croatia.

Once again, venues for all Cup matches will be allocated by the NSL management committee. But it is expected Cup matches will be scheduled in cities outside of those where international games are being played on any particular weekend.

## A LONG WAIT FOR (

For seven years Sydney Croatia have been a force in the New South Wales State League but have steadfastly refused to come into the national competition while it meant a name change.

But this year, the Australian Soccer Federation has eased it rules on the use of ethnic names and Croatia have finally taken their place in the National League.

And backed by a huge, fervent soccerloving community, Sydney Croatia are set to eventually become one of Australia's great clubs.

## FOR CROATIA

Former Socceroo Atti Abonyi — Australia's alltime leading scorer in international matches — is back at 'the helm of Sydney Croatia and has promised attacking football at Spencer Park this weekend.

Sydney Croatia basically has the same side as that which won the NSW grand final last year, in a replay against Melita Eagles. Honors before that includes grand final sucesses in 1977 and 1982 and championship victories in 1977, 78, 79, 81 and 82.
