HOW WE COMPARED . . .

Although Queensland were beaten 2-0 in the interstate clash with New South Wales at Perry Park last weekend, Maroons coach Bruce Stowell still maintains several of his players should be in Frank Arok's national squad.

Go Soccer last weekend put the form-scope on six players. Three from New South Wales who are likely to be included in the Australian squad, and three from Queensland who have been overlooked.

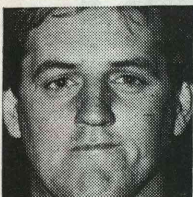
We fitted Kim Wishart (Qld) against Terry Greedy (NSW), the two goalkeepers; Alan Niven (QLD) against (Graham Jennings), the two leftbacks

and Frank Pimblett (QLD) against Peter Raskopoulos (NSW), two midfielders.

And despite the scoreline the statistics tend to show that individually the players were very much on a par. That in itself reinforces the theory that some players are considered better, only because they play in Sydney.

Here's what the formscope saw, and how Go Soccer interpreted the figures.

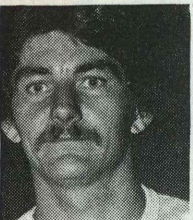

The statistics show that neither keeper was peppered with shots and the majority of their work was taking crosses either from the corners. Both dealt with them competently. Wishart lost possession twice, through a bad kick and dropping the ball, and appeared fractionally slow to react to the near post cross from which Kosmina scored. But overall there was little between the two.

VERDICT: Take another look Frank.

Both players had fine games. Although the statistics tend not to highlight it, Jennings was much more productive with his constant attacking forays. Undoubtedly both players are among the best in their positions and the statistics show they both have workrates akin to those of a midfielder.

VERDICT: Equalled but not bettered, so Jennings deserves his spot.

Both players became highly involved in the game and were very effective in their distribution. There downfalls were that neither player got into enough attacking positions, which was needed to open the game up, although no doubt both were under instruction to stabilise their midfield. A disappointing feature was the lack of aggression by both players, as shown but the lack of tackles.

VERDICT: Nice passes are pretty but Australia needs midfielders wanting to go somewhere.

A FINANCIAL WIN!

Queensland may have lost on the field to New South Wales last weekend, but match financially proved to be a winner for the state.

Although Queensland Soccer Federation Officials did not release exact gate figures or takings, it is understood the returns even stunned some QSF Officials.

"All I can say is it has been one of the best gates we have ever taken," one official said.

Final figures will not be known for some months as many loose ends need to be finalised.

While the gate takings were high, so too were the costs for the promotion. New South Wales are one of the most expensive teams to play in Australia.

The QSF also invested heavily in promotion of the match, an investment which obviously paid off as was proved by the huge crowd, which was estimated by some QSF officials to be in excess of 5000.

A SOCCER SHIELD FORMAT?

Some of Queensland's leading soccer officials have suggested a Claxton Shield or Sheffield Shield-type interstate soccer series as a replacement, or compliment to the National League.

The suggestions, which have been made at various times in the past, have come to the fore again following the successful interstate match promotion last weekend.

It seems opponents and supporters of the idea agree, interest in interstate football is on the way up.

Under baseball's Claxton Shield system, the state teams would gather in one city at the end of each season and play a round robin tournament, possibly in two groups over seven or 10 days culminating in an All-Australian final.

The venue for the series would be rotated around the capitals.

Opponents of the scheme say costs would outweigh returns with matches like South Australia v Queensland in Melbourne attracting paltry crowds. They also say it would be up to six or seven years between hosting the finals if every capital was given a turn.

The other suggestion is a Sheffield Shield competition with certain weekend's set aside where state teams would host or travel to other states.

Eventually through the year each state would have played the other at least once with the two teams at the top of the table playing in the final — probably on a home and away basis.

Queensland Soccer Federation president, Ald. Ian Brusasco, is loathe to commit himself to either plan but makes one point quite clear.

"Interstate matches are the only fair and true way from which to pick Australian teams. A good player can suffer from being in a poor team at National League level and may never gain the recognition he deserves," Ald. Brusasco said.

"No-one knows the players in his state better than that state's coach and by putting the best in one state against the best from another, the national coach has the cream of Australian soccer put before him in a top class situation."

"Any scheme which promotes more interstate football must be looked at seriously".

The Brisbane Select team named for last weekend's interstate match curtain-raiser certainly raised a few eyebrows.

But many did not realise the behind the scenes reasons which influenced selections.

The match was in fact a trial for several Queensland Youth team hopefuls while Richmond-Tweed had asked for a match against a primarily young side as they too were trialling Youth players.

For those reasons, Tony Buesnel picked players he considered would assist and encourage the youngsters on the park.

Fair enough, with that in mind, any criticism of the team was well off target.

But the interest that was created when it was announced a Brisbane team would be named, surely highlights the need for more representative football.

A Brisbane team, excluding National League players, would give the best in the Premier League an extra incentive.

Whether the SF pits the team against Ipswich in a Kruger Cup match, or seeks opponents from intra and interstate federations and associations, would have to be decided at a later date.

But the interest is there and it is about time Premier League players were given more for which to aim than the Rothman's medal.

The Queensland team may not have won last weekend's interstate clash but they did the maroon proud.

Few like to lose but our boys can take heart in the fact that a near-national side could only score two goals against them.

The Queensland squad, and in particular its coach Bruce Stowell deserve a huge pat on the back.

Well done fellows, there's always next year.

Footscray have never been one of the more fashionable sides of the National League and they did nothing to better their reputation when they played Lions at Richlands recently. One player turned out in red socks, while all his teammates wore white. Then he treated sitting on the bench like a day at the beach, spending most of the time sunbaking with his shirt off.

Whispers around town suggest two clubs have banded together to submit letters of complaint over one recent refereeing performance which prompted people to count those players who didn't get a caution.

It seems if Queensland doesn't look after its own players, no-one else will. Despite the fact that Lions were playing in Melbourne last Wednesday, Socceroo squad member Danny Wright was booked on a flight back to Melbourne on Thursday morning which would have gotten him to the national squad training camp that day more than an hour late. Thankfully, QSF officials rebooked flights which saw Wright go down on the Wednesday and stay overnight — obviously the sensible thing to do.

Gary Bromfield certainly had a happy birthday in Sydney recently. Not only did he score in City's 2-1 win over St. George, he played brilliantly at leftback to catch the eye of national coach Frank Arok then won money on the pokies in the St. George club.

Contrary to a lot of suggestions, it was fog which caused the abandonment of the Intermediate League game between Sunnyside and Mitchelton at Rocklea recently. Mitchy's Tony Lowndes says it was the first time he had ever been "fogged off."

One prominent club secretary was rather embarrassed when he turned up at a southside ground to find his team was actually playing out in the western suburbs. The same person was heard only days later attempting to get a game at a rival club. Strange behaviour indeed.

It was interesting to note the number of Premier and intermediate League people at the National League matches over Easter and Anzac Day, which did not clash with the local games played on the Saturday and Monday. One wonders whether they would become regular NSL spectators if they had the opportunity each weekend.

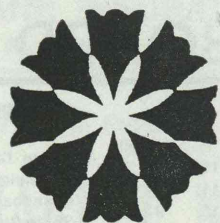
