## TOP CLUBS HERE FOR A SOCCER EXTRAVAGANZA!

The biggest soccer tournament staged in Australia since the 1981 world youth championship finals will begin next week.

Teams from five countries will play for lucrative prizemoney in matches in six centres around the country.


The teams who will play include Manchester United and Nottingham Forest from England, Scotland's Glasgow Rangers, Italy's Juventus, Greece's Iraklis and an Australia and Australia

The matches scheduled for Brisbane are: May 31 — Australia B v Glasgow Rangers, Lang Park, 8 p.m.; June 7 -Australia v Nottingham Forest, Lang Park 8 p.m.; June 13 - Australia B v Iraklis, Lang Park, 8 p.m.

While Manchester United will not play in Brisbane, they will have a training camp on the Gold Coast for four days from May 21.

Manchester United were formed in 1878 as Newton Heath and kept that name until 1902 when the present name was adopted.

The club plays at Old Trafford where the ground capacity is 58,504. The record attendance was 76,962 for Wolverhampton v Grimsby in an FA Cup semi-final in

The club record is 70,504 for a match against Aston Villa in 1920.

The club's manager is Ron Atkinson and president, Sir Matt Busby, a former manager.

The club's nickname is "Red Devils". Club colours are red, white and black. The change strip is primarily white.

Manchester United won the First Division championship in 1908, 1911, 1952, 1956, 1957, 1965 and 1967. They were FA Cup winners in 1909, 1948, 1963, 1977 and 1983.

Manchester United won the European Cup in 1968, the first English club to take the trophy.

The club boasts a string of international players. Leading names, although

Amid all the speculation of picking Brisbane and Premier League Select sides, Go Soccer's GREG RUSSELL has found a team which would provide a real match for the Queensland side.

## FORMER NSL PLAYERS ARE LOGICAL STATE SIDE MATCH

The Queensland Soccer Federation has a top class opponent for its Queensland team — and a side which would draw supporters from all quarters — right under its own nose.

The team is one comprising former National League players now playing in the Premier and Intermediate Leagues.

The two competitions provide a selection base of nearly 30 players — just as many as what state coach Bruce Stowell had when picking his Maroon side from the two NSL sides.

And Go Soccer believes from those 30. a team could - and should - be picked to play an end of season exhibition match.

The potential within the Premier League and Intermediate Leagues is vast, and many of the ex-NSL players now with clubs in the two competitions are not necessarily there because they are in the twilight of their careers.

Changes of coaches, or simply a desire to change clubs, have forced many out of the national spotlight.

Go Soccer believes, that given the opportunity, many would rise to their exciting best for a match against the Queensland side.

In picking a team to play Queensland, Go Soccer's experts believe there was merit in Frank Arok's system to field five across the back.

The tough central defence effectively blots out the long ball forward. And when the team wants to go on the attack, the two fullbacks are pushed forward at will.

Because a five-man defence takes a player from the forward line, a Joe Watson-type player — a winger who has the workrate to drop back effectively into the midfield — had to be found.

The Queensland team also lost out to the fine finishing of John Kosmina in the recent interstate match, and although a player of that calibre was hard to find among the former NSL players in the Premier and Intermediate Leagues, we chose a striker who could be equally hard to handle.

Taking the Arok — NSW blueprint as a guide, the side we opted for to take on Queensland was: Nigel Lownds. (Rochedale R.); Kevin

# **GO** SOCCER

On the surface, the restructuring of the Queensland Soccer Federation's competitions appears to be an outstanding success.

It seems a new enthusiasm has been sparked in to the Premier League, and at many grounds, the crowds seem to be coming back.

The competition has not, as many predicted, turned into a two horse race and the unpredictability of many matches has captured the imagination of many soccer followers.

But it would be foolish for QSF and club officials to settle back and consider all the work has been done.

The time to plan for the future is while things are going well.

The federation and the clubs should begin now to assess what they have done - and more importantly what needs to be done.

It even may not be too bad an idea to call together representatives of the 10 Premier League clubs for a "working conference" at which steps could be taken to solve any minor problems. Concrete plans for the future should be outlined.

Similarly, those clubs which are finding the new competition a great success could offer hints and help to any club which was struggling.

The point is, it is time soccer stopped its day by day planning which many of our administrators at all levels are prone to do.

The break, and seemingly the right break, has been made with the restructuring and now all efforts should be channelled to get on with the job.

The restructuring of the federation administration should be completed as quickly as possible, because therein lies the key to the ultimate success of the bold steps taken last year.

And even if the two NSL clubs return to the local competition, as our story speculated last week, then contingency plans to accommodate them should be formulated now.

The last thing we want is a public row at the end of this season.

The restructuring was never going to be easy, but it seems many clubs are getting on top of the work load.

It would be a waste of time to let ourselves slip back now.

# Points to ponder

The Queensland players were given an extra reward after the state game when it was decided they could keep their jerseys, a practice not afforded to state teams for many seasons. Sabre's Jimmy Rogers deserves a special mention for the shirts, which were undoubtedly the most stunning worn by a state soccer team.

Word has it that a well-known local goalkeeper may quit the game unless he is given a fair go in the first team of his new club. It seems the keeper has copped the blame for some recent defeats, yet the problem is elsewhere on the field.

Look for some upset results in the lower divisions as the OSF attempts to clear the backlog of washed out matches by scheduling mid-week games. Already it is evident some clubs have opted to field "mixed" teams featuring key players from higher divisions sides in their re-scheduled matches. "Stacking" might provide instant results, but in the long run the offenders can only be cheating themselves.

Despite the number of yellow cards handed out by Brisbane referees of late, one of our men in black was chipped after handling a game in the south recently for not handling out more cautions! The poor refs just can't win.

Last week I watched several of the training sessions held at Perry Park for the members of the Queensland Youth team, who are playing in the national championships in Canberra this week.

The squad, while possibly not THE best we have ever sent away, nonetheless contained some very talented players.

But what concerned me was the fact that I was the only "outsider" at the training sessions.

Although the squad contained five boys from the country - and one of them was picked as captain — I did not see one "talent scout" from either of the NSL clubs.

At the championships this week I would be very surprised if Canberra's Doug Collins, Sydney City's Eddie Thomson, St. George's Frank Arok and probably others were not seen poking around the various games.

And I would like to bet there isn't a representative from either City or Lions there.

You would think the clubs would learn from the Manis Lomons and Frank Farina episodes.

The top 128 19-year-old players are in the one place at the one time. It is the perfect opportunity to look at the best youngsters from the non-NSL states - players who probably would cost nothing to sign, yet could be stars of the future.

Surely the two Brisbane clubs can see the benefit of spending money now to send a scout to Canberra to save money in the future.

For those who follow South American football, Sportivo Luqueno of Paraguay Drew 0-0 with Estudiantes de la Plata of Argentina in a group one qualifying match of the Libertadores Cup, the South American soccer club championship.

Olmpia of Paraguay, having played two matches, lead the standings with three points. Independiente of Argentina have three points after three matches, Estuliantes two points after two matches and Sportivo Luqueno two points after three matches.

Cameroun and Algeria, the surprise packets of the Spain World Cup, drew 0-0 in a semi-final of the African Nations Cup. Cameroun won 5-4 on penalties and now meets Nigeria in the final. Nigeria beat Egypt 8-7 on penalties in their semi-final after being locked at 2-2 at the end of extra-time.

Halifax Town will go part-time next season. The club plans to retain its present squad of 14 players but only half of them will be full-time professionals. Only 911 fans — the lowest gate in the clnub's history — watched a recent Tuesday night Fourth Division game against Chester at Halifax, although the home side had lost only once in its previous nine fixtures.

Borussia Moenchengladbach midfielder Lothar Matthaeus will play for tabletopping Bayern Munich next year. Bayern, who will be without Italy-bound Karl-Heinz Rummenigge next year, are expected to pay over two million marks (about \$7780,000 Aust.) for 23-year-old Matthaeus.

West Ham, threatened with expulsion from the next two FA Cups, because of crowd mis-behaviour, has begun to compile dossiers on well-known troublemakers and could impose life bans on the wayward supporters.
