GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Soccer was the unlucky victim of last week's attempted international series boycott by the National League.

The move was irresponsible, ill-timed and totally unnecessary. The National League attempted to hold Australian soccer to ramson.

The headlines the NSL managed to grab did little more than further tarnish soccer's already shaky credibility.

Thankfully, the boycott fell flat on its face, and the players who were made to be the meat in the sandwich carried on refusing to become entangled in the game's politics.

But the fact that the NSL clubs should be moved to take such drastic action highlights that there are problems of serious proportions behind the scenes.

It is extremely difficult to editorialise on those problems when the full facts are not known. And these days in Australian soccer everything seems to be done behind a veil of secrecy.

It is doubtful if many of the facts will ever surface. But one group should not attempt to gain an advantage by embarrassing Australia in the eyes of the soccer world.

It is not surprising FIFA refuses to give Oceania full voting rights when stories of in-fighting, upheavals and discontent continually filter out of Australia.

But the NSL cannot be held totally to blame.

The Australian Soccer Federation and its marketing company seemingly have no regard for the financial difficulties in which some clubs presently find themselves.

In most cases, the clubs have themselves to blame - mainly through paying inflated transfer fees and huge wages. But if just one NSL club goes to the wall this season, it will reflect on the whole of Australian soccer, not just the National League.

It is high time, and it has been said many times before, that officials at all levels began working for the code and not for themselves or their own little part of the game.

Officials on both sides of the present argument should be tolerant and understanding of each other's problems and complaints.

Drastic action such as that taken last week should never be necessary. Such folly threats should be made only behind closed doors, if at all.

If the present crop of ASF and NSL officials cannot work together for the advancement of soccer in Australia, then they should get out, and let people who can take over.

Points to ponder

Bill Bryant's Redlands Intermediate cream stick in their minutes this week League team have been winning praise almost everywhere they play of late. But one particularly high accolade came last week from Ipswich United coach Matt Carson, whose side had to pull out all stops to come from a goal behind to win their Ampol Cup match 3-1. "They are the best side I have seen so far this season," Carson said.

Surely the quote of the week came from a daily newspaper editor on seeing the banner headlines on a story about the threatened NSL player boycott. "When soccer declares peace, then we will have a big story," he said.

Running Queensland soccer is an unenviable job, but one recent Thursday afternoon must have been particularly hectic for the Perry Park staff. The team was caught taking an "energy food" break. Anyone who gets an ice will now know why.

Brisbane Lions youngster Steve Fulton. who has turned in some promising performances at NSL level over the past few weeks, must be one of the unluckiest players around at the moment. Steve was just three days too old to be considered for the present crop of youth players being groomed for the world championships in Chile next year.

The re-arrangement of Australia's qualifying path for the Wexico World Cup finals has ended any chance of what could have been a promoter's dream. Under the old system there was a real likelihood Australia could have been pitted against Greece for a place in the final 24. Imagine staging Australia versus Greece, the winner to go to Mexico, in Melbourne. Tickets would be as sought after as those for a VFL final. Barring an upset Australia will now probably meet Scotland or Spain.

THE PAIN OF MISSING SELECTION By GREG RUSSELL

Brisbane Lions striker Danny Wright has revealed he played in pain in attempt to hold his place in the Australian A squad which this week is taking on some of the best club sides in the world.

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Wright played two games for Lions, despite knowing his ankle injury was not healed, before conceding the injury had beaten him.

"I didn't want injections, but I took painkillers," Wright said.
"I knew I had to play because all

the other strikers in the squad were playing well and scoring goals. I know that if I had taken a complete rest I would have been overlooked anyway. I had to give it a go"

Wright, who was Queensland's only selection in the Australian A and B squads which are now taking on Manchester United, Glasgow Rangers. Juventus, Nottingham Forest and Iraklis, injured his ankle in the replayed derby with Brisbane City.

And he blames long studs for the injury.

"I had put the longer studs in the previous Sunday because of the wet weather. I left them in for Perry Park, but the ground was much harder than I expected.

"I can remember getting my legs tangled with Steve Perry, but my tags gripped and my ankle dug in as my leg went over," he said.

Wright severely tore tendons on both

sides of his ankle in the fall.

"I knew straight away it was serious, it is the worst injury I have ever had," Wright said.

But it took several weeks for the former Young Socceroo to believe that himself.

"Looking back I now wish someone would have just told me to forget

about playing and rest the injury. But everyone left it up to me to decide if I could play, and of course I kept thinking I could play through the pain," Wright said.

Although Wright will be the most disappointed player in Australia when the Socceroos take on Rangers at Lang Park this week and Nottingham Forest on June 7, the youngster has not given up hope of wearing the green and gold again.

"I though if I made the Australian squad I wouldn't have played in the starting line-up anyway. But I fancied my chances as coming on as a reserve.

"I just hope Frank Arok hasn't forgotten about me and I am still part of his world Cup plans," Wright said.

After specialist treatment, Wright hopes to resume light running this week. And although he scoffs at suggestions he could be sidelined for up to six weeks, he admits the injury is a week by week proposition.

"This time I won't play until it is completely right. Then I hope to get back in the Lions team and start scoring goals. This has been my biggest set-back ever but I am determined to bounce back.

"I have learned my lesson with injuries and at 20 I've got time on my side. I want to play for Australia and I hope this is the last of my bad luck," Wright said.

With both National League Clubs recently re-assessing their striking power, Go Soccer's MARK BRIGDEN put the Formscope on two possible NSL candidates from the Premier League.

OUR BACKYARD IS FULL OF IN-FORM STRIKERS!

The answer to Brisbane City and Lions' present goalscoring problems is in the Premier League.

The League is abound with strikers, who with the right coaching and given the right opportunities, could make a go of NSL.

While neither club could afford to buy every striker who shows potential in the lower league, nor would it be practical, perhaps certain players' ability to make the transition could be assessed by them training with the National League clubs one night a week.

In the main, the striking forces of both NSL clubs are local players who were given the opportunity they deserved.

To bring in new players is not to question the ability of Calvin Daunt or Danny Wright at Lions or Stephen Glockner and Lee Scriggins at City.

But these players need to play off a more aggressive hard-working striker to be more effective.

A Barry Kelso-type player is needed to harass opposition defences enough to create the opportunities for others.

The two most aggressive strikers in the Premier League at the moment are Gary Bohan, of Mount Gravatt and Steve Gallagher of Acacia Ridge. The opportunity was taken for a direct comparison under the Formscope, when their respective clubs met recently.

The statistics show both strikers had similar games, with Bohan faring marginally better (although his team was on top territorially).

There is no doubt though that Steve Gallagher has the ability to make a success of the target man position at either of the NSL clubs. He is good in the air, holds the ball well, tackles

tenaciously and has a hard shot. However an adjustment period could be needed.

But Gary Bohan could walk into the National League tomorrow. He has years of experience playing in one of Brisbane's most successful teams and he has the ability to worry the top defenders.

His goal in the Formscope match showed great skill. He controlled a long ball with his chest, swivelled and volleyed in one movement. His shot gave the in-form Brett Beves no chance despite being hit from the edge of the penalty area.

Bohan has one other attribute that is a pre-requisite for a targetman in the National League — toughness.

In the past there has always been a question mark over Bohan's attitude to play NSL. But he is a much more mature and responsible player this season. His sheer commitment alone would be an asset to either of the NSL clubs.

Obviously the movement of any player between the Premier League and NSL can only work if the clubs involved are responsible to the players and to each other.

But acceptable deals can be found in loan arrangements with player swaps and contracts with clauses for further future payment.

Clubs like Mount Gravatt, Ipswich United and perhaps a few others are comparable to any NSW or Victorian State League sides, yet any player plucked from teams in those competitions are considered stars.

Let's start looking in our own backyard first.

When the NSL clubs finally wipe the egg off their faces after last week's boycott debacle, they might get on with the job of trying to promote soccer in Australia rather than destroy it.

Many club officials have been critical of Gordon Nicholson and his zest in handing out yellow cards of late. But their criticism was way off the mark in the NSL Cup derby last week. Nicholson went to great lengths to warn several players, mainly about foul language. And when he did pull the card it was for two wild tackles, one blatantly from behind and after the ball had been played. The match was an aggressive one and Nicholson should be commended for maintaining a firm grip. In fact, he probably lost marks from any inspector for not sending a very prominent player off for what amounted to an open-fisted punch behind play.

Talking to a few National League players recently, it is easy to understand their anxiety over the future of the national competition.

Many of the present players in both teams are set to be left on the shelf, so to speak.

Consider their predicament. If City and Lions go back to the local competition the players will be asked to take wage cuts of up to 200 percent. Those that don't want to do that, or want to continue their football in the higher competition in Sydney, will ask to go on the transfer list.

To recoup their losses, the clubs are certain to slap big transfer fees on the better players. Even after appeals players like Danny Wright, Frank Pimblett etc. won't get away for any less than \$10.000.

How many Sydney clubs will pay \$10,000 for a Queenslander?

F. A. S. T. - Ipswich clubs are rarely mentioned when contemporary, capable and powerful clubs are discussed. Why? It could be that they do not rate comment.

Brisbane parochialism condemns any club outside of a 10 mile radius of Perry Park

as "Boys from the Bush".

This article is written in defence of all IPSWICH clubs, but in particular in defence of Ipswich United (St. Helens) and Coalstars. It highlights the performance of those clubs in four vital areas. They are: Facilities; Administration; Supporters; Team strength.

Comparisons can easily be drawn between

clubs using F.A.S.T.

Facilities: Excluding the NSL clubs, only Taringa matches the development at Ebbw Vale and Bundamba. For overall facilities only Grange Thistle is superior to both.

Administration: Ipswich administrations are a much maligned group. They have performed more than creditably in the past five years. For instance, Ipswich United have held the code's best sponsor, Jacaranda, for that period. Coalstars have also held a very good sponsor First Provincial for almost as long. Can any Brisbane club equal them?

Supporters: Unquestionably the most fierc-

ely loyal in Queensland.

Teams: Ipswich United has for seven years been a regular top four or Ampol Cup finalist. Coalstars have returned to top grade and have completely rebuilt their side.

Who could ask for more?

Apply the F.A.S.T. criterion to other clubs. Facilities — Grange are better; Administration — Perhaps Olympic for the speed of development; Supporters - Ipswich clubs by a mile; Teams - Clearly Mt. Gravatt has a better track record.

F.A.S.T. says that by today's standards Ipswich clubs are in better shape than most of their Brisbane counterparts. Win, lose or draw this season, everyone knows that Ipswich Utd. and Coalstars are here to stay. Are all other clubs so certain?

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WORLD SOCCER SERIES SNIPPETS

Although Frank Worthington is touring with Manchester United, he will not sign for the club.

The 35-year-old former England striker, has gone on a free transfer from Southampton to Brighton.

Worthington, who has made a total of 692 league appearances, scoring 220 goals, is on a year's contract and Brighton becomes his eighth league club.

Worthington said: "I left Southampton because of a personal disagreement with Lawrie McMenemy and, although I will be going on a tour of Australia with Manchester United, I will return to Brighton a week early."

A Video to coincide with the Manchester United tour — called The Manchester United Story — will be available in Brisbane from June 11. The tape, which will be available in both formats and will sell for \$39,95, will detail the history of the club and feature all its big games.

Lou Macari, the only member of the Manchester United side to previously tour Australia, has been offered the post of manager of Derby County.

Macari was notified of the offer in Hong Kong and decided to return to England for further discussions.

Macari, who was recently given a testinmonial by United, was to have guested for Marconi after the international tournament.

United by the way, won their match in Hong Kong 4-2.

Prior to the tour of Australia, Rangers had lost only three matches since manager Jock Wallace returned to the club from English outfit Leicester City six months ago.


But according to Wallace, that was three matches too many and he is not keen to build the total while in Australia.
