GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

At the Sydney Cricket Ground last week, two of the world's greatest clubs — Manchester United and Juventus — clashed in what was billed the Rietch of the Century.

As it turned out, the two sides played an uneventful scoreless draw which was broken only by a late decision to take penalty kicks.

Although both teams were keen to win, their on-field performances were nothing out of the ordinary. And that in itself raises an interesting point.

Are we over-rating overseas teams and being far too critical of our own sides?

The football we see weekly from Britain and Europe is packaged highlights—the best 15 or so minutes. Similarly, we only ever see the big Cup finals and not some of the more unimpressive earlier round matches.

What Manchester United and Juventus gave the Australian public was no better, and in fact at times worse, than the football played over the past month by the Australia A and B sides.

Yet the fans cheered, waved flags and fired sky-rockets. When Australia played a scoreless draw with Manchester United, they were booed off the field.

It is high time Australian soccer supporters took a positive attitude towards the game here. If they appreciate the game, then they should be looking to remember the good aspects of matches, and not complain about some of the not so impressive patches.

A team is not going to play brilliantly every time — Manchester United and Juventus proved that. And it also holds true for the Socceroos, a National League side. a Premier League team or even a lower division club.

Australian soccer is suffering from a huge inferiority complex. And the international tournament of the past month has shown that should not be the case.

At their very best, European teams are obviously ahead of their counterparts in Australia. But on a match by match comparison, we are definitely on the same park.

In a code which seems to change its direction almost yearly, the Ampol Cup competition is one of the real survivors of soccer.

The Cup competition has grown in stature and prestige over the past few years and is unique in Queensland football as it encompasses the whole of the State.

No other football code can boast a competition which annexes so many teams from so many parts of Queensland.

And the introduction of the out-ofthe-hat draw from the quarter-finals this season has added further to the Cup magic.

Points to ponder

They could have staged a mini-tournament at an inner city hotel on a recent Friday. No fewer than seven clubs were represented with some boasting nearly a full team of revellers. At one stage the soccer boys' rendition of "You'll Never Walk Alone" completely drowned out the pub's own singer.

Olympic United officials were far from impressed after a recent visit to a northside ground. After having been told the dressing rooms could not be locked, the club had several Reserve teams shirts stolen from a kit during the main game.

It will be interesting to watch the progress of the new Kenmore Fifth Division side. The team, which will boost the numbers of the withdrawal-plagued division, will come into the competition at the start of the second round. They will be playing for points and will be giving away a 10 point start for a top four position. But stranger things have happened, and an undefeated run might see them snatch a -semi-final berth.

HAWKS ARE HOT IN CUP BETTING

Last season's losing finalists, Mount Gravatt, are hot favourites to win this year's Ampol Cup competition in a special market framed for Go Soccer.

Intermediate league team Rochedale, loom as the value bet while no doubt supporters of premier league clubs Wynnum and Taringa would be keen to get their teams at 10-1.

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"To be honest Mount Gravatt and Ipswich are so far ahead of the others it's not funny. If the draw is kind and they don't meet until the final, it could be anyone's cup. But if one knocks the other out before then, I would rate the winner as odds on for the Cup and anyone could write their own ticket for the opposition," the mystery Bookie said.

But Mount Gravatt will also have to break a cup hoodoo if they are to live up to their favouritism. The Hawks have always done badly in the Ampol Cup and the trophy has eluded them many times.

Mount Gravatt coach Eric Thompson admits he would dearly love to win the trophy.

Everyone wants something they can't get and we would like to make a clean sweep of the trophies this year. The championships are obviously our main concern but a trophy like the Ampol Cup is the icing on the cake," he said.

After the Hawk's scintillating 6-1 win over North Star last week they have been posted at 7-4 in the hypothetical Go Soccer market.

That price is shorter than that for the

In framing the odds, our "Mystery Bookie" said the market would obviously be reviewed after the next round of matches but he considered the eight quarter-finalists easy to pick.

QANTAS CUP SET TO GO

The highly popular Qantas Cup for lower division teams is set to start soon.

Nominations for the competition will close on Monday, June 18.

The QSF management committee has ruled that teams in the following divisions will be eligible to play in the Cup, although participation is not compulsory: Division One and Reserves, Division Two and Reserves, Division Three, Division Four, Division Five, Division Six, Premier Colts, Colts A and teams participating in competition with country affiliates.

The nomination fee is \$50 per team. Strict rules apply to eligibility and the QSF should be consulted if clubs are in doubt.

European champions Liverpool have confirmed Italian side Sampdoria have moved in with a firm offer for club captain and Scottish international midfielder Graeme Souness. The English League champions also said 31-year-old Souness was attracting interest from another Italian Club Verona.

Chief executive Peter Robinson said: "No offers have as yet been accepted or rejected. We may have to part with Graeme, but we will talk over the situation with him as soon as he returns from our tour of Swaziland."

Hungary has won the European Youth Championship, defeating the Soviet Union in a sudden-death penalty shootout after the teams had been locked at 0-0 after extra time and 2-2 after five penalties each.

The match was played in front of a crowd of 72,800.

It was the third time in 11 days that a major European trophy had been settled by a penalty shoot-out. Liverpool beat Roma to lift the European Champions' Cup and Tottenham won the UEFA Cup on penalties against Anderlecht.

Poland beat Ireland 2-1 (halftime 2-0) to take third place.

Yugoslavia beat Spain 1-0 (halftime 1-0) in a soccer friendly here.

The scorer was Safet Susic after only 28 seconds. Attendance: 12,000.

In Moscow, Zenith Leningrad and Dinamo Moscow will meet in the final of the Soviet Football Cup on June 24.

In recent weeks, not only did we see penalties used in the Manchester United-Juventus game in Sydney, but the shoot-out method was used to decide three major European finals, the European Cup, the UEFA Cup and the Youth Cup.

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The method obviously produces a winner but makes a mockery of the whole game. Why don't teams just go out and take penalties and forget about running around the park for 90 minutes?

What is needed are rule changes to ensure goals are scored in normal time. Many suggestions have been put forward and perhaps the time is ripe for FIFA to initiate some form of investigation.

Perhaps the introduction of a short corner, as used in hockey, could produce more goals. At least, it would put the emphasis on the team to score or stop a goal, and not put the responsibility on individuals as does the penalty shoot-

I had to chuckle over some mail which crossed my desk this week. One letter explained a new video soccer game called International Soccer. Some of its features are quite amusing. To quote the letter:

"Details become so fine that it even shows the shadow of the ball as it bounces off the solid green of the ground. As a goal is scored, the crowd, depicted sitting in the stands, roars its approval and waves flags for the appropriate team.

The end of the match sees the players run off the field — but then comes one of the true sophistications of the game. The winning team returns to the field, lines up along the centre of the field, faccing the sidelines.

Then, a dark-haired beauty glides down the ramp between the stands and the winning captain steps forward to receive a gold trophy presented by the lady, amid the ecstatic applause of the crowd!

How does the real game compete?



Under 13 hosted by the Brisbane North Zone at North Star Soccer Club, Zillmere. State Coach and Sole Selector is Jim Dolan, coach of the winning U/15 team in 1983 National Championships.

Under 14: Barber Park, Mackay. Hosted by the North Qld. Zone and the Mackay Junior Soccer Association. State Coach and Sole Selector is John Burgess, coach of the 1983 U/13 team which came equal first, but third on goal difference.

Under 15: Endeavour Park, Cairns. Hosted by the Far North Qld. Zone and the Cairns & District Junior Soccer Association. State Coach and Sole Selector is George Pagan, coach of the 1983 U/14 team which came fourth in the National Championships.

All selected players will be brought to Brisbane for a four day training camp from August 3-6 and will then have a further week prior to departure for National Championships.
