GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Although the format still remains a mystery, it now seems certain that there will be some form of national soccer competition next year.

And indications from Queensland's two representatives, Brisbane City and Lions, are that both clubs wish to be part of it.

While that news may not please a proportion of local soccer officials and supporters, it remains as fact. And it is no use to anyone to bemoan what could, or should have been.

It seems that the final make-up of next year's competition will not be announced until late October which gives Queensland less than four months to act.

If we are going to be part of the National League, then we want to get a fair deal. And the only way we will get that is if we can go into meetings with performances and figures behind us.

It will be all too easy for southern clubs to toss City and Lions to the wayside if both finish in lowly positions. "We can do without them" will be the southern attitude.

But if either City or Lions, and preferably both, can finish high in their conference and do well in the play-offs, club officials will at least have something to stand on when it comes their turn to speak.

Similarly, if the two clubs can show an increase in crowds over the final third of the season, even if ever so marginally, it will give City and Lions more clout to get a fair deal in the likely restructuring.

The problem is though, neither club will go any better unless it starts getting support locally, from other clubs officials and spectators.

Those that have been predicting and pushing for the return of the two NSL clubs should realise that it is not on, for the moment. These people should begin channelling their energies to promoting the National League and making a success of what is reality, rather than dreaming on speculation.

Queensland soccer will gain little benefit, or win any new friends, if it is seen that City and Lions have come back to the Premier League after being tossed out of the NSL by the southern clubs.

Most officials at both clubs generally agree the two sides will eventually return. But if they can return as successful NSL sides, then and only then, will local soccer be on a winner.

Points to ponder

One hopes Brisbane City has a comprehensive fund-raising scheme outside of gate money to run the club. The club's NSL team last played at Spencer Park on May 27—that's 6 weeks ago. How the club is expected to maintain support is something that can only be answered by those whos formulated such a bizarre draw.

Watch for young Lions midfielder Rich Bassingthwaite to play a prominent part in the Young Socceroos next bid to win a place in the world youth championship finals. Bassingthwaite had a very good tour of Europe with the AIS team recently and reportedly is very much in the plans of Youth coach Jim Shoulder.

The forgotten man of Brisbane NSL football, Lions fullback Bob McSkimming, may not be on the outer for too much longer now Gordon Arrowsmith has taken over. "Bob must be one of the fittest players in Brisbane. His attitude

is good and he is definitely pushing for a place," Arrowsmith said recently. But Bob also faces one of the most difficult tasks in Brisbane, ousting the ever-consistent Steve Jackson at right-back in the Lions NSL side.

Brisbane South Junior officials are delighted with the form shown by their rep. team at the recent under 15 championships in Cairns. The side came back strongly after an initial loss and South officials are heralding the system of playing the rep. team in their fixtures as an outstanding success.

A few chuckles at a commercial league game recently when a player went into hysterics after seeing his opponent's leg spin 180 degrees in a tough tackle, then the "injured player" simply rotated it back into position. It took the player some time to realise the opponent had an artificial leg.

STOWELL KEEN ON QUEENSLAND TOUR

Queensland coach Bruce Stowell has reacted enthusiastically to speculation that the Maroons could play in the Merlion Cup in Singapore in October.

"I don't think we would let anyone down," Stowell said this week after hearing reports that Queensland Soccer Federation President Ian Brusasco was investigating the possibility of an overseas tour.

Brusasco, the ASF senior Vice-President and a member of the World Cup Committee, suggested last week that the Queensland team be sent to Singapore if the Australian Soccer Federation did not want to send a national side to defend the Cup, which the Socceroos have won for the past two years.

He intends to raise his suggestion at the QSF Executive meeting in Sydney this week.

The full-strength Australian team is unable to accept this year's invitation from Singapore because the tournament almost overlaps the departure date for the Socceroos world tour.

The Merlion Cup runs from October 14 to 28 while the Socceroos are expected to leave for China on October 30.

Although at this stage there seems only a slight chance Queensland will get the opportunity to fill the void if the ASF declines the Singapore invitation, Stowell believes the idea has merit.

"Such a tour is the natural extension to the interstate games and an obvious step in any preparations to reverse the result against New South Wales next year," he said.

"There definitely has to be more State games and I think by playing on an overseas tour some of our players finally might be able to attract the attention of Frank Arok.

"At the moment he just doesn't want to know about us."

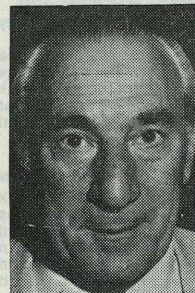
Stowell said that if Brusasco's proposal had any chance of succeeding, he would want to start training an 18-man squad immediately.

"I would want to get them in at least once a week and start playing some trial games," Stowell said.

And the State director of coaching revealed his squad could be somewhat different to that he chose for the May match against the Blues.

"In the light of what happened in the interstate game, I would have to look closer at some of the selection," Stowell said. And after further questioning he admitted: "Yes, there would have to be changes in the striking department."

Stowell said that in picking a squad for such an overseas tour, he could not see himself selecting any more than about three or four Premier League players. "Last week I watched Lions play all over what was supposed to be the best of the Premier League (Ipswich United). If that is the standard of the competition, then I just can't pick any more than about three players.

In all aspects of the game, they have

huge problems. There are administrators, coaches and fund-raisers at local levels who are performing better.

And it is highly questionable whether the two NSL clubs have the best players in the state.

So all these things considered, it's about time the two clubs gave it away and returned to the local soccer competition, which they could probably handle.

Then, perhaps our state team would be picked on a fairer basis and young players would stop leaving good clubs to go to so called "better clubs" only to find that the standard of coaching etc. isn't any better, and sometimes worse, than where they came from,

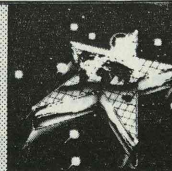

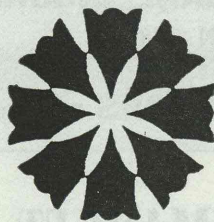
