GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

A seven-week suspension for a foul and abusive language charge appears, on the surface, a harsh penalty.

But offending players really have no excuses.

The rules have been made quite clear in recent weeks and officials at all levels have let it be known that bad language would not be tolerated.

The disciplinary committee should not be criticised for taking a tough-line approach. But the committee must be uniform in its decisions.

On the same night the seven-week suspension was handed down, two other players appeared on foul and abusive language charges.

One received three weeks and the other only one.

How can one incident be seven times worse than the other?

Obviously it wasn't. And while our investigations reveal there were other circumstances taken into consideration before the hefty penalty was handed down, the player in question had a right to feel he was harshly treated in comparison with the others.

If there is going to be a crackdown on foul language, and federation officials still maintain an instruction to do so has not been issued, then let the penalty be standardised.

If hefty penalties for foul language are to be imposed, then let it be across the board.

Let's not make an example of one or two players in a bid to deter the others.

Players will only lose further respect for the rules if they believe they have been treated unfairly.

Moves by some southern clubs to oust Brisbane City and Lions from the national competition should be nipped in the bud by NSL and ASF officials.

Despite what they may think, the powerful southern ethnic clubs do not control Australian soccer. Nor is the National League in operation for their sole benefit.

Every club official should be in the game to help promote the code in Australia, not build a mini empire of his own, as the comments of some officials indicate.

By restricting the national competition to just Sydney and Melbourne, soccer will lose the one aspect that could one day gain it a major footing in Australian sport — the fact that it spans so many states

The last thing Australian soccer needs is an elitist competition for the country's ethnic communities.



Olympic's decision not to buy Mark Barry at the bargain fee of \$1800 raised a few questions about the financial position of the club. It seems though Olympic have now missed their opportunity and it would not be surprising to see other clubs move in for the talented youngster in the future as his appeal-set fee was for a move anywhere, not just to Goodwin Park.

Following our "Year of the Hawk" remark in an Ampol Cup story last week, one Mount Gravatt official has asked whether it meant the Prime Minister would be at the Final. He seems to have popped up at so many other sporting events. I guess it's over to you Ian!

Don't be surprised if a decision is made to stick with the 2.45 p.m. kick-offs rather than switch back to 3 p.m. later this month. The earlier finish has made a number of administrative and media duties easier to complete within the necessary aeadlines.

Our item some weeks ago referring to the coach who had earned the name "Adolf" brought a response from the person in question. He rang to inform Go Soccer that there was no truth in the story and his nickname certainly wasn't Adolf. It was "The Fuhrer", he said.

Som fans are never happy. At a northside ground recently a visiting team was awarded a freekick when the opposing goalkeeper ran well out of his area to foul a fast-breaking winger. The team's supporters were happy with the freekick decision until they watched the ball carry on and some time after the whistle had gone, slowly roll into the goal. The fans, who have quite a reputation for creating disturbances, abused the referee for not allowing the goal which would have given them a draw. Needless to say had the ball rolled wide of the goal, there would have been no complaints.

LIONS HAVE "HIDDEN ACES"

The Brisbane Lions Intermediate League team could have several "hidden aces" for the Ampol Cup Final against North Star at Perry Park on Sunday week.

Amid little publicity, former National League team players Phil Redmond, John Ogden and David Cork have resumed training after operations on injuries.

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And although their progress is at this stage only slow, there is a possibility at least one of the trio could be available for selection for the Cup final.

That could give the Intermediate Leaguers an even more powerful squad.

When Lions beat Acacia Ridge 1-0 in their semi-final, they fielded no less than eight players who had worn an NSL shirt.

By the time they go in against North Star, that number could have risen with Bob McSkiming coming back to the team and Michael Tonner being given a taste of the top league.

With either Redmond, Ogden or Cork in the squad, Lions would have to go in as favorites.

But that is a tag club officials are desperate to avoid.

A UNITED BRISBANE?

The prospect of fielding a "united" Brisbane National League team has again come to the fore.

And while talk of a Brisbane United NSL team has often featured in soccer conversations in the past, it generally has been in relation to a third NSL team.

Now the argument has taken on a whole new light.

A united Brisbane team, using the best players from City and Lions, may be Queensland's only chance of staying in the national competition.

Speculation is rife in Sydney and Melbourne that the country's most powerful clubs will turn their backs on the Queensland and South Australian NSL teams and form a "national competition" of their own.

The clubs claim the cost of two Brisban sides in the NSL is not warranted.

But one Brisbane team would be a cheaper and more acceptable idea — and would still keep Queensland in contact with the country's best league.

Officials from the two Queensland clubs — which clash again in another derby at Spencer Park on Sunday — say a joint team has been discussed in the past — but only informally.

North Star are not really concerned whether they go in as favorites or not. Coach Iain Fagan is quite confident: "We are going to win."

He watched Lions in their semi-final and is certain that if North Star play to its full ability, Ampol Cup Final day will be the most successful in the club's history.

It all makes for a great final. Be there, Perry Park, Sunday August 19.

One club, almost certainly Lions, would have to relinquish its ground as an NSL venue. Then the two clubs would have to come to an agreement over the split of gate, bar and canteen takings.

But would they be as devastating as the problems which would confront the two clubs, and indeed Queensland soccer, if we found ourselves out of the National competition next year?

And the benefits of a joint Queensland team could be quite immediate. Imagine a virtual Queensland side competing each week.

Carlos Alberto Parreira, former manager of Brazil's national soccer team, has been offered a three-year contract in the United Arab Emirates.

Parreira, who resigned in March as the national squad manager and recently led Rio's Fluminense to their 1st national league title, said he would meet Arab officials in New York to discuss the terms of the offer.

"The money and the benefits they want to offer me are something out of this world. However, I worked in Kuwait for seven years and I will leave Brazil again only under highly exceptional conditions" he said.

Manchester have agreed a fee of £100,000 with Sheffield Wednesday for Tony Cunningham, the 26-year-old forward Wednesday signed from Barnsley early last season for £80,000.

City also hope to sign David Phillips, the Wales international full-back, from Plymouth Argyle later this week.

Tottenham were fined £7,500 by the Football League for fielding a weakened side in a first division game at Southampton. The game came 48 hours before Spurs faced Anderlecht in the UEFA Cup final first leg in Brussels—and Paul Miller, a defender, was the only player to start both games.

Alan Everiss, a West Bromwich Albion director, admitted afterwards: "The commission was most impressed with the lucid way Tottenham presented their case and was very mindful of Spurs' success in Europe and the contribution it made to the reputation of British football in general. Unfortunately we had no alternative but to uphold the regulations."

Douglas Alexiou, the Tottenham chairman, said: "We submitted that, taking into account all the circumstances, we fielded our best available side. Graham Roberts was suspended for the game, while others were ruled out by injury. We also pointed out that we had tried several times to change the fixture."

Former Newcastle manager Arthur Cox has been named manager of relegated Derby County, the club which almost closed in mid-season. Cox turned down offers of a higher salary from other clubs.

Cox, who steered Newcastle to the first division in the past season, dropped a bombshell when he resigned from St. James' Park.

A Letter to the Editor . .

Dear Sir.

I hope I am not put in a position of being called a constant whinger and although I am speaking on behalf of Olympic United, this has nothing to do with any of their officials.

Also Ipswich's goal was a deliberate handball and one of their officials agreed with me.

It is time administrators woke up and did something. Two weeks ago young Shane Plazibat had his ankle broken at Perry Park.

If the sport is to survive, start now. Finally, after reading Mr. N. A. Brown's article "Give Youth a Go" (ASW, July 24) I think his point was reasonable but mentioning that it wouldn't be printed in Brisbane was wrong. I have had most of my articles printed in Go Soccer and Australian Soccer Weekly.

In no way do I want to do the game any harm, after having played it for over 20 years. I just hope I can put something back into the game. But I do like to see players, irrespective of who they are, being protected.

To me soccer is the more skilful of all ball games. You play it hard, but clean.

"DESERT PELE" DAZZLING IN LA OLYMPIC SOCCER

At the Rose Bowl stadium the other night, the Brazilian Olympic soccer team must have thought they were playing against a mirror.

For a while, everything the Brazilians did, their opponents from Saudi Arabia did the same.

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There was the intricate touch-play, the circus-like ball-juggling, the explosive attacks.

There was even a young Saudi player they call 'The Desert Pele' — as much for his skills as for his resemblance to the former Brazilian maestro.

And in the grandstands, American fans were astonished and amused by white-robed Saudi supporters, swaying and dancing to the beat of tom-tom drums, Brazilian-style.

For those who know the Saudis, it was no surprise. For years, until recently, their team was coached by Brazilians, including none other than former World Cup coach Mario Zagalo.

For the strictly religious Saudis, in the words of the holy Moslem Koran, "There is only one God." In soccer there is only one Brazil and, though the young Saudi players would never admit it, lining up against the yellow-shirted Brazilians must have been like facing 11 gods.

But the Saudis put up a good show, losing 3-1 in style to a magical team which could have been mistaken for a World Cup side.

The "Desert Pele", real name Majed Abdullah, lived up to his nickname when he launched a solo run in the second half and looked bound to score after ghosting past two defenders.

He was tripped as he did so, but coolly netted the spot kick. Majed's fellow striker, the lanky Muhaisin Al-Dousari, also displayed his talents on several occasions, including a crashing shot against the bar in the first half.

Soccer has taken over from camelracing and falconry over the past few years as the number one sport in Saudi Arabia, with millions of petrodollars poured into the building of new sports complexes.
