LIONS ARE HOT CUP FAVOURITES

The Brisbane Lions Intermediate League team is the undisputed hot favourite to beat North Star in the Ampol Cup Final at Perry Park on Sunday.

A survey of coaches from the Premier League teams not involved in this weekend's fixture revealed a unanimous agreement that Lions would lift the trophy.

In fact, if the opinions of the other coaches are an indication, Lions are probably the hottest favourites ever in the long history of the Cup.

Most coaches were of the opinion that North Star would be lucky to score a goal, let alone win the final. No doubt Stars' Iain Fagan would hotly contest that, but as a finalist he was naturally not surveyed.

But Lions certainly have the form on the board to earn themselves favouritism.

They have proved a number of times this season that they are big game specialists and in four Cup games have

scored 12 goals, but more amazingly, conceded none.

North Star began their run with a big name scalp, edging out Olympic 2-1, then swept aside Bundaberg (on penalties) and Wynnum (3-0) before taking another prize scalp in Mount Gravatt, whom they defeated on penalties in the semi-finals.

The final undoubtedly will be the biggest day in the club's history. For Lions it is not only the chance to atone for their Grand Final loss last year but the opportunity to prove they are worthy Premier League material.

Here is what the opposition coaches tipped for the Final:

BOB BUTCHARD (Acacia Ridge): LIONS—"I have seen Lions three times this season and consistency is one of their strengths. They are young, sharp and play a good brand of football. They have no apparent weaknesses and they certainly looked good against us in the semifinal. Danny Wright could be a real match winner for them, he marshalls the forwards very well and creates a lot of space for Steve Fulton and Mike Mulvey"

LANCE PETIE (Coalstars): LIONS
— "We have played them twice this
year and each time I was very impressed
with their ability and commitments. The

combination of youth an NSL experience will be too much for North Star."

RAY POCOCK (Easts): LIONS—
"They are the younger side and I think that will be a telling factor. I have watched them three or four times this season and I was impressed with the way they came from the back. Lions' youthful enthusiasm will overcome the experience advantage North Star seems to have."

JIM BAYLLISH (Grange Thistle): LIONS — "It has to be Lions, North Star couldn't score a goal if they tried. While Lions should not underestimate the North Star defence, they are better equipped up front to score. And that's the simple difference, Lions can score goals."

MATT CARSON (Ipswich Utd.): LIONS — "North Star have had a great run but they have had a lot of luck. But if you look at form it has to be Lions. Nearly the entire team has NSL experience yet they still have youth on their side."

ERIC THOMPSON (Mount Gravatt): LIONS—"There is really no comparison. Lions have the youth with the skills. They have the ability to last the whole way. They will produce football right to the end and that will eventually earn them a wining goal."

. WALTER TAMANDL (Olympic Utd.): LIONS — "I think Lions will win because they are the better team. And at Perry

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

The decision not to contest the qualifying rounds of the Olympic soccer competition was undoubtedly a mistake.

Had the Australian team reached Los Angeles it would have gained not only invaluable experience but some cheap and very positive publicity.

Rival team sports such as hockey and basketball have gained prime time exposure and some of their lesser known stars have emerged as popular subjects in sport talk right around the country.

But the Australian Soccer Federation was not totally to blame for our decision to once again overlook the Olympic tournament.

The eligibility rules were not established until very late in the piece, and that worked against budgetting and fundraising.

And the ASF was not to foresee the Eastern bloc withdrawal which could have given Australia a great medal opportunity had we qualified.

The pleasing aspect of the Socceroos absence from LA is that our administrators have seen the error. Getting a team to Seoul in 1983 is very high on the ASF priorities over the next few years.

And that is positive planning.

Australia could not possibly hope to win the World Cup this century. Gaining a place in the finals is the best we can achieve.

But the Olympic tournament could be another question and within the next decade. Not necessarily a gold, but perhaps a bronze.

Quite simply, more Australians understand and are interested in the Olympics than the World Cup.

Olympic success might be the only way soccer will finally gain the acceptance of the Australian public at large.

Points to ponder —

The Acacia Ridge Premier Reserves team certainly nullified the bite of the Tigers side at Heath Park recently with a convincing 2-0 win. But the victory also left Ridge coach Brian Addison a little gummy. Brian, whose reunion party with his father is approaching Guiness Book of Records length, is not quite sure where he left his teeth. But Easts patrons are advised to check all glasses before future drinks.

A few eyebrows were raised at a recent Intermediate League clash when a quite prominent player left the field and allegedly punched his own club-mate who had been making quite a nuisance of himself on the sideline. The action was unorthodox, but certainly effective, and to the appreciation of most the match was able to proceed without further incident.

At the same game a visiting official further displayed his incompetence by claiming the troublesome spectator was not from his club. The troublemaker in fact was from his club's reserve team and

had figured prominently in the early game — he was sent-off!

Grange Thistle goalkeeper Gordon Otto certainly has made a big impact since he took over from Dave Gallagher. Prior to last weekend he had not been beaten in four games, and that came after more than a month of cleansheets in reserve grade.

Meanwhile defending champions Colo Colo put a disappointing display in the championship's warm-up tournament behind them to score a stylish 4-1 home win over Iquique.
