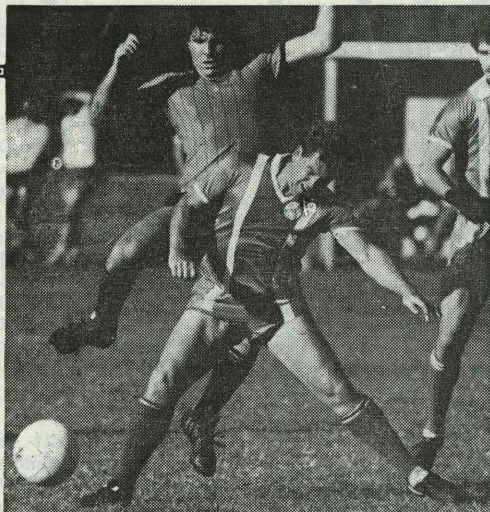

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Any club which has failed to advise its players they are uninsured deserves the sternest of reprimands.

Our investigations reveal there are at least six clubs which have missed the second premium deadline (See story page 3) which means their teams are taking the field without cover.

While we are not criticising the clubs for being caught financially short the present times are difficult ones for sporting clubs, if players are uninsured the clubs have a moral right to tell them.

It would be tragic for a player to be seriously hurt then subsequently find he was uninsured. And the legal repercussions for club officials could be even more devastating.

If players are aware of the situation, then at least they can do something about it themselves, if they so desire.

In fact, clubs should be more willing to advise players of any problems at committee level. Each club should have a players' representative on their committee.

More times than not, if the players know the club is in trouble they will rally and offer their support — if approached in the right manner.

But to keep them in the dark can only promote lack of trust and loss of respect.

To pretend they are insured is skirting financial hardship and heartbreak.

Points to ponder

It seems yet another prominent referee has quit the game following incidents at a suburban ground recently. It's not surprising though that the men in black turn their back on the code. It seems all they ever get these days is criticism and abuse.

On that matter, it is understood a nasty altercation outside the referees room at a National League game recently went unreported.

A Go Soccer Staff member was caught very red-faced recently when he was made to read out his rather derogatory remarks about another team in his club before he "guested" for them in a vital game. But it inspired the team to prove wrong his rather off-beam prediction and they scored an upset draw to maintain their unbeaten run since the story was published.

Following our item last week about Brian Addison's missing teeth, we have since been advised he was able to flush them out of their hiding place! Still teeth or no teeth, Brian was a dapper sight in his coat and tie and the recent Ridge-Mount Gravatt Reserves game which prompted some to suggest that he looked a little more than foreman material.

The Sunday morning training session is becoming increasingly more popular among leading local soccer teams. Brisbane City started it, and found it helped break their run of outs at Spencer Park and North Star used it on their run to the Cup final. Lions also trained on the evening before the Cup final. Whether the last minute sessions have any physical benefit or are just psychologically advantageous is debatable, but it certainly shows a pleasing bit of professionalism, and commitment.

Mount Gravatt certainly took the mickey out of Acacia Ridge when they clashed at Proud Field recently. At 4-0 up and looking very comfortable, Hawks coach Eric Thompson let goalkeeper Stuart Woodruffe play in the forwards. The role was not new though for Woody as it was as a striker that he was chosen in the Queensland Youth team. Perhaps Eric was giving an insight into things to come?

If one story doing the rounds is true, a prominent young player is set for a move south, but he may not go direct from his present club. He fancies a spell back with his old club first.

AN INSURANCE GAMBLE

Players from at least six clubs — including one Premier League club — are presently taking the field uninsured.

The clubs have failed to meet their second premium in the Queensland Soccer Federation's compulsory insurance scheme and their players will remain uninsured until the respective monies are lodged.

The matter was raised at the last QSF council meeting and chairman and QSF president, Ald. Ian Brusasco has strongly recommended the "unfinancial" clubs to advise their players.

(Quoting Council meeting minute 79-84), The Chairman informed delegates that some clubs had failed to meet their second premium to Insurance Exchange and that matter was therefore being further investigated. Clubs were reminded that whilst the premium remained unpaid their players were not insured and therefore it was their responsibility to inform their players of this fact.

Our investigations could not confirm whether players at the clubs in question had been notified, but the clubs had been

advised to place a notice regarding the situation in a prominent place in their clubhouse.

It was discovered in addition to the Premier League club, a First Division club was among those yet to meet the premium.

Insurance cost \$790 per team this season, which covers 20 players and two officials. That was a reduction on the previous season when the premium was about \$1000 per team.

This year clubs were required to lodge \$390 by February 29 and a further \$2400 by June 1 for each team registered.

It is understood the Premier League club is \$1600 in arrears.

QSF officials said this week they were investigating all late premiums and were attempting to advise clubs of the best course of action.

Their advice for all players was to ask their committee about insurance now — before it was too late.

WHO WILL MAKE THE FINALS?

The battle is on for the fourth Premier League semi-final berth in what is looming as the closest finish to the state's top soccer competition in years.

With three rounds remaining, anyone of eight teams could figure in the semi-finals.

Assuming that Mount Gravatt, Ipswich and Grange Thistle will fill the first three berths — and they only need to take a few points from the remaining six to ensure that — then Olympic, Acacia Ridge, Coalstars, North Star and Easts will be left to fight out the remaining one spot.

And if the first round is an indication, Olympic are clear favourites to edge out the others.

For a start they hold a one point break over the Ridge, Coalstars and North Star, and two over Easts, but they finished the end of the first round much stronger than the others.

Olympic took a maximum six points from their final three first round fixtures.

The next best efforts came from North Star and Easts, who took three each while Acacia Ridge and Coalstars could only amass one point each from the final first round six.

Many things have changed since the

first round though and North Star and Easts appear to be setting themselves for a late charge.

At the other end of the scale, Taringa and Wynnum are set to fight out the relegation spot and if Rovers can beat the Wolves this weekend, that battle could go right down to the line.

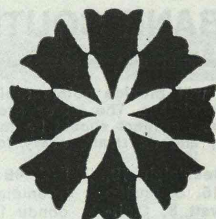
