

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Once again Queenslanders have been overlooked by Frank Arok in the selection of his national train-on squad for the Socceroos' world tour in November.

Mr. Arok chose 34 players in the squad. To rank the players from Brisbane City and Lions as no better than 35th in the country is beyond comprehension.

The statistics suggest it is an injustice.

The week that Mr. Arok named his squad, City and Lions were fourth on points and just outside the top five on places in their conference.

City's defensive record was among the best in the League while Lions had scored as many goals as any other team (Sydney City, Olympic and Marconi aside).

Someone has to be doing something, somewhere. And Joe Gilroy and Gordon Arrowsmith will be the first to agree that the good form of their teams is due to other players' commitment and ability.

The fact is, Brisbane players are more

than competing with their southern counterparts and deserved recognition.

How can Mr. Arok name six keepers as under consideration for the tour, yet not include City custodian Kim Wishart?

That smacks of blatant discrimination. How too can the masterly Frank Pimblett be overlooked when others that he has totally dominated in matches this season are included in the national squad?

Steve Jackson, Alan Niven and John Stewart are others who have shown national team potential throughout the season.

Everyone in Queensland knows we have players capable of performing well in the green and gold, and our officials are prepared to shout about it.

But sadly, the people who make the decisions stopped listening long ago.

WE MISS OUT AGAIN...

Farina was one of 34 players selected by Frank Arok for the train-on squad.

As expected Sydney City dominated the squad with six players, although St. George (Arok's club team) has five selected.

The make-up of the squad did little to please QSF president and ASF senior-vice president Ald. Ian Brusasco, who said: "I think it is typical of the treatment handed out to Queensland that out of 34 players, not one Queenslander was considered good enough to make the squad."

The squad will be pruned to 22 after a training camp in Melbourne on October 10 and 11, which will include a trial

match against Tasmania in Hobart. All players have until October 5 to prove their fitness.

A BIG SEASON FOR AMATEURS

The spotlight of attention this season has firmly focussed on the tightly-packed Premier League, where prior to last weekend, eight teams were a chance of a semi-final berth.

And although the top competition has always grabbed the headlines, some equally interesting tussles and at times some comparable football has been seen in the lower amateur divisions.

In fact, there have been some real success stories, some unbelievable upsets and some surprising disappointments.

As the season draws to a close, Go Soccer this week takes some time out to pay tribute to the lower divisions and its legions of dedicated amateurs.

Division One undoubtedly has been dominated by Kingsridge. Although Salisbury raced to an early lead in the competition, Kingsridge pegged them back by the seventh round and have not been headed since.

At times they have gone on goalscoring sprees, like their 7-1 win over Darra in May and their 5-2 victory over Nerang in July, but at the same time they have kept a tight defence.

But special mention must also go to Annerley, who have kept Kingsridge honest in the run into the finals.

Bob Scanlan's boys began the season disastrously, taking only one point from their first six, but they soon rapidly began climbing the table and in recent weeks have begun to whittle away Kingsridge lead. But the time may run out for the Elder Park boys.

The Annerley Reserves must also rate a mention, maintaining an incredible undefeated run and amassing one of the highest goal tallies in the federation.

Division Two has been all Brighton, The Bulldogs have fought off the challenges of Oxley and University to never be far away from the top of the table throughout the year.

The three teams have opened a comfortable lead at the top of the table and their clashes in the finals will be matches worth catching. The championships is still an open race and it could come down to the last round when Brighton tackle the determined Inal City, who are still bidding for a semi spot, while University and Oxley have the seemingly easier ties against Booval and North Brisbane respectively.

The Reserves is a battle between Brighton, Inala and Uni, all who have scored more than 60 goals this season.

Division Three saw an early charge from Greenbank die as Beenleigh and Ipswich City emerged as the teams to beat. But the division has had its share of upsets, like the weekend where Industrial beat Logan City 5-0. As the semis

Although it may not have appeared in print, quite a few people heard national coach Frank Arok say at Perry Park earlier this year that he could not really consider players from either Brisbane City or Lions because the two teams had finished so low on the NSL table in 1982. How does that leave the St. George players now that their side is struggling at the foot of the Australian Conference and staring relegation in the face?

Big Lions striker Phil Redmond is looking forward to having a game or two in one of the local competitions before the season is out. Despite the injury setbacks of this season, Phil and his wife have hardly missed a Lions home game and the big man will hear nothing of his career being over. He certainly deserves another chance for his professional approach to the game alone.

Liverpool soccer club is reportedly ready to get tough with their Australian star Craig Johnston. (pictured left).

The Sun newspaper says Johnston is refusing to return to the club from Australia until his wife gives birth to their first child. The baby is not due until October 15.

Johnston's refusal to return to Liverpool has been referred to the Professional Footballers Association, the Sun says. Liverpool chief executive Peter Robinson said: 'It is an unsatisfactory situation for him and us. "It must be sorted out.'

Johnston, a 650,000 stg (about \$A1 million) signing from Middlesbrough three years ago, asked for a transfer last season and has refused to sign a new contract.

Liverpool, who will be paying Johnston wages until the end of this month, are likely to ask the Football League to intervene if the PFA is unable to solve the problem.

Italian club A.C. Milan have agreed to transfer England striker Luther Blissett back to his former club Watford.

A spokesman for Milan confirmed that terms for the deal were agreed following a meeting of representatives of the clubs at London airport.

The spokesman said Milan, who were represented by Director General Antonio Cardillo, had agreed a fee of 1.4 million lire, about \$A800,000, with Watford.

The English club's chief executive Eddie

Plumley said he expected the deal to be completed before the weekend.

Blissett, who joined Milan last year in a (\$A1.6 million deal, had a dismal first season in Italian soccer and failed to live up to expectations.

In the close season, Milan signed two other England stars, midfielder Ray Wilkins from Manchester United and striker Mark Hateley from Portsmouth, to take the two places for foreigners in Italian teams.


