GO soccer EDITORIAL

The number of serious injuries in Brisbane soccer this season has now become a point of concern.

Although no collated figures are available, our enquiries have revealed that nearly every major club has labelled this season the worst in years for major injuries.

The casualty list has included many leg breaks and serious knee damage, where in many cases surgery was required and players' careers were put in jeopardy.

There will always be injuries of this nature in a contact sport such as soccer, but if the club's claims are correct then perhaps it is time some questions were asked.

Some clubs are quick to blame referees for not taking a firm control on boisterous play, but that surely can only account for a small percentage of the

It seems there is a general consensus

that the poor state of many grounds around Brisbane has been the major factor in the sudden upsurge in injuries.

And frankly some gounds at the mo-

ment are a disgrace.

Sadly, many clubs neglect their fields as most energies are directed towards the never-ending fun-raising. Yet, is not the home pitch one of a club's most valuable assets in terms of on-field success?

Perhaps its time the QSF management or restructuring committees took a closer look at some playing surfaces and switched matches away from "dangerous"

Such decisions obviously would be tough ones to make, and could cost clubs home game revenue. But then, what price can be put on denying a player the enjoyment of soccer because of a serious injury sustained on a sub-standard pitch?

Points to ponder

The committee of a southside Premier League club took the unusual step of suspending a player for an incident which happened outside of soccer hours. Apparently the Reserve grade player concerned was involved in an altercation with a fellow club member at a private party, but the club saw fit to take action.

Former Brisbane Lions coach Simon Kistemaker has been sacked from his Dutch Second Division club, after an argument with a director, and now is chasing a position in Austria. But it was interesting to note that in a recent communication he hinted that perhaps he had make a mistake leaving Australia.

Lions coach Gordon Arrowsmith has been given a "please explain" from the NSL disciplinary committee after a report from a linesman after the recent Brisbane City-Lions derby. Arrowsmith was ordered back to the bench during the game after he protested referee Gordon Nicholson had booked the wrong player, a claim which later was proved right. He now intends to give a full report of his version of events to the NSL.

Mount Gravatt goalkeeper Stu Woodruffe is a real wag and certainly got the last laugh from a prank recently. Stu like most goalkeepers takes a small bag onto the field with his goalkeeping

"essentials". But all season the bag has been the butt of jokes from his teammates who claim it actually contains his "lunchtime sandwiches". So recently Stu did put his sandwiches in the bag. After getting a laugh from his teammates. Stu then used the sandwiches as ammunition against a group of rival supporters who had heckled him from behind the goal throughout the match. The retaliation stunned the hecklers and they were not game to say another word for fear of what else the Hawks keeper might have in his bag.

It was refreshing to see a bit of honesty from a coach. North Star's Iain Fagan was the person concerned. After his side was beaten 1-0 by Acacia Ridge the week after their Ampol Cup triumph Fagan said to the press: "We thought we were too good. The Ridge were the better side on the day and deserved to win". It's just another example of the big and very positive impression Fagan has made on Brisbane soccer since taking over the reins at Stars mid-way through the season.

What a difference a win makes . . . morale at one Premier League club was rock bottom until an unexpected win put them in striking distance of a top four berth. Suddenly the players were showing the attitude club officials had been trying to promote for weeks.

NO QLD SUPPORT FOR NSL SECOND DIVISION

Queensland's two National League clubs — Brisbane City and Lions — will vote against a proposed NSL Second Division in 1986.

And in a rare occurence, the club's stand is supported by Queensland Soccer Federation president and Australian Soccer Federation senior vice-president, Ald. Ian Brusasco.

The National League Council of Clubs is set to vote on the future format of its competition at a meeting later this week, but Lions and City have been lobbying vigorously to scrap the Second Division idea.

The scheme involves the top six teams in the two conferences at the end of next season forming a First Division. The remaining 12 teams would be split into northern and southern divisions, and joined by more teams lured from the state competitions to form two Second Divisions.

That would require possibly another two or three teams from the Premier League making the step up to the NSL.

But as far as Brusasco is concerned, that is not on.

"We would not encourage any other Queensland team to go into the National League and in fact we would resist it

strongly." Brusasco said.

The Queensland soccer boss sees the second division idea as yet another step in the slow demise of the national competition. And he is determined not to let it take Queensland's Premier League

Ipswich United, Mount Gravatt and Olympic United, who were subject to approaches from NSL officials when plans were first mooted to extend the the League to 24 teams.

Although all three clubs would require one or two players to strengthen their squads, on the form shown by some of the new NSL clubs this season, it would not take much for the like of Ipswich United and Mount Gravatt to compete successfuly at the higher level.

But their absence from the local competition would devastate the Premier League, which has been one of the most interesting local competitions in years.

Lions and City officials too see nothing to be gained by bringing in more teams to the national competition.

"The increase this year has only lowered the standard of the National League and to bring in more teams would make the situation worse," one official

The two NSL clubs are also wary of suggestions that the second division proposal is merely a smokescreen to get an NSL of six Sydney teams and six Melbourne teams.

"Although I could probably name 12 clubs that would like it that way, the NSL is committed to a national competition and in deciding the future I am hopeful everyone will act towards that aim." the official said.

LOCAL SIDES TAKE TO THE SOUTH PACIFIC

Two Premier League clubs will tour the South Pacific at the end of this season — and both are aiming to go away as Premier League grand final winners.

Ipswich United have planned a sevenday tour of New Caledonia while Grange Thistle has organised a trip to the Solomon Islands.

Ipswich United will play three matches during its stay in New Caledonia. Their opponents are expected to be the New Caledonian national side, the country's national cup-winning team, and their local championship winners.

The Jacaranda Men's first match is in Noumea on November 2, the day they arrive in New Caledonia.

Ipswich will take away a tour party of 45, headed by expert club official Terry Brown. The group will include 18 players, including several of United's promising juniors, club officials and supporters.

"If some of Ipswich United's top players are unable to make the trip, then we will look at guest players from other Premier League clubs," Brown said.

Soccer in New Caledonia is well estab-

lished with the island group supporting 55 senior teams and a stadium which seats 14,000.

For Grange Thistle, it will be the second trip in five years to the Solomons.

The club toured there in 1979 and recruited three players, Sam Atta, Ben Sokeni and Wilson Maelaua, who is still with Tihstle.

This time, Thistle will take away a party of 20, which will include 15 players. Veterans of the first trip, Steve Dolan, David Jones and Dave Watson are again expected to tour.

Despite being sidelined for much of this season with a knee injury, Maelaua also is expected to tour.

Thistle's itinerary includes a match and possibly a game against the local premiership side, during their six-day stay. All matches will be played in the Solomons capital of Honiara, under a \$50,000 set of floodlights.

OUR UNLUCKY UNDER 16's

Queensland's Under 16 team were unlucky losers in the final of the National Championships at St. George Stadium in Sydney last week.

Queensland went down 0-1 to South Australia after going into the final as hot favourites.

The young Maroons had looked very impressive in sweeping aside Victoria 4-1 in the semi-final with North Star striker Lindsay Dines netting a hat-

In the final Queensland dominated territorially for much of the game and had a glut of possession, but they could not capitalise.

The winning South Australian goal came after a goalmouth scramble that saw a desperate lunge push the ball in off the upright.

According to QSF secretary Mr. Alan Vessey, who watched the final, the Queensland team — coached expertly by Bruce Stowell — caught the eyes of many interstate coaches and officials.

"Their observations were that the Queensland teams over the years are getting bigger and stronger and are definitely better prepared. That's credit to Eruce Stowell and the statewide coaching system which is now beginning to produce players who are more than competitive with their southern rivals," Vessey said.

The squad will now be groomed for the next national under 18 championships.

FOR THE JUNIORS

The cream of Queensland's junior soccer talent has been flying the Maroon flag around Australia over the past few weeks.

The Under 13 team competed in Melbourne last week after a week's coaching by Jim Dolan at the Rochedale Rovers Soccer Club. Manager for this team was QJSC committee member John Bomben from Cairns.

The Under 14 team went to Newcastle and the Under 15's to Perth, after a week of coaching at North Star Soccer

Last year, FIFA introduced a new international competition for the first time, the Oceania Under 15 competition held in Auckland in December. Australia won the competition and Queensland was represented in the team by Alfie Catalano

The competition is to be held every second year with the next one, in December 1985, to be held in China-Taipai. It was decided earlier this year to change the age to an Under 16 competition.

Although most international competitions are run on eligibility as per the Northern Hemisphere, (i.e. birth date as at 1st August), it has been decided that for this competition eligibility will be as from January 1, thus making all of this year's under 15's eligible to attend.

The coach selected for this team, Mr. Vic Dalgleish, was to attend the National Under 15 championships in Perth to select an initial squad of 40 which will be slowly reduced during 1985 to a squad of 16.

The Queensland Under 14 team were coached by Brian Jeffs, the Regional Director of Coaching based in Townsville. The QJSC were most happy that Brian was able to help us out at such short notice when the coach selected, John Burgess, had his leave cancelled by his employer. Stan Dye, Senior Vice President of the QJSC and Chairman of the National Junior Council, was the Manager of the team.

The Queensland Under 15 team was coached by George Pagan, with QJSC Treasurer Barry Bainbridge as Manager. Queensland won the Under 15 trophy last year.

The thanks of the Queensland Junior Soccer Club go to Rochedale Rovers and North Star soccer clubs for making their grounds available for coaching of our State Teams, and also to all the clubs who made teams available to the three Queensland teams for training games prior to National Championships.

With junior Australian rules teams currently paying a team registration fee of \$230 per team, and an announced intention to reduce it to \$120 per team in 1985 in an attempt to boost their numbers, Brisbane South's modest \$40 per team must be due for a rise, if only to cover increased costs due to inflation.


