6 The interstate clash with New South Wales is always an exciting time for Queensland soccer.

And this year the match against our traditional sporting rivals takes on a new importance.

Because our two National League sides, Brisbane City and Lions do not play the New South Wales sides this season under the two division NSL format, the interstate clash is vital to give the national coach, Mr. Frank Arok, the opportunity to become aware of the Queensland players capable of playing for Australia.

That incentive alone should ensure every player will give his all in today's clash.

And the incentives that are offered in Australian soccer these days cannot be matched by any other football code.

There are now opportunities to wear the green and gold at four different levels — under 16, under 19, under 23 and Olympic and World Cup. And all culminate in a true world championship.

Australia has already qualified for the under 16 and under 19 tournaments and young Queenslanders are involved. And it would be pleasing to see Queensland players taking part in our bid to reach next year's World Cup finals and the 1988 Seoul Olympics.

I wish both teams the best of luck in today's clash.

This will be the second interstate game since I became president of the NSW soccer federation and so far I am yet to taste defeat. I hope that record is still intact at the end of the day.

But overall this is the third game since the series was revived so I guess in modern terms, as both states have won a game, this is the present day decider. And for that reason alone I am sure it will be an exciting clash.

New South Wales comes to Brisbane this year without four key players, who have commitments with their club side to the NSL Cup final.

It doesn't help our cause but it is not an excuse as there are many players in New South Wales.

But what it does show is a positive step between soccer administrators in trying to accommodate all parts of soccer. We all can work together if we try.

While my support will be with the Blues, I wish both teams the best of sporting luck and thank the Queensland Soccer Federation for inviting us to Brisbane once again.

JUST FOR THE RECORD . . .

Recently uncovered records have shown that today's interstate clash with New South Wales is the 75th match between the two states since the series began in 1890.

Because many of the Queensland Soccer Federation's records were lost in the 1974 floods, much of Queensland soccer's past has been difficult to confirm.

It was thought there had been, up until this year, 72 clashes between the two states.

But the new information, supplied by Lions director Gary Wilkins from a program for the 1970 interstate clash, shows that match was the 71st clash. There have been three other games since then.

And it appears the two "missing"

results, which as yet have not been uncovered, were Queensland wins.

The federation records show 18 Queensland wins, 45 NSW wins and nine draws. But the program says up until 1970 Queensland had won 19, NSW 43 and eight were drawn.

The 1970 match was a 3-0 NSW win, in 1978 a 2-2 draw was played, Queensland won 3-0 in 1983 and NSW won 2-0 last year.

The records will now be officially amended to show: 74 clashes, 45 NSW wins, 20 Queensland wins, nine draws.

THE ONE DAY OF THE YEAR

Anzac Day, April 25 — the "One Day of the Year" when Queensland's soccer stars will get the chance to push for places in the Australian team to contest the World Cup qualifying matches, starting in October.

National coach Frank Arok is in Brisbane to watch the annual interstate clash with New South Wales and it will be the only opportunity he will get this year to see the Queensland players.

With the National League competition now split into two groups, the two Queensland teams are in the southern division with the Melbourne and Adelaide clubs.

Arok coaches St. George in the northern division and is never confronted by either Brisbane City or Lions.

"I am coming to Brisbane with an open mind," Arok said.

And that is all the Queensland players can ask. The rest is up to them. And the Maroons must win if any player is to have a realistic chance of selection.

Unlike last year, when Arok coached the NSW side, this season the Blues are under the control of new NSW state director of coaching Alan Vest. And Vest's record in interstate clashes is impressive.

As South Australian state coach he guided the "Croweaters" to three wins in three matches, including a 3-0 victory over the Australian Youth team.

But his most successful stint was as coach of the West Australian team. Under his direction the "Sandgroppers"

beat Glasgow Rangers, drew with Middlesbrough and lost 1-2 to Manchester United, after missing a penalty. And the WA side under Vest was extremely successful in south-east Asia, winning two Marah Halim tournaments in Indonesia and handing out double figure thrashings to some of the top Indonesian sides.

"I am not taking Queensland lightly just because the NSW side has a host of Socceroos," Vest said. "To play in any state game is an honour and this time it is a chance for the Queenslanders to prove something. They will be hard to toss."

Queensland's Bruce Stowell has tasted success and defeat since he took over the state director of coaching job more than two years ago.

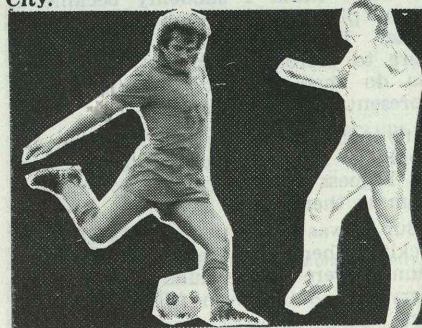
In his first game controlling the Maroons, with a squad picked by others, Stowell saw Queensland beaten by Victoria but later in the year he guided the state team to an emphatic 3-0 win over NSW. Last year Queensland were 0-2 losers.

But Stowell, who also has had continued success with state youth sides, believes another win is on the way.

Undoubtedly, Anzac Day 1985 at Perry Park will be a historic battle.

FROM CITY TO SOCCEROO



Everyone in Queensland thinks you have to go south to get into the national team, but young players in Brisbane should remember a move can work two different ways.

Sure, it worked well for me and my move to St. George from Brisbane City saw me eventually become a national team player.

But there is always the risk of going from a big fish into a little pool to a little fish in a big pool.

Take Larry Gaffney for example. He went to Wollongong from City and now he isn't even playing. I am sure if he was still at Spencer Park he would be in their team.

There's no denying that Sydney and Melbourne are the soccer centres and that's no disrespect to Brisbane, Adelaide or any of the other centres.

But if players in Brisbane keep performing well then I am sure Frank Arok
