WILL THEY MEET By GREG RUSSELL AGAIN?

Next year's interstate clash with New South Wales could be in jeopardy if Australia qualifies for the World Cup finals in Mexico.

The World Cup begins in Mexico City on May 31. The experts predict, and as Australia found out during the preparations for the world youth championships in Mexico in 1983, teams will have to arrive in Mexico at least a month prior to the start of the tournament to acclimatise to the high altitude and steamy weather conditions.

If the Socceroos reach the final 24, it would be expected their final preparations would be well underway by late April. And that has consequences for the Queensland Soccer Federation's biggest game of the year.

The Anzac Day promotion this year was an outstanding success with an overall crowd approaching 5000.

The QSF could opt for the date again next year, as it also seems to be an acceptable date for the National League - but it would mean NSW, which will provide the bulk of the Socceroos, would have to send a second string team.

While that would boost Queensland's chances of success, NSW Soccer Federation president. Mr. John Constantine, who is yet to taste defeat since taking over the position, may be reluctant to send north a team lacking Socceroo stars.

And it may be awkward for the QSF to promote a clash with a NSW side missing John Kosmina, Dave Ratcliffe, Joe Watson, Jim Patikas and others.

Alternatively, the QSF could change

the date of the interstate clash to either pre-season or end of season.

But if Australia does qualify for Mexico, then it is certain to cause a reshuffling of the entire 1986 soccer calendar and the QSF may not be able to reserve a suitable date.

An early February or late October match would be totally unacceptable.

One solution though could be to suspend the interstate series next year and instead, offer a match against the full Socceroo side on the eve of its depart-

A Queensland versus Australia game at Perry Park in mid-April would ensure a packed house and certainly would give the Socceroos a tough pre-World Cup workout.

But at this stage, the QSF can not make any firm plans until the fate of the Socceroos is known.

"Over the coming weeks the QSF management committee will be examining this year's interstate clash and then will begin planning for next year. Bue we will be doing everything within our power to ensure there is representative football at Perry Park next season." QSF president Ald. Ian Brusasco said.

"And if the opportunity arose for us to host the national team I am sure we could make is a successful promotion".

No doubt it would be a game towards which State coach Bruce Stowell would keenly look forward.

Premier League clubs, and one carrying valuable prizes.

Yet Premier Colts games, which remember carry the same points value as do Premier League matches are not being afforded their correct importance under the present system.

In many cases only one match official is assigned to the Colts games and the lines are left for willing spectators.

There are obviously difficulties in assigning three officials to all matches, but could some of our more prominent men in black who are given just a Premier League game arrive a little earlier and run a line for a Colts game?

It certainly would help prevent some controversial decisions in Colts matches of late.

While it will be interesting to hear the referees' response to the call for a full panel of officials at Colts games, perhaps the QSF management committee could consider whether the current points scoring system used for the club championship is a fair method.

Does it presently not favour those clubs who persist in fielding stalwarts in

The club championship has become a keenly contested competition among

Reserves, and even Colts, and prejudice against a club which gives youth a go in the lower grades in an attempt to groom them for future Premier League

There is a real likelihood that under the present system that a club destined to finish mid-table in the Premier League, could "stack" its Reserves and Colts in the latter part of the season to go for the club championship at the expense of fielding its best team in the top division.

And that would leave the Premier League open to farce.

So far it hasn't happened, and with the present crop of club officials we would be surprised if it did. But perhaps a better weighted points system would be fairer.

Strength through all three Premier grades is a desirable aim, but the Premier League is the flagship of Queensland soccer and should be the focus of every club's efforts.

There are the world under 16 and under 20 championships every two years, the Olympic (under 23) competition every four years and, of course, the full World Cup.

With the right dedication, a talented player could progress through all four grades.

And with the coaching set-up now established in Queensland, no matter where in the state a player lives, he can aspire to reach all the representative goals.

And through his regional director of coaching and ultimately through state director of coaching Bruce Stowell, the youngster will be given the guidance and opportunity to make the most of his abilities.

There are now five regional directors of coaching supporting Stowell.

They are Jim Foley (Cairns), Brian Jeffs (Townsville), Jim Hewson (Mackay), Richard Evans (Rockhampton) and Jim Selby (Bundaberg).

Their aims and objectives are to upgrade the standard of coaching at all levels, to identify, develop and keep the QSF informed of any player with potential, and to assist and co-ordinate the media and public relations in their region.

All Queensland soccer players and officials should remember, the coaches are always accessible and willing to give sessions by appointment.

Make the most of your chances and become involved with your director of coaching.

Queensland performed gallantly in its 1-3 loss to New South Wales at Perry Park last week. And although it seems almost certain none of the Maroons will be named in Frank Arok's national squad this week, some interesting quotes emerged from the match. Here's a selection . . .

"There is not one living creature who can get into the national squad unless he is better or different from any other player." - Frank Arok.

"I was thrilled to bits with everybody." - Bruce Stowell.

"The loss of Hermiston was significant. We rated him highly." - Alan Vest.

"The combination of Danny Wright and Dave Wheeler looked very good. I am surprised Wheeler is not playing NSL, he is as good as anything I have seen at Brisbane City." - Dave Rat-

"I thought I would be on the bench all day. I didn't have time to get nervous but I loved every minute of it. If the opportunity arises to play NSL, I'll grab it." - Glenn Archer.

"Now that I have tasted football at a higher level, I would love to play it in the future. But at this stage I am a Coalstars player and until that changes I will be giving everything for them." - Dave Wheeler.

"Hunter and Niven are overweight. Steve O'Connor lost eight kilos to stay in the National squad. That is the commitment we need." - Frank Arok.

"I told them at halftime to believe in themselves and go out and do what they wanted to do. We did it for about 20 minutes then lost our concentration.. We lost the belief in our own ability." -Bruce Stowell.

"It is so disappointing. I was so keyed up for this game. I had got rid of the ball and had all my weight on one leg when a boot came from nowhere." -Jim Hermiston.

"Patikas stood out. People were asking who he was. If he had been in a Maroon shirt he still would be in my squad." Frank Arok.

"I think NSW could win a full interstate series." - Alan Vest.

"Next year I hope we have a sponsor. If anyone knows one get them to contact me." — Ian Brusasco.

"Glenn Archer and Dave Wheeler have to look at playing regularly at that level. They are good players." - Bruce Stowell.

"Jackson was unfortunate, he had to play out of position. I cannot judge him on that." - Frank Arok.

"I had to score because I had missed a similar one a few minutes before. It was something we had been practising at training." - Dave Wheeler.

"Everything I try doesn't seem to be coming off, I don't know what is wrong." - Russell Stewart.

"Danny Wright has had almost a whole year off, he has lost a lot. He would have beaten Dave Ratcliffe two years ago when they were in a one-onone situation in the second half." -Frank Arok.

"Brisbane City is interested in Glenn (Archer) and Dave (Wheeler). But we will have to see what happens." - Jim Hermiston.

"Lions have seven forwards with NSL experience, we don't need Dave Wheeler," - Lawrence Oudendyk.

"If I can get a commitment that these games will become an annual event then I will put up a trophy myself." — Ian Brusasco.

"The Lions players are good club players. But show me one player who is definitely better than any other already in the national squad." - Frank Arok.

"There's nothing to be disgraced about. We just have to admit that at the moment NSW are technically superior to us. We had the best players in Queensland out there and we lost. That's football". - a spectator.

After being the subject of a lot of other people's articles, the referees — with the official sanctioning of the Australian Soccer Referee Federation (Qld Division) - have decided to put their point of view forward in a column in Go Soccer. The columnist, "Whistler", will air his views and opinions, but it must be stressed they may not always be the official view of the ASRF (Old).

The referees have "Billy Bunter" to thank for this move into the world of journalism.

Alan Hunter was lavish in his praise for referee Chris Bambridge, of Melbourne, for his performances in the National League and suggested Queensland referees had a long way to go to reach any kind of acceptable standard.

Now I would be the first to admit my good friend Chris Bambridge is among the top whistlers in the country, but let me explain some of the problems the National League referees in Queensland must face.

I think Alan Hunter, or any of the local National League players, would find it difficult to turn out every fourth week in the top team and perform as well as a player getting a game in the top side every week.


