

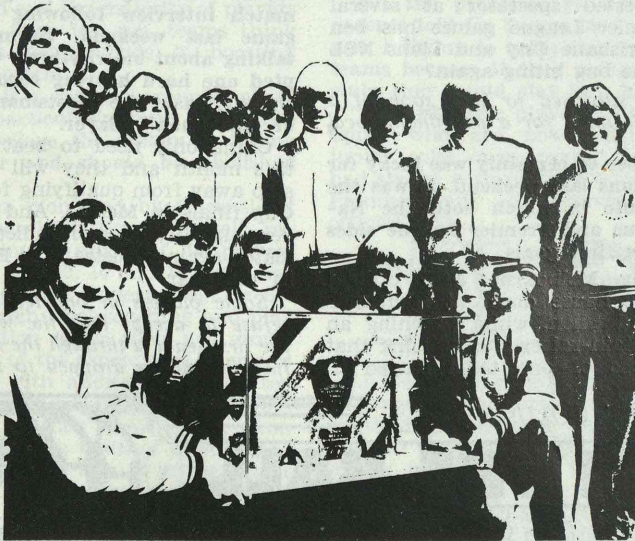

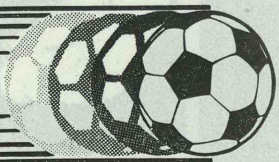

REP. TEAMS SPLIT JUNIORS

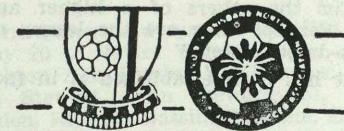

South went to the state championships and won the title.

"Last year's 15's were always a good year among Brisbane South clubs and the region probably would have won the state title anyway," a club official said.

But the problems go deeper, several parents told Go Soccer that players were now refusing to enter the representative teams because if they stayed with their clubs they would play in a higher grade.

"We lost three players to the 15's rep. squad who are now playing in the junior colts open competition. If they had stayed with us they would be in the Premier Colts or Reserves," one club official said.



And another parent revealed that his son, who was a member of the Brisbane South 14's, had said he wanted to go back to his club because it had become boring playing in a team which was winning so easily.

Those that criticise the scheme say that many of the boys involved are becoming interested only in individual glory.

"They are backing this scheme because the parents and the boys are trophy hunters," an official said.

The critics also say that the system is "stealing" players from the clubs.

They say that if a boy enters the rep. squads as a 13-year-old, by the time he has graduated through the ranks he is "anyone's player" when he comes out as a 15 or 16 year old.

Despite the criticism, Stowell is adamant the Brisbane North and South associations have made the right choice in adopting the system and they have laid the groundwork for future success of Queensland teams.

"Some people are trying to sabotage the system because of their petty jealousies and narrow-mindedness," he said.

Just four weeks into the 1985 season, Junior soccer in Brisbane is split over the system of fielding junior representative teams in competition with club sides.

Despite playing up an age group, the Brisbane north and south representative sides are regularly thrashing the opposition. Double figure scores are common. One side has netted 30 goals and conceded none in three games.

Is the system too successful, or, is it a failure?

It seems association officials, the coaches involved and the majority of players and parents from the rep. teams think the progress being made is boosting Queensland soccer.

But there is a growing groundswell of opposition, particularly from club officials, who believe the system is killing junior soccer and should be abolished immediately.

The system, pioneered by Queensland director of coaching Bruce Stowell, involves selecting a squad of 16 players from each of the 13, 14 and 15 years age groups. The players undergo regular intensive and high level coaching and play in a competition above their age group.

The theory of the exercise is to ensure that players with ability are given top class coaching and are given the incentives to improve their game rather than being lost amidst a team of lesser players. The long term aim is to see better quality players being produced from the junior ranks.

But some club officials do not agree. They say that the system trial last year with the Brisbane South under 15's was not a true indication. After playing together through the season Brisbane

The critics of the junior representative squads scheme are very quick off the mark and very vocal.

But how qualified are they to make comments?

Most are parents and club officials whose football knowledge has largely been learned from the sidelines. They are attacking a scheme initiated by people with years of coaching experience.

Decisions have been made in the best interest of the youngsters and Queensland soccer.

And if that hurts a few clubs which in the past have held all the trumps, then that's too bad. Too much junior sport revolves around the egos of parents.

It is plainly obvious that better players will improve playing alongside players of equal standards and against opposition of a higher standard.

The system is not to be blamed if the best from one age group is presently too good for the others of a higher age group. Perhaps they are the legacy of an out-dated system?

What has been established is in fact

an "institute" type system within the Brisbane North and South Associations.

The Australian Institute of Sport too had its critics in the early days, and the criticism was along similar lines. But today the AIS is producing the finest sportsmen and women in the country.

To criticise the representative squad scheme after only a month of operation is to highlight, in the strongest possible way, one's lack of football knowledge and sporting appreciation.

Those clubs which sent representatives to the Sibyl's XXXX promotion last week deserve congratulations. The representatives of Lions, Ipswich United, North Star, Easts and Olympic were fine ambassadors.

The absence of the five other clubs was inexcusable, and leaves them little ground to complain in the future about the promotion and acceptance of soccer among the general public.

The turn-out was typical of the laziness which rots our code from within.

ACROSS MY DESK . . .

I often hear from people within our code about the failure of soccer to get its rightful share of publicity. "We are never given a fair go", is the common cry.

Last week, Sibyl's in association with soccer sponsors Castelmaine, gave soccer the same opportunity as the other three football codes to be involved in a major promotion.

The Premier League clubs were asked to provide one representative each to take part in a novelty event for which was being offered some attractive prizes.

It was an ideal chance for the Premier League clubs to promote themselves, their sponsors, their players and soccer, in front of an eager and excited crowd.

Those that did were well received and did their clubs, and code, proud.

For the record, Lions' Mick Tonner certainly did, and won the first prize and now goes into the final against the other codes next Wednesday night.

It would be good for soccer if representatives of ALL clubs turned out to urge him on.

Remember, opportunity seldom knocks twice.

Tony, like other potential top referees is being carefully nurtured towards the top.

I should add that Tony Slater's potential had already been noted in a more positive way. Each of the Queensland Referees' Federation nominates a panel of referees considered as short and long term prospects for FIFA badges.

Tony, along with Ken Adriaansen have been nominated as long term prospects while Alan Kibbler and Bill Monteverde have been placed on the short term list.

Roger Marshall had been selected to represent the ASRF (Qld) at the under 18 championships in Sydney this week.

IN THE LOWER LEAGUES

Last week certainly will go down as one of the most successful in recent times for Peninsula club Redcliffe City.

"It is about time some clubs were honest enough to admit that they are only soccer nurseries. They must give players with potential the opportunities to develop that talent."

Stowell conceded that some of the rep. teams are regularly winning by big margins but says that definitely does not mean that the system is a failure.

"It only indicates that these teams are not playing in the right environment. If the competition in which they are presently in is not suitable then a program should be formulated where they select their opposition say in mid-week games rather than in a regular weekend competition," Stowell said.

"But the point is results are not important. We are looking at the development of individuals within themselves and within a team.

"It should be irrelevant whether the rep. teams play in a regular competition or not. The challenge should be to win each game as it comes and every player's goal should be much longer term than a week to week basis or even winning a presentative opportunities available to championship at the end of the year.

"Players should be aware of the re-good youngsters at a national level and should be striving to learn as much as

they can to give themselves every opportunity of representing their country."

Stowell also rejects that the system is "stealing" players from clubs.

"If we take 16 players out of a competition, we have created 16 places for other youngsters to press their claims. The whole system is aimed at giving everyone the best possible chance to develop their ability not pandering parent's egos.

"At the end of the season the only thing the rep. players are going to show will be a better football education, not something on a shelf. But in the longer term trophies don't make national players.

"There always will be some dark areas in a new system, and I think one of those at the moment is that coaches are not accepting the similar challenge as are the rep. boys, but I am sure things will be worked out.

"The proof of the success of the system will be when the present 13's come out as 16-year-olds. I have no doubts that the overall improvement will be obvious. It would be a shame if we took away the opportunities for a young player to make the most of his talent."

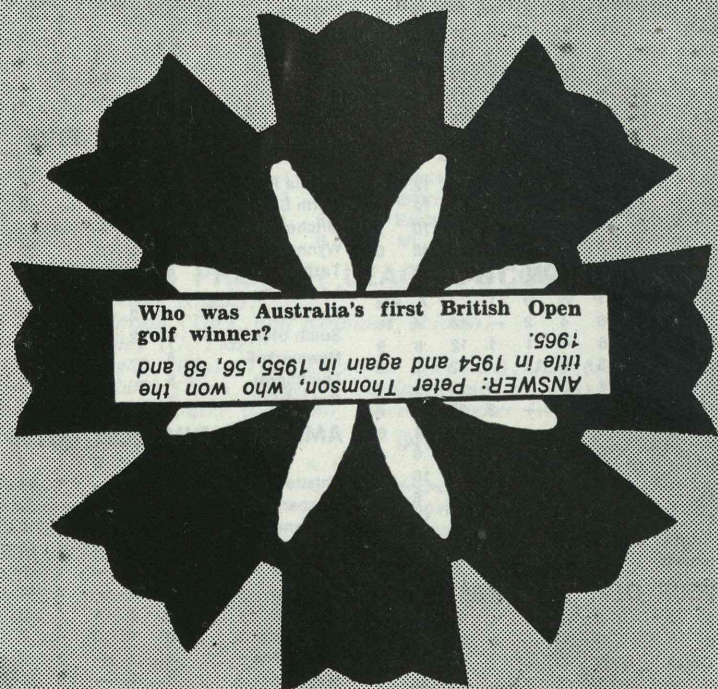
