In fining Charlie Egan but giving him 14 days to provide a written explanation, is the ASF saying that the South Melbourne striker is not all to blame?

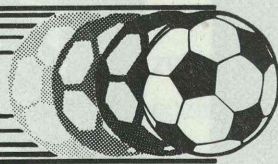

## GIVE THEM A GO SAYS STOWELL

Queensland director of coaching Bruce Stowell has called on Premier League coaches to give the state's Youth players the opportunity to play in the top level.

"I have no doubts that every member of the Youth squad could be, and should be playing Premier League," Stowell said on returning from the successful national championships.

Queensland won the national title after beating New South Wales 2-1 in the final.

"The Queensland boys were up against players who are in National League and State League teams interstate. As the result shows we more than matched them.

"Local coaches must have faith in these youngsters and give them the opportunity to play in the higher league. The clubs can only benefit in the long run."

Less than half of the Premier League squad have played Premier League this season, or in their club's top side. Only

Lindsay Dines and Damien Butler have appeared regularly in the Premier League.

Apart from those players still eligible for the state 16's squad later in the year, Stowell will have little to do with the Youth squad until he assembles another side next year to defend the titles at under 19 level.

And that is the more important championship as it is from those titles that the next Young Soccerroo side will be picked.

"It's up to the clubs to keep developing the players, and up to the players themselves to strive for the highest level possible," Stowell said.

The rules must be adhered to, but as long as no-one is being hurt or one team is not gaining an advantage from rough-house tactics, then let them go.

For many sporting followers, the appeal of soccer's football rivals is the aggression shown on the park. The big tackles, the occasional scrummages.

If more referee were prepared to treat players like men, rather than junior foot-

ballers, and the players were prepared to act accordingly — then more people certainly would be lured through the turnstiles.

The final capped what was a successful tournament despite the many setbacks. Goals came frequently, but whether that was due to the "Brusasco Line" is open to debate.

But congratulations to the QSF for having the courage to experiment and to the two NSL sides for making the final one to remember.

**It would be wrong to single out anyone in particular for praise following the Queensland Youth team's win at the national championships last week — It was indeed a team effort.**

And that "team" is not only the group that went to Sydney. It includes all those at regional, club and home level who did their part to get the successful Young Maroons together.

Congratulations to everyone involved. We have once again proved that at this level, on and off the field — Queensland is leading the country.

The hurdles that must be overcome even before our team leaves the state are daunting, which makes the victory even sweeter and highlights the extent of the achievement.

The vastness of our state makes it exceedingly difficult to assess the ability of all young players. Yet this problem is overcome through the close working relationship between Bruce Stowell and his regional directors of coaching.

The country talent that has been unearthed this year and in previous seasons more than justifies the system. It is a credit to the attitude and eagerness of the coaches throughout the state.

But the story goes further than that. The Queensland Junior Soccer Council must too be given its share of congratulations for establishing a state-wide structure that continues to produce

young players equal in talent to those anywhere in Australia.

## NOT JUST BLACK AND WHITE

THE REFEREES' POINT OF VIEW . . .

"YOU CAN'T PLEASE ALL THE PEOPLE ALL OF THE TIME".

The above statement could well be the guiding motto for all referees. Indeed many referees would argue that it should read "You can't please any of the people any of the time".

Of course the age old question is just who does the referee please? What many people do not realise is that every week there are a number of referees inspectors at grounds round the city checking and reporting on the performance of the officials at the game.

Just like the players, the referees must perform to a standard or they can be dropped to a lower division.

The inspector, however, examines the referees technical ability and his application of the laws and not whether his game has the approval of the players, coaches or the media.

These three sections of the game all see the perfect referee as something quite different. They seldom appreciate why a player must be cautioned, why advantage is not allowed in some instances and get quite irate at what they consider petty

or irrelevant things that the referee seems to be doing.

It is highly probable that the referee is just as frustrated, but he is trying to perform the balancing act that keeps the inspector happy and yet pleases other sections of the game.

*Speaking of sections of the game, this article could not pass without some reference to the spectator.*

Nobody can object to criticism but some of the language used to express their objective and unbiased words of wisdom make you shudder.

Some time ago and on repeated occasions the QSF ask that the language of players on the park be "cleaned up". This is so families will not stop coming to the game because of foul language. Let me assure you the worst language at most games usually comes from the terraces and I don't see too many clubs, let alone the QSF being too concerned about it. After all these people are only abusing the referee and usually bringing his parentage into question, so it can't be too bad!

## RIDGE REPORTING . . . by SYD SHOT

The most popular topic in Queensland soccer at the moment must be the ridiculous transfer fees some clubs have slapped on players over the past couple of seasons.

And I must include my own club for being a party to this never ending farce of greed.

Although I blame the clubs, the real guilt must rest with the QSF who in most cases end up as the arbitrator between the clubs and players concerned.

This procedure can take as long as three months, from the time the players ask for a transfer request.

If we must have blue form players like we have under the present formula, I believe that at the time of signing a blue form for the first time, a maximum fee should be placed on the player for that year — say \$500.

This contract should accompany his blue form to the QSF with the scale of his wages.

If at the conclusion of the contract, the year concerned, the player desires a move the fee stated on the contract should be adhered to.

If the player decides to stay with the club his wages and a further increase in his transfer should be negotiated prior to the commencement of the new contracted year.

I would suggest the coach of the team be present at the meeting to advise both parties to the valuation and requirements of the player and club, as in most cases the persons making the decision for the club know nothing or little about the football value of the player. Most of them are there to administer the general running of the club.

With this in mind a maximum transfer covering all players should also be introduced as should a limit on wages.

A just maximum fee for Premier League would be \$2000. If a player goes to a club that has an NSL team the fee should remain the same as he is still only a Premier League player when he joins that club and has to prove himself otherwise.

If he should make NSL it is usually by his own doing or that of his NSL club — as in the case of Alan Hunter.

When he left the Ridge he was playing first division. It took him two seasons to break into NSL.

In those two seasons it was not the Ridge who made him a NSL player.

Oh for a little sanity!

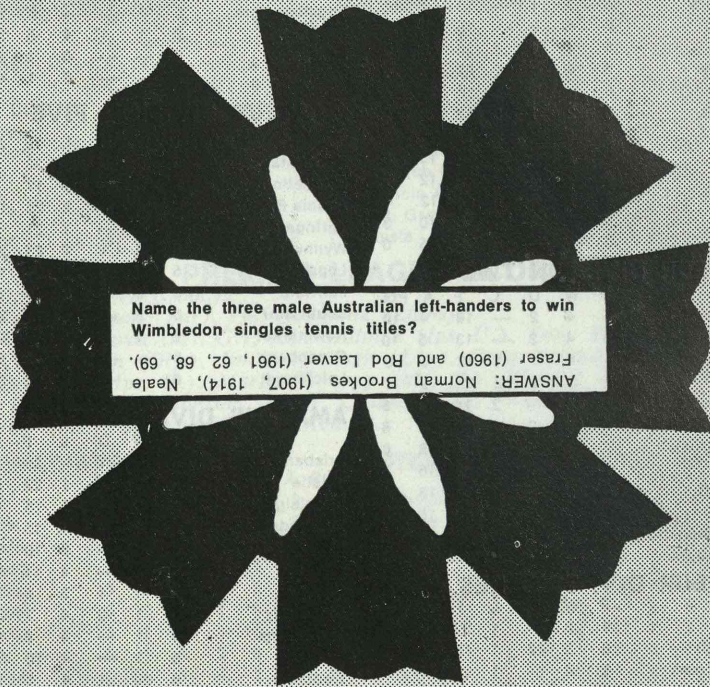
