# Points to Ponder

Don't be surprised if within the next few weeks a prominent soccer identity takes steps to secure his long term future at a major club. Has he heeded the warnings of stormy waters of the past few weeks?

The Brisbane City nets were a disgrace for last week's National League match against Footscray. In the warm-up City keeper Kim Wishart found three holes in the net through which a ball could easily pass — one of them just behind the post in the side-netting. The net at the other end also had to be patched before play commenced. Hopefully the situation will be rectified this week.

One club that lost a key game last weekend was showered with three cartons of beer cans after the match. It may have been the tonic to drown their sorrows, but the side had hardly played well in defeat.

Those on the park tell us that when four of the 18 lights at Acacia Ridge went out in last Saturday's vital game against Olympic United, referee Garth Goodwin was seriously considering abandoning the match. Olympic were lead-

ing 2-0 and their supporters would not have warmed to the idea, as thankfully a high-ranking QSF official pointed out. The Ridge can't be blamed for the partial blackout as it was a supply problem from outside the ground. # CLUBS BATTLE FOR By GREG RUSSELL SURVIVAL

Some of Queensland's oldest clubs are set to fall by the wayside as crippling overheads and dwindling support begin to take their toll.

The QSF management committee has been told last week that First Division club Westside was close to being wound up. And several other clubs, some in high divisions may not front again in 1986. Westside, the former Budapest Grovely side whose most famous son is former NSL star Peter Tokesi, was founded in 1963. With the backing of Brisbane's Hungarian community the club prospered for many years.

But in recent times as the ethnic backing of the club drifted away, only a hard core remained to do all the work. The guiding light in past seasons has

been president Mr. Tom Tovier who informed the QSF last week that he had resigned and in doing so has virtually declared the club would cease.

Westside had teams in Division One and Reserves this year, but the latter has withdrawn. The Hungarian community is rallying to save Westside and have asked for a 14 day period of grace during which the club's first team will still meet it's commitments.

It is no secret that North Brisbane, the former Polonia club, is fighting hard to maintain it's existence while Booval Stars also are facing lean times.

The QSF is doing all it can to assist the struggling clubs and are moinitoring some on an almost weekly basis.

## GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

The case of Young Socceroo skipper Andrew Bernal is indeed a delicate one for the Australian Soccer Federation.

And it certainly has highlighted an area which needs urgent attention.

Bernal has learned all his soccer in Australia. He has spent the past three years at the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra, at the expense of the Australian taxpayers.

Now he has been offered a playing contract with Spanish First Division club, Sporting Gijon. The club has virtually told the 19-year-old that if he goes to Russia with the Australian Youth team next month, that contract offer could well be revoked.

Bernal has become an innocent pawn, being manipulated by a powerful overseas club. The Australian Soccer Federation is being insulted.

One can understand Bernal's decision to withdraw from the Youth squad. He has an ambition to become a professional footballer in Europe and this could well be his chance of a lifetime. But does a club have the right to deny a youngster the opportunity to play for his country in a world youth championship? For Bernal, the opportunity will never arise again.

While any success Bernal achieves in Spain will eventually reflect back on Australia, will it outweigh any bad publicity which could arise if the Young Socceroos, minus Bernal, do not perform in Russia?

Australian youngsters should not be denied the right to try their fortune overseas. But we should not become merely a nursery for overseas clubs at the expense of our own success on the international stage.

Youngsters should be tied to the ASF for the duration of a championship bid.

It should be remembered that the Australian public will always warm quicker to a soccer player dazzling the world in green and gold, rather than if he was in any other colours.

# ACROSS MY DESK . . .

At the halfway stage of the soccer year, now is the time to start planning for 1986.

Both the federation and the clubs should begin tossing around ideas and putting forward suggestions which ultimately will make for a smoother runing 1986 season.

In the federation's case we must begin to examine things like our representative program in 1986. This is going to be slightly clouded next year until we know what is happening with the World Cup.

Hopefully, for Australia's sake, our annual match with New South Wales will be difficult to schedule.

The federation must also look at the prospect of another tour and we must begin to look at other south-east Asian and Pacific nations and see what is available in those areas.

For the clubs, too often the planning aspect is looked at in December when the football season is finished. But the

time to begin planning for the next season is right now.

Clubs should begin to look at the aspect of players, their performances to date and their desirability for next year. Clubs should start looking at players they may want for next year and make projections towards the cost of attaining them and budget accordingly.

Now is the time to begin the planning of any capital improvements for future years and become familiar with what grants are available and how to apply for them. It is also a good time to make initial approaches to sponsors or to begin the groundwork for major fundraising drives. Overall, it comes down to the long and short term objectives of each club. If a club is aiming for a higher division it must begin making plans to achieve that on the field and off the field.

## TALKING TOUGH SOCCER

It is hard to sympathise with referee Gordon Nicholson. I think he brings on himself much of the controversy that clouds nearly every NSL game he handles.

He just asked for trouble in giving Brisbane City a penalty last week. Luciano Fabrizio undoubtedly took a dive and made a mess of it as well. Even the most diehard of City supporters shook their heads when Nicholson fell for the ploy.

The decision set the tone of the match from then on and everything else, which normally would have been brushed over, suddenly became a huge farce.

Talking to Nicholson afterwards, it is obvious he is well aware of the rules of the game, how to administer them and how to display to the crowd the meaning of his decisions. But he is yet to master the art of gaining the respect of the players. The other refereeing controversy of last weekend was Bill Monteverde's decision to disallow a goal in the St. George-Canberra match he refereed in Sydney. On that occasion, and at the other end of the ground when a goal was awarded after a goalmouth scramble, Monteverde took the advice of his well-positioned linesman.

And yet he was still criticised. What could have happened if he had ignored his linesman? No doubt the outcry would

have been even louder.

## NOT JUST BLACK AND WHITE

THE REFEREES' POINT OF VIEW . . .

Who should control the top games each week, who should referee the Cup final games and the grand final?

That's the question asked not only by the federation, clubs and the media, but also by referees.

The problem it seems is everybody thinks the top five or six referees should control the top Premier and National games in Brisbane each week. That's only the first problem. The second is who rates the top five or six referees at any given moment?

Some would argue that the top National referees should always rate at the top. But that is not always the case.

I have mentioned before that there are referees' inspectors checking and marking referees each week. These marks are tallied and it can be seen whose performances have been at a consistently good level. Only last year a referee outside of the National League was voted Referee of the Year for his onfield performances. But because he wasn't a "National League referee", he was not considered good enough by the federation for the Premier League grand final.

Many referees, especially those at the

top level, think that the top six guys should also get the top games each week. Those on the fringe of the top level don't agree, but their chance to go out and referee the top level is severely limited.

The answer has to be a balance and the clubs have a right to expect the best referee available to control the top matches as well as acknowledging that promising officials have to be given top games to prove themselves.

Every club and player has their own opinion who are the top referees. Each referee is different and clubs react in their own way to that official. It would be interesting to poll clubs in each division and see who they rate as the top referee in each grade.

I wonder how far different it would be from the referees' rating scheme?

Maybe the Go Soccer should conduct an end of season poll and award a trophy, if a sponsor could be found, to the top referee in each grade.

The results could be interesting!

# REDLANDS KEEP BATTLING

While Wynnum has grabbed many of the Intermediate League headlines this season, spare a thought for their bayside rivals Redlands.

After narrowly missing promotion to the premier League last year and winning through to the Intermediate League grand final, many tipped Redlands as promotion favourites this season.

But it has been a tough year for Bill Bryant and his side and they have done well to stay among the competition leaders, although not threatening for promotion. It is almost hard to believe but Redlands this season have lost nine players from last year's Grand Final squad. They include Dave Large who retired, Craig Dangerfield who transferred to Lions, Stephen Marley who had study commitments this year, John Coffey who was forced out because of work, Kai Schimkatt who transferred to Logan City and Greg Rafter, Peter Gammie. Mark Colley and Tony Burley who are all injured.

Rafter and Colley injured knees, Gammie did a calf muscle while Burley badly dislocated his shoulder and the 23-year-old has been advised not to play in goal

again. Redlands also just recently lost Barry Kelso, who is on loan to Taringa for the remainder of the season.

New faces this year have included Steve Perry, Alan Collins and Shane Cooper and although they all have given mammoth efforts, they hardly are cover for nine players.

Redlands have been forced to develop their youth and make this season a consolidation year. President Dick Karremann has told Bryant that anything that is achieved this season will be a bonus. He knows that within a few years the kids will take Redlands back into the top league. The average age of the club's Intermediate League is 23.5 years, the Reserves 18.3 and the Sixth Division 22.

"There is certainly plenty of potential at the club and I have been delighted with the way everyone has rallied this season in the face of all our setbacks," Bryant said.

Every year we have State title competitions in all age groups except in senior football. Why can't we have a competition that involves the senior sides of all the State Federations including a side from South East Qld. made up of Premier League players? The nearest we have now is the Ampol Cup but this eliminates many of the country sides in knockout rounds before the competition proper.
