TEAMS WANTED TO GO INDOOR

A new indoor soccer club has been formed in the Logan City area and organisers are keen to attract players for the new season.

The Logan City Indoor Soccer Sports Club is based at Logan City Great Skate, Noel Street, Slacks Creek.

The club wants to run competitions for juniors, teenagers, men and women during the QSF off-season.

"We in no way want to impede soccer fixtures conducted under the auspices of the Queensland Soccer Federation, but we believe a well-organised off-season indoor competition will help players sharpen individual ball skills, improve their passing and heighten their levels of awareness in marking in defensive patterns," competition organiser Julie Wishart said.

Attractive incentives are now being offered for indoor soccer players in Australia. The Australian Indoor Soccer Federation will send teams to the following tournaments over coming months: Under 14 and 15 boys to Japan; Under 16 boys to play Italy in Australia; Under 18 boys to Holland and England; Under 20 men to Brazil; All age women to Holland and England; All age men to the World Indoor Soccer Cup in Spain.

"Indoor soccer is Australia's fastest growing sport at the moment and the players who get in early will be the ones who will have the edge when the rep. teams are picked," Mrs. Wishart said.

YOUNGSTERS READY FOR THE WORLD

Queensland will be represented at the inaugural world under 16 and youth championships in China and Russia over the next two months.

And our Young Maroons have hit form at the right time and now are set to do the state proud when they wear the green and gold.

Brisbane City striker Alfie Catalano and Ipswich United defender Damien Butler were named in the Australian Under 16 squad a month ago and the "Terrific Trio" was completed when Lions midfielder Richard Bassingthwaite gained selection in the Young Socceroos squad last week.

Catalano and Butler, whose under 16 squad have been dubbed the Kodak Kids following a giant sponsorship by Eastman Kodak, will be accompanied by Queensland coach Bruce Stowell and Queensland Soccer Federation president Ald. Ian Brusasco.

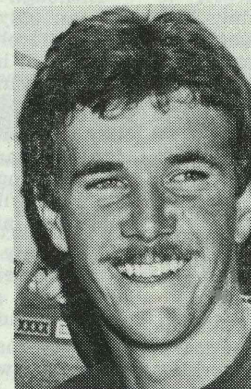


They have been grouped with West Germany, Argentina and Congo and will play their matches in the Chinese coastal industrial city of Taijan. And everything points towards success.

Bassingthwaite's selection in the Young Socceroos side continues a fine tradition for Queensland at Youth level. Gold Coast keeper Glenn Ahearn was a member of the 1981 squad while Danny Wright, Stephen Glockner, Russell Stewart and Frank Farina were 1983 Young Socceroos.

Bassingthwaite assured his selection in the final 18-man squad after a series of top performances for the Lions National League team in recent weeks.

In just a handful of first team appearances the Silkstone youngster has netted three goals.

"When I got to Canberra, for the final selection camp I wasn't sure whether Jimmy Shoulder knew what I had been doing. But we were practising shooting one day and I missed a few and he joked about how I was scoring so many goals in the NSL. That made me feel better," Bassingthwaite said.

The under 16 squad goes into camp within a fortnight and will play several warm-up games in the Sydney area before leaving for China.

The national Youth squad will assemble in Sydney shortly and will play a series of warm-up matches as curtain-raisers to the forthcoming international series.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Australian soccer authorities must react strongly to the disgraceful behaviour of Sydney Olympic supporters last Sunday.

Our fine game has now been directly linked with the radical element of English soccer, and like British authorities we must be seen to be taking stern steps to return the sport to sanity. Sydney Olympic are not first offenders. Their fans have caused trouble on a number of occasions in recent seasons. And each time the club has been let off lightly.

This is a matter for the Australian Soccer Federation to deal with. The National League, it must be remembered, is a club-orientated organisation that survives on the success of clubs like Sydney Olympic. Therefore the NSL cannot be left to deal with the matter alone.

The ASF must step in and make it quite clear to Olympic and its supporters that this type of loutish behaviour will not be tolerated in Australia. It is not the Australian way of sport and if Olympic's fans cannot accept that — then Australian soccer does not want them. The QSF recently showed that it will not tolerate this type of behaviour in handing down hefty fines to three clubs. One, an amateur third division side, was required to lodge a \$2500 bond

— a stinging, but very effective penalty. The ASF, and QSF boss Ian Brusasco as ASF senior vice-president is involved here, should act similarly. The fine should be of a size to affect Olympic in the same way the bond affected the Brisbane club.

In five minutes last Sunday, the Sydney Olympic supporters negated any progress our game had made in the past decade. On Monday morning soccer once again was a game for "hot-headed wogs".

Most of those playing the game now are Australians and unfortunately will be the ones to suffer. Sydney Olympic should pay for inflicting that on sport-loving people.

The time for the ASF to act is now, the manner can only be severe — for the sake of our game.

On a brighter note, congratulations must go to referee Bill Monteverde on his promotion to the FIFA panel.

Bill for many years has been a leading light among the constantly criticised Queensland referees. He is well respected by players and officials and will do Australia proud when called into the international arena.

It is not my position to say what the Australian Soccer Federation or the National League should do in the wake of the Sydney Olympic riot last weekend.

But as a concerned administrator, it worries me about the affects things like this have on those within the game, as well as the reaction evoked from those outside of the code.

Incidents like last weekend undo the work that has been achieved with players like Damien Butler and Alf Catalano in the under 16's and Richard Bassingthwaite in the Youth team.

They have highlighted the positive points of soccer, yet a lot of the media, thankfully not all, chose to overlook those achievements when they can headline events like those of last Sunday.

While the Sydney Olympic incident will be uppermost in the minds of many for some time, those that are working towards the positive aspects of our game should not lose heart.

Although setbacks like last weekend are an ugly scar, to achieve success at youth level and in the international arena will in time be remembered while the other incidents are slowly forgotten.

There is no stopping people like Sydney Olympic supporters. They act spontaneously and adopt the sheep syndrome of following each other. Any action by the authorities now will not erase what happened at Pratten Park last weekend.

The only way we can do that is to work harder on the positive side of our game and give the Australian sporting public a more favourable view of soccer.

Unfortunately that now means those that were working in that direction now must work harder. But I urge them not to lose faith. In the end they will succeed.

THE REFEREES' POINT OF VIEW . . .

STICK TO YOUR CARDS — It is just coincidence that the number of send-offs and cautions has increased over the past couple of weeks.

There has been no official crackdown by the referees although it may seem that way.

The two "summit" meetings were useful, but it is difficult to say they worked. Maybe they highlighted some of the problems to people in the game who could not see them before.

In the end though, the cleaning up of the game on the field must come down to the referees. So my advice to all refs is "stick to your cards".

The only way many players and clubs will react to any action is if cards are handed out to players when action by a referee is warranted.

It seems talking to players hasn't worked and coaches find it difficult to control their players once they get on the park.

Referees should not feel embarrassed or ashamed about showing the cards as that is their job. Forget about ill-informed demands from coaches, clubs and to a large extent the media and do your part in cleaning up the game.

In reply to Syd Shot's article recently I spoke to Alan Kibbler about the off-side incident at Spencer Park.

He said: "I saw the offside flag and waved to play on but made the mistake of not shouting "play on". The goalkeeper did not look at me and as all players had stopped, assumed there had been a whistle. I felt the problem was caused by me not saying "play on" for all to hear so in the spirit of the law it would have been wrong to penalise the goalkeepers."

NO CREDIT CARDS

Players sent-off next season in England will pay a higher price for their misdemeanours. A player sent off for the first time next season will lose half of his week's wages, a second dismissal will see him lose all his wages and a third red card will mean he will forfeit one and a half times his weekly salary. The previous rules saw only a maximum of 80 percent loss of wages for a third send-off.

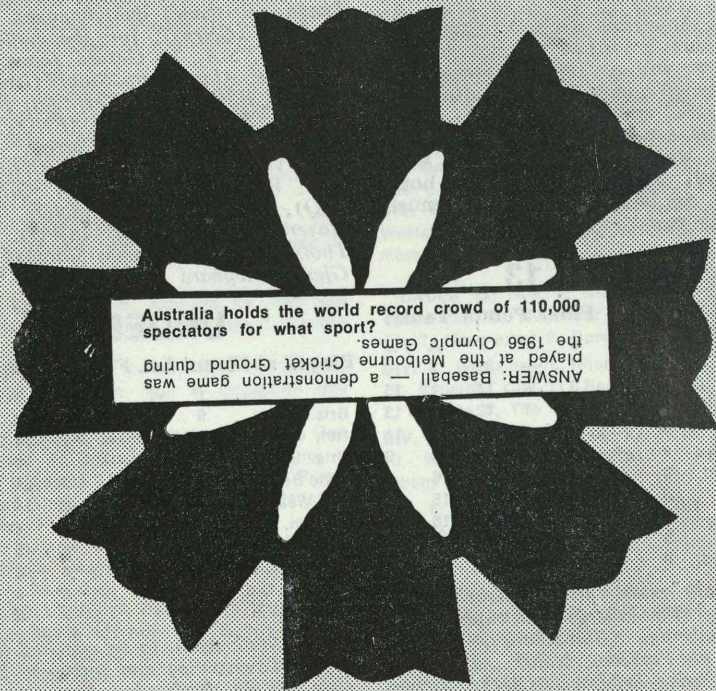
