## IPSWICH CHASING A SECOND CLUB TITLE

Ipswich United are staging a bold effort to retain the Premier League club championship — but the title is far from last season's two horse race.

Ipswich presently hold a two point lead in the race for the coveted and lucrative championship, but five other clubs are still in the reckoning with six rounds and more than 100 points remaining.

Ipswich United last week overhauled early leaders Lions in the championship race and are on 45 points, Lions on 43 hold only a tentative grasp on second place as lurking just behind are Grange Thistle on 41 points.

And certainly not out of contention are Taringa and North Star on 40 with Easts still well within a show on 37.

That situation is far different from the club championship race last year when Mount Gravatt and Ipswich United skipped clear of the others. The Hawks looked to have the title, and its accompanying prizes in their keeping until the final round. Ipswich Utd. took six points from Easts, while Mount Gravatt could only manage to secure one from North Star. The Coalminers took the title by two points with and over all score of 74 points.

Ipswich United were by far the Lea-

gue's most prolific scorers over the three Premier grades last year with 113 goals in 54 matches and are on target to exceed that total this season.

In 36 matches the Jacaranda sponsored side had netted 74 goals, 18 more than any other club.

While the club championship, which offers Insurance Exchange and Attack prizes, is keenly contested by the Premier League clubs, there is just an intense rivalry in the lower league for the "unofficial" club championship.

And Second Division pacesetters Inala City are runaway leaders. The club's three top senior sides have picked up 72 points from 41 games — scoring an amazing 156 goals and conceding only 36.

Other clubs doing well in the unofficial race include last year's unofficial club champions Annerley, whose top three sides this year have 54 points from 38 games while Wynnum are travelling well with 52 points from 37 games.

Other clubs that are displaying solid strength throughout their seniors include Rochedale, North Star, Salisbury, Mitchelton and Taringa.

Who was the Premier League coach who had officials from a rival, and struggling club, all excited when he casually suggested whether they would be interested in him coming over, with most of his team, next year. Was the coach serious or just teasing the officials?

Then there was the lower division player spotted parked just outside of the Wynnum ground, well in view of the dressing rooms where his team had assembled, looking at his street directory for Maramba stadium.

There could be a number of changes among local soccer writers before next season with more than one scribe looking to other areas. And an old name could return to the scene.

# FIGHTING FOUR BID FOR A CUP FINAL APPEARANCE

Four teams go into this weekend's Ampol Cup semi-finals with different, but equally important incentives.

North Star, Ipswich United, Sunnyside and Bundaberg Federation are just one step from the final and to win the Ampol Cup, the state's longest running statewide knockout competition, will enable each club to champion its cause.

North Star are the Cup holders. Last year no-one gave them a chance of beating Lions in the final. But they did it with enthusiasm and football and now Iain Fagan's side are determined to prove that win was no fluke.

For Ipswich United, the path to a Cup final is not a new one. They have been winners and losers. But this year there is a very real chance of the club winning the elusive treble. Ipswich are a big game team, but they need to get to the Cup final first.

Sunnyside are on the brink of the club's greatest ever triumph. The Croatian backed club suffered its biggest setbacks two years ago when it was relegated out of the Premier League. It is a tough battle to win the Intermediate League, and while they have missed on

that again this year, the Cup is a chance for the side to prove that they are still a force in Queensland soccer.

And for coach Tony Lowndes, the discarded Brisbane City National League mentor, it is a chance for him to prove a point.

For Bundaberg, to win the Cup would be the biggest boost to the region since the State League. Country soccer took a kick in the teeth when the State League was dismantled and the hopes of every country soccer player will be with the maroon and whites at Perry Park on Sunday.

Bundaberg and Sunnyside clash first at soccer headquarters at 12.30 p.m. while Ipswich and North Star meet at 2.30 p.m. A result must be achieved in each match. In the event of a draw after 90 minutes, two periods of 15 minutes extra time will be played. If the scores are deadlocked, penalties in accordance with FIFA rules will be taken.

This year's Ampol Cup is sponsored for \$15,000 by Ampol Petroleum (Qld.) Limited, and the Queensland Soccer Federation expresses its thanks.

It was reassuring to see Queensland Soccer Federation president Ald. Ian Brusasco's determined stand against increasing the Premier League to 12 teams next season.

The simple answer to anyone who advocates a change is why alter a successful formula?

Since the QSF re-structuring, the Premier and Intermediate Leagues have been highly competitive and intriguing to say the least. Just look at this year's competition. Only a few points separate the majority of teams and the battle against relegation is as intense as ever.

Similarly in the Intermediate League, although Wynnum have skipped away, the competition for top four places, and to avoid the drop to the amateurs is near cut-throat.

No doubt in taking his firm stand to juggle the present format Brusasco has learned from the National League debacle.

In nine years of the national competition, the format has changed up to four times. And the ever dis-satisfied clubs want to alter it again.

Soccer will never gain any credibility or sustained following if the general sporting public cannot understand what is going on. Thankfully we now have sanity in the local competition and the interest and support is growing steadily. Those that are advocating an increase

to 12 teams are those that are set to gain from the switch, either unjustified promotion and an escape from relegation.

The re-structuring is working. To tamper with it would be to invite trouble. Stick by your guns Ian Brusasco!

This week the biggest delegation of Queenslanders to an Australian soccer team contingent leave Brisbane for their final preparations for the world under 16 championships in China.

QSF boss and Australian Soccer Federation senior vice-president Ald Ian Brusasco heads the band of Maroons which also includes State coach Bruce Stowell, top junior official Stan Dye and of course champion players Damien Butler of Ipswich United and Alfie Catalano of Brisbane City.

The group will be helping to break new ground in world soccer and although the titles are at under 16 level, it should always be remembered that they are still a world championship — the best each nation can offer.

Australia has a great chance of success and Go Soccer takes this opportunity, on behalf of all Queensland soccer followers to wish the Maroon contingent well.

## ACROSS MY DESK . . .

I have written before on the importance of supporting the QSF Marketing scheme, but once again I feel I must stress the necessity and benefits of total support of the idea.

Clubs and affiliates have shown stronger support of the QSF Marketing endorsed products and we are expecting a considerable increase in financial returns this year. But we are still nowhere near maximising the full potential of the scheme.

As I have outlined before, every time a club or affiliate buys an endorsed product or uses an endorsed service, money comes back to soccer. And those returns are shared out not only to senior soccer, but also the juniors and women.

It has been made compulsory for clubs and member clubs of affiliates to use the endorsed products. That decision was made to ease the burden of future funding of the QSF and its affiliates.

The Marketing company does not retain any profits, nor does its officials who are all acting in an honorary capacity.

A number of companies have been endorsed and QSF Marketing is looking at a three-year program with these suppliers to gauge their potential. Companies to support include Attack, Sabre and Fourex in clothing and Mitre, Attack and Treloar in soccer balls among others.

The coming months are important times as clubs begin deciding what and where to buy for the next season. When your club makes those decisions, keep QSF Marketing uppermost in your thoughts. That way, in the long run, you and the rest of Queensland soccer will benefit.

## Q.S.F. MOVES TO SOLVE INSURANCE PROBLEMS

The Queensland Soccer Federation could discuss a number of recent incidents that have left injured players out in the cold.

A number of problems were raised by clubs including South Star and Goodna at this month's Council of Clubs meeting and the QSF management committee is keen to have the matters finalised.

The problems have occurred with regard to the loss of wage clause. Injured players have taken holidays to avoid losing their jobs while injured and then have found they have not received loss of wage payments. There are particular and more detailed circumstances in each case, which the QSF and the insurers are considering.

But QSF secretary, Mr. Alan Vessey, conceded this week things were far from ideal for all parties concerned.

"There are a couple of cases we are not happy with and we have written to the brokers and asked them to take the matter up with the insurers. We are awaiting replies but if things are not

finalised satisfactorily in the near future we will request a meeting with the insurers," Vessey said.

The problems that are arising have caught many unaware as they did not occur last year. But Vessey pointed out that before complaining, those seeking compensation should understand it is against the law to make a profit out of insurance payments.

"Payments are made to ensure an injured player is compensated not rewarded for his mishap," Vessey said.

Clubs have paid out considerable sums this year to be part of the compulsory insurance scheme. Premiums this year included \$600 for each amateur team and \$790 for each semi-professional side.

Benefits include \$30,000 death cover, \$150 per week loss of wage with a seven day excess and 50 percent of non-Medicare expenses. Claims should be lodged within 30 days of the injury.

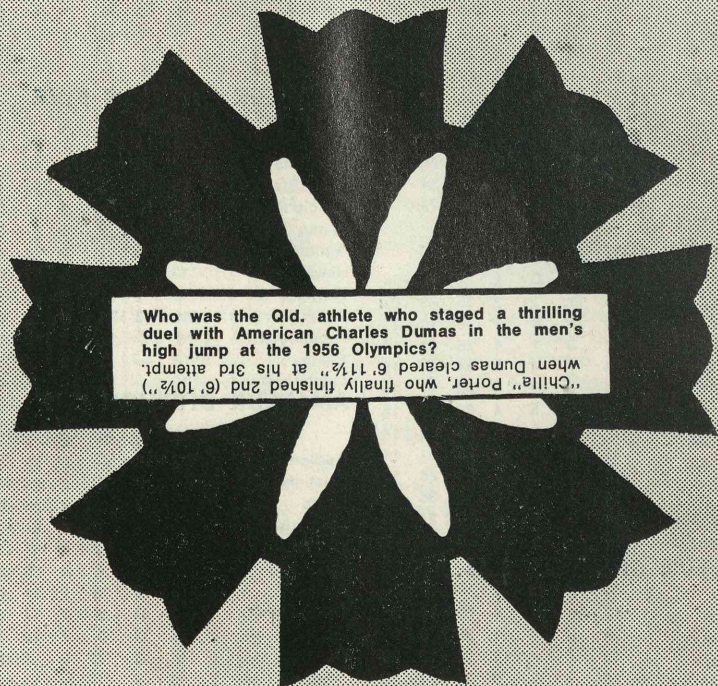

## HUGO A 'GOER' FOR THE WORLD UNDER 16 TITLES

Australia's youngest Socceroo will face tough opposition when they take on Argentina during their qualifying matches in the finals of the inaugural FIFA World Under-16 Kodak Cup in China this month.

One of their opponents in the Argentinian side will be 15-year-old Hugo "Huguito" Maradona, a brother of the world's highest paid soccer player.

Australia's first match will be against Argentina on Wednesday, July 31. The 'Kodak Kids' will play in group B against Argentina, Congo and the German Federal Republic at Tianjin, 135 kilometres from the Chinese capital of Beijing.

They will leave for China next week and because of the sport's popularity, chinese officials expect big attendances at Tianjin's Minyuan stadium.

The Australian Soccer Federation believes the youngsters will be the nucleus of the 1989 World Youth Cup squad and will be the backbone of the 1992 Olympic Games team.

The other 12 nations competing in the Cup are: Group A — China, Bolivia, Guinea, United States; Group C — Saudi Arabia, Costa Rica, Nigeria, Italy; Group D — Qatar, Brazil, Mexico, Hungary.

After the qualifying round, the two leading teams in each group will contest the quarter-finals.

The final will be at Beijing on Sunday August 11.

Australia's squad will assemble in Sydney tomorrow and leave for China on Thursday July 25. There are five Queenslanders in the party, players Damien Butler and Alfie Catalano and officials Ian Brusasco, Bruce Stowell and Stan Dye.

## KIWIS PLAY IT SAFE

Ten of the players who were in the New Zealand soccer team at the World Cup finals in Spain in 1982 have been included in a squad of 27 named for this year's World Cup Oceania qualifying round.

In naming his squad, New Zealand coach Kevin Fallon has covered the possibility that some players might not be available.

Three, midfielders Kevin Hagan and Declan Edge and striker Colin Walker, the top equal scorer in New Zealand's National League, are still awaiting naturalisation.

It is also still not certain that captain Ricki Herbert, who plays for English Third Division club Wolves, and the Rufer Brothers, Shane and Wynton, who play for FC Zurich in the Swiss First Division, will be available for all games.

New Zealand's first World Cup qualifying game is against Australia at Auckland on September 21 and Fallon will reduce his squad to the statutory 22 on August 27.

## CROATIAN TAKES COURT ACTION

Former international Vedran Rozić has brought the Yugoslav Soccer Federation (YSF) to court in a dispute over his right to play in Australia.

Rozić, who has been in Australia for more than a year, filed a petition with a Belgrade court alleging that the YSF had illegally prevented him from playing for National League side Sydney Croatia.

His lawyer asked the court to order the YSF to issue a licence allowing Rozić to join Sydney Croatia and demanded two million dinars (\$A10,317) in damages.

The petition said Rozić fulfilled all conditions to play in Australia, but the YSF had failed to issue an international licence following "sensationalist reports in the Yugoslav media about the alleged hostile nature of Croatia."

Thirty-seven English football league clubs face possible financial difficulties and the closure of parts of their soccer grounds next season as a result of the introduction of new safety and fire regulations.

In the wake of the Bradford fire disaster on May 11, in which 54 people died the 1975 Safety of Sports Grounds Act, which previously only applied to first and second division clubs, has been extended to include third and fourth division members of the 92-club football league.

This means that 37 clubs from the two lower divisions (11 clubs relegated from the second division already possess valid safety licences) now face the task of bringing their grounds up to the required safety standards by the start of the new English season on August 17.

The overall cost of the operation has been estimated at between Stg15 million (\$A28.96 million) and Stg22 million (\$A42.48 million) — a sum which is far beyond the reach of the ailing clubs.

Who will pay — soccer itself or the British Government who are implementing the extension of the law — remains unresolved following two meetings of a working party formed to find ways of improving the state of English soccer.

The lowly clubs have little money to spare and the football grounds improvement trust, which normally pays up to 75 per cent of improvement costs, has less than Stg2 million (\$A3.86 million) to distribute.

As a result, clubs are likely to carry out the required improvement work on a piecemeal basis over a prolonged period, with only the more easily certifiable sections of the grounds being open for stands, like that which burnt to the start of the season.

Clubs where old timber-structured ground at Bradford, remain alongside modern concrete grandstands and open terracing will probably have to close the former until they can be renovated.

The resultant reductions in ground capacity are unlikely to affect the comfort of spectators because few clubs in the third or fourth divisions attract more than a meagre 3,000 or 4,000 fans, and many attract a great deal less.

The working party — made-up of representatives of the Football League, Football Association (FA), Football Trust, Pools Promoters Association, Sports Council, Football Grounds Improvements Trust, Home Office and the Sports Minister Neil McFarlane — has heard reports

from surveyors on all the 130 soccer grounds in England and Scotland as well as the Windsor Park stadium in Belfast.

The president of the Football League Jack Dunnett has said many clubs will be forced to close without financial assistance from the government.

But Football League secretary Graham Kelly disagrees. The third and fourth division clubs are the ones that can least afford the expenditure — and that concerns us. But it is premature to start talking about clubs going out of business."

The most likely solution to the problem of financing the ground improvements is a reduction in the pools betting duty, currently 42.5 per cent, to 40 per cent with the pools companies and the league sharing the money thus released.

Kelly said he believed this would provide about Stg5 million (\$A9.65 million) annually for ground improvements.

Lobbying is reported to have started in Parliament, pointing out to politicians that the duty on pools betting already produces over Stg200 million (\$A386 million).

If the lobbying fails and no cut in duty is approved, the third and fourth division clubs face an increasingly testing future with severe cutbacks to staff and a widespread transition to part-time soccer likely to be the only solution.

**The Football League plan to break down the barrier between referees and players in a new attempt to reduce the number of bookings and sendings-off.**

*Captains will have a pre-match discussion with the referee when they take in their team sheets, referees will be encouraged to visit clubs to meet the staff, and match officials will be allowed to share an after-match drink with managers and players.*

*Captains will now wear an official arm band on the field and will be allowed to talk with the referee during the game. Failure to reduce the number of cautions and dismissals has led to the campaign. Figures for the season up to mid-April this year (3,594 cautions and 151 sendings-off) suggest there will be yet another increase by the end of the season.*
