IT'S A CLASSIC CUP FINAL

Plucky Intermediate League side Sunnyside stands between North Star becoming the first club in nearly 20 years to retain the Ampol Cup.

The two clubs will clash, almost certainly at soccer headquarters, on Sunday, August 25 in the Cup final.

They earned the right to play in the climax to the \$15,000 statewide knockout competition after winning their semifinals in a thrilling and well-supported semi-final program at Perry Park last weekend.

Sunnyside beat country hopefuls Bundaberg 1-0 on a Marcello "Ringo" Mejais goal while North Star ended Ipswich United's treble hopes, and kept their own alive, when they advanced on a David Currie goal.

The final now is a classic Minnow v Giant Cup affair.

Sunnyside, under the coaching of Tony Lowndes, are only moderately placed in the Intermediate League while North Star, guided by player coach Iain Fagan, are bidding for a Premier League semifinal place.

North Star won the trophy for the first time in the club's history when, as underdogs, they beat hot favourites Lions in the final minutes.

Stars will go into this year's final as the favourites, although no club has retained the Ampol Cup since Hellenic won it five years in a row in the early 60's.

For Sunnyside, it is the furtherest the club has ever advanced in the competition and the Perry Park ground is certain to be packed to the rafters with the club's enthusiastic Croatian supporters supporters who have been praised by various clubs in the Intermediate League this season.

It will be a classic Cup confrontation — and no doubt a fitting finale to the state's longest running knockout football competition.



Russell Stewart's good form of late and his total dominance of the midfield against Adelaide City recently was none so more demonstrated when he took on NSL Player of the Year Sergio Melta, played a beautiful "nutmeg" and strolled off towards the goal.

Mount Gravatt president Paul Lonton showed his professionalism and the club's sporting nature in two letters this week following Noel Davis' leg break at Dit-tmer Park recently. Lonton wrote to Lions to assure the club there was no ill-feeling and thanked Calvin Daunt and Mick Mulvey for their after-match enquiries at the hospital. The referees also received praise from Lonton who said of John Broughton - "he enhanced the game as an exciting encounter for both sets of supporters." The Hawks president, in a separate letter to the referees federation, went on to thank the match officials for the help and concern after Davis' accident. Well done Paul and Mount Gravatt.

A very prominent referee is understood to be in two minds about continuing at NSL level next year, and has indicated he may "retire" to Premier League and lower only. The competent whistler may be a little disillusioned that he has missed out on long overdue recognition. Who was the Intermediate League player who turned up at his appeal last week with his wife? And a few are wondering how he managed to get his cause promoted in one of the weekend papers.

A lot was made last weekend of Jim Hermiston's telephone substitution. But not all at the ground were in favour of passing the message on and some reckoned that as the man at the ground, and the one in charge on the day, Tony Buesnel should have been left to make his own decisions.

If the 2 National League clubs are looking for a player to bolster their squads next year, they would be well advised to have a good look at Bundaberg's Peter Kelly. At 23, he's a great prospect and probably the most consistent sweeper in Queensland this season. If Frank Farina, Manis Lomons and Ray Junna are examples, Lions and City scouts won't recognise Kelly's talents until he is snapped up by a southern club.

Will QSF officials turn out in force this weekend to watch their Premier League game at Richlands, bearing in mind the likely presence of a big contingent of officials representing a rival sponsor?



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Brusasco confirmed that if Perry Park went plastic, it almost certainly would be in conjunction with the Queensland Hockey Association.

The QSF Trust is committed to formulate a development plan for Perry Park, as by next year the existing bank overdraft on the complex will be wiped. Therefore funds will be available to upgrade the complex.

"There is a lot of maintenance to be done, but that aside, the Trust must sit down soon and look where we are going. We are limited in a certain extent in that Perry Park is a Council lease, but if the Council is looking to stage the Olympics then it must look to utilise grounds like Perry Park," Brusasco said.

Although soccer has had an established headquarters for longer than some of the other codes, the sport is being left behind in terms of developing its ground.

Lang Park is now a world standard arena and the Queensland Rugby Union has recently announced plans to develop Ballymore into a multi-million dollar sporting complex.

The Queensland Australian Football League this week also revealed its plans to build a headquarters at Boondall.

"The Ballymore Bears type of development in conjunction with private developers has never been considered because of our lease arrangement, but the idea of getting other sports to Perry Park is not only being considered but has been done in the past," Brusasco said.

The potential of Perry Park is enormous. The developed section of the ground represents only a portion of the area defined by the lease.

With approval, development could take over the area presently occupied by storage sheds on the eastern side of the field.

Soccer, and those involved in the game, are often among those first to criticise the code.

This unfortunate trait seems to have become all too common in our game and sometimes perhaps we do not appreciate or give due credit, to what we have or have achieved. The Ampol State Cup is a prime example.

The competition is the longest running statewide knockout Cup, of any football code. The Ampol Cup encompasses sides from as far as Toowoomba to Mount Isa. It gives the opportunity for players in almost every part of the state to taste top Cup competition.

Anyone at Perry Park last weekend would have seen the high regard and importance placed on a good Cup run by country folk. Bundaberg brought three coach loads of spectators to Brisbane last week and helped make semi-final day one of the most successful promotions at Perry Park this season.

Sunnyside too have shown what the Cup is all about. They have thrown off indifferent Intermediate League form to fight their way to the final. Similarly North Star embody the competitive spirit among Premier League clubs to win the prized trophy.

The Ampol Cup is no longer a season "bonus". By the sheer amount of prize-

money involved — \$15000 and \$6000 to the winner — it has to be a key part of a club's season plan.

Ampol Petroleum must be thanked for their continual support of the competition and perhaps it is about time we started boasting to other sports about our state competition — which is the equal, if not better, than those in other codes. After last weekend, Queensland soccer has every reason to be proud of its Ampol Cup.

Similarly, some have taken for granted the achievement of the Australian Youth and under 16 teams in qualifying for the world titles which will be held in Russia and China over the next month.

Our efforts in qualifying should not be taken for granted. From more than 130 soccer-playing nations, we have proved we are among the top 16 in the world. At youth level, this will be our third consecutive finals — and we are yet to be placed lower than ninth.

Rather than knocking the code, next be proud of what soccer has achieved and use successes like the Ampol Cup and our national youth teams to promote the sport to the non-converted.

ACROSS MY DESK . . .

The importance of sponsors within our code, and particularly long term and generous sponsors like Ampol Petroleum, Castlemaine Perkins and Qantas, cannot be taken too lightly.

In the case of Ampol, which after last weekend's highly successful semi-final day is a good example, the benefits are not just restricted to those in the limelight. In 10 years the backing from Ampol Petroleum has grown from \$2000 to this year's \$15,000, and that is a boost for soccer Queensland-wide.

Although the \$6,000 winner's cheque is a luring incentive, cash handouts go to the runners-up, the losing semi-finalists and even country zone winners. That money helps offset the costs incurred in a successful Cup run, and often is poured back into soccer. So in backing the Cup, Ampol is backing soccer on a wide scale.

The format that is adopted is as close as possible to an FA Cup style of competition and the random draw from guarter-final stage has allowed teams like Bundaberg and Sunnyside to make the most of their opportunities. The Ampol Cup is for many teams, their chance for glory.

That makes the Ampol sponsorship one that is highly valued by the federation and in turn it should be highly valued and respected by the clubs and affiliates. And that should go for all the federation's sponsors.

When a region like Bundaberg is motivated enough to bring three busloads of supporters to Brisbane for a Cup semifinal, then soccer certainly has something to be proud of. And it is because of the faith in the game shown by sponsors like Ampol.

Such sponsorships must be retained and everyone has a responsibility to support them in whatever way they can, because it will be soccer that benefits. 25th July, 1985

TALKING TOUGH SOCCER

After a few weeks holidaying in New Zealand, I have returned refreshed and eager to tackle the remaining weeks of the season — but I wish the news I have brought back for Frank Arok was as pleasant.

After watching several games of football in the Shaky Isles, I am convinced the Kiwis will be harder than ever to beat in our forthcoming World Cup qualifying games.



Top New Zealand officials told me that boom has since subsided, and some even admit perhaps it was not exploited enough. But now there is a new challenge.

The fine showing by the country's rugby league team against the Kangaroos was all the talk throughout New Zealand and now soccer authorities, and the players, believe to maintain their standing among Kiwi sporting fans, they too must beat the Australians.

That opening clash on September 21 at Auckland, and the Australians will find the field much softer than anything they have played on this season, is set to be a beauty.

Derek Dougan, the man who helped save Wolverhampton Wanderers from collapse two years ago, has joined the long list of creditors trying to close down the club. Dougan, who resigned as club chairman in January has now joined the list of petitioners behind winding up orders that could result in the closure of the struggling club. And in further bad news for Wolverhampton, their shirts have virtually be torn off their backs. The clubs strips were plastered with a sponsor's name, but now the sponsor has pulled out of the deal, rendering the shirts useless. The crucial European group seven

match between Wales and Scotland will now be played at Ninian Park Cardiff and not the Cardiff Arms Rugby Union ground.

The Welsh FA wanted to take the game to the National Stadium where a 62,000 crowd would have brought profits of three quarters of a million dollars. but the Welsh Rugby Union vetoed the proposal following the tragedy in Brus-

sels. Ninian Park has half the capacity of the Rugby ground and now to ensure the match is still a money spinner for the financially troubled Welsh FA, seat prices have been doubled.

The Bulgarian Football Association has banned for life five players including two internationals and suspended four others following a brawl in the country's Cup final between Levski Spartak, the police team and CSKA Sofia, which is run by the army. The banned internationals are goalkeeper Borislav Mikhailov and defender Plamen Nikolov from Levski. Their team-mates Emil Velev and Emil Spassov were also outed for life along with CSKA player Khristo Stoichey.

Both clubs were disbanded on government orders after a violent brawling game in which players swapped punches and intimidated the referee. The match was won 2-1 by CSKA, but the government has ordered that the Cup be withheld.

THE REFEREES' POINT OF VIEW . . .

It's about time clubs realise that referees don't make the laws of the game they only enforce the laws that exist.

And law is quite specific about the way a referee should handle injuries on the field. The law says we should stop the game if a player has been seriously injured and have the player removed from the field as soon as possible. The law further says the game should not be stopped if a player is slightly injured and any player who is able to go to the touchline should not be treated on the field.

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The law infers that the treatment of injuries is in the hands of the referee. Therefore it is up to the referee to decide how serious the injury is. This may not please too many "medics" on the sidelines, but that's the way the law reads. If you don't think the law is right . . . Then change the law, don't blame the referee on the day.

It must be remembered that somebody has to make the decision and while the top clubs have strappers etc, in the lower divisions it is whoever happens to be sitting next to the bucket. The laws are designed to cover all divisions of the game, not just the fortunate clubs. It's an awesome responsibility that I am sure most referees would rather not have but at this stage we are stuck with the job and must make the best of it.

How many times do you see a player slightly injured being told to lie down by his team-mates? Everyone then gets upset when the referee refuses to stop the game, noting that the player could have walked to the sideline for treatment. How many times, with one of their team-mates lying injured, do you see players continue playing rather than kick the ball out, and still demanding the referee acknowledge their injured colleague.

I don't believe a game should be stopped or treatment allowed for a player who has cramp. A player can usually solve that problem himself or go to the sideline. Too many players go down and demand treatment for very minor knocks. It is these players who set the standard for a referee to judge by.

Sometimes a more serious injury is given scant attention by the referee as he has to deal with very minor incidents throughout a game. I know its not the perfect system but until someone finds a better one, and changes the law, it's what we are stuck with.

Clubs would do better to instruct players to go to the sidelines if they need treatment, rather than abuse the referee when he won't stop a game.

All for taking the time to do the hardest job in the game.

The reason referees are clinging to the job is that no-one else wants to do it. But it's a worry each week. You just don't know what the devil is going to happen next,


