## VESSEY OFFERS SOUND ADVICE



A trip by Queensland Soccer Federation secretary Alan Vessey (pictured) to Chinese-Taipei this month is set to ensure the 1987 Young Socceroos are given the best possible chance to qualify to the finals.

Vessey is one of four soccer officials from within the Oceania Confederation invited to conduct a series of seminars in the south-east Asian country from August 16 to 22.

The seminars will be designed to help improve the standard of Chinese-Taipei soccer at all levels. That includes administration and Vessey hopes to teach those who attend the course skills which will stand them in good stead when the country hosts the Oceania qualifying round of the world youth championships in 1987.

Vessey played a key role in this year's qualifying tournament in Sydney and if the Chinese-Taipei authorities can learn how to stage an event with similar precision, the Young Socceroos will face no outside obstacles in attempting to win the tournament.

Travelling with Vessey to the seminar will be NSW director of coaching Alan Vest, Fiji refereeing official Ahmed Husain and New Zealand sports medicine expert David Edwards.

Vessey, 45, will be calling on a decade of experience with the QSF when he lectures on a wide range of topics. His list of areas of discussion include FIFA and its statutes, the structure and role of the national, local and club associations, correct meeting procedures and finance and budgeting.

And although Vessey will be the one

emparting most of the knowledge, he too expects to learn.

"By listening to and understanding the problems other countries have in administration, often you can see a solution which may apply to the QSF as well," Vessey said.

This will be Vessey's second overseas lecture course. In 1979 he travelled with Eric Worthington, Leo Wilson and Kerry Thompson to do a similar series in Papua New Guinea.

"I learned from PNG that as an administrator you have an important role in co-ordinating administration, coaching, the referees and the media into one working unit. That is the secret to success, but undoubtedly the hardest and least glamorous job in soccer," Vessey said.

The Chinese-Taipei lecture series is part of the on-going FIFA Coca-Cola world football development program in as much that the tour will encompass the principles of one association assisting another.

During his absence, Vessey will be ably covered for by QSF assistant secretary Jim Gilbert and the Perry Park staff.

## Points to Ponder

Popular story doing the rounds tells of the Premier League club which approached one of its player of NSL experience to take on a player-coach position. The money reportedly was quite good but the player concerned declined the offer and it is understood has since made enquiries about returning to his old stamping ground.

The Olympic United committee's decision to take on the selection of its Premier League team will put the club in a very difficult position when it calls

for coaches next year, irrespective of what league it plays in. It is hard to see any professional going there now with the club having that kind of track record.

A few tempers flared in the Lions NSL dressing room last weekend after the shock 1-2 loss to Heidelberg and one young star took berating a media representative. His point was right but his method wasn't.

Don't be surprised that now the Australian under 16 team is in China that Queensland's Bruce Stowell begins emerging as the more dominant coach as far as team activities are concerned.

## GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Irrespective of the circumstances, there can be no excuse for the Olympic committee taking on the selection of the club's Premier League team.

If the media reports are true then it is a deplorable decision and the club has lost all credibility.

Grahame McMillan was appointed as coach and his record to date has not been that bad. How club officials can justify their actions in taking the power of selection away from McMillan is beyond understanding. Most would have resigned over the incident.

The interference of club officials in team matters has always been one of the behind the scenes problems of soccer. Clubs will never prosper or taste success while officials believe they are better qualified than the man they sought fit to appoint as team coach.

Everyone will have their own opinions on the ability of a player or the quality of football produced by a side. But the coach is the man in charge and should stand or fall by his decisions. To interfere with team selections is to show a committee without the courage of its convictions — a club desperate and devoid of ideas.

One wonders now where the club will go if the committee is unsuccessful in its selections?

The whole incident no doubt has left a sour taste in the mouth of not only Grahame McMillan but his players. It is indeed an undesirable blur on the season.

Olympic has chosen that path and it is too late now for further action, the committee will have to accept the responsibilities. But hopefully other clubs will see the folly of the decision to interfere.

**But for statistical purposes, the National League season is over for Brisbane City and Lions.**

An honest appraisal will show it has not been a successful season. Once again we have failed to compete with the south on many fronts. Now is the time to begin planning for next year, and the NSL clubs should receive the co-operation of all Queensland soccer.

The NSL will continue and Queensland will be involved but it will never be a success here until we taste success on the field. And once we do, that success will flow down to all other levels of soccer. A few more people should realise that.

The National League is a reality, let's make it work in 1986.

## ACROSS MY DESK . . .

The importance that world youth championships at under 16 and under 20 level have assumed in recent years should be reflected upon when clubs consider nominating players for state representative teams.

The national championships are the first major step in the youth selection program and the federation always endeavours to field the best side possible, no matter from where in the State a player may live.

For that reason, State director of coaching, Bruce Stowell, moves constantly throughout the State looking at possible candidates.

But one of the problems that is continually emerging in the city is clubs that cause an undue waste of time at trial level by nominating far too many players. For instance, this year we had one club which nominated eight players for trials.

In doing that the club was saying that it felt it had eight players capable of making the State team. And with due

respect to the players concerned, it's just not fair on them or those who have to undergo trials.

The situation has forced the federation to consider a policy of examining the qualification of the coach of each team to gauge the selections.

We have told clubs repeatedly that we are looking for quality rather than quantity. By nominating excessive numbers of players, all clubs are doing is placing undue pressure on the State coach and those assisting him. In the long term that will restrict the time the State coach has available to develop those who make the final squad.

Youth football is now an important and professionally organised level of our game. Clubs should begin to adopt a similar outlook.

The Australian under 16 team, in China for the inaugural world championships for the Kodak Cup has proved to be an instant hit with the locals.

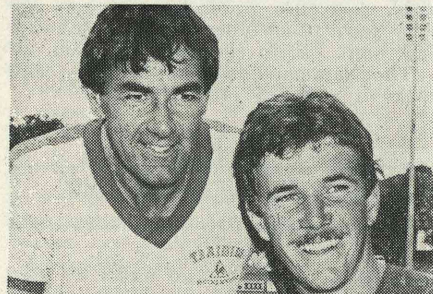
The Chinese, who still fondly remember the Socceroos who toured there last year, have turned out in their thousands to watch every training session and match involving the young Aussies.

## A BATTLE FOR SURVIVAL

The two teams to be relegated from the Intermediate League back into the amateurs could well be decided this weekend.

The draw has pitted the bottom four clubs against each other.

Presently Newmarket and Kingsridge are equal last on seven points, with Newmarket having a slight goal difference advantage.

Two points above them are locked Redlands and Valley Trident, with Valleys having a much more inferior goal difference than the Baysiders.

This weekend Valley Trident host Newmarket on Sunday while Redlands and Kingsridge clash at the Showground on

Saturday evening. If Redlands and Valley Trident win, the other two sides will be four points adrift at the bottom of the table and almost certainly relegated. Kingsridge are now unbeaten in three games while Newmarket were desperately unlucky against Sunnyside.

But then Valley took the first point off Wynnum last weekend and Redlands are a talented young side. For once the division this weekend could take the limelight off the Premier League.

"It has required very little effort by us, but has proved to be very effective. The Australians have sparked the Chinese imagination and if we can get the crowds onside for the remainder of the tournament we will have a major head-start," Brusasco said from Tainjin, where the Australians are playing their round one matches.

Australian coach Vic Dalglish said the tournament was a great opportunity for the youth of the world to make friends not only with one another — but with the Chinese people.

"The Australian boys will do all they can to be friendly and this will be good for soccer. Fortunately China is in another group in the tournament and by extending the hand of friendship we hope to get their support in the qualifying matches," he said.

Australia played Argentina in its opening match on Wednesday and is drawn to meet the Congo tomorrow (Friday) and West Germany on Sunday. The Young Aussies must finish first or second in the group to advance to the next round.

Queensland is represented at the championships by players Damien Butler and Alfie Catalano in addition to Brusasco, state coach Bruce Stowell and junior official Stan Dye.

And it has been discovered this week that Butler is the youngest player in the squad while Catalano is the eldest. Butler, from Ipswich United not 16 until September 5 while Catalano qualified inside the age limit by only 25 days.

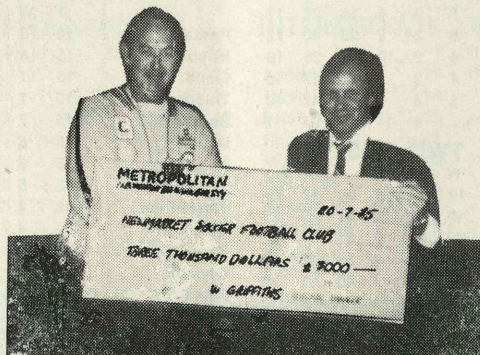

The Newmarket player of the match

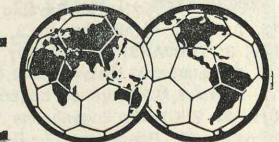
for the main game was Grant McCullagh, a selection which was most certainly deserved.

Pedro Pasculli, the leading scorer in Argentina last season is negotiating with newly-promoted Italian side Lecce. The 23-year-old Pasculli who scored three times in his country's recent World Cup qualifying games, is insisting on a clause in his contract that he be released for international duty, something the Italians are reluctant to grant. And another Argentine, Daniel Passarella, intends to end his career in Italy. Passarella, who was a member of the 1978 World Cup winning side, has been offered a new three year contract with Italian club Fiorentina, but has signed only a one-year agreement. Passarella was quoted as saying his main concern was with the World Cup in Mexico next year after which he anticipates he will give up football.

Plans have been put forward for a new English knockout Cup, involving First and Second Division clubs only. The

plans are yet to receive League approval but the idea is being strongly pushed by Chelsea chairman Ken Bates and his Crystal Palace counterpart Ron Noades.

Liverpool captain Phil Neal, rumoured to be leaving the club after failing to land the managerial position, promises he will line up again for the new season.

Mexico, for many years rated very ordinary class on the world scene, have suddenly become an outside chance to win the World Cup, played in their own country.

The Mexicans were much too good for England in Mexico City recently.

Polish international Zbigniew Boniek has left European Cup winners Juventus for Roma. Although a transfer fee was not disclosed, Boniek has reportedly signed a three-year contract.

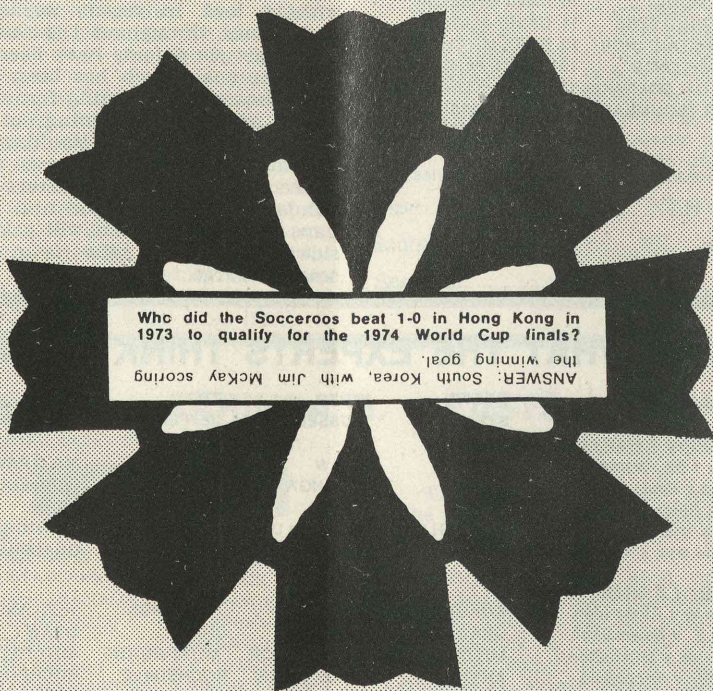
