YOUNG SOCCEROOS BEGIN OUR THIRD CHALLENGE

This week Australia's Young Socceroos — the national youth (under 20) team — left for Russia for the world youth championships for the Coca-Cola Cup.

It will be the third consecutive championship finals in which the Young Socceroos have participated.

Australia is highly regarded throughout the world at youth level — having been unlucky quarter-final losers in Sydney in 1981 and finishing ninth in Mexico in 1983.

There is extra pressure on this year's squad following the success of the Australian under 16 team in China.

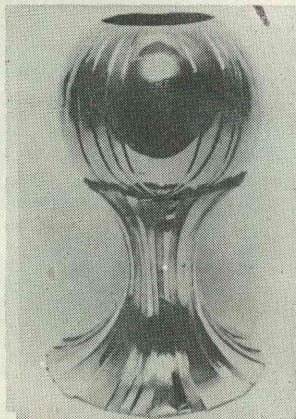
Queensland has one member in the Youth squad, Brisbane Lions midfielder Richard Bassingthwaighte.

The squad will finalise its championship preparations with an intensive training camp in Holland over the next fortnight. The team then flies into Russia on August 19 to prepare for the opening match of the tournament, against the Russians in Minsk on August 24.

The other teams in Australia's opening round group are Canada and Nigeria.

While on paper it looks as if the Young Socceroos have an excellent chance of finishing either first or second in the group and advancing to the quarter-finals, coach Jim Shoulder warns that the Young Australians cannot afford to take any team lightly.

"Every side has had to battle to reach the final 16 so they all must have ability. We will be going out to give our best

and hopefully that will be enough to carry us through," Shoulder said.

Next week's edition of Go Soccer will give a complete wrap-up of the Youth team and its program at the world titles.

Points to Ponder

There was an interesting set of results in the clash between University and Nerang on the Gold Coast at the weekend. The University Division One

Reserves, who happen to be leading their league, won 8-0, yet the University first team, positioned about mid-table were beaten 7-0. Has the club put all its eggs in one basket — and not that of its first team?

One struggling club certainly found that everything was against them last week. The side battled back from 1-3 deficit to draw level with their opponents then had three goals disallowed — two of those for offside after the ball had bounced BACK off the crossbar. We understand a report could well be submitted.

WILL IT BE OUR LAST DERBY?

Will this weekend's National League derby between Brisbane City and Lions at Richlands be the last?

Reports continue to filter out of Melbourne that despite a resolution by the 24 NSL member clubs to maintain the present format for three years, the competition is under review yet again.

A number of Melbourne clubs have met on several occasions in recent weeks to discuss a new format and the latest reports indicate they are now seeking a conference with "selected" Sydney clubs.

The reports say the clubs want a seven Melbourne team — seven Sydney team competition. That will leave Brisbane,

along with the other smaller centres, out in the cold.

Despite the reports, Brisbane officials are confident that both City and Lions will be in the National League next year. They point out that the clubs organising the new format would not have the votes to succeed.

But stranger things have happened in the National League and as the two Brisbane clubs go into battle against each other this weekend, they would be well advised to keep one eye on what's happening across the border.

KODAK KIDS DO THE TRICK!

Australian soccer has taken a giant leap forward over the past week with the heroic performances of the Kodak Kids at the inaugural world under 16 championships in China.

Tour leader in China, QSF president and ASF senior vice-president, Ald. Ian Brusasco summed it up when he said after the first round: "Whatever happens from here on in is a bonus. We have proved our point in the first round alone".

And indeed the Young Aussies made the world sit up and take notice when they brushed aside the youth teams from Argentina and West Germany — countries which in the past 15 years have won senior World Cups.

Australia beat the Argentines 1-0, the Germans by the same score and edged

out their other group opponent, the Congo 2-1.

"We have beaten a European team, a South American team and an African team by playing Australian style football. That is the lesson for everyone at home to learn," Brusasco said.

The Young Australians captured the imagination of the sports-crazy Chinese in the opening round and were the only team to emerge from the initial stage of the tournament with a perfect record.

Although every member of the 18-man squad has been a hero in his own right, the two Queenslanders in the side — Damien Butler and Alfie Catalano have more than played their parts.

"It is undoubtedly the greatest Australian soccer tour I have been privileged to be part of," Brusasco said.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

This month has been one of the brightest in Australian soccer for a long time.

Locally the Socceroos scored their biggest win in years with an emphatic 4-1 win over touring Yugoslav side Red Star Belgrade while overseas our under 16's have proved to be the greatest ambassadors for the game since the 1974 Socceroos.

Yet these great achievements, particularly these of the under 16's in the world forum, have not gained the publicity they deserve.

The Australian media was all to quick to pick up on the Brussels tragedy and the Sydney Olympic riot and plaster the ugly side of soccer on the front pages.

Yet some local newspapers have ignored the world titles in China. They have scarcely rated a mention on morning radio bulletins and some television networks do not appear to even know they are on.

But this situation can be remedied quickly by a simple action.

Soccer followers should call the various news outlets. Not just the papers, but

the radio stations and the television networks. Ask to speak to the news editors. Then, without being rude or abrupt, ask for the results of our national soccer teams and enquire whether stories will be published, broadcast or telecast.

Don't do it just once, but repeatedly. If the news outlets are continually deluged with calls then they must respond. By complaining to ourselves about a lack of publicity is to let those not doing their job off the hook.

Soccer can call on a huge public and represents a massive slice of the market for which news outlets are competing. If we make our voice heard, then we will get publicity.

Success like that achieved this month by the Socceroos and the Kodak Kids can be the thin edge of the wedge for soccer to gain its right coverage in the Australian media.

This month soccer has done all the right things, let's shout about it and tell the rest of the country.

Promotions like last weekend's event in Rockhampton help to foster soccer and encourages youngsters to stay in the game longer. Congratulations to the Rockhampton Soccer Federation and to Brisbane Lions for doing their part.

A BAYSIDE DECIDER . . .

Intermediate League clubs Wynnum and Redlands United will contest the decider in the Wynnum-Redlands Herald trophy series at Maramba Stadium on Sunday.

Wynnum hold a 2-1 lead in the two-legged series. The trophy, valued at \$200 will be awarded to the leading club on aggregate score when this weekend's result is added to the first round score.

If the tally is even after Sunday's clash, the two clubs have obtained permission from the Queensland Soccer Federation to stage a penalty shoot out to decide the trophy winner.

After the game, \$200 will go towards an after-match function and trophy presentation.

The first round match, at the Showgrounds was shrouded in controversy with referee Bob Crapnell, walking off mid-way through the first half of the spirited clash. Although Wynnum are 16 points clear of Redlands on the table, the local derby atmosphere will ensure a close game.

But there is an added incentive for the Wolves this weekend. If Wynnum can take two points from the game, with only three rounds remaining, they will have clinched the League and promotion back to the Premier League.

But having been involved in junior football for many seasons, it annoys me that those who really deserve the credit have been forgotten.

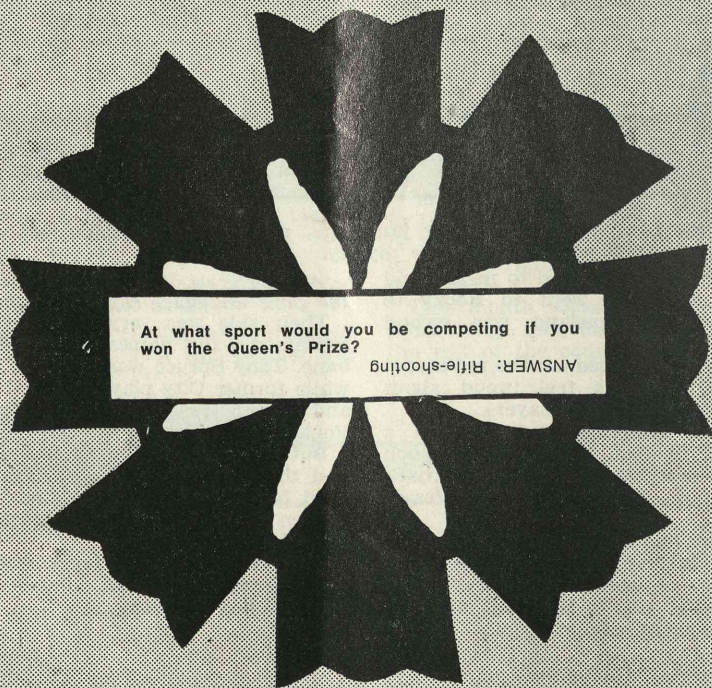
