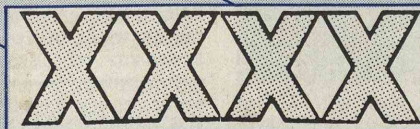

Anyone who has chased sponsorship will know it is hard work. But it should always be remembered the real effort is required once the deal has been finalised.

Contrary to the outlook of some sporting officials, major companies do not have a moral or social obligation to pour money into sport. It is a business deal, and those receiving a sponsorship should not just take the money and run.

Sponsorship is a two-way thing. A sponsor can look to help an organisation, but the company is well within its right to expect a return.

Queensland soccer has a valuable and generous sponsor in Castlemaine Perkins. It is a sponsor we should treat with the utmost respect.

The money poured into soccer by XXXX, is money saved in other areas. The sponsorship by Castlemaine Perkins has not just enabled soccer to stand on its feet, it has given the code the impetus to be off and running.

Unless we want the carpet to be pulled from under our feet, we should look to give the company the return it deserves.

The sponsor's name and its products should be promoted at every opportunity. XXXX is the Federation's sponsor, the clubs' sponsor, the affiliates' sponsor and the players' sponsor. XXXX is Queensland soccer.

As the season kicks off for another year, let's keep "Our beer" associated with "Our game."

At this early stage of the season, from my observations, it appears that a number of clubs are underprepared.

A good indicator is always the number of registrations received at the Perry Park office, and it was quite startling to learn that up until last week we had received only 10 percent of the expected number of registrations.

The season proper begins this Saturday and there no doubt will be the usual rush of late registrations, but some of these may require clearances and because of clubs giving the Federation insufficient notice, the unfortunate result will be players declared ineligible for matches this weekend.

Clubs should remember any player

who in his last season did not play under the jurisdiction of the QSF needs a clearance. This must be done through the Federation office. Written clearance submitted by players or verbal agreements are not acceptable.

Blue form players placed on the retained or open to transfer list are considered registered. White form players must sign a new form each season.

A club would be foolhardy, and unfair to other players in the team to play any unregistered or uncleared player this weekend.

Who is the Lions player now nicknamed "Gilligan" after on-tour high seas hi-jinx that could have had a much more disastrous ending.

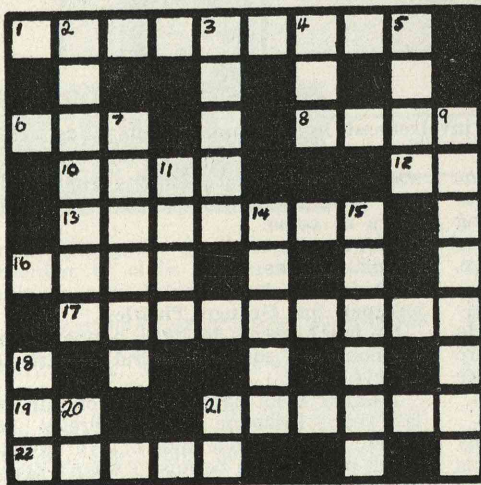
What were the Lions officials drinking at Spencer Park recently and why were they hiding around the corner of the clubhouse while doing it?

An occasional series looking at our soccer past, by Queensland's most authoritative soccer statistician, ALAN FOUCHE.

SPOT-ON STATS

One of the casualties of the modern era has been the traditional rivalry between Brisbane and Ipswich for local soccer supremacy.

The Kruger Cup, contested between the cities for several decades, lapsed in 1975

Partly this was due to congested fixture lists, and partly to the drift of players across the traditional borders between the two cities.

This resulted in players living in one city and playing for a club in the other, blurring the distinctions between the two centres.

The inter-city challenge was not revived until last year, and then no longer under the Kruger Cup banner.

The goalless draw, with Brisbane winning on a penalty shoot-out, was a far cry from many of the rip-roaring clashes of the past which frequently produced a glut of goals.

In 1952, for instance, Brisbane scraped in by the amazing score of 8-7 in the first match of the series, then followed up with a 6-4 success in the return encounter.

Toowoomba also took part that year in a three-way contest, but quickly found themselves out of their depth, recording losses of 9-3 to Brisbane and 11-1 to Ipswich.

Other high-scoring encounters included a 7-5 win to Brisbane in 1954, a 9-2 triumph by Ipswich in 1955, an 8-1 win by Ipswich in 1957 and a 6-6 draw in a floodlit match at the Exhibition ground in 1967.

Goalscorers that night were: for Brisbane, Syd Tucker, Graham McMillan and Ray Richards, with two apiece. For

Ipswich, who fought back from a 2-4 half-time deficit, the six came from Ian Davis, John McIntosh, Bruce Parkes, Dale Mortimer, Col Smith and Rob Hughes.

Despite surviving the criticism in establishing the rules, QSF president Ian Brusasco is still looking to improve the tournament and hopes to make it the premier pre-season footballing competition in Brisbane.

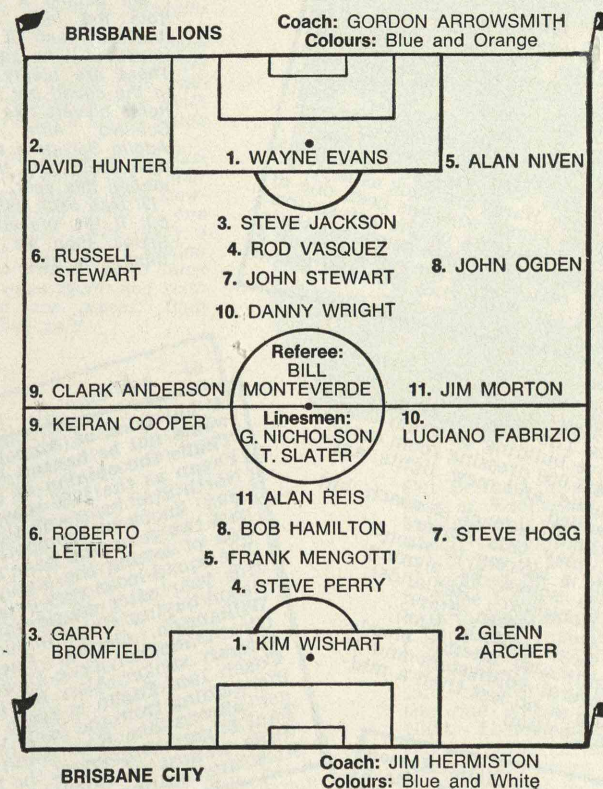
Wright, who scored six goals, has won a pair of Brooks "Hugger" training shoes.

1986 SEASON PREVIEW

Olympic United began the season in fine style, making the final of the Silver Boot competition and are looking for a better year than 1985. Last year Olympic only narrowly missed relegation but with new coach Juan Cutillas at the helm there is a new optimism at Goodwin Park. The club has purchased cleverly this season with gains including Stephen Glockner, Paul Barry, Mick Gerritsen, Kerry Felsch, Gordon Otto and Peter Tyson. Regulars like Harry Tsoumbaris and Mark Barry are back as is striker Chris Fegan who has been one of the form players of the pre-season. Olympic officials are confident their team can repeat the successes of 3 years ago when they won the grand final.

There are big plans at Pine Rivers in its first year in the semi-professional ranks. The club has embarked on a massive building program that will see a \$25,000 dressing room complex installed and new lights and fencing added. Dave Scriggins is back as coach, but will not play this season. The club is looking to strengthen its squad by signing Steve Robinson (Redlands), Col Potter (North Star), Mark Boyd (North Star) and Scriggins also intends blood-ing several youngsters and is looking at no less than a mid-table position.

Slowly but surely Iain Kesson has been turning Taringa into a formidable combination since he arrived from Lions two years ago. And this season could begin to see some of the benefits of his unrelenting, but constructive approach. Taringa showed flashes of brilliance, and plenty of determination last season but club officials are confident of a more consistent showing this time. Star signings have been former Lions NSL player Calvin Daunt and Annerley's Phil Mulvey while a host of youngsters have been attracted to Spare Park. Consolidation was Kesson's first year, mid-table his second, now nothing less than semi-finals will be acceptable by his standards for the third.

A hat-trick of Ampol Cup wins would not be beyond North Star. That's the opinion of coach Iain Fagan as the 1986 season begins. North Star have won the prestigious knockout competition the past two years and have no intention of letting the trophy go. The squad looks very experienced this year after considerable off-season buying. Gains include Billy Williamson, Gordon Buchanan, Dave Gallagher, Dale Dawes and veteran striker Alan Marley. Coach Iain Fagan is again playing, guiding from the back. Younger players like Ross Swan and Paul Fagan compliment the team while a host of talented youth stars are waiting in the wings.

With Bob Scanlan back at the helm, Annerley is looking to make a serious charge at promotion to the Premier League this season. Off-season losses have been minimal with Phil Mulvey and Bill Perry the only notable absentees this season, but gains look like including Tom Pike, Ivan Frkovic, John Gilchrist with Jim Wiltshire back from overseas where he spent considerable time at Chelsea and West Ham. "We can compete with anyone in the League and anything less than a top four position will be disappointing," a club official said.

In his first stint as a coach former Brisbane City NSL player Billy Wilkinson's enjoying every minute with the Club's Intermediate League team. "It's terrific because I am getting a great response from the lads. They are enthusiastic and it seems to be infectious," he said. There are plenty of new faces in the squad but Wilkinson highlights players like Paul and John Schiavo, Alfie Catalano and Adolfo Salvatore as among those who could help the club to promotion this year. "I'll take each game as it comes, but if the present attitude continues, then we could do anything," he said.

1986 SEASON PREVIEW

As always, big things are happening at McCook Park and Newmarket is determined to put things right on the field this season. After staving off relegation last season, the club is looking to strengthen and consolidate this year. Bobby Ford is the non-playing coach and gains include exciting strikers Peter Richards, a former club stalwart, Richard Poloskey, a State youth rep, and Mark Parkin a former Luton apprentice. Parkin scored 26 goals in his last British season and netted five in four trial games since signing with Newmarket. "We lost nine games by one goal last season so it was really a lot of bad luck, but that is behind us now and we would like to think somewhere between fourth and sixth is not beyond our grasp," Club official Bob White said.



Since being re-admitted to the top competition, Coalstars have had to live in the shadow of their neighbouring Ipswich United, but the plans are in progress to change that. Thinking a youth policy which may not reap rewards this year, but is certain to pay dividends in the future, Styles spent much of the off-season scouting and has attracted to Bundamba talent like Alan McFarlane and Tony Giovanni. Other likely signings include Murray Kitching which should give stars a competitive outfit with plenty of potential. "It's a rebuilding stage but we certainly have a lot more depth than in the past. Anything we achieve this season will be a bonus because our aims are much longer term," a club official said.

The Hawks have no doubts that they have the team to bring silverware back to Dittmer Park this season. Although among the honours, the Hawks have failed to secure a major trophy for some seasons, having to play second fiddle to Ipswich United and Lions. The club believes the securing of Ken Swan from Grange Thistle will prove to be the signing of the season and give the Hawks an impressive midfield of Swan, Martin Kirsopp and Harry Stewart. Coach Eric Thompson is making a playing comeback and has been rewarded with Brisbane selection. The expected signing of Len Pollock could solve the club's goalscoring problems in recent seasons. "We've got the players to play any team in Queensland off the park," Thompson said.

Col Bennett is now in his third year at Rochedale and he firmly believes this will be the one in which the club achieves its aim of playing in the XXXX League. "I worked on a three-year plan because I felt it would take that long to start getting things right. I hope now that the players will begin doing things by instinct rather than being told," Bennett said. "I think this year will be the one when players like Stu Hart, Lance Foley and Gary Carter come of age." Rochedale's losses this year have been minimal — Phil Cruse and John McNairn. But the gains have included Kevin Coleman and Brian MacNicol while Nigel Lownds has been signed from Lions.

After last year's grand final win Bennett has hung up his boots and will only coach this season.

NSL CLUBS TO WORK TOGETHER

The presidents of Queensland's two National League clubs have vowed to do everything in their power to assist each other to keep the State's dual representation in the national competition.

Brisbane City's Sam Pappalardo and Lions' John Morcus have been involved with their clubs ever since they were signatories to the inaugural league agreement.

"We have been through too much now to give up easily. We are among the best 14 clubs in Australia and we deserve to be there. We will fight to the end," Morcus said.

Similarly, Pappalardo has vowed City will never surrender.

"If necessary, we will fight until the last drop of blood falls. The only thing we can do is keep fight, fight, fighting until we are included in the new format," he said.

"And the two clubs must do everything possible to help each other. One strong team and another struggling is not good. Both Queensland teams must be doing well to give us plenty to shout about."

HOW IT ALL WORKS

In a competition known for its unpredictability and a penchant for off-beat ideas, the NSL has excelled itself this time with the selection criteria for next year's 14-team league.

The details of the criteria were set out in a five-page document circularised among the current 24-member clubs earlier this year. The clubs subsequently debated and accepted, without change, the proposals.

For those that may like to attempt to fathom the selection process, here is the summary of the criteria.

The clubs agreed that

1. The bottom placed NSL club in each division at the end of the 1986 competition not be eligible for inclusion in the 1987 competition.

2. The champion team in each division at the conclusion of the full round of matches be automatically included in the 1987 competition.

3. The 1986 national top 5 champion (not being a divisional champion) be automatically included in the 1987 competition.

4. That the criteria for membership be based on a percentage system as follows, with the top point scoring clubs being elected to the League.

- (a) League position in 1986 comp. max. 50%
- (b) past playing record in the League max. 40%
- (c) spectator support during 1986 comp. max 10%

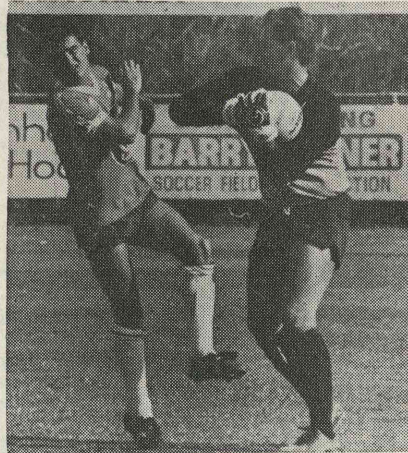
5. Subject to the A.C.T. and Northern NSW entering teams into the NSW State League —

(a) At the end of the 1987 competition the bottom two teams shall be relegated.
(b) There shall be a play-off for one position between the State League champion of Victoria, South Australia

and Queensland with the other position being filled by the club from NSW, Northern NSW or ACT, which the champion NSW State League.

6. The clubs relegated from the 1986 NSL be admitted to their State Premier League for 1987, with provision being made for Newcastle and Canberra, if relegated to participate in the NSW State League.

7. Entry to the League, the present criteria and conditions will remain and are not subject to alteration until after 1st July, 1988.
