While the O'Callaghan Park clash between North Star and Coalstars on Sunday will decide the XXXX League premiership flag it also will determine who are Queensland soccer's Club Champions.

The two pacesetting clubs are locked on 66 points each after combining the points table totals of their XXXX League, XXXX Reserves and XXXX Colts sides.

As defending club champions Ipswich United, although with Taringa, are six points behind with just one round remaining, the two leaders cannot be overhauled and the club which wins the most points this weekend will take the title.

The club championship offers rich prizes which are a boost to the entire club and not just one team. The club which wins the championships this weekend will gain a \$1,000 voucher towards next year's insurance from Insurance Exchange of Australia. The club also will receive a set of jerseys in club colours from Attack Sportswear.

The club championship was introduced two years ago and has been dominated by Coalstars' Ipswich neighbours, Ipswich United. United again put up a bold challenge but fell fractionally behind in recent weeks as the two League pacesetters showed strength through their entire ranks.

Looking at the statistics closer (the full Club Championship table is on

Page 10), Coalstars hold a narrow goal-difference lead going into this weekend's fixtures. The Ipswich club has scored 29 wins, six draws and 15 losses from its 51 games so far. It has scored 94 goals and conceded 57 for a positive 37 goal difference.

North Star has won 25, drawn 16 and lost 10 of its 51 matches played so far and has scored 98 goals and conceded 66 in the process for a positive 32 goal difference.

As mentioned earlier the next best club was Ipswich United with 25 wins and 10 draws followed by Taringa (24-12), Mount Gravatt (21-17), Grange Thistle (20-5), Olympic United (13-17), Lions (17-7), Easts (16-9) and Wynnum (11-7).

While Coalstars and North Star have been close in the XXXX League, Coalstars have been the better performers in the Reserve while North Star have had a much stronger season in the Colts. And that could mean the Club Championship goes right to the wire this weekend. On form North Star should win the Colts, while Coalstars should take the Reserves which will mean the flag and the club title will rest on the main game.

DOWN TO THE LINE FOR LIONS

Brisbane Lions officials are formulating an extensive proposal to push for a 16-team National League next season.

The club intends to lobby heavily to increase the current 14-team proposal by two. The club's main argument will be that if Adelaide is to be represented — Adelaide City are assured of a berth on their strong showing this year — then Brisbane should have a team too. But the club is confident the proposal will not have to be aired as, with a bit of luck, their side will win its way into the 14 this weekend by beating Footscray at Richlands.

It should be remembered that all criteria rankings being quoted at the moment are unofficial and do not take into account the 10 percent for crowds yet to be allocated by the NSL. But without going into details, the results which must occur this weekend for Lions to snare 14th place are as follows. . . .

Any club which entertains the thought of accepting, or offering, a "financial incentive" to get a particular result in a key match is playing a very dangerous game.

While the word "bribe" is a serious allegation, the term goes hand-in-hand with "financial incentive". What on the surface may seem to some to be little more than a sporting offer could be constructed by others, including the law, to be much more serious.

Apart from the possible legal repercussions of offering cash inducements for particular results, the practice is banned by FIFA. It does not take too long to find instances overseas where "financial incentives" got out of hand and charges were laid. Bans also have followed.

While stories of incentives being offered in the Intermediate League are only heresay, every club should heed the warning signs. Sport is about winning or losing on your merits and being satisfied at the end that you gave your best. It is not about buying results. Quite simply, that is a crime.

It is hoped that the stories of incentives here are unfounded and just popular beer booth talk. Indeed it would surprise and disappoint if players within the QSF allowed their competitive natures to be prostituted.

NORTH BRISBANE

North Brisbane is hoping to maintain its record as the only Third Division side to maintain an unbeaten record at home when the Lutwyche club hosts South Star this weekend.

North Brisbane will go into the match boosted by its 3-2 win over Willowburn last weekend to end the Toowoomba's side undefeated record. The Willowburn match was a fine effort by the young North Brisbane team and may have clinched promotion to Division Two for the rebuilt club. North Brisbane were 1-0 up after four minutes through a goal scored by Ian Watson from a freekick. Willowburn equalised just before halftime and two minutes after the break they scored again. Twenty minutes from the end North Brisbane's Kevin O'Brien scored an equaliser in the top corner and five minutes later Tim Lumley brought the North supporters to their feet when he scored the winning goal.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Sir,

Never at any stage did I suggest in my recent article that we should return to National names or that we permanently throw away the key to National competition. Perhaps you and some other readers may have missed my point. Therefore, to remove any ambiguity I shall restate my views in a different way.

We have in the past been quick to break the common tenets of 'good marketing'. It was never my intention to dwell upon history. However, history can provide some useful clues for future long term planning. What we must do is consider the total product and how it can be promoted over the next decade. Perhaps the four simple marketing steps used by successful private enterprise organizations can be applied to soccer.

(1) **PRODUCT** The game itself, players, it's personalities. (2) **PRICE** The target audience; What they are prepared to pay for their entertainment? (3) **PRO-MOTION** How is the game packaged, presented and promoted? When and where it is played and how accessible is it and for what reasons? (4) **PURCHASE** The spectator: Who are they?; What they want?; Will they return?; and importantly will they introduce new customers?

We must recognize our competitors. One often feels that most of our competitors come from within and not from outside. Let us consider our strategic advantages and develop a product which will not only satisfy existing customers but attract new ones. Let us set some objectives and then develop some long term plan to achieve those objectives.
