

The postponement of the annual interstate clash against New South Wales is a good news-bad news proposition for XXXX League players.

The good news is that the threeweek postponement will give more XXXX League players a chance to push for inclusion in the State squad. The bad news is that the planned tour of Papua New Guinea, which would have been done by a State squad of largely non-NSL players, is in extreme doubt.

State coach Bruce Stowell has said he will not scrap his 18-man Queensland scuad chosen for the originally planned May 11 clash. That squad contains four XXXX League players — I orth Star's Gordon Euchanan, Mount Gravatt's Martin Kirsopp, Coa'stars' Dave Wheeler and Olympic United's Mick Cernaka.

But Stowell has indicated the squad is wide open for additions and deletions .And this week he told Go Soccer

The good news is that the threeit was his intention to watch as many XXXX League players a chance to ash for inclusion in the State squad. in mind.

"The XXXX League players largely made their State squad bids with very little preparation behind them. Over the coming weeks I will be going to the Saturday night XXXX League matches and those on Sunday which don't clash with the National League and I will very much have an open mind as to possible new State players." Stowell said.

"If there are XXXX League players who come on over the coming weeks with more match fitness and training under their belts, then they will certainly be considered for the Queensland squad once the details of the match are finalised."

FOUR BACK

Four players from last year's Queensland Under 15 team are in the State squad again this season for the national championships and Oceania qualifying tournament selection trials in Canberra next month.

They are Brisbane South's Wayne Hinton, North Queensland's Simon Sarinas, Mark Wingett from Southwest Queensland and Martin Simpson from South-east Queensland.

The Queensland Junior Soccer Council named a 16-man squad recently to travel to Canberra on May 2 for the national titles, which Queensland lost by just one point to New South Wales last year.

The squad was named prior to the State championships to fit in with the world U16 qualifying program. As joint Australian coach, Queens-

land's Bruce Stowell is one of the national selectors.

GO soccer Editorial

Queensland soccer has good reason to feel rejected and bitter this week

following the Australian Soccer Federation executive meeting in Sydney.

Our carefully planned representative program was thrown into turmoil and the QSF's local credibility was put on the line when May 11 was not ratified for our annual interstate clash with New South Wales. Queensland had the carpet pulled from under its feet, not only by those who have opposed us in the past, but also by those who normally would be behind us.

The annual interstate series has been a sapling nurtured by the Queensland Soccer Federation over the past four years. That sapling was beginning to grow impressively and was assuming a flourishing stature. But last weekend we were left to hang helplessly from a bough.

Any illusions the State's two NSL clubs may have had that southern "allies" would look after them in their bids to get into the 1987 national competition should now be dispelled. It is quite obvious that when it really counts, all that matters is Sydney and Melbourne soccer.

The Queensland-New South Wales game is not some hurriedly organised friendly match. It is the key date on our calendar and one set aside by the QSF last November. That date was circulated to the Australian Soccer Federation and the National League. The National League even acknowledged that when it formulated its initial 1986 draw. But later developments saw a clash of interests. And the solution to that clash, according to the ASF, was for Queensland to compromise.

That compromise has not only thrown the proposed tour of Papua New Guinea into extreme doubt, but the proposed alternative even now is not finalised. It is a compromise that has taken away a major incentive this season for every player within the XXXX League.

The Queensland Soccer Federation has been a responsible and enterprising member of the ASF, but in this matter we have been treated poorly. The 63 QSF-member clubs have been ranked inferior to a handful of Sydney National League clubs.

Queensland, which undoubtedly is the best organised soccer State in the country, will not forget this week's callous treatment. We will ultimately have the last laugh — on and off the field.

State Government sports subsidy claims.

Funds for assistance are available in various areas. But the methods of application and requirements for grants are particular and the guidelines should be followed closely. The main areas which apply to soccer are those in respect to junior coaching and the upgrading of facilities and fields.

The applications to be submitted now are for work to take place, or monies which will be paid, in the 12 month period FROM July 1, 1986. It is not a retrospective grants system.

In making an application, a club or affiliate would need to submit plans and/or quotations of any intended

> work. With regard to coaching, the position and areas of jurisdiction and involvement should be outlined.

The grants available are one in five dollars for capital works and one in four for coaching to a maximum of \$3750. Applying is not a guarantee of funds and grants are not allocated until after the State Budget is brought down in August.

But to be considered for a share of these funds an application must be submitted NOW. The deadline is April 29 at the QSF Office at Perry Park. The applications are submitted the following day to the Department of Sport.




Morton is obviously another player with a great deal to offer.

In continuing the Sunday Times' "Football 2000" investigation, we look at some of the alternatives to the four division 92-team Football League.

THE WORLD REPORT

Anybody in England confused by the proposals and counter-proposals for restructuring professional football will inevitably look to Scotland, where an elite Premier Division was established ten years ago. The lesson from Scotland is that it worked. "It was the best thing that has happened to Scottish football because our game was dying on its feet," said Chris Anderson, Aberdeen's chief executive.

Eut now, as in England, the climate has altered and the frustrations of the top clubs look like producing a further change.

The 10-team Premier Division made a huge difference to playing standards and broke the grip of the Old Firm on the major honours. Now the gap between the two Glasgow giants and the rest has closed. "The old First Division had a fat middle section of teams who were never going to be in serious contention for the championship, nor in much danger of relegation either," Anderson recalls. "The Premier Division is much more competitive, and no team can afford to relax."


The paying customers agreed. In the final season of the old First Division average gates were 8,500. Last season,

despite a general decline in interest, Premier clubs attract an average of 11.000. The others benefitted too: total gates for the Scottish League have increased in each of the past three seasons.

However, Dundee United manager Jim McLean is one of many who now consider that it is time for a rethink. McLean believes the Premier Division, where teams face each other four times. has made the game at this level too competitive. There is little scope for managers to experiment and all talk about the fear which is undermining the game as a spectacle.

As a consequence the leading clubs want a new one-division Scottish League, based on the franchise system. Aberdeen's Anderson has suggested a 16-team national league with the discarded clubs forming an intermediate league. This would ensure that those which generate most of the income receive a bigger share. Six rebel clubs Rangers, Celtic, Aberdeen, Hearts, Hibs and Motherwell - have threatened to break away from the Scottish League if necessary

These are desperate times and it seems clubs are prepared to take desperate action.



Isn't it about time all the self-appointed scribes and media people realised that their knowledge of the laws of soccer is at best, poor.

Players and journalists spend their time perfecting their own craft and fail to appreciate that a referee does exactly the same.

To get to the top, a referee spends years studying the laws, questioning and understanding their meaning and putting them into practice. To referee at international level, that official has to be recognised by the Soccer establishment, not just the referees, as being capable of doing a good job.

It remains nothing short of shameful the way sections of the press were quick to try and crucify Bill Monteverde after he sent Jim Morton from the field.

Without checking their lawbooks, if indeed they have one, they assumed he was wrong.

In this instance the law concerned, gave the referee no option but to caution the player for ungentlemanly conduct and as he had already been cautioned he had to be sent off. The same law makes no mention of having to caution the goalkeeper should he move at the taking of a penalty kick.

So a message to all you people with a responsibility for reporting soccer. Don't make the referees' job any harder than it is by sensationalising incidents in which the referee merely acts according to the laws . . . check your facts first.

THE GOOD COACH

WEEK TWO: PLANNING A SESSION

The coach who simply turns up at the training ground and does his session "Off the top of his head" ultimately will run out of ideas. His sessions will become repetitious and boring.

All training should be based on the players' performance in a game. It is of little benefit to coach above or below the ability of the players.

In designing his program and planning his sessions, the good coach should base his outline on the age, ability and understanding of the players.

Generally, it is not in the best interests of the skill development of players at any age to work in training sessions for much longer than 90 minutes. In planning a session, there are three "R's" which always should be considered -Routine, Realism, Repetition.

Routine allows for players to know what they have to do. Realism in exercises makes for better motivation, for example, put attackers against defend-

ers, mark out an area, keep a score. Repetition, without getting to a point of boredom allows players to get it right.

In planning the session there are four basic parts a coach should incorporate. They are: 1. Opening Activity; 2. Technique - Skill Training; 3. Games; 4. Fitness Training.

The good coach will vary his sessions by changing the order of the four parts, excluding one or more, joining one or more or varying the time spent in each area.

Over the next four weeks we will examine each section in detail, but at the moment it would suffice to say, the success of a session always rests on its pre-planning.
