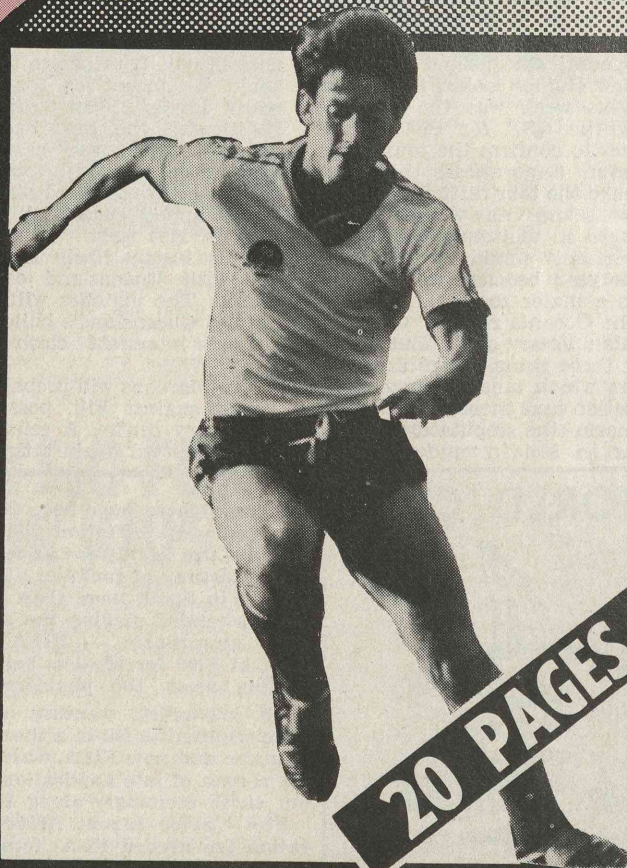

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Any disappointments XXXX League players may have this season over the disrupted representative program is certain to be more than compensated next year.

The Queensland Soccer Federation has already begun planning what will be the State's biggest representative season in years. And the key to the success of the program will be the early start. The QSF is going to let it be known as soon as possible what it intends to do next season.

As we went to press the future of the proposed Queensland tour of Papua New Guinea looked in extreme doubt. This week was the deadline given by the QSF for PNG soccer authorities to confirm the tour plans.

And even a go-ahead this week would make the tour difficult to stage as passports and visas would have to be arranged in minimum time.

"We certainly would have liked to tour this year because we see ourselves as a major soccer ambassador within the Oceania region," QSF secretary Alan Vessey said. "But in organising these things there are a lot of factors which must be taken into consideration and there is no way we would harm the reputation gained last year in Fiji by undertaking a

tour which had not been thoroughly organised."

Among the plans the QSF has in mind for 1987 are a tour here by the Fiji national team and a possible Maroon tour of New Zealand.

"At the moment we are very conscious of what the soccer situation could be next year and are planning accordingly. If things go to plan there could be incentives for players at many levels," Vessey said.

Although the New Zealand plans are still in the very early stages of negotiation, the Fiji tour has been on the drawing board since Queensland's highly successful tour of the Islands last year.

It is highly likely the Fiji team will visit Queensland early in the season. The matches will be used as part of Queensland's build-up for the annual interstate clash with New South Wales.

The Maroons will probably play two games against Fiji, possibly one in a country centre. A select side may also be pitted against the tourists.

Already there have been 2836 requests for media accreditation for this year's World Cup in Mexico. Because of an overburdening of facilities at past World Cup — in Spain more than 6,000 journalists attended making the situation almost unworkable — FIFA has set a limit of 2700 for Mexico, being 2,200 for writing press, 500 photographers.

All journalists wanting accreditation were required to fill in a thorough questionnaire and now FIFA, which is expecting a rush of late applications, will weed out those seemingly along for the ride.

The US\$300 (about A\$500) administration fee needed to be forwarded with the accreditation appears to have done little to restrict the journalistic numbers.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Calls over the past weeks for those connected with the national team to sign "documents" and "codes of conduct" are surely unnecessary and certainly not good publicity for the code.

To wear the green and gold, or to coach the national team, should be the ultimate honour in one's career and should be treated as such.

Frank Arok has asked the Australian Soccer Federation, the State federations, the clubs and the players to sign a document of his wording to ensure they all "adhere to the rules." Similarly the ASF has called on Arok to sign a code of conduct. The whole thing appears to be a petty exercise of which the bottom line is a lack of trust. There were problems in certain areas during the last World Cup campaign. But surely all parties concerned can sit down together and work those problems out before we begin our Olympic bid. Once the guidelines have been set, each other's word and the common goal for success should be enough to ensure all criteria is met.

Players selected in national squads should be made well aware of what is

required and by that level they should know already —and be expected to act to those standards. Anyone who does not want to give his all for Australian soccer should be asked to stand aside. There are plenty more ready and willing to take his place.

The national coach has a style and a manner which has produced results. But he too must know where to draw the line and should be the example for his players. To be successful in the international arena there must be discipline. But that discipline should be a self-orientated one—a determined approach to a difficult job.

To attempt to force that discipline on any one party will ultimately cause discord and disharmony. And they are the ingredients for failure in soccer.

Let's get out there and do it for Australian soccer — and not just to satisfy a signature on a piece of paper.

ACROSS MY DESK . . .

Last week Eric Thompson touched on the question of player clearances and said in his column that he considered the rules unfair. Eric's thoughts were that players with impeccable records were being kept on the sidelines by rules designed to trap the few who tried to dodge suspensions and financial commitments. the guidelines insisted upon by FIFA throughout the world.

Eric's suggestion was that a club should have the option to field a player with a written clearance. Should that written clearance be proved false, then the club should lose points as well as the player being punished. Put the onus on the clubs, he said. I can see what he is getting at, but the idea would not work. To begin with the rules used by the QSF to clear players are those enforced not only by the Australian Soccer Federation but are

But that aside, it is my experience with clubs and players that they would much prefer to take the park without a player in some doubt about his clearance than lose the points afterwards. A club would be foolish to risk fielding an uncleared player or a player ineligible through suspension. The QSF conducts spot checks in all divisions. The costs of being caught are high. The maximum penalty is suspension from the federation. But in the higher leagues it could also cost a club the \$10,000 grand final prize, the club championship or worse still could result in relegation.

THE GOOD COACH

WEEK FOUR: PLANNING A SESSION . . TECHNIQUE / SKILL TRAINING

The opportunity for players to display and develop their skills should always be the highpoint of a training session, and it is the job of the good coach to ensure that is the case.

He should work towards establishing a sound application by the players towards the acquisition of skill. This application can be nurtured by encouraging and rewarding those players who show concentration and improvement.

In developing skills, the good coach should not try to achieve too much too quickly.

He assesses his squad and decides the level of skill within it. He should select a theme and should drive himself and his players into persisting with the chosen technique or skill. There should be a number of sessions devoted to just one aspect.

The good coach should not seek to introduce something new, or advance the technique until real progress throughout the squad is shown.

He should encourage the stronger players to assist and improve the weak-

er ones, but should watch carefully that his more talented squad members do not become bored.

This can be achieved by a careful selection of groups within exercises.

Ensuring there are partners and opponents to test, assist and guide the player, the amount of time devoted in any one session to technique and skill training should be adapted according to the level of motivation of the players. It is no use demanding players produce high level skill when they are mentally or physically drained.

For this reason it may often be wise to space technique and skill training away from other sections of high physical workrate.

Later in the series the different skills and techniques of the game will be examined and exercises to develop and master them will be outlined.

NOT JUST BLACK AND WHITE

THE REFEREES' POINT OF VIEW . . .

The cry from one XXXX League club that "everyone is picking on them — especially referees" surfaced again this week when they complained about the amount of injury time added in a game.

A survey once carried out determined that in an average game the ball was only in play about 20 to 25 minutes in each half. The rest of the time the game was stopped for injuries, bookings, fouls, goals or some other kind of disturbance. That list does not include the time lost each time the ball goes out for a throw in, corner kick or goal kick.

It is not inconceivable to believe that a referee could add an extra 15 minutes to each half of a game of soccer if he was to stop his watch every time the ball goes out of play. That situation would, of course, be impractical so the referee is forced to make a valued judgment about the amount of added time he will allow. This judgment differs in each game as sometimes the referee is forced to add time when he considers one of the teams is indulging in tactics still designed to waste time.

When the laws of the game were framed they needed an impartial judge of

the time of each game. That job fell to the referee who the laws say is the sole judge of time. In other codes an outside timekeeper sounds a hooter at full time but however you look at it somebody is vested with the responsibility of deciding how much time should be played. It only goes to prove you will never be able to please some people.

GOAL OF THE YEAR?

If a Goal of the Year was awarded, it would be hard to go past Jim Kelly's effort for Rochedale Rovers in the Intermediate League clash with Acacia Ridge at Underwood Park last Saturday night.

After the ball bobbed in the Ridge penalty box it was half cleared to find Kelly lurking 30m out from the goal. The former Mount Gravatt player hit a fierce half volley which struck the net with such force it nearly tore the pegs from the ground.

AMPOL CUP GETS READY FOR SUCCESS

Queensland's Ampol Cup, one of Australian soccer's most successful and longest running competitions, has had a slight format change which is certain to make the competition even more exciting.

The initial stages of the city section of the Cup will be on a round robin basis this season. In the past the Ampol Cup has been a straight knockout format which meant first round losers missed out on any further matches.

But now the city qualifying section has been divided into five groups of five teams. Those 25 teams will be the 10 XXXX League sides, the 10 Intermediate League teams, the top three Amateur Division One clubs and the representative teams from the Gold and Sunshine Coasts.

The qualifying groups will be seeded with placings on the league tables after the completion of fixtures on May 18 determining standings.

Naturally those teams highest placed in the higher leagues will get,

on paper, the easiest qualifying groups. But if past Ampol Cups have been any indication, there are no easy games as all matches are cut-throat with every side eager to get part of the \$8,000 on offer in the final.

The five group leaders after a round-robin of matches will be joined in the quarter-finals by the three country zone winners. Those teams will come from the Northern Zone, which will be played in Mackay, the Central Zone, centred on Rockhampton and the South-East Zone which will be played in Toowoomba.

The series of matches, which involve rep. teams from 12 regions will be played this weekend.

The eight quarter-finalists will go "into the hat" for a public draw, another recent innovation which has added to the success of the Cup. The semi-final draw also will be public.

MARK IS STILL INVOLVED

When defender Mark Aponas (pictured) damaged his knee for the second time at Richlands earlier this season, it could well have signalled the end of his involvement in the game.

SPOT-ON STATS

When it comes to stability, Queensland soccer over the past 60 years is in the banana republic league.

Clubs have come and gone so rapidly in the State's top division that it is hard to keep pace with the ever-changing flow of arrivals, name changes, mergers and disappearances.

Quite apart from major disruptions such as splits in the governing bodies in the 1930s and in 1962, most clubs appear to have found it difficult — except Ipswich — to establish permanent community roots.

The result has been that when hard times come — as they do to all clubs sooner or later — some of the most famous names in Queensland soccer have simply withered away.

Two modern examples of this are Latrobe and Hellenic, who swept all before them in the early 1960s.

Hellenic, after undergoing a name change to St. George, have now vanished for ever, a victim of their own lack of foresight in spurning development of juniors and a home ground.

Latrobe, later Latrobe-Wests and now Bardon Latrobe, also appeared destined

to fold at one stage but thanks to the Bardon connection survive in the amateur divisions.

Perhaps this is one of the reasons Queensland soccer is lacking in the rich traditions which, in countries such as England, have woven soccer into the thread of national life.

The table below shows, at 10-year intervals since 1926, the composition of the top division in Queensland, with placings of teams in the particular year. An 'x' under 1986 denotes that the club is in the XXXX League.

Of course, even this list is not exhaustive, as it takes no account of continuing changes in the intervening years.

But the fact that only one club — Thistle — features in every year listed indicates how shallow the roots of our leading clubs have so often been.

The list for 1936 has not been included as the code was undergoing one of its periodic splits at the time and rival competitions were run.

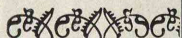
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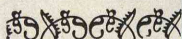

In our next Newmarket news, we will look at our junior teams and the club's coaching staff.

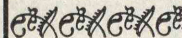
