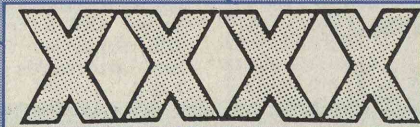

**THE COMEBACK?**

**W**hat is Brisbane City's survival in the National League worth? That is the question City directors must ask themselves now as the future of the club's tenure in the national competition is very much in the balance.

The club seems lost for solutions after its record NSL defeat to Lions last weekend, but Go Soccer believes for an outlay of just \$3,000, City could assemble a side much more capable of finishing mid-table or higher. It would require some quick negotiating and would hinge on several local clubs giving their players the opportunity to have a go at the higher league. It also requires wholesale axings at Spencer Park. But it can, and should, be done.

The local shopping list City could assemble is enormous, but we have singled out six players City could get on a four-figure team-building budget. They are Cameron Pearse (Nth. Star), Gordon Buchanan (Nth. Star), Mike Mulvey (Lions), Billy McDermott (Wynnum), Dave Wheeler (Coalstars) and Mark Gilbert (Taringa).

Starting at the back, City should stick with Bobby Cox. With a better defence he will see the club through and to buy anything else would be an economical extravagance City can't afford. Pearse, a white form player therefore attracting no transfer fee, would slot in at right back. Frank Mengotti would keep his position as stopper and Hermiston should play himself as sweeper. This is only a stop gap decision brought on by the lack of quality sweepers at bargain rates. Under appeal Hermiston's contract could be bought from North Star for \$1,500. Gilbert, who is an amateur, would be bought and blooded at the appropriate times over a

number of games and hopefully by mid-second round would have enough experience to hold the position.

Gordon Buchanan, who should be able to be bought at around the \$3,000 for which he signed for North Star, should be leftback. That would allow Garry Bromfield to move into a wide left midfield position, as he was used in the State team on tour last year. Mt. Gravatt's Martin Kirsopp looms as a logical addition to the midfield, but would be out of City's price range. Mulvey, who could be snapped up for about \$2,500 from an understanding Lions, has NSL experience. Bobby Hamilton would have to anchor the centre of the midfield but City's first priority for next season would be the signing of a class midfield import.

McDermott, another amateur, could give City speed and skill on the right. Cooper retains his place in the middle, while \$4,000 should secure Wheeler as his striking partner.

**So the City team would be: Cox, Pearse, Hermiston, Mengotti, Buchanan, Mulvey, Hamilton, Bromfield, McDermott, Cooper, Wheeler. Reserves: Melosevic and Gilbert.**

While the total bill is \$11,000, City should be able to recoup at least \$3,000 through the sale or swapping of players like Roberto Lettieri, Steve Hogg, George Caird and Phil White. Clubs like Sunnyside, Grange Thistle, Taringa and Pine Rivers are among those who might appreciate experienced players to bolster their squads.

Well, what about it City?

Australian Soccer Federation Executive Director, Brian Emery has left for Mexico where he will play a key role for FIFA in the organisation of the World Cup.

Emery has been chosen from soccer administrators around the world to be the FIFA administrative representative at one of the six venues which will stage first round matches. He will oversee all operations in connection with the staging of matches at the assigned venue.

Emery will be part of a four-man FIFA team. The team also will include a doctor, a referee's representative and a coaching expert. Each will supervise their particular area and afterwards submit a report to FIFA.

There was the old story of good news-bad news from the Australian Soccer Federation last week.

The welcome announcement was the inclusion of Danny Wright and John and Russell Stewart in the Socceroo training camp for Melbourne earlier next month. The trio represent real national team hopes and now hopefully they will be given the proper chances to retain their place in the full Socceroo squad.

But the manner of their selection was messy and unprofessional.

On one day we had Frank Arok saying he would wait until the interstate game to name Queenslanders. Then just 24 hours later the three are included in a squad. One sincerely hopes that it wasn't a case of selections to silence the critics. Hopefully Arok genuinely believes that he can utilise the three Queenslanders in his notional squad, and perhaps when he sees the quality of football that can be played by the Lions trio he will be prompted to look deeper in Queensland. Steve Jackson is obviously the player who must be considered as a future addition.

But unfortunately, and this is the bad news, Arok will not be here next week to watch our best take on New South Wales in the key interstate

game. Arok will be in Mexico for the World Cup. And that is surely a trip made without the blessing of all concerned with Queensland Soccer.

Arok says that he and Australian Soccer will benefit greatly from his Mexican excursion, but why then is he basing himself in Leon where group C includes France, The Soviet Union, Canada and, surprise, surprise — Hungary, Arok's home nation?

There are two teams in Mexico that could be directly pitted against Australian soccer within the next four years. They are South Korea, who we could well meet in the Olympic tournament and Paraguay who could be our final qualifying stage World Cup opponents next time round. Arok says he will watch Paraguay, but why aren't his efforts concentrated on these two teams?

Arok says he has picked Leon to study the training methods of the teams based there. Most teams are already training behind closed doors and it would be considerably out of the ordinary if any of the sides, particularly the French and the Russians to let an unknown Australian watch their sessions.

It will be interesting to hear on his return, what Arok has learned.

## WOMEN SWING INTO CUP SEMIS

The semi-finals of the South Queensland Women's Soccer Association's Atlanta Cup will be staged this weekend.

The competition, formerly known as The Knockout Trophy has already seen some keen cup football and this weekend will be no exception. The competition is open to first and second division teams in one group and third and fourth division sides in the other.

The matches this weekend see the group one semis between Easts and Annerley and Coalstars and Grange Thistle. The group two semis are between North Star and Brisbane City and Souths and Kingsridge.

The finals of the Atlanta Trophy will be held on June 14.

The SQWSA this season has 31 teams playing in four divisions plus an additional six teams participating in an Under 12 competition. The six first division sides are Grange Thistle, Easts, Riverside, Coalstars, Merton-East and a Queensland Under 17 Rep. side.

Coalstars showed they could be the

dark horses for the title this year when they swept aside second division side North Star to win the annual pre-season Watson Shield. It was the club's first victory in the competition in 12 years.

But in recent weeks it has been the Under 17 side and Easts who have been the most dominant in the local competition. The regular matches are proving invaluable experience for the Under 17 girls which should show up at this year's nationals.

The regional referee's Cup has been held in conjunction with the fixtures. Results of the first round, held on May 10 included: Brisbane 4 d Ipswich 0; Gold Coast 4 d Towomba 0; Gold Coast 2 d Ipswich 0 and Brisbane 10 d Toowoomba 0.

## NOT JUST BLACK AND WHITE

THE REFEREES' POINT OF VIEW . . .

**Just how serious are the QSF about cleaning up the game of soccer in Brisbane?**

Quotes in the media from time to time suggest that a player found guilty by the QSF judiciary, after being sent off, has received a lengthy suspension. Obviously their idea of a lengthy suspension and mine are totally different.

The Rugby League in Sydney have the right approach when they suspend a player found guilty of violent conduct, anything from six to twelve weeks. Soccer on the other hand ranges from one week to three weeks. It seems incredible to me that a player can viciously and violently attack his opponent during a game of soccer and the worst that seems to happen to him is a three week holiday from the game.

The clubs don't care as they often support their players at an appeal. The coaches don't care as they declare their

player will be back in the team as soon as he completes his suspension. The QSF don't care as they hand out trivial suspensions for what they agree has been a violent assault. ALL THEY CAN DO IS BLAME THE REFEREES FOR NOT CLEANING UP THE GAME WHEN THEY HAVE NO REAL INTEREST IN SEEING THE VIOLENT PLAYERS OUT OF THE GAME.

With this season not many weeks old we have already had many players dismissed, at all levels, for violent acts. Players have been found guilty of head butting, hitting and kicking opponents and still no sign of a toughening attitude from the clubs or the QSF. Maybe it will take a private civil assault charge brought by a player to wake up the whole system.

## THE GOOD COACH

WEEK SEVEN: PASSING

The secret to success is teamwork and the key to teamwork often is good passing.

There are four qualities which make a good pass — accuracy, power, timing and deception — and all apply to the different methods of passing — inside and outside of the foot, instep and backheel.

The benefits of accuracy are obvious. An inaccurate pass only puts pressure on the receiver or squanders possession. In judging the power of the pass, a player must assess the situation.

A pass to a marked player must be paced to allow him to play it first time. A pass to a player in a goalscoring opportunity must be firm.

Similarly, a player must evaluate the situation in timing his pass. He can be critical to the success of the move, in many cases, players with the ball should commit defenders before passing.

The successful pass would be when the defender approaches within one or two metres. He may think that the pass has been delayed long enough to give him a chance of winning the ball, but if the pass is made as the defender is coming forward, the chase for the return pass will be all in favour of the attacker.

Using deception in passing promotes unpredictability, which can be the major weapon in attack. Deceptive passes include the outside of the foot, the back heel, the swerved pass and the reverse pass.

But more times than not, the best pass is the simplest, because always the ultimate aim is to retain possession as the ball is advanced through the team.

The good coach should encourage his players when passing to attempt to have the ball carry a message each time it is passed. For example — a soft pass means the player has to check off a defender or a firmer pass means the team-mate is looking for a return pass or a turn. Try and get into the habit of passing where the player is running or into his advantage space.

**Exercise: 3 v 1** in a 10m square grid. Players on three corners, one in centre of grid. Players on outside must pass the ball to each other, receiving it only at the corner. The ball must not cross the grid diagonally. The player in the centre must pressurise. The objectives of weighting a passing, timing and deception must be employed.

Why do we have two Soccer Clubs at Wynnum?

Not even the most "Dyed in the Wool" club supporter could claim that either Bayside or Wynnum are enjoying good financial health, or that this position will improve radically in the near future. My forecast is that unless some discussion takes place on amalgamation, it

will only be a matter of time before one or both clubs fail financially.

Any talk of amalgamation always raises questions of "take over"! Such suggestions should be immediately scotched. By starting from this premise, talks will fail. I am not saying that this task is easy, but if both parties start with the intention of doing the best for the code, progress must be made. The two clubs are complementary and combined could challenge any club in Brisbane.

To me the best future for soccer in this area is a combined Wynnum and Bayside Soccer Club.

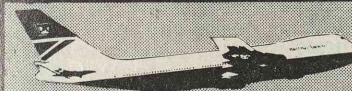
