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he hunt for high scores conducted in Go Soccer over recent weeks has unearthed a few freaks, up to an astonishing 23-0.

But generally speaking, such scores occur in lower divisions and that is just what they are - freaks. One suspects that the opposition in many cases did not even have a full complement of 11 players.

Occasionally, though, even in the lower divisions, this sort of scoreline reflects the true calibre of a winning team. When a club scores 62 goals in four consecutive matches, for example . . .

That was the proud achievement of Germania, precursors of todays Southside Eagles, back in the Sixth Division of 1960. Starting with a 16-2 hammering of Redlands on April 30, Germania went on to trounce Redcliffe 8-1, Army 17-0 and Newtown 21-0.

These results were no flash in the pan, as the undefeated Germania went on to notch up 145 goals in 18 matches for the season, including wins of 14-1 in the return against Redlands, and 12-0 against Latrobe.

Another source of freak scores has been cup competitions, where hopeful minnows usually find their ambition has outrun their ability. That certainly happened to Beaudesert back in 1974, when they ran into Lions in the Queensland Cup.

No fewer than eight Lions players, plus a defender with an own goal, got on to the scoresheet as Beaudesert were buried 20-0. Those who found the net, apart from the own goal, were: Ian Steele (4), Jim Mc-Cabe (3), Trevor Broadbent (3), Ben Docherty (3), Charlie Dench (2), Ian Lawrie (2), Darryl Wilkins (1) and Gary Lovell (1).

Yet perhaps the most remarkable score involving a Queenslander occurred in anything but a scratch match down in the proverbial "Z" grades.

It all happened way back in 1951 at the Sydney Cricket Ground, when Inswich's Bob Lawrie had the honour of being the first Queenslander to captain his country against a professional team from Britain.

"England", as the press of the day styled the FA XI tourists although the matches were never considered full internationals, had won the first 'Test' by a comfortable 4-1 and were expected to take the honours again.

Queensland Soccer's most Authorative Statistician

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With names such as Jimmy Hagan, Sam Bartram and Jackie Sewell in the English line-up, it was obvious Australia faced an uphill battle.

But then an extra factor came into play when a week of heavy rain turned the pitch into a quagmire perfectly suited to the vastly experienced tourists.

By half-time, the FA XI led 7-0 as Australian goalkeeper Norm Conquest found himself bombarded from all angles. As the goal tally mounted, a Sydney newswaper report of the time noted tersely: "A crowd of 14,123 saw the start of the match. Many of these had left the ground by the time it ended. England's white jerseys were still white . . . the Australians' were mud-black from their many visits to the ground."

By the time the final whistle brought a merciful end for the home side, the tally was 17-0 - still far and away the most spectacular scoring spree involving the Australian national team.

But it must be added that this black day was a rare event in the otherwise glittering career of Bob Lawrie.

An indication of Lawrie's quality came when he was stationed in England during a World War II stint with the RAAF, and turned out as a guest player for Brentford, a first division club at the outbreak of hostilities.

An automatic choice for Australia at right half in the late 1940s and early 1950s, he captained the team which toured South Africa in 1950 and at one stage led Australia in nine successive internationals.

And right to the end of his career, Lawrie kept on setting records. The final one, achieved in his swansong year of 1963, may never be beaten at the age of 43, he was a joint winner with Cliff Sander of The Courier-Mail's best and fairest tro-Continued next page

IT'S THOMMO TALKING

Queensland soccer has to be cleaned up and it is high time a few people realised that referees cannot do it on their own.

Two incidents in games over the weekend left me feeling sick and highlighted how bad the problem really is. At Heath Park on Sunday Ken Swan, one of the gentlemen of local soccer and a dual Rothman's medal winner mind you, was felled by an elbow which broke his nose and prompted a trip to hospital. Then at Speare Park on Monday I am told there were scenes akin to a Rugby game and youngster Dale Dawes was left unconscious on the ground.

The match officials can only see so much. In effect they have to be classic ball watchers. If there are animals on the park that are going to jeopardise the careers of our true footballers, then it is up to coaches and club officials to drag them off the field. Any coach, club president or supporter who condones this type of play, or can watch it and stand back doing nothing, must seriously question the reasons for his involvement in the game.

People may laugh at what they may think is an over-reaction, but let's act now before someone is killed. And it could so easily happen.

I read with interest last week's "From the Fastern Suburbs" column and admired the subtlety of their correspondent.

I then went to Heath Park and left my car in an unsealed car park, walked past the floodlights which are not suitable for XXXX League games, failed to find any toilets in the dressing room and after the match was forced to have a freezing cold shower.

Yes, some clubs have failed to meet some parts of the criteria. But others. like Mount Gravatt, have worked to a sensible plan of gradual development within our budget. And unlike Easts, who probably spent more on buying players this season than most, Mount Gravatt has developed its juniors and more than half our side is home-grown.

THE GOOD COACH

WEEK TEN: GOALKEEPING

Errors by goalkeepers undoubtedly are those that prove the most costly and most vividly remembered after the match.

The good coach will not instantly blame his goalkeeper for every goal conceded, but look at the factors leading up to the opposition scoring. He should decide whether the fault was the goalkeeper's, or in fact, whether he was left exposed and vulnerable by his defence.

The good coach though will always have his goalkeeper as best prepared as possible, and the only way to achieve that is through specialist coaching.

A goalkeeper can never get too much practice and should be utilised to his full extent with the opportunity to test all his skills, in every exercise possible. At regular periods, specialist training, apart from the remainder of the squad, should also be given.

The basic skills of a goalkeeper can be grouped into three areas: receiving a ball, distributing a ball and positioning to stop a ball.

The skills required for a keeper to properly receive a ball are similar to those of an outfield player receiving a pass. He must always be in line with the ball, body behind its flight. Slower balls may be taken by bending from the waist, heels in close, fingers pointing to the ground and scoop the ball.

If the ball is travelling faster, the keeper should drop to one knee, keeping the other heel in close with the toe pointing at right angles to the path of the ball. The ball should then be scooped up into the chest.

When taking a high ball the keeper should aim to attack the ball, trying to reach it at the maximum height. The hands should be behind the ball, thumbs touching.

The keeper should attempt to catch the ball whenever possible, but if conditions or the play does not allow for a clean take, a punch should be made—two-fisted if the ball is coming towards the goal, one-fisted if it is travelling across the goal. The ball should be knocked as far away from the goal and opposing players as possible.

When the goal is under seige, a keeper should always be taught to narrow the angle of the attackers' view on goal. The good coach will emphasise that the near post must be protected and the keeper must not advance so far as to be chipped. The keeper should be calm

and balanced and if possible jockey the attacker into the direction the keeper wants him to go, looking for an opportunity to dive at his feet. In this position the keeper is similar to the first defender and should adopt similar principles as outlined earlier in our series.

In blocking shots, the keeper should attempt to get as much of his body behind the ball as possible. With low shots the body should drop to the ground, the hands should go behind and on top of the ball. The ball should be pulled into the chest and then the keeper should roll into a ball for protection.

With diving saves, the dive should be sideways, the ball caught if possible with two hands or parried away with the fingertips.

Once the goalkeeper is in possession he is in a position to initiate an attack. The good coach should encourage the keeper to distribute with his hands rather than kicking, thus increasing accuracy and maintaining possession.

Players should be drilled to support the keeper once he is in possession, looking to exploit the spaces to the sides of the penalty area. Before distributing the ball, the keeper should be aware of the opposition and not put a teammate under pressure. His throw should allow his team-mate to control as quickly and easily as possible.

The good coach should drill his goal-keeper to be alert and aware of what is happening. He should be advised to patrol his area and always follow the path of the ball, even if it is at the opposite end of the field.

Exercise: Four-part circuit looking for good technique at speed. 1. Keeper throws or bounces ball high into air, makes a forward roll then catches ball before it hits ground, taking the ball in the fingertips and dragging down to chest (five times then 30 second rest, five repetitions); 2. Goalkeeper stands with coach facing. Ball served to either one metre to sides, above or in front of keeper who must stretch or drive to gather - not run (10 times with 30 seconds rest, three repetitions); 3. Similar as in previous exercise but keeper on back and must roll or stretch along ground to gather (same repetitions); 4. Keeper on side, arms stretched above

head. Coach serves the ball in front of hands. Keeper must get up and dive to save the ball. Work across in the line for 20 saves then come back working the dive to the other side (20 saves one side then 20 the other, one minute break, three repetitions).

While many variations can be used in specialist keeper training, the best practice for a goalkeeper is to be involved in real match situations. The keeper should be utilised where possible in all grid games and the good coach will encourage him to protect his goal as he would during a match.


